REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS, QUARTER ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1905.

Offices of Commissioner of Public Works,

Hon. JOHN F. AHEARN, President, Borough of Manhattan:

Dear Sir—In accordance with section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, I beg to submit the following report of the business of the Department of Public Works for the quarter ended December 31, 1905:

The following contracts were entered into:

Twenty-one paving and repaving, estimated cost, \$378,983.19; six regulating and grading, estimated cost, \$93,589.70; five sewer and receiving basins, estimated cost, \$24,765.94; four miscellaneous, estimated cost, \$42,964.95. Total, thirty-six contracts entered into at an aggregate estimated cost of \$548,303.78.

Contracts were completed as follows:

Forty paving and repaving, cost, \$656,982.39; two regulating and grading, cost, \$18,263.88; eight sewer, cost, \$79,557.81; seven flagging, cost, \$14,708.09; three miscellaneous, cost, \$356,796.92. Total contracts completed, sixty, at an aggregate cost of \$1,126,309.09.

The principal items of work done under the regulating, grading and flagging contracts were: 34,391 cubic yards of earth excavated, 15,392 cubic yards of rock excavated, 53,663 cubic yards filling placed, 8,976 linear feet curbstones set, 1,524 linear feet curbstone reset, 66,563 square feet of flagging laid, 7,694 square feet of flagging relaid, 1,093 square feet of bridgestone set, 4,700 cubic yards retaining wall built and 53,616 cubic feet hammer dressed granite used.

New pavements were laid as follows:

Sheet asphalt, 5.70 linear miles; block asphalt, 0.83 miles; wood block pavement, 2 miles; granite block pavement, 0.36 miles. Total, 8.80 miles.

The working force took up and relaid 81,561 square yards of stone block pavement.

The following permits were issued:

To construct vaults, 53; to repair vaults, 41; to place guy posts, 9; to place tar kettles, 108; to place boilers, 192; to set banner poles, 37, and to repair pavement, 7.

The receipts for the permits issued to construct vaults amounted to \$54,141.39.

The macadamized and unpaved roadways in the upper part of the borough were regularly repaired and dangerous washouts promptly filled up.

Permits to open pavements were issued as follows:

Six hundred and twenty-seven to lay and overhaul electric mains; 15 to lay and overhaul gas mains; 3 to lay and overhaul steam mains; 8 for other purposes; 3,358 to lay and overhaul electric services; 2,569 to lay and overhaul gas services, and 213 to lay and overhaul steam services.

City departments made 325 openings to lay and overhaul water mains and 41 openings to lay and overhaul sewer mains, while plumbers made 497 openings to lay and overhaul water service pipes and 326 openings to lay and overhaul sewer pipes; 499 openings were made to construct and repair railways, making a total of 8,481.

Fourteen receiving basins and 14,365 linear feet of sewers were constructed during the quarter, making the total length of the sewerage system in the Borough of Manhattan 2,705,041, or 512.31 miles, with 6,167 receiving basins.

The repair and reconstruction work of the Bureau of Sewers amounted to 4,226 linear feet.

Work is in progress under 13 contracts, involving an expenditure of \$81,087, payable out of the Street Improvement Fund, and two contracts for reconstructing sewers are in progress at an estimated expenditure of \$6,392.

Three hundred and forty permits for new sewers and 294 for repairs to sewers were issued.

The force of mechanics and laborers cleaned 2,898 receiving basins, 282 manholes, 132,018 linear feet of sewer and performed much other necessary work set forth in the report of the Bureau of Sewers.

The Bureau of Incumbrances received and attended to 704 complaints of obstructions, made 121 seizures and removals of obstructions, issued 1,246 building material permits, 236 permits to cross sidewalks with horses and carts, 178 permits to erect temporary sheds over sidewalks, removed 122 loads of dirt, stone and rubbish, 8 fallen trees, dangerous stumps and posts, and served 8 notices to repair defective vault covers.

The report of the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices gives a detailed account of the repairs made in and the supplies furnished to the various public buildings and offices within the jurisdiction of this Department.

