Resources

The Mayor's Office for International Affairs provides critical services and information to assist the diplomatic and consular community accomplish its important work.

City of New York/U.S. Department of State Diplomatic and Consular Parking Program: In collaboration with the U.S. Department of State, the Office administers the NYC diplomatic parking program, issuing parking decals annually and assisting diplomatic and consular offices with parking-related issues throughout the year.

Assisting the Diplomatic & Consular Corps: The Office assists Consulates General to obtain information regarding incidents involving possible injury or casualty to foreign nationals in NYC. In addition to consular notification, the Office assists the diplomatic community by working to resolve administrative disputes, ensuring that diplomats know how to comply with city rules and regulations and facilitating the work of the diplomatic and consular community in NYC as per the Vienna Conventions.

The New York City Guide for the Diplomatic & Consular Corps provides useful information for Mission and Consular officials on accessing a range of City services and addressing Cityrelated issues.

PDC's @jgmoore shared #NYC's public art & design work in #Seoul. **Economic Development:** The Office works with the diplomatic community, businesses, and City agencies to attract and create economic opportunities for New Yorkers. We assist international businesses and startups considering entering NYC, and assist NYC-based businesses and startups interested in selling internationally. The Office also works to connect businesses to government programs available to them, and helps promote NYC as a global hub of innovation.

Ensuring that the City's economic development remains inclusive, sustainable, and good for all New Yorkers is a priority. In 2016, the Office led the effort to ensure that the International Innovators Initiative results in the inclusion of women entrepreneurs; worked to create a connector between the employer pipeline of international startups coming into NYC and the employee pipeline of New Yorkers graduating from the NYC Tech Talent Pipeline; and identified new international sources of investment to bolster the economy of NYC.



In partnership with the NYC Economic Development Corporation, the Office launched a website to provide a one-stop resource for international businesses considering growing their businesses in NYC: nyc.gov/internationalbusiness

Connecting Local to Global (#CL2G)

The *Connecting Local to Global* (#CL2G) program connects NYC's diplomatic and consular community to the City in which they live and serve. #CL2G creates opportunities for diplomats in NYC to learn about the work of NYC agencies and to share NYC resources and programming with their diverse populations, while also sharing their own best practices.

The City's diversity is a pillar of our strength and the 114 Consulates that maintain residence in NYC are essential to our work in serving New Yorkers of all backgrounds across all five boroughs.

Giving Back



During the holiday season, in partnership with NYC Service and the Department of Homeless Services, the Office and NYC's consular and diplomatic community provided over 250 gifts and 120 winter coats for children and youth across NYC as part of the Secret Snowflake Toy Drive.

Global Partners Junior

Global Partners Junior (GPJ) is an online exchange program that connects underserved NYC students age 9 – 13 to peers in cities around the world. The program runs in partnership with the NYC Department of Parks & Recreation and the NYC Department of Youth and Community Development. Using the online platform, GPJ students partner with global classrooms to brainstorm creative strategies for making lasting changes in their communities. The 2016 curriculum focused on immigration, and highlighted the positive value that immigrants bring to communities around the world.

Celebrating Diversity in NYC

In March, in honor of International Women's Day, and in partnership with the Consulate General of the Republic of Korea, the Office hosted the launch of the book Love Is into six languages as part of the Talk to Your Baby Campaign, an initiative of the NYC Children's Cabinet. The event featured First Lady Chirlane McCray, Deputy Mayor for Strategic Policy Initiatives Richard Buery, and the Consul General of the Republic of Korea, Gheewhan Kim. Hosted at the Queens Library in Flushing, the event included an information forum with NYC Agencies to bring information about City services to the Korean community in NYC. NYC agency representatives from six City agencies and offices provided information about City resources, including the Mayor's Office of Immigrant Affairs, the Mayor's Office for People with Disabilities, the NYC Human Resources Administration, NYC Department of Consumer Affairs, NYC Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, and the NYC Department of Aging.

Trainings and workshops

Through #CL2G the office hosts trainings and workshops to inform the diplomatic and consular community about NYC services and programs.



The Office hosted over 150 consular officials and City representatives at the NYC Emergency Management command center to discuss New York City's emergency response strategies and programs.

Through this program the Office hosts training workshops, such as "Navigating Administrative Enforcement" in partnership with the Office of Administrative Trials and Hearings, and in partnership with the Office of Emergency Management, held a briefing on crisis response in order to provide valuable information to the consular community in NYC on how to access City services.

The Office collaborated with Consulate General of Switzerland and the Digital Diplomacy Coalition to host an event focused on social media strategies for emergency preparedness and crisis response featuring NYC agency representatives from the NYC Office for Digital Strategy, NYC Mayor's Fund, NYPD, and the NYC Office of Emergency Management.



Consul Generals receive a briefing from the NYC Police Department about how they work to protect 8.5 million New Yorkers. In addition, participants had the opportunity to take a ride on the NYPD Harbor Boat used to patrol NYC's 176 miles of coastline and 576 square miles of navigable waters.

The Office hosted a briefing in partnership with the NYC Police Department (NYPD) that brought together members of NYC's diplomatic and consular community to learn about the many security and preventative law enforcement initiatives led by NYPD.

