When a proper "charitable lodging institution" shall have been provided by proper authority for the accommodation of worthy unfortunate persons who require a night's lodging – such persons, on applying at the Station-houses, shall be supplied with a ticket and sent to the care of the managers of such charitable lodging institution. The above resolution was promulgated to the Force, and to its enforcement may be attributable the greatly decreased number of lodgings granted during the quarter ending December 31, 1876, as compared with the corresponding quarter in 1875. 




