BUDGET FOR 1901.

[PUBLISHED AS REQUIRED BY SECTION 226 OF THE GREATER NEW YORK CHARTER.]

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by the affirmative vote of all the members thereof, makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and one, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said city for the said year; secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the State taxes and charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, for the said year, and, thirdly, the amount audited pursuant to the provisions of chapter 525 of the Laws of 1897, and which, according to the provisions of said act, is to be raised by taxation levied upon the taxable property in the Thirty-second Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of ninety-eight million one hundred thousand four hundred and thirteen dollars and forty-three cents (\$98,100,413.43).

CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be kept so as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial ability to provide for such inmates.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioners of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

CHANGE OF GRADE OF MCKIBBIN STREET, BROOKLYN.

The following report from the Chief Topographical Engineer was read:

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, November 8, 1900.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements:

Sir—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn requesting to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grade of McKibbin street, between Bushwick

avenue and White street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, I wish to report that on June 21, 1900, a map or plan with technical description showing change of grade of McKibbin street was submitted to the Board of Public Improvements for a public hearing and adoption. (See minutes of the Board, June 27, 1900.)

The resolution of the Local Board conforms to this plan, and I recommend, therefore, that public hearing be given in this matter, in accordance with the letter of June 21, 1900.

Papers in the matter are herewith returned.

The following resolution was then unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest so to do, proposes to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grade in McKibbin street, between Bushwick avenue and White street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of McKibbin street and Bushwick avenue, the elevation to be 14.75 feet above mean high-water datum;

1st. Thence easterly to a point distant 800 feet westerly from the western curb-line of White street, the elevation to be 16.21 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. Thence easterly to the intersection of McKibbin street and White street, the elevation to be 12.21 feet above mean high-water datum.

All elevations refer to mean high-water datum as established by the Department of Highways, Borough of Brooklyn.

3d. Thence easterly, curving to the left on the arc of a circle of fifty feet radius and tangent to the preceding course for 44.35 feet;

4th. Thence northeasterly on a line tangent to the preceding course for 239.78 feet to the point of beginning.

In reply I have to state that these avenues and the street are in the territory east of the Bronx river, to which the city water-mains have not yet been extended and which is supplied by the New York and Westchester Water Company. The city water service cannot be extended east of the Bronx until the high-service pumping station at or near the Jerome Park Reservoir is completed and large distributing mains laid therefrom. Even then the Department will be confronted with the difficulty that permanent street grades have not yet been established in that section of the Borough of The Bronx, and that few of the streets are as yet graded to any uniform grade. For these reasons I cannot report favorably on the communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

In the meantime the sole reliance for water supply in that section is on the supply furnished by the New York and Westchester Water Company, which is notoriously inadequate and not capable of any extension of the service to new streets and buildings.

By Fifteenth Street, 105 feet east of Sixth Avenue, Briggs Street and White Plains Avenue and in Prospect Terrace, between Thirteenth Street and Fifteenth Street, and in Fourteenth Street, between Second Avenue and Prospect Terrace; modified so as to conform with the herein returned opinion of the Corporation Counsel.

DEAR SIR—Referring to a communication from your office of the 18th ult., inclosing copies of three communications, dated October 12, respectively, from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, embodying resolutions of the Local Board of the Ninth District, in the Borough of Brooklyn, recommending the following lighting:

Ralph Street, between Hamburg and Knickerbocker Avenues;
Furman Avenue, between Bushwick Avenue and Evergreen Cemetery;
Ridgewood Avenue, between Crescent Street and Euclid Avenue, and Pine Street, between Fulton and Etna Streets.

The above recommendations have been investigated by this department, and it is reported to me by the Deputy Commissioner of this Department in the Borough named, that Ralph Street, between Hamburg and Knickerbocker, is an open street and would require four gas lamps to light it.

Furman avenue, between the lines of Bushwick avenue and Evergreen Cemetery, is not an open street within the meaning of the law, and therefore is not in line for consideration for lighting.

Ridgewood avenue, between Crescent street and Euclid avenue, has been regularly opened, and to complete its lighting system would require three gas lamps.

Pine street, between Fulton and Erma streets, is not an open street within the meaning of the law, and, like Furman avenue, is not eligible for municipal consideration relative to lighting.

To properly maintain the two streets mentioned herein, which are in line for consideration in the direction of lighting, would require an expenditure which the appropriation for lighting in the said borough for the balance of the year does not now warrant.

However, the matter will be borne in mind, and I will endeavor to give it favorable consideration the early part of next year.

Placing three gas lamps on Demilt avenue, from White Plains road to Second street extension, Wakefield;

Laying gas-main in Intervale avenue, between Freeman and Jennings streets;

Lighting Bronx Park avenue, between One Hundred and Seventy-seventh and One Hundred and Seventy-eighth streets;

Laying gas-main in Thirteenth street, between Prospect terrace and Second avenue.

The above recommendations have been investigated by this Department, and I have to advise you that I have this day signed orders as follows:

To the Bronx Gas and Electric Company, to fit up and light one arc electric lamp on St. Lawrence avenue, corner of Tacoma street; also one on St. Lawrence avenue, corner of Beacon street.

