BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN, THE BRONX AND RICHMOND. Personnel, etc.

On June 30, 1906, the active personnel of the Department in these boroughs numbered 2,608, the fire extinguishing force comprising 2,260 members, assigned (with the exception of forty chief officers) to the companies of the twenty-two battalions, which compose six divisions. These companies are classified as follows:

Hook and ladder companies	34
Hose companies	1

Of the above companies 12 are known as combination companies, each being equipped with an engine and hook and ladder truck.

Thirteen of the engine and seven of the hook and ladder companies are known as double companies, equipped with two sets of apparatus, one of which remains in quarters to cover the unprotected territory while the other is absent in a response to an alarm of fire. One of the engine companies and three of the hook and ladder companies are equipped with water towers. One engine company and one hook and ladder company are each equipped with searchlight engines.

NOTABLE FIRES.

April 2, 5.31 a. m., 5.38 a. m., 5.39 a. m., Station 573.

Fire occurred at Nos. 308 and 310 West Fifty-ninth street, a six-story brick building, 50 by 90, occupied as billiard room and bowling alley.

The fire originated in cellar and extended to first, second, third, fourth, fifth and sixth floors, through stairway to elevator shaft, considerably damaging building.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Callaghan, Chiefs of Battalion Devanny, Kane, Ross and Graham.

The services of ten engine companies and four hook and ladder companies were required, and the duration of the fire was one hour.

Cause unknown.

At 5.38 a. m. and 5.39 a. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

April 8, 1.24 a. m., 1.35 a. m., 1.44 a. m., Station 616.

Fire occurred at Nos. 52 and 54 West Sixty-seventh street, a three-story brick building, 50 by 90, occupied as a garage.

The fire originated on the first floor and extended to second and third floors by stairway, elevator shaft and burning through flooring, considerably damaging building; also extended to Nos. 42 to 50 West Sixty-seventh street, through windows on east side of building, damage trifling, a six-story brick building, 100 by 90 feet, occupied for business purposes; also extended through rear windows to Nos. 55 to 69 West Sixty-sixth street, a three-story brick building, 225 by 100, occupied as a skating rink, damage slight.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department John Binns, Chiefs of Battalion Devanny, Crawley, Stone and Dougherty.

The services of twelve engine companies, four hook and ladder companies, Search Light Engine No. 2 and Water Tower No. 3 were required, and the duration of the fire was one hour.

Cause unknown.

At 1.35 a. m. and 1.44 a. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

April 8, 1.16 p. m., Station 277; 1.22 p. m., Station 277; 1.23 p. m., Station 277.

Fire occurred at Nos. 153 to 157 Lewis street, a four-story brick building, 50 by 75, occupied for business purposes.

Fire originated on the first floor, slightly damaging same.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Charles W. Kruger, Chiefs of Battalion Hayes, Worth, Shay and Kenlon.

The services of five engine companies and three hook and ladder companies were required, and the duration of the fire was ten minutes.

Cause unknown.

At 1.22 p. m. and 1.23 p. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

April 12, 3.31 a. m., Station 4-783, 3.34 a. m., 3.40 a. m., 4.14 a. m., Station 387.

Fire occurred at Nos. 318 and 320 East Twenty-third street, a six-story brick building, 50 by 100, occupied by printers.

Fire originated on the fourth floor and extended to fifth, sixth floors, through partitions and floor, considerably damaging building.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Langford, Chiefs of Battalion Graham, Shay, Ross and Acting Chief of Battalion Norton.

The services of eleven engine companies, four hook and ladder companies and Search Light Engine No. 2 were required, and the duration of the fire was five hours.

Cause unknown.

At 3.40 a. m. and 4.14 a. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

April 27, 12.23 p. m., 12.27 p. m., 12.37 p. m., Station 75.

Fire occurred at Nos. 16 and 18 Chambers street, a five-story brick building, 50 by 50, occupied by Typographical Union No. 6 as meeting room.