STATEMENT NO. 2.

Report of Chief Engineer Loomis.

January 15, 1906.

Hon. MATTHEW F. DONOHUE, Superintendent of Sewers:

Dear Sir—In compliance with your instructions I herewith hand you a report of the work done and in course of construction under my supervision for the quarter ending December 31, 1905, with a statement of work done by mechanics and laborers.

The present total length of the sewerage system in the Borough of Manhattan is 2,705,041 feet, or 512.31 miles, with 6,167 receiving basins, making the amount done and accepted during the quarter 14,365 linear feet of sewer and 14 receiving basins. Seven repair and reconstruction contracts amounting to 4,226 linear feet were completed.

The following is a list of all works completed:

Sewer in West One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street, between Boulevard Lafayette and Riverside drive.

Sewer in One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, between Harlem river and Lenox avenue, and in Lenox avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-sixth and One Hundred and Forty-seventh streets.

Alterations and improvements to sewer in Sixty-fifth street, between Columbus avenue and Central Park West, and in Columbus avenue, between Sixty-fifth and Sixty-seventh streets.

Sewers in One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, north and south sides, between Riverside drive and Broadway.

Extension of sewer in Seventy-fourth street, between Columbus avenue and Central Park West.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in Broad street, between East river and Wall street, and connecting sewers in South, Front, Water, Pearl, Bridge, Stone, South William and Beaver streets.

Sewer in West street, between Morris street and Battery place, and in Battery place, between West street and Broadway, with outlet through Pier 4, North river.

Sewer in Morris street, between West and Greenwich streets.

Sewer in Washington street, between Battery place and Morris street.

Sewer in Greenwich street, between Rector and Thames streets.

Sewer in Twenty-fourth street, between Avenue A and First avenue.

Sewer in Albany street, between West and Greenwich streets.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in Avenue St. Nicholas, between One Hundred and Forty-ninth and One Hundred and Fifty-fifth streets, and new sewer in Avenue St. Nicholas, east side, between One Hundred and Fiftieth and One Hundred and Fifty-fifth streets.

Receiving basin on north side of West Sixty-ninth street, between West End avenue and Twelfth avenue.

There are now in active progress 13 contracts payable out of Street Improvement Fund, involving an expenditure of about \$81,087.10. There are also 2 reconstructing contracts in active progress, involving an expenditure of about \$6,392.04. A detailed statement of all of the above works appears in schedule annexed.

The following contracts are in contemplation and will be started as soon as they can be got ready for advertising. The surveys have been authorized by the President on petition of property owners and plans are now being prepared so that the contracts may be advertised as soon as possible for the following works:

Sewers in Two Hundred and Fourteenth and Two Hundred and Fifteenth streets, between Ninth and Tenth avenues.

Sewer in Two Hundred and Fourteenth street, between Tenth avenue and Harlem river.

Sewer in Two Hundred and Thirteenth street, between Tenth avenue and Harlem river.

Sewer in Eleventh avenue, between Thirty-fourth and Thirty-sixth streets, and in Thirty-fifth street, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues.

Sewer in Grand street, between Jackson and Columbia streets, and in Henry street, between Grand and Gouverneur streets.

Sewer in Grand street, between Lewis and Columbia streets, and in Henry street, from Jackson to Gouverneur street.

Rebuilding of sewer in Twenty-sixth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues.

Rebuilding of sewer in Liberty street, Greenwich to West street.

Rebuilding of sewer in Cedar street, Broadway to West street.

Rebuilding of sewer in Liberty street, between Nassau street and Maiden lane.

Rebuilding of sewer in Frankfort street, West to Cliff and Cliff to Hague street.

Rebuilding of sewer in John street, Broadway to Pearl street.

Rebuilding of sewer in Cedar street, between Broadway and Nassau street.

Sewer in One Hundred and Fifty-second street, between Broadway and Riverside drive.

Sewer in One Hundred and Seventy-second street, between Audubon and Amsterdam avenues.

