

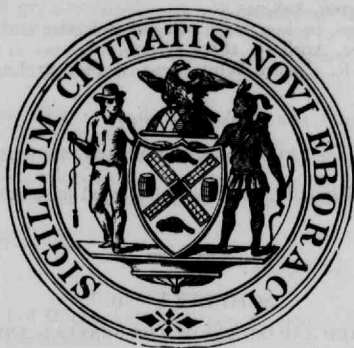

Opening of Proposals.

[Every law, unless a different time shall be prescribed therein, shall commence and take effect throughout the State, on and not before the twentieth day after the day of its final passage, as certified by the Secretary of State. Sec. 12, title 4, chap. 7, part 1, Revised Statutes.]

CHAP. 89.

AN ACT to extend the time for making assessments and correcting assessments for taxes in the city of New York.

Passed April 1, 1880; three-fifths being present.
The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:
SECTION 1. Any assessments made by direction of the commissioners of taxes and assessments for the year eighteen hundred and eighty, in the city of New York, authorized by any law of this state shall be as valid, if made on or before the eighth day of May, eighteen

hundred and eighty, as if they had been made on or before the second Monday in January, and any person against whom an assessment may be made, under the provisions of this act, shall have the right to apply for a correction of his assessment at any time prior to the twenty-ninth day of May, eighteen hundred and eighty, and the said commissioners are hereby invested with power to receive such application and to make the corrections.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
