Dear Sir—In accordance with instructions given in your circular letter of January 6 ultimo, and the resolution of said Board, dated 6th ultimo, and set forth in the circular letter of the Comptroller of The City of New York, dated the 15th ultimo, and in compliance with the provisions of sections 10 and 56 of the Revised Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to present herewith a new or revised estimate of the amounts required to conduct the public business of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, for the year 1902.

In making up this estimate I have carefully examined and considered the one presented by Hon. William Dalton, Commissioner of Water Supply, to the former Board of Estimate and Apportionment in September last, and the estimate presented by Hon. Henry S. Kearny, Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, so far, especially as it appertains to the part of the business of that former Department, which has been transferred to this Department, and have availed myself of such information as, in the brief space of time accorded, I have been able to obtain in regard to the innumerable details of the work to be covered by this year's appropriations.

#### ESTIMATE FOR WATER SUPPLY.

There are to be provided for in this appropriation:

The care, maintenance and repair of sixty-one miles of old and new aqueducts, with their appurtenances, embankments, retaining walls and lands; of the storage reservoirs in the Croton Watershed, which have an aggregate capacity of forty billion gallons; of the bridges required in consequence of reservoir construction (see section 512 of the Charter); of the receiving and distributing reservoirs in the Borough of Manhattan; the maintenance and operation of the three High Service Pumping Stations, which now pump and distribute fifty-five million gallons of water per day; the constant patrolling of the Croton Watershed to prevent pollution of the water, and the operation of plants for the disinfection and disposal of the sewage in two of the villages which formerly drained into certain tributary streams.

A further charge on this appropriation is the payment of taxes on aqueduct and reservoir property in the Counties of Westchester and Putnam. Under section 480 of the Revised City Charter, it is claimed by the local assessors that buildings and structures, as well as the land to which taxation has heretofore been confined, are subject to assessment for purposes of taxation. This would add about \$3,000 to the taxes of 1902.

The items which make up the present estimate, and which are taken from Commissioner Dalton's estimate of September last, with modifications and reductions, amounting to \$34,000, are as follows:

This appropriation for The Bronx and Byram River System is of similar nature to the preceding one for maintenance of the Croton Water System. It involves the care and repair of three storage reservoirs, of fifteen miles of pipe and tunnel conduits, and of the receiving reservoir at Williamsbridge, with all their appurtenances; also the sanitary patrol of the water sheds.

This appropriation is for the maintenance and repair of the entire system of water mains, stopcocks and hydrants, in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. At the date of the estimate in September last, this system, according to the report of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Water Supply, included 803 miles of water mains, 9,008 stopcocks and 11,650 fire hydrants. The paramount importance of providing adequate appropriation to maintain the safety and efficiency of this distributing system is obvious. I am informed that in the past, from year to year, the Departmental Estimate for this purpose has been cut down in the Final Estimate, to an extent which in each year required supplemental appropriations by transfers of available balances in other accounts. In the Departmental Estimate of last September particular stress was laid on the necessity of replacing the old style and obsolete hydrants, which were brought into use more than forty years ago, and are subject to frequent derangement and leakage, with new hydrants of improved pattern. This seems to be a desirable and necessary improvement.

For purposes of maintenance and repairs, the distributing system is divided into six districts—four in the Borough of Manhattan and two in the Borough of The Bronx. For each district there is a repair shop or station, and a repair force of mechanics and laborers, under the charge of a Foreman and Assistant Foreman. For several years past two repair companies at large have also been employed.

The amount of this estimate is required for the care and repairs of three hundred existing drinking hydrants, now in use.

This is to pay for hydrant service which the New York and Westchester Water Company claims the right to furnish under unexpired contracts with former villages and towns, which became incorporated with the city under the Greater New York Charter.

The high grounds on the west side of the Borough of The Bronx, which are above the elevation at which water can be delivered from the Croton Water System, have for twenty-eight years past been supplied from the Yonkers City Water Works, under contract between this city and the Yonkers Water Commissioners. The Yonkers system is the only available source from which this section can be supplied, though this service may be superseded by the city's own supply when the High Service Pumping Station at Jerome avenue shall have been completed.

For Additional Hydrants on Requisition of the Fire Department.

