BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Sewer in Garrison Avenue.

The assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in Garrison avenue, between Longwood avenue and Whittier street, and objections of Edward Hammer and James Day, filed by Hugo Hirsh, attorney; the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company as lessee and the Harlem River and Portchester Railroad Company as lessor, filed by Luce & Davis, attorneys, with abstract of testimony taken in said matter, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of January 7, 1910.

The President, Mr. Frank L. Polk, presided.

In his appeal the candidate had stated that after finishing his first paper on the morning of the examination he had been informed by one of the monitors that he might leave for lunch, as he would be "through until 1 p. m.," whereupon he had left the room without receiving the second paper (Rules and Regulations). After hearing the candidate the Commission questioned Mr. O. Schwarz, of No. 1774 Washington avenue, City, the monitor who was accused by the candidate of having given him the erroneous instructions. The matter was laid over for further consideration.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the appointment of Messrs. Charles K. Johansen and Birger Anderson as Expert Examiners to conduct the examination for Interpreter be and the same hereby is approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved. That the requirement of citizenship be and the same hereby is waived so far as it applies to the forthcoming open competitive examination for Assistant Alienist.

The appeals of Theodore A. Hamilton and John Courtney that their names be removed from the black list were granted, with the provision, however, that they should not be admitted to any examination for a court position.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to communicate with Dr. James P. Warbasse, Chief of the Bureau of Physical Examinations, and request an immediate report on the case of Charles E. Field, a candidate for promotion to Chief of Battalion, Fire Department, who had been passed in the physical examination, notwithstanding the fact that he had but one arm.

The Secretary was directed to summon Patrolmen Valentine Standing and Joseph H. Mahoney to appear before the Commission at the next meeting in relation to the date of birth given by them in their applications, filed March 23, 1906, and February 8, 1906, respectively.

On the recommendation of the President, to whom the matter had been referred for consideration, the request of Joseph Shaffer for permission to file an application for Patrolman was again denied in the absence of satisfactory proof as to the date of birth.

On the recommendation of the President, to whom the matter had been referred for consideration, the appeal of William F. Peabody, that his name be restored to the eligible list for promotion to Captain in the Police Department, was granted, in view of his reinstatement by the Courts to his former position in the said Department.

Edward M. Butler, a candidate for Patrolman, appeared before the Commission and submitted an affidavit from his parents that he had been born on September 29, 1885 (the date of birth given in his application); also a communication from one J. B. Flynn, Trustee, Flynn Township, Lawrence County, Bedford, Indiana, to the effect that he had entered school in the fall term of 1891, at which time his age had been given as six years. After considering the evidence submitted, the Commission directed that the disqualification appearing against the candidate on the eligible list be removed, and that the Police Commissioner be advised of the fact.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated December 10, with reference to a letter from Comptroller Metz, under date of December 8, requesting the certification of an eligible list of Inspector of Supplies and Repairs with a knowledge of iron and steel construction, and stating that he would have to report adversely to the request; that there was a fresh list of Inspector of Supplies and Repairs, but no attachment to the qualifications such as the one called for by the Comptroller was contained in that list. The Secretary stated in connection with the requisition that he had received a letter from one T. H. Graham, of No. 7 East Forty-first street, whose name appeared first on the preferred list of Inspector of Iron and Steel "waiving his right to the position of Inspector of Supplies in the Department of Finance in favor of Mr. James M. Finlay," whose name appeared second on the said list. The matter was laid over.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, relative to communications from the Corporation Counsel, dated December 8, in which it was requested that the name of David Joyce, a Junior Assistant Corporation Counsel, be transferred from the promotion list for the Bureau of Penalties to the list for the Bureau of Street Openings, also that the name of Edward F. Fagan, second grade Clerk, be transferred from the promotion list for the Law Department to the list for the Bureau of Street Openings, and recommending, as it had not been the practice of the Commission to allow transfers from one promotion list to another, that the request should be denied. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated December 13, in relation to a communication dated December 8, from Mr. C. B. J. Snyder, Superintendent of School Buildings, Department of Education, who stated that he had received an application from Mr. Ward Cunningham, an Inspector of Carpentry and Masonry, to be admitted to the examination for promotion from Inspector of Repairs to General Inspector of Repairs in his Bureau. The Examiner stated that in mental equipment and practical knowledge there was no difference in the men bearing the titles of Inspector of Repairs and Inspector of Carpentry and Masonry, and recommended, therefore, that all men serving under the title of Inspector of Masonry and Carpentry be admitted to the examination. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated December 13, in relation to Joseph J. Manley, of No. 502 Court street, Brooklyn, an applicant for the position of Fireman (24607), and recommending that he should be marked qualified on the eligible list upon which his name appeared, with a percentage of 86.48. After consideration of the report, the Secretary was directed to communicate with the applicant and state that the Commission could not see their way clear to remove the disqualification appearing against his name.

