SUITS AND SPECIAL PROCEEDINGS INSTITUTED.

SUPREME COURT.

The Staten Island Railroad Co. vs. the Mayor, etc., the Board of Police Commissioners, et al.—To restrain defendants from throwing garbage, ashes, etc., into New York Harbor.
