MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York, Held Wednesday, January 10, 1917, at 10:30 o'clock A. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President; Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners.

The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the exempt class, under the heading "Department of Education," the following: "Executive Manager." William J. Wilcox, Chairman of the Board of Education, and Walter H. Gilpatrick, Chairman of the Committee on By-Laws of the Board of Education, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Classification be and the same hereby is amended by including in the exempt class, under the heading "Department of Education," the following: "Executive Manager."

Edward E. Cadley, Chief Clerk in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and James J. Byrne, Chief Clerk in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Brooklyn, appeared in connection with the request of the President, Borough of Brooklyn, for approval of the employment of John E. Quinn from Nov. 9 to Dec. 31, 1916, as expert engineer to prepare plans and specifications relative to the introduction of the forced draught system in the heating of public buildings at a compensation of \$500. Murphy, an accountant, from \$1,650 to \$1,920 per annum, subject to a subsequent promotion examination of the said employee, the latter salary having been recommended for him in the budget for 1917, but not having been adopted. The Secretary was instructed to inform the Commissioner of Accounts that there was an eligible list for promotion to Fourth Grade Accountant for his office containing three names and less than two years in existence for which reason it would be inadvisable to hold another promotion examination at this time and that under these conditions the provisional employment of Mr. Murphy at the increased salary could not be allowed.

Duties—To locate breaks and test for electrolysis of cables, and to make acceptance tests on, and inspections of, wires and cables, underground conduits, manhole accessories, fire house and public building wiring for alarm systems and pole line equipment.

Requirements—Candidates must have had an actual factory, laboratory or field experience in cable testing of at least one year, and should have a general knowledge of the principles of electricity and a familiarity with the various electrical testing appliances appurtenant to this position.

Candidates must be at least 21 years of age on the date of filing applications.

The salary is from \$1,200 to but not including \$1,800 per annum.

The compensation rates proposed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for this position are from \$1,140 to \$1,380. Under the terms and conditions of the budget for the year, appointments will, as a rule, be made at the lowest compensation rate.

Whereas, the Division of Inspection has submitted to this Commission the following requests for variation of law made by the parties named herein, in which appeal is made from strict compliance with the orders issued against the premises noted below, the granting of which would necessitate a variation of law, and

Whereas, the Division of Fire Inspection has had a reinspection made of the premises and in accordance with the conditions found submits the following facts with recommendations:

Premises affected, (1) Bath, 23 Liberty st.; appellant, Davenport Library.

3-story non-fireproof tenant factory building; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarms; occupancy above the 2d floor, 3. Exits: One interior stairway from 1st to 3d floors; this stairway is continued from 3d floor to roof at a point remote from main stairway; safe egress from roof.

Recommendation: As there are but 3 employed in entire building, located on top floor, accept as 2d means of exit from 3d floor the stairway from 3d floor to roof if pent house be provided; if occupancy increases, a rule 4-a, e. to be provided at a remote point.

Premises affected, (2) Buffalo, Perry and Mississippi sts.; appellant, W. A. Case & Son.

2-Additional exit. 5-story non-fireproof building; open stairs; no sprinklers; no fire alarm system; one employee occasionally above 2d floor; 3d floor used for live storage, 4th and 5th floors used for dead storage; no egress from roof. Exits: 1 unenclosed stairway from 1st to 5th floors; an exterior stairway from 1st to 2nd floors.

Recommendation: Acceptance of outside stairway to be extended to 3d floor on condition that no one be permitted to go above the 3d floor until such time as the outside stairway is continued to 4th and 5th floors.

Premises affected, (3) Ellicottville; appellant, Lander & Watson Hosiery Co. 26—Additional exit. 27—Enclosed stairway. 28—Make stairway of incombustible material. 29—Stairs to roof. 30—Enclose elevator fireproof. 31—Enclose doors at elevator openings. 2-story non-fireproof factory building located in village of Ellicottville, erected since October, 1913; no sprinklers; no combustibles; no fire alarm system; occupancy above first floor, none. Premises affected, (4) Geneva, 110 Seneca st.; appellant, Mrs. Mary Hill. 1—Additional exit. 2—Prohibit occupancy. 3-story non-fireproof building; tenant factory; divided lofts; no sprinklers; combustibles carried; no fire alarm system; 3 factory employees. Exits: One interior stairway; no egress from roof.

Recommendation: In view of small occupancy, accept a substantial wooden stair from roof of two-story section on rear to roof of bakery section, and ladder from said roof to step at rear of bakery section on condition that there be not more than 3 employees.

Exits: One interior stairway not properly enclosed, doors open in, are not self-closing; no egress from roof; imperfect fire escape on front, openings not fireproof; exits remote.