Receiving basin northwest corner One Hundred and Fortieth street and Fifth avenue.

Sewer in One Hundred and Fifty-third street, between Broadway and Riverside drive.

Receiving basin northeast corner Thirty-eighth street and First avenue.

Sewer in Audubon avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-fifth and One Hundred and Sixty-sixth streets.

Receiving basin south side of Fourth street, near East river.

Repairing and Rebuilding sewer in Ferry street, between Cliff and Water streets.

Receiving basin on northeast corner Avenue A and Twenty-second street.

Sewer in Convent avenue, west side, between One Hundred and Fifty-first and One Hundred and Fifty-second streets.

Sewer in One Hundred and Forty-third street and One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, between Lenox and Fifth avenues.

Sewer in Broadway, west side, between One Hundred and Seventy-seventh and One Hundred and Eighty-first streets.

Rebuilding receiving basins both sides Broadway, between One Hundred and Fifty-fifth and One Hundred and Sixty-ninth streets.

Extension of sewer in One Hundredth street, between First avenue and Harlem river west to about 50 feet from First avenue and east to Harlem river.

Alterations and improvements to sewers in Columbus avenue, between Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets, and in Sixty-first street, between Broadway and Columbus avenue.

West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street (Depot lane)—Haven avenue to Riverside drive.

Pier, new 15, East river.

Sewer in Broadway, Two Hundred and Fourteenth street to Ship Canal Bridge, Two Hundred and Fifteenth, Two Hundred and Eighteenth and Two Hundred and Nineteenth streets.

Sewer in Broadway to Ninth avenue, and in Ninth avenue, between Two Hundred and Fifteenth and Two Hundred and Nineteenth streets.

Sewer in One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, Broadway to Kingsbridge road.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Fifty-second street, between Eighth avenue and Macomb's Dam road.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Sixty-third street, between Broadway and St. Nicholas avenue.

The work of construction of this Bureau during the past quarter has been scattered over almost all sections of the City from the Battery to Washington Heights. As alluded to in previous report, the great activity in building has necessitated the construction and reconstruction of sewers in almost all parts of the City. Some of the larger works which have been completed during the quarter might be mentioned, for instance, sewer in Broad street, between Wall and South streets, together with outlet under Pier 4, East river. This work has been over a year in progress and replaced an old sewer built in the early history of the City which had become very much dilapidated.

Another contract worthy of notice is the sewer in St. Nicholas avenue, west side, between One Hundred and Forty-ninth and One Hundred and Fifty-fifth streets, which was reconstructed under the sidewalk in front of very many expensive apartment houses, passed under the old Croton Aqueduct and was otherwise of difficult construction. I am pleased to note that this work was carried on without any complaints from resident property owners or damage to adjoining buildings.

A large part of the work carried on during the quarter consisted of rebuilding pipe sewers which were constructed some thirty odd years ago and replacing the same with ones of larger capacity. A large part of the work for the future will be of this class, since we find, especially in the thickly settled portion of the City, that pipes laid about that date are in very bad repair, and in consequence have been frequently clogged with dirt and other obstructions and found to be of insufficient capacity.

The upper portion of the island, which has been alluded to frequently in other reports, is now in better condition for improvement than it was during the early portion of the year. Contract has been already awarded for an outlet sewer in West Two Hundred and Sixteenth street and Harlem river, which serves quite a large territory. In connection with this, we are now making preparations to construct sewers along Broadway, from Two Hundred and Fourteenth street to the Ship Canal Bridge, together with some branch sewers in other streets.

Very expensive works carried on by the Department of Docks on the river front, consisting in the construction of new bulkhead-walls, some of which have been farther inland than the original bulkhead-line as, for instance, in the Chelsea District, have resulted in the destruction of quite a number of outlet sewers which must be rebuilt in the near future.

All such work will have to be provided for by appropriation, since it would be unjust to reassess property to provide for changes which other works of the City have rendered necessary.

Sewer Permits.

Three hundred and forty permits for new sewers and 294 permits for repairs to sewers have been issued.

Engineers' Fees.