Fire originated on the second floor and extended to third, fourth and fifth floors and roof by stairways and pipe recesses; also extended to No. 20 Chambers street, a three-story brick building, 30 by 15, occupied by engravers, by doorways in walls, considerably damaging both buildings.

Chief officers present were Acting Chief of Department Binns, Deputy Chief of Department Callaghan, Chiefs of Battalion Duffy, Worth, Lucas and Acting Chief of Battalion Sullivan.

The services of ten engine companies, four hook and ladder companies and Water Tower No. 1 were required, and the duration of the fire was forty minutes.

Cause unknown.

At 12.27 p. m. and 12.37 p. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

May 15, 5.23 p. m., Station 449; 5.27 p. m., Station 449; 5.30 p. m., Station 449; 5.48 p. m., Station 449; 6.03 p. m., Station 425.

Fire occurred at Nos. 404 to 410 East Thirtieth street, a five-story and basement brick building, 125 by 75 feet, occupied as a piano factory.

The fire originated in basement and extended throughout building by stairways and elevator ways and chutes, considerably damaging building; also to Nos. 510 to 514 First avenue, a three-story brick building, 75 by 60 feet, occupied by wood turners, considerably damaging same; also extended to Nos. 403 to 409 East Twenty-ninth street, a five-story brick building, 100 by 60 feet, occupied as dwellings, slightly damaging building; also extended to Nos. 407 to 411 East Thirtieth street, occupied as a lumber yard; also to Nos. 506 and 508 First avenue, a five-story brick building, 50 by 60 feet, occupied as dwellings, slightly damaging building.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Langford, Acting Deputy Chief of Department Ross, Chiefs of Battalion Graham, Worth, Kenlon, Kane and Acting Chiefs of Battalion Fox, McGuire, Brogan and Ahearn.

The services of twenty-three engine companies, Search Light Engine No. 2, seven hook and ladder companies and Water Tower No. 3 were required and the duration of the fire was sixteen hours.

Cause unknown.

At 5.27 p. m., 5.30 p. m., 5.48 p. m., and 6.03 p. m., respectively, second, third, fourth and fifth alarms were sent out.

May 21, 10.07 p. m., 10.17 p. m., 10.25 p. m., Station 313.

The fire occurred on water front, between Arrietta street and Stuyvesant place, Tompkinsville, Borough of Richmond, a one-story brick building, 66 by 200 feet, occupied as a warehouse.

Fire originated in No. 3 storage compartment on the first floor and extended through roof; also extended to No. 9 compartment, a one-story brick building, 65 by 200 feet, occupied by same, considerably damaging both.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Guerin, Chief of Battalion King and Acting Chief of Battalion O'Hearn.

The services of five engine companies and two hook and ladder companies were required, and the duration of the fire was seven hours and thirty minutes.

Cause unknown.

At 10.17 p. m. and 10.25 p. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

May 23, 3.03 a. m., 3.12 a. m., Station 189.

The fire occurred at No 23 Spring street, a five-story brick building, 25 by 75 feet, occupied by wood turners.

The fire originated in the cellar and extended to first, second, third, fourth and fifth floors by stairway, pipe holes, etc., considerably damaging same.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Kruger, Chiefs of Battalion Worth, Hayes, Lucas and Acting Chief of Battalion Sullivan.

The services of twelve engine companies, Search Light Engine No. 1, four hook and ladder companies, and Water Tower No. 1 were required, and the duration of the fire was three hours.

Cause unknown.

At 3.12 a. m. third alarm was sent out.

May 26, 2.35 p. m., Station 412; 2.38 p. m., Station 412; 2.42 p. m., Station 412; 2.57 p. m., Station 372; 3.10 p. m., Station 412.

Fire occurred at Nos. 526 and 528 West Twenty-fifth street, a five-story brick building, 50 by 75 feet, occupied as a factory.