Recommendation: While not more than one employed above the 1st floor, accept fire escape with non-fireproof openings; if more than one person is employed above 1st floor, the 2d or 3d floors be rented or the occupant of 3d floor increase number of employees, fire escape to conform in all respects to Rule 4-a, and orders 2 and 3 to be complied with.

AND it appearing from the facts above set forth that there are practical difficulties and unnecessary hardships in complying with the strict provisions of the law and the rules and regulations of the Industrial Code, on the premises noted herein, and that in granting the variation recommended in each case the spirit of the law and of the rules and regulations will be observed and public safety secured for the employees in such buildings, and

It further appearing that each of the appellants has been notified that he would be given an opportunity to be heard at this time and place if he desired to appear, and in default of appearance decision rendered would be confirmed by the Commission, and such of the appellants who appeared having been heard by the Commission,

22. Service records shall be based upon reports submitted by the superior officer, most closely in touch with the work of the employee rated, and shall be prepared in each department by such superior officers or employees of the department and such committees or boards therein as may be designated by the appointing officer of such department for that purpose, subject to confirmation by the Commission, and pursuant to such general plan as the Commission may prescribe. A duly authorized representative of the Commission shall be a member without vote of every committee or board which may be established in any department for the purpose of preparing or reviewing service records. Upon the submission of the service records of a department to the Commission, the Commission shall cause an examination to be made thereof, and in the course of such examination shall have power to examine the original records of the department. The Commission shall have power to change or amend any service record submitted to it where it shall find that the statements or recommendations made therein are not warranted, or that the records do not contain a true and fair account of the comparative efficiency of the several employees whose names appear therein; but no record shall be changed or amended by the Commission unless due notice has been given to the department that such change is proposed and an opportunity afforded the department to appear before the Commission in regard thereto. Where a change is made the reason therefor shall be given in writing to the department concerned. No service record shall be used as a basis for rating previous service in a promotion examination until approved by the Commission. Every officer or employee shall have the right, pursuant to such regulations as may be adopted by the Commission, to inspect his own service record prior to its submission to the Commission, and to apply to the department for a revision thereof, and to inspect his own service record after its submission to the Commission and the Commission shall have power to provide for the right of inspection by each employee of the service records of other employees in his department holding the same title or performing similar work. For periods of service prior to the establishment of service records, or in the absence of such records, rating for previous service shall be based upon such certification as the Commission may require.

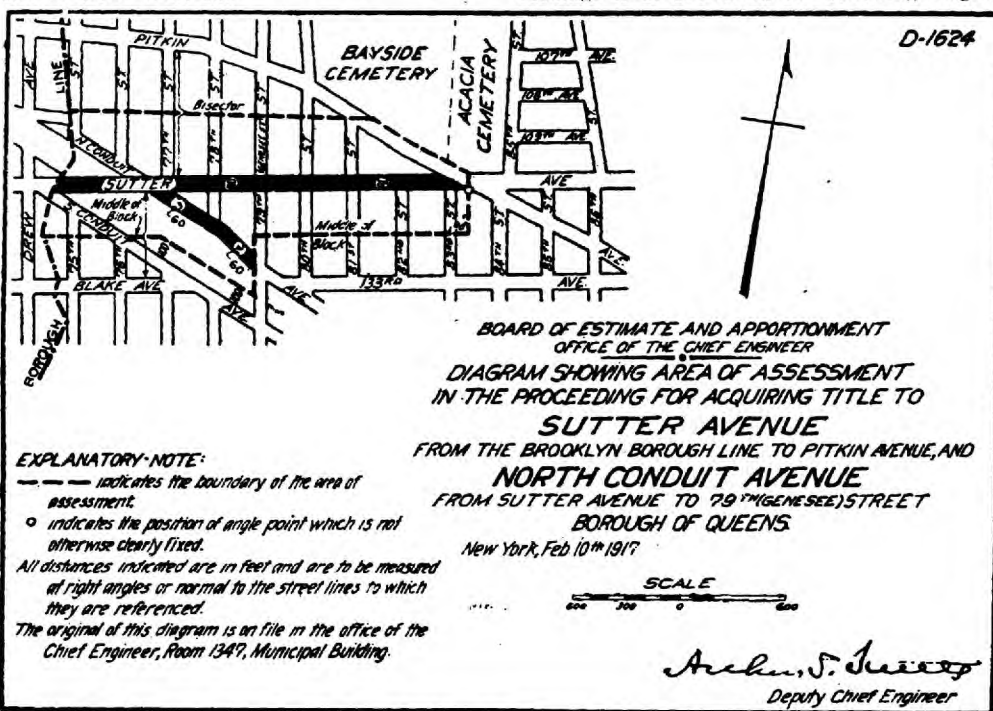

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in the street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days

from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

"No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions, shall in any case be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made."

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any service, work, materials or supplies for the City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall file the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may be seen there.