Amount of Engineers' fees assessed on property benefited and charged to Street Improvement Fund is \$10,614.85.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

President of the Borough of Manhattan,
Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices,
New York, February 17, 1906.

Hon. WILLIAM DALTON, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—In accordance with your instructions I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending December 31, 1905:

Criminal Courts Building.

Orders were issued for the usual janitor's and engineer's supplies and the care and maintenance of the plumbing, steam and gas systems. Repairs were made to the leaks in the boilers, the hot water tank was repaired, also the 6-inch header on top of boiler; the 6-inch flange valve was overhauled and placed in good condition. The leaks on the 6-inch main were repaired, and three pumps and one steam gauge connected, and the flanges in engine and boiler room packed. Repairs were made to the brick piers and walls in the cellar of the building on the Elm street side; all the open joints pointed and repairs made to the cement floor where required. Necessary plastering was performed in the Labor Bureau, Civil Service Commission. All of the outside masonry and brick work on the Elm street side of the building, from White to Franklin streets, from the sidewalk to the roof, was pointed up and repaired. Motors in the engine room were thoroughly examined and defective parts removed, repaired and left in perfect working order. Six electric cables for the elevator bells were installed and repairs were made to the old cable. All of the new steamfitting work was covered, also the piping of the tank with an 85 per cent. magnesia covering.

District Attorney's Office.

The walls and ceilings of the large room adjoining the District Attorney's office were cleaned off, prepared and painted as directed. A supply of shelving was furnished and erected for the records of this office and for the library. An oak and glass partition, about 25 linear feet in length, was furnished and erected in the large room on the fourth floor adjoining the law library. The upper panels of the same were arranged on pivots with two doors and all the necessary hardware. Forty portable desk lamps, 5 cluster lights and 4 stand lamps were furnished and installed in the above office. Repairs were made to the lighting fixtures.

Court of General Sessions.

Chief Clerk's Office—Three small rugs were furnished as selected, also three Wilton rugs, 34 by 60.

Civil Service Commission.

One oak roll-top typewriter desk and one rug were furnished for the use of the above commission.

About 400 yards of plain A linoleum was furnished and laid in the reception-room, witness-room, room adjoining library and room on the top floor, together with three Axminster rugs, one clothes tree and umbrella stand and two dozen chairs, and four 7-foot settees, two dozen small chairs and six dozen No. 453 chairs.

The necessary janitor's and engineer's supplies were furnished for the cleaning and care of the building. The elevators were examined and found in good condition.

County Court House.

The usual janitor's and engineer's supplies were furnished during the quarter, together with the necessary supply of steam. Repairs were made to the exhaust pipes from the engine room, new gate valves and connections put on, new drip line from steam drum and trap, the hot water well connected and repairs made to valves and piping as required, and the steam system left in complete working order.

About 50 burners, 125 globes and 250 mantles were furnished and installed where required. The tile flooring was repaired and new tile furnished where necessary. The elevators were examined, piston rods, pistons and valves repacked and general repairs made to place same in good condition. All the canopies, curtains, portieres, shades,

etc., were taken down, cleaned and repaired and 13 new shades furnished. The necessary janitor's and engineer's supplies were furnished as required.

Supreme Court—One screen was furnished for Justice Dowling's room; 1 book-keeper's desk 4 feet long for the Calendar Clerk; 1 specially constructed cabinet book-case made to order for Judge Davis' room, 23 rubber threads $\frac{1}{8}$ inch thick, and 23 polished brass nosings furnished and laid in the dining-room, 1 steel filing case furnished and made to order for Special Term, Part 2, and 3 tapestry table covers furnished for the Justices' chambers, 20 presiding chairs for use in the various parts of the Supreme Court were furnished and made to order to conform to the present style of furniture, made of the best quartered oak, upholstered with leather seats and back, and the best South American hair used for filling, and 12 dozen chairs furnished. One wardrobe was furnished for Part 2, Trial Term, and 1 roll-top desk for Trial Term, Part 7. A supply of mineral water was furnished during the quarter to the various parts of the Supreme Court. One table was furnished for Judge Fitzgerald's room.