A report was presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated December 8, in relation to Olavina B. Bideau, of No. 258 St. Nicholas avenue, Brooklyn, an applicant for the position of Police Matron. After consideration of the statements contained in the report, the Secretary was directed to communicate with the applicant and state that the Commission could not see their way clear to remove the disqualification appearing against her name.

A report was presented from Mr. L. B. Bonnett, Examiner, dated December 14, 1909, in relation to the requisition of the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for an eligible list from which to appoint an Inspector of Hydrants, Stop-cocks and Shop Work in the Borough of Richmond, and stating that in his opinion the eligible list for the position of the same name was the proper one from which to certify, as the duties of the positions for which there were preferred lists did not agree with those of the vacant position. The Secretary was directed to certify accordingly.

A report was presented from Dr. James P. Warbasse, Chief of the Bureau of Physical Examinations in the Office of the Commission, dated November 22, stating that he had that day examined Miss Edith Abrams, of No. 115 West One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, a Nurse, employed in the Department of Health, in the non-competitive class, who had been rejected by the Examiner who conducted the physical test in the open competitive examination for the position of Nurse. The report stated that Miss Abrams had been occupied as a Visiting Nurse in tuberculosis work among the poor for the past six years; that the examination had shown that she had good lung expansion and was otherwise well, and that he could find nothing in her physical condition to interfere with her work or activity, or sufficient to justify her rejection.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to remove the disqualification appearing against Miss Abrams' name on the eligible list.

A report was presented from Dr. James P. Warbasse, Chief of the Bureau of Physical Examinations, dated December 1, stating that he had that day examined Miss Eleanor B. Hobart, of No. 415 Lafayette avenue, and found that she had no disease of the heart; that she was in good physical condition, free from evidence of disease and should be passed physically for the position of Nurse; that the "nervous heart" found by the experts in the previous examination was probably a temporary emotional disturbance. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to remove the disqualification appearing against Miss Hobart's name on the eligible list of Nurse and to certify her in the order of percentage.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission, dated December 13, stating that at a meeting of that Board held on December 10, the resolution adopted by the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York on November 10 and approved by the Mayor on December 1, 1909, amending the classification of competitive positions by placing in graded schedules certain positions which, prior to that time, had been ungraded as to salary, had been approved. The communication was ordered filed.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, dated December 3, requesting approval of the transfer of William J. Galvin from the position of Steam Engineer to that of Stationary Engineer, and stating that Mr. Galvin's name appeared upon the eligible list for the latter position. The Secretary stated that Mr. Galvin's name had appeared on the said list, but that upon his failure to report for appointment at the Department of Docks and Ferries on November 30, 1909, his name had been dropped; that he wou'd be third for appointment at \$4.50 per day, if restored. Resolved, That Andrew Fanchulli be and he hereby is excepted from examination, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII., to serve as Janitor and Cleaner in the office of the Coroner of the Borough of Richmond during the current year; provided, however, that his total compensation shall not exceed four hundred and eighty dollars (\$480).

A letter was presented from Dr. Winford H. Smith, General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, dated December 13, requesting that the name of John Lennon be restored to the eligible list of Hospital Clerk and certified for appointment at \$720 per annum. The Secretary stated that Mr. Lennon had been certified on October 22, 1909, but had declined appointment at \$720 per annum on the score of insufficient salary. The request was granted

insufficient salary. The request was granted.

A letter was presented from Dr. Winford H. cently held by the Commission for employees of the Water Company in the Borough of Richmond to qualify them for transfer to the service of the City. After consideration of the matter the Commission ruled:

First—That the Assistant Superintendent of the company was eligible to take the examination, as under the statute the term Superintendent might be deemed to apply also to the Assistant Superintendent.

Second-That the eligible list for Superintendent be announced.

Third-That the candidate for the position of Assistant Superintendent be given a supplemental oral examination.