New Yorkness of the UN creates opportunities for learning between New Yorkers and the United Nations, and is an effort to fully integrate the UN community into the fabric of our City.

#CityofUnitedNations: As the 71st UN General Assembly opened in NYC, welcoming world leaders from across the globe, the Mayor's Office for International Affairs kicked off the **City of United Nations** campaign which showcases NYC's history, shared values and unique relationship with the United Nations. The ongoing multi-dimensional campaign included the digital launch of a Tumblr site, bus shelter advertisements launched across the five boroughs, and asked New Yorkers to share why the UN in NYC is important to them.

Over 70 Years of the UN in NYC

UN Day: NYC joined the world in celebrating the establishment of the United Nations. Mayor de Blasio proclaimed October 24, 2016 as UN Day and the City celebrated the establishment of the UN by unveiling the #CityofUnitedNations bus shelter advertisements across the five boroughs.

NYC Youth Participate in International

Youth Day: The Office partnered with the United Nations Envoy for Youth and the NYC Department of Youth and Community Development to facilitate the attendance of NYC schoolchildren at the UN's celebration of International Youth Day. NYC middle school students learned about the UN's work to eradicate poverty and further sustainable development.

The Mayor's Office for International Affairs, in collaboration with the New York City Economic Development Corporation, released the **UN Impact Report 2016**, a cost-benefit analysis that outlines the concrete economic benefit to NYC due to the presence of the permanent headquarters of the United Nations and broader UN community. The report also reflects the costs to NYC and showcases how the City supports the UN community in its diverse metropolis.

The UN Community contributed \$3.69 billion in total economic output to the City of New York.



The Office launched the release of the report at the United Nations and held a briefing for international journalists on the report's findings at City Hall, facilitated by the Foreign Press Center.

Coverage of the report:



NYC Junior Ambassadors (NYCJA) leverages the United Nations as a resource for NYC seventh graders and empowers students in all five boroughs of NYC to become actively engaged with the United Nations and its mission of addressing some of the most pressing challenges in the world.

This initiative is made possible through partnerships with the NYC Department of Education, the Department of Youth and Community Development, the United Nations and the United Nations Foundation. Launched in October 2015, in celebration of the 70th Anniversary of the United Nations, and following a successful inaugural year with eleven sites around the City, the program expanded to twenty classrooms and after-school programs in 2016.

NYC Junior Ambassadors is premised on the idea that the United Nations offers an entry point for learning for any subject and provides a holistic experience of the United Nations and international affairs for 7th graders and their educators. The program is comprised of three distinct parts, which include:

- <u>Classes at the UN:</u> Each NYC Junior Ambassadors classroom participates in a curated guided visit of the United Nations Headquarters. These visits provide youth with an opportunity to visit a site of global importance and to engage with UN experts on their topics of interest.
- <u>UN Ambassadors visit NYC classrooms</u>: Senior United Nations diplomats visit each 7th grade classroom. These visits create an opportunity for dignitaries to visit New York City schools and to build a connection with the school community. It also helps to reinforce youth understanding of the UN system.
- <u>Graduation Ceremony and Year-End Projects:</u> All participating classes join together at the end of the program for a graduation ceremony attended by local and international leaders, parents, school administrators, partners and other stakeholders. The students exhibit their year-end projects ranging from art projects, video interviews, posters, and music about their topics of interest. They each also receive a certificate attesting to their participation in the program!

U.S. Mission to the United Nations

The first class of NYC's Junior Ambassadors program visited USUN headquarters today and talked with **Ambassador Samantha Power** about the need to help aid refugees.



At the end of their journey, almost **275 students** from the inaugural cohort graduated from the program and had the opportunity to present their end of the year projects at their graduation ceremony at the Queens Museum! In 2017, nearly **600 New York City students** will graduate from the program. *Global Vision* | *Urban Action* is a program designed to highlight the connections between the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and NYC's innovative blueprint for the City's future *OneNYC: The Plan for a Strong and Just City* focused on growth, equity, sustainability and resiliency.

Through the **Global Vision | Urban Action** program, the office published a two-part booklet, *A City With Global Goals*, which provides an in-depth look at the synergies between the SDGs and *OneNYC*. The Office convenes local and global leaders to share strategies that have been effective in taking forward the global goals and to facilitate site visits for the diplomatic community around NYC.

Equity In and Through Tech: Moving from Conversation to Implementation

In recognition of Women's History Month and the 60th Session of the Commission of the Status of Women, the Office hosted "Equity In and Through Tech" to highlight the role of broadband and technology in achieving equity, with a focus on municipal and global development goals.

In August, the Office hosted a tour of the Newtown Creek Wastewater Treatment Plant in partnership with the NYC Department of Environmental Protection where members of NYC's consular community learned about the City's complex wastewater management system which treats 1.3 billion gallons of wastewater daily.

Tour of the Union Square Greenmarket

In partnership with GrowNYC, the Office held a Greenmarket tour in November for the consular and diplomatic community to learn more about how NYC is making healthy food more accessible while connecting over 230 small family farms to the residents of NYC's five boroughs.