Surrogate's Court—About 200 yards of best quality of body brussels carpet were furnished and laid in the above court room and rooms connected with the above court.

City Hall.

The usual janitor's and engineer's supplies were furnished, together with the necessary supply of steam. New valves were installed on the steam system and general repairs made to same where required. About 90 incandescent lights were furnished and installed in the clock tower in dome of building. A small strip of linoleum and 20 yards of Wilton velvet carpet were furnished and laid in the Borough President's office.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Plans and specifications were prepared by Messrs. Warren & Wetmore, architects, for altering the platform, improving same to meet the requirements of the Board. Desks were erected and chairs and new railing furnished. The work was done in accordance with designs, and was found necessary to facilitate the business of the Board.

Mayor's Office—Twenty-seven square yards of special Templeton Axminster carpet, with plain red centre and shaded border, was furnished and laid, and the old carpet taken up. Four curtains of red velvet were furnished and put up on the windows of the above office, interlined with double faced flannel, and lined with cream colored Parma satin, and finished with special made bullion edging, with silk pull-cord and tassels complete.

A supply of clean towels was furnished each week for use of the office.

Brownstone Building.

The usual janitor's and engineer's supplies were furnished. One oak partition, with all necessary glass shelving, hardware, etc., was furnished and erected as directed; partition taken down on the third floor, new flooring laid and new panel doors installed. Considerable plumbing work was performed in the ladies' toilet; extra wash basins put in and supply line from pumps to tank in cellar. One rug was furnished for the Attendants' room, also chair and one table. The walls and ceilings in the Chief Clerk's rooms, connected with the City Court, were cleaned off, prepared and painted as directed. The water pipes on tank in the above building were covered with hair felt and canvas. The elevator pump was repacked and repaired.

City Court—One flat top desk and one chair were furnished to the Calendar Clerk, and the frame of the late Justice Fitzsimmons was regilded as directed.

West Fifty-fourth Street Court House.

The usual cleaning and engineer's supplies were furnished. Repairs were made to the heating coils in the hot-air ducts on the westerly side of basement. Repairs were also made to the steam pipes, coils and radiators throughout the upper portion of the building and Janitor's floor. New water gauges were put on boiler, and the return and drip pipes repaired, and the steam plant left in first-class working order. The walls, ceilings and woodwork in the various rooms connected with the Magistrates' Court in the above building were cleaned off, prepared and painted as directed. The elevators were examined and all necessary repairs made to same. The piston and operating valves were repacked and the hand rope and nipple on the supply pipe were renewed. One steel document filing case was furnished and installed for the use of the Tenth District Court, also two steel document filing cases were made to order in accordance with sketch for this court.

Harlem Court House.

The following painting work was performed in the above court house: The walls, ceilings and woodwork were cleaned off, prepared and painted in the rear hallway from top to bottom. The iron work on the stairways received two coats of paint and varnished. All repairs necessary were made to the steam plant and the same left in perfect order. Defective valves and connections were removed and new ones substituted. About 100 yards of body brussels carpet and 50 yards of linoleum were furnished and laid in the above building. All the janitor's and engineer's supplies were furnished as usual.

East Fifty-seventh Street Court House.

The usual janitor's and engineer's supplies were furnished. This building is being placed in first-class condition under a contract.

Children's Court.

The usual janitor's and engineer's supplies were furnished. The walls, ceilings and woodwork were cleaned off, prepared and painted. Also all the windows and the iron bars inside and outside received a coat of paint.

Thirteenth District Municipal Court.