Fourth-That the eligible list of Foreman be announced and that Mr. Perry be marked "not qualified" on such list, pending the receipt of an affidavit from him show-

ing by whom he had been employed each month from July 1, 1907, to the present date. A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated December 21, 1909, in relation to the appeal of James F. Flynn, a Keeper in the Department of Correction, that he be granted a special examination for promotion to the grade of Head Keeper. The report stated that the examination for Head Keeper had been held on November 9, and that in the Examiner's opinion Mr. Flynn had not advanced sufficient reason for the holding of a special examination in accordance with Rule VII., paragraph 11. After consideration of the matter the appeal was denied.

Reports were presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, recommending that the following promotion examinations

1. Stenographer and Typewriter (second grade) in the office of the Superintendent of Buildings, Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, of the Fire Department, to Third Grade Clerk (Rule XV., clause 2).

2. Laborer to Axeman in the Aqueduct Commission (Rule XV., clause 11). 3. Steam Fitter to Inspector of Steam Plants in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan (Rule XV., clause 10), to be open to all Steam Fitters who had served at least three years in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices of the said Department and to all Assistant Foremen who had served at least six months.

The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated December 21, 1909, relative to the request of William J. Cahill and Joseph H. Bennett that they be permitted to compete in the promotion examination for Assistant Foreman in the Bureau of Highways, Borough of Queens. It appeared that on Monday, December 20, 1909, Mr. Cahill had called at the office of the Commission and informed the Examiner that he and Mr. Joseph H. Bennett had not received notices to appear for the examination on December 22, 1909; that Mr. Cahill had personally filed all the applications for his Department on November 1. 1909, and that these had included his and Mr. Bennett's applications; that in view of the statements of the applicants they had been directed to file duplicate applications, and notices for the examination had been given them subject to the approval of the Commission. The action of the Examiner was approved.

A letter was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated December 18, 1909, in relation to a requested change in the title of the position in the promotion examination to Chief Inspector of Repairs in the Department of Education. It appeared from a communication of the Secretary of the Board of Education that the title Chief Inspector of Repairs had not been used in the Department of Education since January 2, 1905, and that there was no provision in the Budget for such a position. It was further stated that the position to be filled was General Inspector of Repairs, for which reason it was recommended by the Examiner that the examination ordered by the Commission on November 24, 1909, for Chief Inspector of Repairs, Department of Education, be amended to read General Inspector of Repairs, Department of Education. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated December 15, 1909, in relation to the request of M. F. Loughman, Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, for permission to change the title of John J. Flannery, a Bookkeeper in his Department (Central Office, Borough of Manhattan), at a salary of \$2,850 per annum, to that of General Bookkeeper, at a salary of \$3,000 per annum. It was stated that Mr. Flannery had been employed in the Department for the past eighteen years and had held the title of Bookkeeper since August 1, 1905; that there was but one other Bookkeeper employed in the Central Office, who had waived whatever right he possessed in the matter in favor of Mr. Flannery; that Mr. Flannery was at present in the highest grade of Bookkeeper and for that reason his salary could be raised to \$3,000 per annum without further examination. As to the change of title, the Examiner stated that in his opinion there would be no objection to the same, provided the title General Bookkeeper had been established for the Department. After consideration of the matter the increase in salary to \$3,000 per annum was approved, and the change of title to General Bookkeeper was also approved, with the understanding that the same had been established for the Department under section 56 of the Charter.

A report was presented from Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated December 15, 1909, in relation to the request of the Comptroller for approval for the promotion of Charles D. Cords, Stenographer and Typewriter, at a salary of \$1,650 per annum, to the position of Clerk (fourth grade), at a salary of \$1,800 per annum. It appeared that Mr. Cords had entered the third grade as Stenographer and Typewriter on August 15, 1907, when he was promoted to a yearly salary of \$1,200; that he was, therefore, ineligible for examination for promotion, having served less than three years in the third grade. The request for a promotion examination was denied for lack of power, and the matter of allowing Mr. Cords' promotion to a salary of \$1,800 per annum, without examination, was referred to the Chief Examiner for a report.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated December 15, 1909, in relation to the request of the Comptroller for approval of the increase in salary of Edward O'H. Jervois, a Clerk in the Chief Clerk's office, Department of Finance, from \$2,350 to \$2,400 per annum, without further examination. It appeared that Mr. Jervois has been employed by the City for over forty years; that on February 6, 1891, he had passed an examination for promotion to the then third grade; that there were less than three Clerks in the Chief Clerk's office who were eligible to etter a promotion examination for fifth grade Clerk, and that in the examination taken by Mr. Jervois in 1891 the same questions had been given candidates for the third and fourth grades, the latter covering a salary of \$2,500