The fire originated on the first floor and extended to second, third, fourth and fifth floors and roof by stairway and pipe recesses, elevator shafts and windows, totally damaging building; also extended to No. 530 West Twenty-fifth street, a three-story brick building, 25 by 75 feet, by windows and archways, damaging building totally; also extended to No. 532 West Twenty-fifth street, a three-story brick building, 25 by 75 feet, occupied as a stable, damage slight; also extended to No. 534 West Twenty-fifth street, a three-story brick building, 25 by 75 feet, occupied as a stable, slightly damaging same; also extended to No. 544 West Twenty-fifth street, a two-story brick building, 25 by 100 feet, occupied as a factory, slightly damaging building; also extended to Nos. 527 to 531 West Twenty-fourth street, a four-story brick building, 100 by 100 feet, first floor, occupied as a steam laundry, upper floors by printer and dealer in metallic beds, considerably damaging same; also to Nos. 533 and 535 West Twenty-fourth street, a six-story brick, 50 by 100 feet, occupied as a stable, considerably damaging same.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Langford, Chiefs of Battalion Ross, Lucas, Shay, Graham, Devanny and Acting Chief of Battalion O'Hearn.

The services of twenty-six engine companies, Search Light Engine No. 2, six hook and ladder companies, and Water Tower No. 3 were required, and the duration of the fire was two hours.

Cause unknown.

At 2.38 p. m., 2.42 p. m., 2.57 p. m. and 3.10 p. m., respectively, second, third, fourth and fifth alarms were sent out.

June 5, 10.40 p. m., 11.26 p. m., 11.40 p. m., Station 494.

The fire occurred at Nos. 327 and 329 East Thirty-fourth street, a five-story brick building, 40 by 90 feet, occupied as store and shop fixtures.

The fire originated on the third floor and extended to fourth and fifth floors and roof by stairway, elevator shaft and pipe recesses, considerably damaging same.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Callaghan, Chiefs of Battalion Kane, Shay and Acting Chief of Battalion Fox.

The services of nine engine companies, searchlight engine 2 and four hook and ladder companies were required, and the duration of the fire was one hour and forty-five minutes.

Cause unknown.

At 11.26 p. m. and 11.40 p. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

June 5, 4.10 a. m., 4.16 a. m., Station 213.

The fire occurred on waterfront, between Arrietta street and Stuyvesant place, Tompkinsville, borough of Richmond, a two-story brick building, 90 by 300 feet, occupied by the American Dock and Trust Company as a warehouse.

The fire originated on the first floor, compartment No. 17, and extended throughout building; also extended to compartment No. 18, a one-story brick building, 63 by 300 feet, by wall of No. 17 falling on same; considerably damaging both compartments.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Guerin, Chiefs of Battalion King, Martin, Kenlon and Acting Chief of Battalion Murray.

The services of six engine companies and two hook and ladder companies were required and the duration of the fire was seventeen hours.

Cause unknown.

At 4.16 o'clock a. m. third alarm was sent out.

June 12, 12.43 a. m., 12.51 a. m., 12.52 a. m., 12.59 a. m., Station 2-365.

The fire occurred at No. 697 East One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, a two-story brick building, 25 by 100 feet, occupied as a stable and engine room.

The fire originated on the first floor, totally damaging same; also extended to No. 695 East One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, a four-story brick building, 25 by 100 feet, occupied as a factory, totally damaging same; extended to Nos. 727 to 733 East One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, a six-story brick building, 100 by 100 feet, occupied as a factory, considerably damaging same; also extended to Nos. 702 and 704 East One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, a four-story brick building, 50 by 100 feet, occupied as a factory, totally damaging same; extended to Nos. 706 to 712 East One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, a six-story brick building, 100 by 100 feet, occupied as a silk factory, considerably damaging building.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Ahearn, Chiefs of Battalion Sloan, King, Gray and Acting Chiefs of Battalion Lawlor, Nash and Roan.

The services of fifteen engine companies and five hook and ladder companies were required and the duration of the fire was two hours and thirty minutes.

Cause unknown.

At 12.51 a. m., 12.52 a. m., 12.59 a. m., respectively, second, third and fourth alarms were sent out.

June 12, 1.37 p. m., 1.53 p. m., Station 213.

The fire occurred on river front, between Arietta street and Stuyvesant place, Tompkinsville, Borough of Richmond, a one-story brick building, 50 by 200 feet, occupied by American Dock and Trust Company as a cotton warehouse.