The usual janitor's and engineer's supplies were furnished. The cold water pipes and branches under the first floor, also pipes leading from roof to tank, were covered as directed. The two heating stoves necessary to heat old premises No. 200 East Broadway were furnished as directed. About 250 yards of the best grade of inlaid linoleum, as selected, were furnished and laid in the new court room at No. 264 Madison street, also about 200 yards of Wilton velvet carpet were furnished and laid. Two wardrobes and 7 dozen chairs were furnished, together with 71 settees. All the defective tin from the main front cornice was removed and replaced with new tin of best quality. All the soil and vent lines which were exposed were inclosed with oak, and the cellar ceiling above boiler room was made fireproof by the installation of concrete deafening between beams and plaster boards set on the under side of ceiling. The parapet walls were extended 3 feet 6 inches above roof in rear of building, and blue stone coping placed over same. Counters were provided on both sides of Clerk's partition on third story, and the shelves underneath same on Clerk's side inclosed with doors, and terrazo floor of passage leading to court was laid.

Essex Market Court House.

The usual janitor's and engineer's supplies were furnished.

Fourth District Municipal Court.

The usual supplies were furnished, also one wardrobe.

First District Magistrate's Court.

About 20 yards of body Brussels carpet and about 20 yards of plain linoleum and one small rug were furnished and laid as directed.

Eighth District Municipal Court.

One fireproof safe with combination locks, etc., and the interior arranged as ordered, and the usual cleaning supplies furnished.

Department of Finance.

One filing cabinet, one set of vertical guides and 25 blank guides were furnished to the Auditing Bureau. Three roll top desks, $3\frac{1}{2}$ feet wide, and 18 high revolving desk stools with cane seats and back, and one roll top desk, $3\frac{1}{2}$ feet long, were furnished, also a cashier's cage was erected, old railing taken down and new furnished and installed. Repairs were made to the exhaust fans and lighting system as required in the office of the Receiver of Taxes. In room 233 a record room was constructed with

all shelving for books, documents, etc., together with all carpentering work incidental thereto. The Bureau of City Revenue and Markets received two revolving chairs. The Bureau of Investigation three chairs; the Bureau of Law and Adjustment one-half dozen sets of library bureau filing cards; the Bureau of Franchises had three Pullman ventilators installed; 222 map tubes were furnished and installed for the Bureau of Real Estate. One set of Macy's sectional book cases was furnished for the book-keeper's office.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

One Remington 4-drawer drop cabinet, 37 by 32 by 30 inches, golden oak grade A, and one Remington typewriter chair, No. 22, upholstered leather back and cane seat, and one roll top desk, and one revolving chair were furnished.

City Chamberlain's Office.

Necessary lettering of the offices was performed as directed, and the windows in the above office fitted up with ventilators. One combination gas and electric fixture similar in design to the one at present in use was furnished and installed. About 250 yards of inlaid linoleum were furnished and laid. The old linoleum was taken up and taken to the store room, also $10\frac{1}{2}$ yards of Wilton velvet and 16 yards of Wilton border were furnished and laid. One umbrella stand was also furnished. Several carpet runners were furnished to run between desks, about 60 yards in all.

City Paymaster's Office.

Necessary cleaning supplies were furnished as needed. One fire and burglar proof safe with special cabinet work and full banker's chest placed at the bottom of same was furnished and installed in the above office. Chest was made extra heavy, and the measurement of same was 19 inches high, 46 inches wide and 18 inches deep. An electric cabinet was installed over the cash safe.

The Markets.

Fulton Market—The old iron columns under the floor were taken down and safe and proper foundations built for same, flooring raised and jacked up, and the iron posts replaced in proper position as directed under stands occupied by Ottmann & Co., and restaurant stands 12, 14, 16 and 26.

Jefferson Market—All of the old tin on roof of awning gutters and leaders were stripped off and carted from the premises, and the iron frame covered with new roof, gutters and leaders. The galvanized iron used was of the best No. 24 Bloom, and the corrugated iron $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch corrugated No. 24, well riveted and cleated fast to frame. The upper side of roof was flashed and ends turned into brick work one inch, and all finished in a first class manner. The tin roof on the Greenwich side of the market was repaired and painted, and the roof and gutters left water tight. The walls and ceilings of the hallway of the market building were cleaned off, prepared and painted, and the plastering repaired. Also the iron awning on the Sixth and Greenwich avenues side thoroughly scraped, cleaned and painted. The usual cleaning supplies were furnished.

