

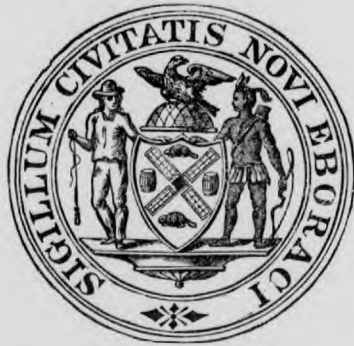

A committee from the Ladies' Health Protective Association appeared before the Board and presented a report upon the sanitary condition of the district bounded by First avenue, Forty-second street, East river and Forty-eighth street, which was received and laid on the table.

The Board proceeded to the opening of bids for estimates for furnishing five thousand cubic yards of earth-filling on North Brother Island, City and County of New York, as follows:

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 7, 1885:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,991.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 1,499.

During the past week 199 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 26 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 7 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 5 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks, 36 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 40 visits were made, and 40 disinfections and 5 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 4.

The number of vaccinations performed was 465, of which 55 were primary and 410 re-vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 7,250 pounds of meat and 650 pounds of fish.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 63; the number of analyses of same made was 4; the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 2.

The certificates of 718 births, 76 still-births, 234 marriages, and 775 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 7, 1885. This shows an increase of 139 births, 12 still-births, and 98 deaths, and a decrease of 48 marriages when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1884, there was an increase of 173 births, 33 still-births, 61 marriages and 149 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 11; croup, 4; erysipelas, 3; typhoid fever, 6; diarrhoeal diseases, 1; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 4; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 10; apoplexy, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 6; Bright's disease and nephritis, 7; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 4; whooping cough, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; malarial fevers, 8; inanition, 2; cancer, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 30; bronchitis, 6; pneumonia, 45; heart diseases, 9; aneurism, 3; convulsions, 10; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 10; premature and pre-natural births, 3; surgical operations, 3. The number of deaths from diphtheria, puerperal diseases, gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, and suicide was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 175 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 246 under two years, 312 under five years, and 56 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 18 more than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 40.26 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 177 were in institutions, 404 in tenement-houses, 182 in houses containing three families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 4 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 154 on the first, 195 on the second, 140 on the third, 77 on the fourth, 20 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 775 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 0 non-residents; 105 were stated to be single, 179 married, and the condition of 390 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 775; still-births, 76; bodies in transitu, 16; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 69 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 718 births, 234 marriages, 76 still-births, 775 deaths; 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 130 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 12 transcripts of the birth record, 8 of marriage, and 70 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending February 7, 1885, was 22.3 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.659, the mean humidity was 91, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,431, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.06 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 720 deaths and still-births, or 83.67 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 20; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 314; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 88; Greenwood (undenominational), 50; Lutheran (undenominational), 104; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 30; Evergreen (undenominational), 46; Woodlawn (undenominational), 25; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 8; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 9; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 2; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 5; Washington (undenominational), 14.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending January 31, 1885, was in the following Wards, viz.: First, 14; Second, 1; Third, 5; Fourth, 7; Fifth, 6; Sixth, 16; Seventh, 28; Eighth, 26; Ninth, 32; Tenth, 27; Eleventh, 33; Twelfth, 116; Thirteenth, 12; Fourteenth, 19; Fifteenth, 11; Sixteenth, 17; Seventeenth, 45; Eighteenth, 36; Nineteenth, 109; Twentieth, 42; Twenty-first, 49; Twenty-second, 65; Twenty-third, 8; Twenty-fourth, 6.

The actual mortality for the week ending January 31, 1885, was 730; this is 173 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1884, and 94.6 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.49 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,380,762.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia was 25.78; Brooklyn, 20.01; Baltimore, 22.37; Boston, 27.03; New Orleans, 26.66; Richmond, 22.80; Charleston, 38.78; Erie, 4.22; Lowell, 12.37; Worcester, 18.00; Cambridge, 26.41; Fall River, 16.58; Lawrence, 14.85; Lynn, 13.89; Springfield, 10.92; Pittsburgh, 22.10. REPORTED MORTALITY * for the week ending February 7, 1885, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending January 31, 1885.

SIR—There were 775 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, February 7, 1885, which is an increase of 98, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 149 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884.