per annum. The promotion was approved in accordance with paragraph 12 of Rule XV.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated December 17, in relation to the request of the Comptroller that a non-competitive examination be held through which Mr. Joseph Foley, I a Watchman employed in the office of the City Paymaster, might qualify for promotion to the position of Janitor. It appearing that there were three Watchmen employed in the office who were eligible to compete with Mr. Foley, the request was denied.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated December 17, in relation to the request of M. F. Loughman, Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, that a non-competitive examination be given to Mr. William Brandt, an Assistant Foreman in the Bureau of the Chief Engineer, by which he might qualify for promotion to third grade Clerk. The request was denied for lack of power.

Reports were presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated December 16 and 17, 1909, in relation to the following named candidates for the position of

Fireman:

Edward J. Kelly, Albert E. Frewin, Harry E. Bates, Albert F. Bliss.

After consideration of the statements contained in the reports, the Commission directed that the disqualification appearing against the names of the candidates on the cligible list be removed.

A report was presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated December 15, 1909, in relation to the case of Michael J. Benedetto, of No. 553 Third avenue, an applicant for the position of Fireman. The matter was referred to the President.

A report was presented from Dr. James P. Warbasse, Chief of the Bureau of Physical Examinations, dated December 6, 1909, in relation to Miss Kathleen O'Neill, of No. 135 Seventh avenue. Brooklyn, who had been rejected for defective vision in the physical examination for the position of Nurse. The Examiner stated that upon examining Miss O'Neill he had found her vision to be normal. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to restore Miss O'Neill's name to the eligible list of Nurse and certify it in the order of percentage.

A report was presented from Doctor James P. Warbasse, Chief of the Bureau of Physical Examinations, in relation to the case of Charles E. Field, a candidate for promotion to Battalion Chief in the Fire Department, who had been passed in the physical examination notwithstanding the fact that he had but one arm. In conjunction with the Examiner's report, the Commission considered an appeal from the candidate that his papers in the mental examination be rated, he having been advised by the Chief Examiner that owing to the fact that he had signed his examination number to the said papers he had been disqualified. The matter was laid over.

A letter was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated November 29, requesting authority to continue the services of Daniel Shefflin, of No. 5 East One Hundred and Sixth street, as first grade Clerk, pending the holding of the non-competitive examination ordered by the Commission under the provisions of paragraph 3

of Rule XII. The request was granted.

A letter was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated December 16, 1909, requesting approval of the appointment of William J. Lloyd, of Garrison, N. Y., as Caretaker, at a compensation of \$50 a month, pursuant to paragraph 7 of Rule XII. The request was granted.

A letter was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated December 21, requesting an amendment of the classification by striking from the exempt class under the heading "Board of Water Supply of The City of New York" the following:

Chief of Patrolmen on Aqueduct.
Two Deputy Chiefs of Patrolmen on Aqueduct.

-and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

Two Inspectors, Board of Water Suppply Police.

—also by placing the position of Inspector, Board of Water Supply Police, in the competitive class. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to advertise a public hearing for the next meeting on the proposed amendment of the classification by changing the line "Two Deputy Chiefs of Patrolmen on Aqueduct' to read "Two Inspectors of Patrolmen on Aqueduct."

A letter was presented from the Comptroller, dated December 18, 1909, stating that he had appointed Edward Dickel, of No. 259 Ridgewood avenue, Brooklyn, John F. Mullins, of No. 144 Third street, New Brighton, Staten Island, and George Steitz, of No. 196 Ralph street, Brooklyn, as Searchers in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears for about fifteen days, under the provisions of paragraph 4 of Rule XII., and requesting that the said persons be given a non-competitive examination to qualify them for temporary employment, there being no one on the cligible list of Searcher willing to accept a temporary appointment. The request was granted

A letter was presented from the Comptroller, dated December 1, 1909, requesting authority to continue the services of ten Bookkeepers temporarily employed in the Bookkeeping Division, until February 1, 1910, in order to give the new Comptroller an opportunity to make provision for the carrying on of the work. The Secretary stated that the said persons had been appointed from the eligible list of Bookkeeper for a temporary period, which would expire on or about December 31. The request was

The reassignment of George F. Doyle, an Axeman in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, was approved, it appearing from the doctor's certificate furnished that his absence from August 9, 1909, had been due to illness.