Washington Market—The old flooring and sleepers were taken up and replaced with new material at several stands throughout the market where the same was necessary. Repairs were made to doors, etc., and new ones furnished where required. Necessary cleaning supplies were furnished as required and ordered.

West Washington Market—The glass in skylight No. 24 Grace avenue was taken out where broken and replaced with new. New leader installed at No. 16 Grace avenue, the gutters lined from No. 39 to 49 Grace avenue; new leader at No. 33 Grace avenue, No. 32 Thompson avenue and No. 17 Loew avenue, and the gutters lined and roof repaired from Nos. 37 to 47 Lawton avenue. The gutters lined at Nos. 33, 35 and 37 Thompson avenue, and the roof repaired from Nos. 34 to 44 Thompson avenue, and Nos. 35 to 39 Gansevoort street. All obstructions and refuse was removed from around the above market and the same cleared, repairs made to leaders where necessary, and defective ones replaced with new. The usual cleaning supplies were furnished from time to time.

The Baths.

Rivington Street Bath—Necessary cleaning and engineer's supplies were furnished from time to time. The side, cheek and bridge walls in the boiler were rebuilt. Grate bars taken out and replaced, and the dead plates and bearing bars reset. New grate bars furnished where necessary, and repairs made to old ones. The steam pipes were covered with sectional pipe covering as directed. New main stop valves were placed on the boilers, new pipe furnished for supply to main street line, new globe valves furnished for house lines and new pressure valve on shower line, together with all necessary supply of piping, connections, etc. All repairs were made to valves where necessary, and the plant left in good working order. The following supplies were furnished for the steam plant: One 3-inch Curtis regulating valve with flange; two 6-inch Jenkins Bros. flange globe valves; one 3-inch Jenkins Bros. globe valve; two 4-inch Jenkins Bros. globe valves; 20 pounds of torpedo packing; 36 pounds of garlock ring packing; two 6-inch extra heavy flange elbows; three 50-foot lengths of wire-bound hose with nozzle were furnished complete.

West Forty-first Street Bath—The waste pipes and toilets were cleaned and repaired, also repairs were made to the hot water pipes, removing the marble and replacing same in order to make repairs. Necessary Engineer's and cleaning supplies were furnished.

East Eleventh Street Bath—The necessary cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished; 18 settees of different sizes, together with three lengths of hot-water hose, 75 feet each, were also furnished.

East One Hundred and Ninth Street Bath—Necessary cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished and repairs made to the steam coils in the men and women's section on the first floor of bath. Repairs were made to boiler where leaks appeared, and relief pipe put in for hot-water heaters, and repairs made to returns where leaks appeared. All necessary piping and connections were also furnished.

Allen Street Bath—Necessary cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished, and the cold-water pipes and filters were covered as directed. One new 4-inch supply pipe was furnished and connected with water main in street, which was necessary to supply water to the upper part of the building. All the necessary excavating was performed and connection made with the 2-inch Smith connection. A 4-inch galvanized iron pipe was continued to inside of front wall of building, and one 4-inch gate valve of approved make was installed and the valve continued from front to rear of building with a line of 4-inch galvanized iron pipe, leaving all necessary outlets for hot and cold water to upper part of building, establishing an independent water supply system for the upper floors. Two wardrobes, six chairs, Twenty-four cuspidors, eighteen settees and three lengths of hot-water hose were furnished and delivered to the above bath.

East Seventy-sixth Street Bath—Cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished, together with nineteen settees and two 25-foot lengths of $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch rubber hose and two 75-foot lengths of cold-water hose, with nozzles and reel complete, were furnished.

Free Floating Baths.

The baths were safely towed to their winter quarters at the foot of Twenty-second street, South Brooklyn, and orders were issued for disconnecting the anchors and chains, and disconnecting the mooring lines and hawsers from the piles and ring bolts on the following baths: Battery and Corlears Street, East river; Seventeenth Street, East river; Eighty-second Street and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh Street, North river. Orders were also issued for tugboats to tow baths, and for taking down the awnings on the various baths and storing same.

