NOTE.—The number of vehicles crossing the bridge is “estimated” based upon the actual count during one month. It is estimated that the average sum received from each vehicle is 12½ cts. before and 6¼ cts. after the reduction of tolls. This result, whilst it may not be absolutely accurate, is believed to be approximately correct.

The earnings for tolls from Brooklyn to New York were in excess of those from New York to Brooklyn, \$47,789.04.

The number of people using the promenade from New York to Brooklyn exceeded those going the other way by 291,111, while the number of passengers crossing by car from Brooklyn to New York exceeded those crossing the other way by 1,134,837.

The number of vehicles (estimated) crossing from Brooklyn to New York exceeded those crossing from New York to Brooklyn by 11,553.

NOTE.—During the year the Receiver of the Atlantic State Bank paid 60 per cent. dividend on the deposit in the bank.

REPORTED MORTALITY * for the week ending June 13, 1885, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending June 6, 1885.

SIR.—There were 593 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 13, 1885, which is a decrease of 28, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 28 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending June 6, 1885, was 601, which is 8.6 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.41 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,394,712.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, Wednesday, June 10, 1885, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Commissioners present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners James C. Spencer, William Dowd, and C. C. Baldwin.

Also, Acting Chief Engineer Fteley; Consulting Engineer Davis. And Chief Engineer Birdsall and Consulting Engineer Adams of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the stated meeting of June 3 were read and approved.

The Committee on Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of the fifth monthly estimates of work done by contractors, included in vouchers Nos. 800 to 809, and of the bills included in vouchers Nos. 810 to 820; all of which were approved by the Board and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee on Construction made report, dated the 8th instant, with recommendations, as follows:

1st. The Committee submitted requests from the Chief Engineer for authority to purchase the necessary furniture for the auxiliary offices of the Engineers of the Second, Third and Fifth Divisions, at a cost not to exceed \$108; and for the purchase of 8,000 copies of standard diagrams, for recording the cross-section measurements in the aqueduct tunnel, at a cost not to exceed \$275; with recommendations that both requests be granted; which recommendations were approved by the Commissioners, and authority given the Chief Engineer to make the purchases within the limits of cost named.

2d. The Committee reported that having been informed by the Chief Engineer that two Inspectors of Masonry were now required on some portions of the Aqueduct work, and applications in due form having been received from Philanzo Edick and George B. Burbank, who appear to be qualified for the work, the Committee had directed the Chief Engineer to examine said applicants as required by the rules, and to report upon them to the Board at this meeting.

3d. The Committee reported that they had made further investigation of the matter of an allowance to Division Engineer Wolbrecht of keep for his horse whilst necessarily in use by him upon the work of the Commission; and that they saw no reason to recall their recommendation of May 20th, that such allowance be made; and, therefore, adhered to the said recommendation.

Commissioner Baldwin moved that the recommendation of the Committee be approved by the Commissioners; which motion was seconded by Commissioner Spencer.

Commissioner Dowd moved to amend by requiring that such allowance be made only when the horse is kept in the stables of the Commission. This motion was not seconded.

The motion of Commissioner Baldwin was then adopted by a majority vote, Commissioner Dowd voting in the negative.

The Committee on Construction next submitted a communication from Acting Chief Engineer Fteley, of this date, describing the lands necessary to be taken in fee, and for the easement rights required, for the construction of the New Aqueduct on Manhattan Island, as follows:

1st. A width of 100 feet, to be taken in fee, from Tenth avenue to Harlem river; also a certain amount of land, as proposed by the Commissioner of Public Works, to the United States bulkhead line.

2d. Four lots, 25 feet by 100 feet, or thereabouts, to be taken in fee, at the southeast corner of Tenth avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, for the working plant of Shaft No. 28.

3d. Four lots, 25 feet by 100 feet, or thereabouts, to be taken in fee, at the southeast corner of Tenth avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street, for the working of Shaft No. 29.

4th. A width of 50 feet, to be procured as a permanent easement on the reverse curve from Tenth avenue to Convent avenue, and vicinity of said curve.