A letter was presented from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated December 21, requesting approval of the leave of absence, without pay, granted Matthew F. Duggan, Inspector of Sewer Construction, for two months from December 16, 1909. It appearing from the doctor's certificate furnished that the leave of absence was required on account of illness, the same was approved.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, dated December 16, 1909, requesting approval of the appointment of Mr. William H. Shelton, as Curator of the Jumel Mansion, under the provi-

sions of paragraph 5 of Rule XII. The request was denied.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Parks. Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, dated December 17, 1909, stating that on August 18, 1909, he had made application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the establishment of the grade of Foreman of Mechanics, in accordance with section 56 of the Charter, but that as yet his application had not been approved, and requesting to be advised whether, under the circumstances, he was required to appoint James W. Blackett to the position. The Secretary stated that under date of December 14, he had notified the Park Commissioner that Mr. Blackett's name appeared upon the eligible list of Foreman of Mechanics; that he was a veteran of the Civil War, and that the payroll of the person who had been performing the duties of the position in question could no longer be certified. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to continue to certify the payroll of the temporary appointee pending the creation of the position.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Mr. Gustave Tait be and he hereby is excepted from examination, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII., to be employed in the Laboratories of the Department of Chemistry of the College of The City of New York, to assist the Instructor with his apparatus, etc.; provided, however, that his total compensation shall not exceed seven hundred and fifty dollars.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated December 16, 1909, requesting that the name of Miss C. M. Young, of No. 9 Post road, White Plains, N. Y., be restored to the eligible list of Nurse and certified for appointment. The Secretary stated that Miss Young's name had appeared on the eligible list of Nurse when announced; that the words "not qualified" had been placed opposite her name, however, as she had only been passed conditionally by the Medical Examiners because of a slight affection of the heart. On motion, the Commission directed that all the persons whose names appeared upon the eligible list of Nurse with the words "not qualified" opposite their names, because of some physical disability, he re-examined by the Chief of the Bureau of Physical Examinations of the Commission, in order to ascertain whether any error had been made by the Examiners who conducted the physical examination.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated December 21, 1909, stating that, pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 4 of Rule XII, Lambert O'Neil, of Ocean avenue, Arrochar, Borough of Richmond, had been appointed as a First Grade Clerk, with salary at the rate of \$300 per annum, for a period of fifteen days, from December 21, 1909, and requesting that Mr. O'Neil be given a non-competitive examination to qualify him for provisional appointment. The emergency appointment was approved under paragraph 4 of Rule XII and the Secretary was directed to proceed with a non-competitive examination at an early date.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated December 15, 1909, requesting that the payroll of George John Anderson, of No. 317 East Fifty-sixth street, Borough of Manhattan, a First Grade Clerk in the employ of the Department of Health, assigned to duty in the Division of Communicable Diseases, Borough of Manhattan, be approved up to and including the 22d day of September. 1909. The Secretary stated that Mr. Anderson had been examined on August 27, 1909, under the provisions of paragraph 3 of Rule XII. for provisional appointments, and that he had failed in the examination; that through some inadvertence word that he had failed to pass the examination had not been sent to the Health Department until September 22, 1909, when his services were immediately dispensed with. The payroll was approved.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated December 20, 1909, requesting authority to continue the services of Miss Josephine Ryder, of No. 1519 Fifty-seventh street, Brooklyn, a Stenographer and Typewriter, for an additional period of two weeks, ending December 31, 1909. The Secretary stated that Miss Ryder had been appointed for a period of fifteen days, beginning December 3, under the provisions of paragraph 4 of Rule XII. The request was

granted.

A letter was presented from the President of the Borough of Queens, dated December 21, 1909, with reference to the employment of Mr. William P. Kleb, for a period of 180 days, to superintend the rebuilding of the Queens County Courthouse, and stating that the appointment of Mr. Kleb to the position in question, without the authorization of the Commission, had been purely an oversight, and that had he (the Borough President) at any time had the slightest doubt as to the propriety of the appointment and designation of Mr. Kleb he would have taken immediate steps to terminate the same. The Secretary stated that vouchers in the amount of \$1,440 covering the employment of Mr. Kleb had been forwarded to the Commission, but that he had declined to certify them in view of the fact that the consent of the Commission had not be obtained. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to certify the vouchers as exempt from the provisions of the Civil Service rules.