West Sixtieth Street Bath—The following extra work was performed in connection with the contract for the completion of this building: The guard rail around balcony was furnished and installed in accordance with the directions of the architects.

Public Comfort Stations.

Battery Park—The usual cleaning supplies and incidentals were furnished. Hanover Square—The outside of the station was cleaned off, prepared and painted with a dark green paint, and the inside was cleaned off and painted two coats of white paint.

City Hall Park—The broken and defective toilets were replaced with new, and all repairs made to leaks, and the pipes cleared.

Chatham Square—Two galvanized iron ventilators, running through sidewalk and safely secured with braces, were furnished and installed. The outside of the station was cleaned off and painted dark green, and the inside was painted with two

coats of white paint. A heating system was also installed, including a new steam boiler, and all the valves and connections complete.

Long Acre Square—The inside and outside of the superstructure was cleaned off and painted as directed, and the usual cleaning supplies furnished.

Sheriff and Delancey Streets—The usual cleaning supplies were furnished.

Greeley Square—The usual cleaning supplies were furnished.

One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Park Avenue—The usual cleaning supplies were furnished.

Offices of the Commissioner of Public Works.

One large oak bookcase was furnished as selected, together with one sectional bookcase and six book sections, and two top sections for the Engineer's office, also one chair.

Bureau of Highways—One clothes tree was furnished, and telephone service was installed in the residence of the Principal Assistant Engineer.

Bureau of Sewers—Corporation yard, One Hundred and Twenty-third street, one dozen chairs were furnished.

Corporation Yard, Rivington Street—One telephone desk extension was furnished and installed.

Bureau of Buildings—All of the defective mantles, globes and burners were removed and about 200 new mantles were installed complete, and the electric lights overhauled.

Bureau of Incumbrances—One roll-top desk was furnished.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices—The usual Janitor's and Engineer's supplies were furnished from the storeroom in the various public buildings as required. The order for the use of horse, wagon and driver for Superintendent was issued as usual. The following supplies were distributed as needed: Coal and wood for heating, etc., ice, brooms, pails, soap, waste-paper baskets, sapolio, sponges, mop handles, feather dusters, scrubbing brushes, ash cans, etc., for use in the various public buildings, courts and offices in the care of this Bureau. Among the many items of repairs made to the various courts and offices not hereinbefore mentioned are plumbing, steam fitting, carpentering, roofing, plastering, mason work, painting work, electrical work, repairs to safes, repairs to machinery and elevators and repairs to furniture, which work was done from time to time under monthly orders. For the use of the mechanics in the employ of the Bureau supplies of lumber, hardware, paints, varnish, etc., were furnished.

To approve the mode and manner of construction of elevator.
For to inclose elevator would practically render it useless, for it is intended for hoisting wagons from first to second floor.
If the underside of elevator be covered with tin and proper guard rail be placed on second story, as shown on plans, that same be permitted.
That the elevator will only be used at such time when necessary to store away wagons not in use.
And as it requires two men, one on first and one on second, to operate same, opening will be sufficiently guarded when in use.
Mr. Howell appeared before the Board.
On motion, approved on condition that the elevator, when not in use, shall be kept at the second story floor level.
Appeal 19, of 1906, New Building 223, of 1906, No. 110 West Fourteenth street, Manhattan; Henry Anderson, appellant.
"No. 6. Wind bracing should be provided; building possesses no prevence stiffness."
Method of construction does not require bracing.
If he may not be allowed to leave out wind bracing.
The building is to be built with heavy bearing walls throughout, these being firmly anchored together at every story by every beam.
Front and rear walls to be tied to side walls by means of girders and continuous brickwork between sills and lintels giving transverse stiffness.
The building being located in a locality surrounded by tall buildings, and all new improvements are of the same character.
The present adjoining buildings on each side are five-story buildings, thus practically offering no surface of any account for wind pressure.

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Court House, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 23d day of July, 1906, at the opening of the Court on that day.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