To the Northern Union Gas Company, to fit up and light fourteen (14) lamps in Tenth street, between White Plains avenue and Fifth avenue, Williamsbridge.

To the Northern Union Gas Company, to fit up and light three lamps in Demilt avenue, between White Plains avenue and Second street, Wakefield.

To the Bronx Gas and Electric Company, to fit up and light one arc electric lamp in Bronx Park avenue, corner of One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, and one on Bronx Park avenue, corner of One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street.

To the Northern Union Gas Company, to fit up and light four lamps in Thirteenth street, between Prospect terrace and Second avenue, Williamsbridge.

Concerning the recommendation that four naphtha lamps be erected and lighted in Bleecker street, between White Plains avenue and Bronx Park entrance, it is reported to me by the Inspector of this Department that this street has not been regulated and graded; and as to laying gas-mains in Intervale avenue, between Freeman and Jennings streets, I am informed that there are no houses on this block.

In view of the above facts, this Department does not feel warranted in taking favorable action upon the last two recommendations mentioned.

The maps thereof were respectively filed, as for the Southern Boulevard May 4, 1900, and for the Second avenue approach October 17, 1900.

To the Commissioner of Bridges:

By your order I submit herewith a general description and estimate of cost of a proposed Southwest Approach to Willis Avenue Bridge.

This approach will extend from the west line of the present bridge over First avenue and through private property, acquired or to be acquired, along the north line of East One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street to Second avenue, a total length of 672 feet, of which 615 feet consists of granite walled approach, and 57 feet 3 inches of connecting steel spans.

Its width will be the same as that of present bridge—roadway 42 feet wide and two 9 feet wide footwalks.

The grade will fall toward Second avenue at the rate of 2 feet and 7 inches per 100 feet.

The specifications will call for granite, steel work, railings, lamps, roadway, footwalks, etc., in strict conformity with those on the present Willis Avenue Bridge now under construction.

The roadway of the steel span will be of asphalt, that of the granite walled approach of granite blocks on concrete foundation. The footwalks will be of granolithic cement on the whole approach. On the steel span steel curbs will be used; on the granite walled approach granite curbs.

The foundations will be piled where necessary, and elsewhere be of concrete.

This approach will be lighted with twelve inclosed arc lamps of 600-candle power of 4½ amperes. The power will be furnished from the present bridge, for which provision has been made.

All the above is shown in Drawing No. 59 accompanying.

The detailed estimate following gives the cost of this approach \$154,525, to which add cost of engineering and inspection, etc., ten per cent., and also the cost of condemnation of lands.

By your order I submit herewith general description and estimate of cost of proposed Northeast Approach to Willis Avenue Bridge.

This approach will extend from the east line of the present bridge over Willis avenue, and through private property, acquired or to be acquired, beginning at the north line of One Hundred and Thirty-second street and extending to the Southern Boulevard, a total length of 635 feet, of which 142 feet consists of arched viaduct, 453 feet of granite walls with earth filling between them, and 40 feet of connecting steel span over Willis avenue.

Its width will be the same as that of present bridge—roadway 42 feet wide and two 9 feet wide footwalks.

There will be an iron stairway 5 feet wide with rubber treads at the junction of the present bridge and new approach.

The grade will fall toward Southern Boulevard at the rate of 2 feet 7 inches per 100 feet.

The specifications will call for granite, steel work, railings and cornices, lamps, roadway and footwalks, etc., in strict accordance with those on the present Willis Avenue Bridge, now under construction.

The roadway of the steel span will be of asphalt, that of the granite walled approaches and viaduct of granite blocks on concrete foundation. The footwalks throughout will be of granolithic cement. On the steel span steel curbs will be used; on the rest of the approach granite curbs.

The foundations will be piled where necessary, and elsewhere be of concrete.

This approach will be lighted with fourteen inclosed arc lamps of 600-candle power, and 4½ amperes. The power will be furnished from the present bridge, for which provision has been made.

All the above is shown in Drawing No. 54 accompanying.

The detailed estimate following gives the cost of this approach \$273,989, to which add cost of engineering and inspection, etc., ten per cent., and also the cost of condemnation of lands.

REPORTS FROM CHIEF TOPOGRAPHICAL ENGINEER.

The following report from the Chief Topographical Engineer was read and the matter was referred to the Commissioner of Sewers:

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, NEW YORK, November 8, 1900.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements:

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report and investigation a communication from the Commissioner of Sewers transmitting a modified plan of drainage for sewers in Beck street, between Leggett avenue and Craven street; in Craven street, between Beck street and Fox street, and in Fox street, between Craven street and Longwood avenue, Borough of The Bronx, I have to state that the plan was examined, and it is suggested to change the grade of the sewer at Neck street and Craven street (East One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street), from 36 feet above high water to 35 feet above high water; at Fox street from 36.45 feet above high water to 36 feet above high water, and that a 12-inch pipe is laid in part of the block in the Southern Boulevard, between East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street and Longwood avenue.

