On the 31st day of October, 1876, the following resolution was adopted by the Board of Police: Resolved, That indolent, indigent, and vicious persons, who habitually and frequently lodge in Station-houses, on applying for lodgings at any Station-house, on and after the 5th of November next, shall be arrested and arraigned before a magistrate and charged with the crime of vagrancy.

When a proper "charitable lodging institution" shall have been provided by proper authority for the accommodation of worthy unfortunate persons who require a night's lodging—such persons, on applying at the Station-houses, shall be supplied with a ticket and sent to the care of the managers of such charitable lodging institution.

The above resolution was promulgated to the Force, and to its enforcement may be attributable the greatly decreased number of lodgings granted during the quarter ending December 31, 1876, as compared with the corresponding quarter in 1875. This is especially noticeable in the number of male applicants.

A strict enforcement of the order to arrest habitual lodgers and charge them "with the crime of vagrancy," seems to have had the effect to more than double the number of persons arrested for that offense during the quarter ending December 31, 1875. By reference to the report of this Board for that quarter, it will appear that 620 persons were arrested for vagrancy. During the corresponding quarter of 1876, there were 1,451 arrested for that offense—an increase of 831.