5th. I understand from the Secretary that sufficient ground can be obtained from the adjoining owners for the working of Shaft No. 27.

6th. I understand also, from the Chief Engineer of the Department of Public Works, that for the working of Shafts Nos. 30, 31 and 32, the adjoining streets can be opened, thus giving sufficient room for the operations of the contractors without taking any land from private parties.

In relation to which the Committee recommended that the Commissioner of Public Works be requested to include on the property maps the lands described in the first four clauses of the above report as necessary to be taken in fee, or for easement in perpetuity; and that in regard to the lands required for Shafts Nos. 30, 31 and 32, the Committee on Construction be directed to ascertain whether the streets upon which those shafts would be located can be opened, and placed at the disposal of the Commission within the required time, and if so, to give the necessary directions with regard thereto for the preparation of the said property maps.

These recommendations were approved by the Commissioners, and notice thereof directed to be given to the Commissioner of Public Works.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Public Works, dated June 10, 1885, submitting forms of contract, specifications and bonds, for building the new gate-house and section 1 of the New Croton Aqueduct, at Croton Dam; subject to an additional clause necessary to fully protect the present aqueduct and its appurtenances, while the new work is under construction.

On motion of the Commissioner of Public Works, the above forms were referred to a Special Committee, composed of the members of the Committee on Construction and Commissioner Dowd, for consideration, and report thereon to the Commissioners at as early a day as practicable; and the Secretary was directed to have copies of said forms prepared immediately for the use of said Committee.

The Comptroller gave notice, under date of June 6th, of the issue of a warrant for voucher not certified by the Aqueduct Commissioners, and appertaining to the work of the Commissioners of Appraisal for New York County; amounting to \$59.19; which communication was ordered placed upon file, and entered upon the books of this Commission.

The Secretary submitted an abstract of Balance of Accounts ending May 31, 1885, as shown by the books of the Commission; which, on motion of the Comptroller, was referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit for consideration and such report as they may deem necessary.

Acting Chief Engineer Fteley presented a communication dated this day, with an estimate of the probable cost, and time of completion of the new gate-house, and its appurtenances at Croton Dam; which, on motion of Commissioner Spencer, was referred to the Special Committee to which was referred the forms of contract, etc., for constructing said gate-house, this day submitted by the Commissioner of Public Works.

The Acting Chief Engineer, in accordance with his instructions from the Committee on Construction, then presented the applications of Philanzo Edick and George B. Burbank, for Inspectors of Masonry; both applicants having been examined by him, and approved.

Commissioners Baldwin, Dowd and Spencer then endorsed upon the application of George B. Burbank, their certificate of his competency and experience, as required by section 40 of the act, and Mr. Burbank was thereupon appointed by the Commissioners an Inspector of Masonry, at the rate of compensation heretofore fixed by the Commissioners.

The application of Mr. Edick was laid over for further consideration.

On motion of Commissioner Dowd, the Committee on Construction were requested to examine all applications for Inspectorships, as the same are received, and to forward those made in compliance with the established rules to the Chief Engineer for examination of the applicant; and after the applicant has been examined and approved by the Chief Engineer, to certify, as required by section 40 of the act, to the competency and experience of such applicants as are, in their opinion, duly qualified for the position.

A request was made by the Stenographer, George Lucas, a member of the Seventh Regiment N. G. S. N. Y., for leave of absence, with pay, during the week ending June 27, to attend the State Camp at Peekskill with his regiment.

On motion of Commissioner Spencer, the leave of absence was granted.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

2d. Bidders will be required to complete the entire work to the satisfaction of the Health Department, and in substantial accordance with the specifications of the contract and the plans therein referred to. No extra compensation beyond the amount payable for the work before mentioned, which shall be actually performed, at the prices therefor to be specified by the lowest bidder, shall be due or payable for the entire work.

Bidders will state in their estimates a price for the whole of the work to be done, in conformity with the approved form of contract and the specifications therein set forth, by which price the bids will be tested.