The fire originated on the first floor, considerably damaging building

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Guerin, Chiefs of Battalion Martin, Kenlon and Acting Chief of Battalion McDermott.

The services of five engine companies and two hook and ladder companies were required, and the duration of the fire was six hours.

Cause unknown.

At 1.53 p. m. third alarm was sent out.

June 13, 8.30 p. m., Station 709; 8.39 p. m., Station 719; 8.43 p. m., Station 709; 8.56 p. m., Station 719.

Fire occurred at No. 428 East One Hundred and Eighth street, a one-story frame building, 25 by 50, occupied as a rag shop.

The fire originated on the first floor and extended to No. 426 East One Hundred and Eighth street, a one-story frame building, 25 by 50, occupied as a rag shop, considerably damaging same; also to No. 424 East One Hundred and Eighth street, a one-story frame, 25 by 50, occupied as paper stock, damage considerable; extended to No. 430 East One Hundred and Eighth street, a two-story frame, 50 by 90, occupied as stables, slightly damaging same; also to No. 440 East One Hundred and Eighth street, a one-story frame, 75 by 100, occupied as stone works, damage slight; also extended to No. 416 East One Hundred and Eighth street, a one-story frame, 25 by 50, occupied as stables, damage slight; also to No. 418 East One Hundred and Eighth street, a one-story frame, 25 by 50, occupied as a rag shop, considerably damaging same; also extended to No. 422 East One Hundred and Eighth street, a two-story frame, 25 by 50, occupied as stables, damage slight; also No. 420 East One Hundred and Eighth street, a one-story brick, 25 by 50, occupied as a stable, damage slight; also to No. 419 East One Hundred and Seventh street, a one-story frame, 25 by 50, occupied by J. Genovese Marble Works, damage slight; also to Nos. 415 and 417 East One Hundred and Seventh street, a one-story frame, 50 by 50, occupied as a rag shop, damage considerable; also to Nos. 409 to 413 East One Hundred and Seventh street, a five-story brick, 75 by 90, occupied by leather findings, damage slight.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Duane, Chiefs of Battalion Crawley, Kane, Kenlon and Acting Chiefs of Battalion Lawlor, Corcoran and Winter.

The services of fourteen engine companies, six hook and ladder companies were required, and the duration of the fire was twelve hours.

Cause unknown.

At 8.39 p. m., 8.43 p. m., and 8.56 p. m., respectively, second, third and fourth alarms were sent out.

June 14, 8.13 p. m., Station 234; 8.18 p. m.; 8.29 p. m.

Fire occurred at Nos. 2 and 3 Congress street, a six-story and attic brick building, 50 by 100, occupied as stables.

Fire originated on fifth floor and extended to sixth and attic floors by stairway, considerably damaging same.

Chief Officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Kruger, Chiefs of Battalion Worth, Terpeny and Acting Chiefs of Battalion Reilly and McGuire.

The services of twelve engine companies, four hook and ladder companies, Search Light Engine Company No. 1 and Water Tower No. 2 were required, and the duration of the fire was one hour and thirty minutes.

The fire originated on first floor and extended to second, third and fourth floors by stairway and burning through flooring, considerably damaging same; also extended to No. 28 West Sixty-sixth street, a five-story brick building, 25 by 85 feet, through side windows, occupied as dwellings, damage trifling; also extended through side windows to No. 32 West Sixty-sixth street, a five-story brick building, 25 by 85, occupied by tenants as dwellings, damage slight; extended to No. 11 West Sixty-fifth street, a five-story brick building, 25 by 85, occupied as dwellings, damage trifling.

Chief officers present were Acting Chief of Department John Binns, Acting Deputy Chief of Department Dougherty, Chiefs of Battalion Devanny, Kane and Acting Chiefs of Battalion Livingston and Corcoran.