I wish, however, to call the attention of the Board to the fact that by changing the direction of the sewers the flow is diverted from the outlet sewer in Dupont street to the outlet sewer in Tiffany street, and that therefore the property on Beck street, from Leggett avenue to East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, should be included in the assessment for the cost of the outlet sewer on Tiffany street. I submit for adoption a map or plan entitled "Modified Plan of Drainage showing location, size and grades of sewers in Beck street, from Leggett avenue to Longwood avenue, and in Fox street and Southern Boulevard, from Craven street to Longwood avenue, and in Craven street, from Beck street to Southern Boulevard, designated Sewerage District No. 36 'N,' Twenty-third Ward, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York," which map shows the above-mentioned changes.

The section bounded by Alexander avenue, Third avenue, Courtlandt avenue, Melrose avenue, the New York and Harlem Railroad, the Southern Boulevard, East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, Boston road, East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, Bronx street, East One Hundred and Eightieth street, the Bronx river, the East river, Bronx Kills and the Harlem river, was taken up first, and the accompanying map and list of names for avenues and streets were prepared, which, according to chapter 1, section 49, paragraph 5 of the Charter of The City of New York, is herewith recommended to be forwarded to the Municipal Assembly with the requisite forms of ordinances.

The following is a list of avenues and streets laid out on the above-named section and filed on the final maps and profiles of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth wards (now Borough of The Bronx), made under chapter 545, of the Laws of 1900, which avenues and streets are named on said maps, but are not legalized as yet.

The proposed names coincide with those shown on the final maps and profiles of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and those specially named by ordinances, with the exception of the following cases:

1. Arthur avenue, from Crotona Park, North, to Tremont avenue, is changed to Crotona Park terrace, according to a suggestion made by the owners along the street.

2. The name Seabury place was given to an unnamed street, from Charlotte street to Boston road, and lying easterly of Minford place.

The list is accompanied by a map entitled "Map or Plan to accompany report on legalizing names of avenues, streets and places in that part of the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, bounded by Alexander avenue, Third avenue, Courtlandt avenue, Melrose avenue, the New York and Harlem Railroad, the Southern Boulevard, East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, Boston road, East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, Bronx street, East One Hundred and Eightieth street, the Bronx river, the East river, Bronx Kills and the Harlem river."

The avenues and streets laid out on the final maps and profiles of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth wards and amendatory maps are shown by yellow color, and the names of avenues and streets to be legalized are underlined by red color.

MISCELLANEOUS COMMUNICATIONS.

The following petition was referred to the President of the Borough of Manhattan:

To the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York:

The undersigned, owners of property on the west side of Wadsworth avenue, between One Hundred and Eighty-seventh and One Hundred and Eighty-eighth streets, hereby respectfully request your Honorable Board to change the grade of Wadsworth avenue, between One Hundred and Eighty-fifth and One Hundred and Eighty-ninth streets, as shown upon the annexed plan, made by Robert L. Waters, City Surveyor, dated October 4, 1900.

Your petitioners respectfully request the said change of grade for the following reasons:

Your petitioners are the owners of the several houses and lots on the west side of the avenue between One Hundred and Eighty-seventh and One Hundred and Eighty-eighth streets, in which

most of your petitioners now reside. There are no other buildings on the avenue between One Hundred and Eighty-fifth and One Hundred and Eighty-sixth streets. The houses were built but a few years since, are substantially new, and the sidewalks in front thereof were also constructed so that your petitioners could use the sidewalk and street in front of the buildings on the west side thereof. The City of New York has recently made a contract for the grading of Wadsworth avenue, and the contractor is now engaged in the performance of the work. We were recently informed by the contractor and the surveyor in charge of the work that the contract required the filling of the street in front of our houses, so that the present first floor thereof, which is now above the sidewalk, would be, when the avenue was completed, from two to three feet below the grade or surface of the street. Should this be done we will suffer great loss and damage, for which, in view of the fact that the buildings were constructed since the Central Park Commissioners established the grade of the avenue, in 1869, we will have no remedy. We are informed that when the buildings were constructed it was the intention of the builder, and shown by the plans, that they should be upon or above the established grade of the avenue, and we have been unable to learn by what mistake, if not fault, they were not so constructed. At the time we purchased the houses we believed that they were upon the established grade, and that when the City should thereafter grade the avenue to its full extent and in accordance with the established grade we should be neither injured nor damaged.

The proposed change will conform to the grade of One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street as the same has been actually graded and paved and the sewer-lains set therein. It will involve no injury to the property south of One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street or north of One Hundred and Eighty-eighth street, for the reason that the same is vacant and unimproved, and the slight change in grade will be an advantage thereto, as the map or plan annexed will show. The change will not affect the terms or the conditions of the contract for the work of grading now in progress, as that provides for any change of grade made during the performance of the work.

Resolved, That the Local Board hereby recommends such temporary sewer and pump to be forthwith constructed under and in pursuance of section 559 of the Charter of the city.
