BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's Office on Monday, February 5, 1883. at 1.30 o'clock P. M.

The minutes of the meeting held January 6, 1883, were read and approved.

The assessment list for constructing sewers in Front street, between Broad street and Old Slip, and in Coenties Slip, between Front and South streets, and objections of J. F. Clason, laid over at the last meeting of the Board, were, on motion, taken up.

After hearing Mr. Clason, and considering the objections, on motion, they were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for constructing sewers in Mangin street, between Broome and Delancey, and Rivington and Stanton streets, with objections of Anderson Price, attorney, laid over at the last meeting, was, on motion, taken up.

On motion, the said objections were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for paving, with granite-block pavement, Ninth avenue, from the westerly line of the Boulevard to Seventy-seventh street, and objections of the executors of James Brown, deceased, laid over at the last meeting of the Board, on motion, were taken up.

T. H. Baldwin, attorney for the objectors, submitted for the consideration of the Board a survey and affidavit as to the amount of paving done in the Ninth avenue, between the westerly line of the Boulevard and the Ninth avenue, and the north crosswalk of Sixty-fourth street.

On motion, the said assessment list was ordered to be returned to the Board of Assessors for further consideration, with reference to the said objections.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curb, gutter and flagging in Eighth avenue, from One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street to Harlem river, and objections of William Astor, John McDermott and others, laid over at the last meeting of the Board, were, on motion, taken up.

Louis K. Ungrich was heard in opposition to the assessment, and submitted copy of a bill paid in December, 1867, which he claimed was in payment of an assessment for similar work.

On motion, the assessment list, with objections of Mr. Ungrich, was ordered to be returned to the Board of Assessors for further examination.

No other parties appearing, due notice having been given to those interested, on motion, all other objections presented to the assessment were overruled.

At 2.10 o'clock P. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.

Whereas, The public authorities and the press of this city have from time to time called attention to the dilapidated and unsafe condition of Central or McComb's Dam bridge over the Harlem river, and to the fact that the present structure, on account of its age and weakness, is constantly in need of repairs, at a heavy expense to the taxpayers, and furnishes inadequate accommodation for the large and increasing travel in this part of the city; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks be and they are hereby requested to report to this Board, as soon as possible, the present condition of the aforesaid bridge, what action has been taken by said Department to provide for the construction of a new bridge over or a tunnel under the Harlem river at said point, and what further action is necessary on the part of the municipal or State authorities to secure the early completion of this important work.

An Ordinance to amend section 58, article V. chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, as amended by resolution, approved December 30, 1882.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, do ordain as follows: Section 1. Section 58 of article V. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, as amended by resolution approved December 30, 1882, is hereby amended by inserting after the roman numerals "XIV.," and before the word "or," the numerals "XXX.," so that said section, when so amended, shall read as follows:

"Section 58. All ordinances, or parts of ordinances inconsistent or in any manner conflicting with the provisions of this article, are hereby repealed; but nothing in this article contained shall affect the provisions of article V. of chapter 3, or of articles IX., XIV., "XXX.," or XXXIII., of chapter 8, of said Revised Ordinances, or the provisions of the resolution relating to the Gansevoort Market, approved by the Mayor, December 14, 1881; nor shall the provisions of this article apply to newsboys; neither shall anything in this article contained authorize the Mayor to grant licenses for the sale of any article by existing law or ordinance forbidden to be sold."

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice.