The underground system consists of 131.56 miles of cable in subways, or 1,063.07 miles of conductor. During the quarter 13,252 feet of cable were laid, of which 7,797 feet were for alterations and repairs and 5,455 feet were for extending the system; 4.68 miles of wire were put up, of which 3.28 miles were for repairs and alterations, and 1.40 miles were for extensions; 1.29 miles of wire were taken down, and five poles taken down; 6,100 feet of aerial cable, of which 1,100 feet were for alterations and repairs and 5,000 feet for extensions; 542½ feet of pipe were laid, all of which were for extensions.

NOTABLE FIRES.

May 15, 1906, 1.21 p. m., Station 493.

Fire occurred at Nos. 1 to 11 Oak street, a one-story corrugated iron building, 100 by 150 by 40 feet, occupied as a storehouse for jute. Fire extended through building, which was a total loss; contents considerably damaged.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department in Charge Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Thomas Lally, Deputy Chief of Department Burns, Chiefs of Battalion McCarthy, Howe and Geo. Rogers, and Acting Chief of Battalion Smith.

The services of nine engine and three hook and ladder companies and three fireboats were required, and the fire was placed under control in about one hour and thirty minutes.

At 1.29 p. m. and 1.33 p. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

May 20, 1906, 3.10 p. m.

Fire occurred in plant of New York Sanitary Utilization Company on Barren Island. Fire originated on the first floor of three-story frame building, 92 by 225 feet, occupied as press room, and extended throughout entire building, considerably damaging building and contents; also extended to the following named buildings, which were considerably damaged: Three-story frame and brick building, 92 by 225 feet, occupied as digester plant; one-story brick building, 40 by 60 feet, used as boiler plant; one-story corrugated iron building, 40 by 150 feet, used as boiler plant; two one-story corrugated iron buildings, 30 by 30 feet each, used as pumping plant; two-story brick building, 50 by 72 feet, used as dryer plant; one-story corrugated iron building, 80 by 80 feet, used as dryer plant; one-story concrete and iron building, 20 by 30 feet, used as dryer plant; two one-story concrete buildings, 30 by 30 feet each, used as engine plant; one-story frame and brick building, 150 by 300 feet, used as storehouse; one-story frame building, 20 by 40 feet, used as evaporator plant; two two-story corrugated iron sheds, 20 by 125 feet each, used as conveyor plant; also extended to the following, with slight damage: Coal bins containing 3,000 tons of coal; docks and wharf on east end of island.

At 3.10 p. m. received telephone message from Mr. Weidman, who is connected with the above named company, that fire was burning fiercely in the above mentioned plant. Immediately ordered Engine Company 123 (fireboat "Seth Low") to proceed to Barren Island. Deputy Chief of Department in charge Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Thomas Lally, accompanied by Hon. Charles C. Wise, Deputy Fire Commissioner, immediately proceeded to Flatlands Bay, and were conveyed by naphtha launch to Barren Island. Ordered Chief of Forty-seventh Battalion, with a detail of six men, to report to the island. Fire was placed under control in about five hours. Duration of fire, 42 hours. Estimated damage, \$350,000.

June 6, 1906, 11.51 a. m., Station 819.

Fire occurred at No. 626 Rockaway avenue, two-story frame building, 35 by 60 feet, occupied as stable. Fire originated on first floor and extended throughout building, which was a total loss. Also extended to No. 624 Rockaway avenue, two-story frame building, 32 by 210 feet, occupied as shed for storage of lumber, totally destroying building and contents; also No. 622 Rockaway avenue, one-story frame building, 15 by 10 feet, occupied as office, considerably damaging building and contents; also No. 620 Rockaway avenue, one-story frame building, occupied as office, considerably damaging building and contents; also to piles of lumber in yard at Nos. 612 to 618 Rockaway avenue, damaging same considerably.

Chief officers present were Deputy Chief of Department in charge Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Thomas Lally, Deputy Chief of Department Martin, Chiefs of Battalion Thomas, Matschke and McGroarty and Acting Chief of Battalion Murray.

The services of nine engine and four hook and ladder companies were required, and the fire was placed under control in about 3½ hours. Estimated loss, \$12,000.

At 11.54 a. m. and 11.58 a. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