A letter was presented from the Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated December 21, 1909, requesting authority to extend the appointment of Miss Elizabeth Rinn, Temporary Clerk, for a period of three months, from December 31, 1909. The Secretary was directed to authorize the continuation of Miss Rinn's services until January 31, 1910.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated December 7, 1909, requesting approval of the promotion of H. C. Kelly, Stenographer and Typewriter, employed in the Bureau of Lamps and Lighting, Borough of Richmond, to \$1,200 per annum, from July 1, 1908. On motion, the promotion was approved under the provisions of paragraph 12 of Rule XV.

The Secretary was directed to attach the certificate of the Commission to the payroll.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, dated December 21, 1909, requesting that the position of Automobile Engineman in his Department be placed in the competitive class. The matter was laid on the table.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, dated December 20, 1909, requesting approval of the reassignment of Nicholas Dooley, Section Foreman, whose name had been off the payroll from November 3, 1909. The reassignment was approved.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Borough of Manhattan, dated December 17, 1909, requesting approval of the increase in salary of John A. Ginley, Axeman, to \$1,200 per annum, as of December 1, 1909. In view of the amendment to the classification adopted December 10, 1909, by which the positions in the Engineering Service had been placed in graded schedules, the Secretary was directed to state that the Commission was without power to approve the increase in salary without a promotion examination.

A letter was presented from the Secretary to the Aqueduct Commission, dated December 14, 1909, requesting approval of the leave of absence, without pay, granted W. H. Langler, an Inspector of Masonry, for a period of three months, beginning December 11, 1909, and transmitting a doctor's certificate to the effect that such leave was required on account of illness. The request was granted.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Borough of Manhattan, dated December 16, 1909, stating that the title of John Trainor had been changed from Inspector of Complaints, at a salary of \$6 a day, to General Foreman, at a salary of \$1,800 per annum, taking effect November 1, 1909, and requesting approval of the same. The matter was laid over.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Borough of Manhattan, dated December 11, 1909, requesting that the title of John McKenzie be changed from Janitor to Janitor-Engineer, and stating that the former title had been conferred on the said employee through error, as he was really a Janitor-Engineer. The Secretary stated that there was nothing in the records of the Commission to show that Mr. McKenzie had ever qualified for the latter position. The request was denied.

I., Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, together with all that certain wharf property situated in the Borough of Manhattan and in the Borough of Queens known and described as follows:

"All that certain wharf property in the Borough of Manhattan, being about 142 feet of the bulkhead extending along the easterly side of Avenue A, at and north of the foot of East Ninety-second street, with the wharves, piers and platforms extending therefrom out into the East River, which have heretofore been customarily used for ferry purposes, being the same wharf property and premises shown upon the diagram hereto annexed in red.

"All that wharf property in the Borough of Queens being the bulkhead extending from the southerly side of Fulton avenue, East River, extended, northerly a distance of 66 feet, to the northerly side of Fulton street extended, and the land under water in front of said bulkhead at present occupied by ferryhouses, platforms, bridges, racks, etc., used in connection with and for the operation of said ferry, being the premises shown upon the diagram hereto annexed in red."

The lease to be for a term of fifteen years from May 1, 1914, at a rental of 3 per cent. of the gross receipts of said company annually for the ferry franchise and \$700 in addition, for the wharf property. The lessee shall furnish a statement of the receipts and expenditures of said ferry, duly verified by the proper officer of said company, to the Commissioner of Docks, whenever so requested by him, and The City of New York, its officers, agents or employees shall at all times have access to and power to examine the books and accounts of said lessee relating to the affairs of said

The company shall furnish a bond of a surety company approved by the Comptroller in the sum of \$50,000 to guarantee the continuance of the ferry service for the term and in accordance with the conditions of the lease.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of ferry franchises and wharf property now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries the form of which lease shall be approved by the Corporation Counsel.

6. Authorizing the execution of a lease to George Dressler of the bulkhead on the southerly side of Wallabout Basin, Brooklyn, extending from Fleeman street to August 1, 1919, at a rental of \$1,000 per annum.

In case the lessee shall avail himself of the option of renewal contained in the lease made the first day of August, 1909, between The City of New York, acting by and through the Comptroller and George Dressler, of certain plots of ground in Wallabout Market and become lessee of the property therein described, for a further term of ten years, the said George Dressler shall have the privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years of the lease hereby authorized, upon giving at least six months' notice in writing prior to the expiration of the first term of his election so to renew. The rental for said renewal term to be at the rate of 10 per cent. advance over the rental for the first term. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by the Department.

7. Authorizing lease to the Brooklyn and Manhattan Ferry Company of a franchise to operate the following ferries:

Ferry No. 1-From and to the foot of Broadway, Borough of Brooklyn, to and from the foot of Roosevelt street, Borough of Manhattan.

Ferry No. 2-From and to the foot of Broadway, Borough of Brooklyn, to and from the foot of East Twenty-third street, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

The company to operate Ferry No. 1 daily, except Sundays and holidays, every 20 minutes from 5 a. m., to 9 p. m.

The company to operate Ferry No. 2 daily every 20 minutes from 5 a.m., to 9 p. m., excepting Sundays and holidays, when trips shall be made every 30 minutes from 5 a. m., to 9 p. m.

The company shall find, furnish and provide good and sufficient ferryboats, licensed and approved by the Federal Government, for the operation of both ferries. The company shall pay the entire expense of boats and the maintenance, repairs and dredging for terminals of Ferry No. 2, it being understod that as the company is to use the middle slip between East Twenty-second and East Twenty-third streets, Borough of Manhattan, jointly with another ferry, only one-half the expenses of such maintenance, repairing and dredging in connection with the middle slip is to be paid by the company. One-half of the expense of boats and the maintenance, repairs and dredging of terminals for Ferry No. 1 shall be paid by the company and one-half by the City. The one-half which the City will be called upon to pay to be fixed at \$11,000 per month, which shall be paid by the City to the company in monthly installments, at the end of each month, for every month during the term of the lease. The first payment to be made thirty days from the date that said Ferry No. 1 shall be placed in operation.

The City to lease to the company, in addition to the franchises to operate the two

ferries Nos. 1 and 2, the following described property:

(a) The ferryhouses, racks, bridges, floats, platforms, structures and other property in the vicinity of Rocsevelt street, and between East Twenty-second and East Twenty-third streets, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, which were formerly leased to the Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York, except that the City reserves the right to use the middle slip between East Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets jointly with another ferry to be operated from the foot of East Twenty-third street, or to lease the use of said middle slip to be used jointly with another lessee for the operation of another ferry from the foot of East Twenty-third street.

(b) The property in the vicinity of South Sixth street and Broadway, Borough of Brooklyn, described in Exhibits "A" and "B" in the advertisement inviting bids for the operation of Ferries No. 1 and No. 2, which advertisement appeared in the

CITY RECORD on or about October 25, 1909.

The City shall deliver the terminals, ferryhouses, racks, bridges, floats, platforms and other appurtenances and appliances in connection with the terminals in good condition and repair, well painted, the slips properly dredged and the premises to be in all respects ready and fully equipped for the operation of said ferries.

The lease shall commence thirty days from the date that the City shall turn over to the company the property above referred to in good condition and repair, well painted, the slips properly dredged and the premises in all respects ready and fully equipped for the operation of said ferries. The lease shall be for the term of ten years, the lessee to have the option of renewal for a further term of ten years, upon the same terms and conditions, except that the City shall make no alterations or repairs at the beginning of the renewal period.

The company shall have the right, within such limits as are now prescribed by law, to fix the rates of ferriage to be charged on said ferries, and, in case the proper legal authorities shall decrease the rates so fixed by the company, the company shall have the option of cancelling said lease.

The company shall pay to the City as rental for the franchises and property herein mentioned, which shall include all compensation due the City in connection with the operation of said ferries:

For Ferry No. 2, the sum of one dollar (\$1) per annum; For Ferry No. 1, one-half the net profits;

-the net profits to be calculated, after allowing all of the expenses of operation and reasonable payment for services rendered by the management of the company; and for the purpose of ascertaining such net profits, the books and accounts of the company shall, at all reasonable times. be opened for inspection by the proper City officials.

The company shall furnish a surety bond, approved by the Comptroller, for fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), to guarantee the continuance of the ferry service for the term and in accordance with the conditions of the lease.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of ferry franchises and wharf property now used in the Department of Docks and Ferries in so far as said terms and conditions shall be necessary to carry into effect the above.