For the four years, 1894 to 1897, inclusive, there was an annual issue of Fire Hydrant Stock to the amount of \$50,000 for this purpose, under chapter 510, Laws of 1894, such issue being limited to the four years. For the years 1899, 1900 and 1901 an annual appropriation of \$25,000 was included in the city budget. I believe that the expenditure for additional fire hydrants on requisition of the Fire Department should again be provided for by bond issue, in accordance with section 178 of the Revised City Charter, but I present this estimate of \$20,000 for the current year to make temporary provision for continuing the work of placing additional hydrants, leaving it to your Board to determine whether the expense of these hydrants is a proper charge against bond issues, under the provisions of section 178 of the Charter.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The estimates for the Borough of Brooklyn embrace only appropriations payable out of the tax levy. Under section 242 of the Revised Greater New York Charter, your Board is authorized to appropriate, for the maintenance, improvements and extensions of the system of water supply of that Borough, the moneys received from water rents, subject, however, to the charges now imposed by law upon said revenues. An appropriation of \$1,281,905.25 for such maintenance, improvement and extension, was requested by me from your Honorable Body in my

communication of January 13 ultimo. Details as to this appropriation will be submitted whenever your Board comes to act upon this particular subject, but further reference to it is unnecessary at this time.

Between January 1, 1898, and December 31, 1901, the Departmental and Final Estimates for hydrant rentals or hydrant service, furnished by the Flatbush Water Works Company, in the Twenty-ninth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, were made at \$30,000 annually, in accordance with the conditions of a contract made by the former City of Brooklyn, which remained in force until December 31, 1900, and of a renewal at the same price for 1901. When the subject of a further renewal of the contract came before me, I succeeded in inducing the company to accept a reduction of \$5,000 a year in the price to be paid by the city for the service, for a term of three years from January 1, 1902, or until the acquisition by the city of the company's plant in condemnation proceedings.

The only other accounts concerning the Brooklyn water supply which are payable from appropriations in the annual budget and tax levy, and not from Brooklyn water revenue, are for salaries, Deputy Commissioner's Office, Chief Engineer's Office, Bureau of Water Registrar and Laboratory, and for Supplies and Contingencies, all of which will appear in another part of this estimate.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

The actual appropriation in the Final Estimate for 1901 was \$23,000, but this had to be supplemented by a transfer of \$5,000 to meet increased expenses for fuel, oils, etc., caused by greater demands on the water service furnished from the six Pumping Stations in the First Ward (Long Island City) and the Third Ward (Flushing, College Point and Whitestone). Complaints of the inefficiency of the existing service have been received since January 1, hence, as greater calls upon the capacity of the pumps, requiring additional outlay for fuel, etc., are to be expected the full amount of the present estimate should be appropriated.

From the records I find that the Final Estimate for 1901 fixed the appropriation at \$23,000, and that it was supplemented by a transfer of \$3,000, making a total of \$26,000. The Departmental Estimate of the Commissioner of Water Supply, made in September last, asked for an increase of \$10,416. I have concluded that it may be possible to maintain the distributing system from the City's Pumping Stations in the First and Third Wards of the Borough without increase over the appropriation for 1901, as supplemented by transfer; and have, therefore, fixed the amount in this estimate at \$25,000.

On May 16, 1898, the Commissioner of Water Supply, after due authorization by the Board of Public Improvements and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, made a contract with the Citizens' Water Supply Company of Newtown, by which it was to furnish a supply of water not exceeding a maximum of three million gallons per day for the First Ward (formerly Long Island City). The supply under this contract began June 4, 1898, at the rate of seven hundred thousand gallons per day, and in less than two years the demands on the service increased at a rate which required the full limit of three million gallons per day. On the expiration of this contract a renewal was made for one year, terminating May 29, 1902, requiring the Company to furnish as much water as should in the judgment of the Commissioner become necessary, but not less than five hundred thousand gallons per day. The estimate of \$118,625 in the Departmental Estimate of September last allows for a service of five million gallons per day for the entire year. Under my present estimate of \$100,000 the daily supply would have to be diminished, unless the price per million gallons is reduced to a more equitable figure.

The Company has had a profitable contract with the city for four years, without reduction in price during all this period, and inasmuch as the cost of water delivered in Brooklyn is only \$57 per million gallons, and public maintenance is always more expensive than private, I see no reason why it should not in any new contract abate its price, and I shall hope to succeed in inducing it to do so, especially as the Borough will be likely to require more water than during the past year.

Some of these contracts will expire during the year, but others will outlive the year. The prospect of reduction can therefore hardly be considered in this year's appropriations, although diligent efforts will be made to secure new contracts in all cases at lower rates.

**BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.**

Last year a bond issue of \$10,000 was authorized for the construction of additional wells at the Tottenville Pumping Station, the only water plant owned by the city in the Borough of Richmond. A contract for the work was made and it is now in progress. The Commissioner of Water Supply also made a contract in December last for extending the water mains and the water service from this plant into several new streets. When these two works are completed it will be necessary to operate the pumping machinery for at least sixteen of the twenty-four hours each day. This requires the services of one additional Engineer and two additional Firemen, which, together with the increased amount of coal and other supplies required for the Pumping Station, account for the increase in the estimate over the appropriation of \$6,950 for 1901, and the advance over the Final Estimate of December last. It is always to be borne in mind that increased demands upon the pumps mean increased expenditure for coal and other supplies, and repairs, in a disproportionately larger ratio.

The estimate is based on existing contracts between the two private water companies in this Borough (the Crystal and the Staten Island Water Supply Company) and the former village and town authorities, at prices therein fixed, and the number of hydrants in use. Some of these contracts will expire this year, and upon their termination I shall use my best efforts to obtain lower prices, as the existing prices seem to me to be high. In all cases of hydrant service, in whatever Borough, this Department will aim to see that no payments are made beyond those due for hydrant service actually given.

Under a still existing contract between the Crystal Water Company and the former town and village authorities, now constituting the Second and Fourth Wards of the Borough of Richmond, the city is obliged to bear one-half the cost of relaying water mains, where such relaying is made necessary by changes in the grades of streets, avenues or roads ordered by the city authorities.

No provision for this was made in the Final Estimate for 1901, in consequence of which accrued bills against the Department of Water Supply on this account remain unpaid, and others will accrue during the current year. The appropriation, therefore, appears to be necessary.

It will be observed that the present estimate does not contemplate any appropriation out of the tax levy for laying new water mains to extend the water service in any of the boroughs. Estimates for such appropriations for the boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Queens appear in the estimate submitted to the late Board of Estimate and Apportionment by Commissioner Dalton in September last, which in making up its budget reached the conclusion that, under the provisions of section 178 of the Revised Charter, the expense of laying additional mains and extending the water service into new streets should properly be charged against bond issues. Therefore, the Board omitted from its budget any appropriation for laying water pipes in any of the several boroughs.

**Gas and Electricity.**

The Departmental Estimate of September last, the Final Estimate made in December and the present estimate include the expense of lighting, with gas and electricity, during the current year, the streets, highways and public buildings of the several boroughs. The estimated aggregate of this expense is \$2,907,245.57.

The law devolves upon this Department the duty of auditing bills for public lighting, but it is extremely desirable that it shall be clearly understood that this expense is no part of the expense of maintaining and operating this Department. A distinction is to be drawn between expenses required for maintenance and operation of a particular department of the city administration and an expense relating to all the departments, but which is audited through a particular department.

It is obvious that the lighting of the streets and avenues of the city and of its public buildings, the expense of which is audited through the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, is not a genuine expense of that Department. It seems to me proper, in presenting the first annual estimate for this Department, to call attention to the fact that the estimate includes a contemplated expense for such lighting, of \$2,907,245.57, which, in reality, forms no part of the expense of maintaining the Department itself, but which must be provided for in this Department's estimates.

It may be proper in this connection to remark that the two subjects (lighting and water) are in no sense cognate. The only possible analogy between them lies in the fact that water distribution is through underground pipes—gas distribution through sub-surface mains, and distribution of electricity, in a large measure, by wires placed in subways under the street surface. In all really important features these subjects are widely divergent, and there seems to be no logic in uniting them under one department.

The difficulty of analyzing the appropriations for the former Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, of determining what portion is incident to the subjects of gas and electricity alone, and of contrasting the salaries of preceding years with the salaries proposed in this estimate, is, of course, readily evident.

In the estimate which follows, I have separated lighting public buildings from lighting streets, highways, parks, bridges and docks, believing that the two should not be confounded with each other.

The Departmental Estimate presented by Commissioner Kearny, in August, 1901, the Final Estimate of the late Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and the present Departmental Estimate, are based upon the prices bid and awarded for the contracts for 1902, for gas light and electric light, and upon the estimated quantities of gas and electric light required.

ESTIMATE FOR SALARY APPROPRIATIONS.

I deem it proper to precede the actual estimate for salary accounts by a general statement explanatory of the increases asked for over final estimate made by the late Board in December last. The statement may aid your Board in forming its judgment and determining its action, on the estimate.

It is not to be denied that a large addition is proposed to the salary list in the Water Register's Office, Borough of Manhattan.

The opening of a Water Register's office in the Borough of The Bronx is naturally accompanied by the employment of Clerks and Inspectors in that borough.

It is unnecessary here to argue for the establishment of a Water Register's Bureau in the Borough of The Bronx, because your honorable Board has by resolution already approved of such establishment. The unanimous opinion of the people of the borough upon most substantial grounds favors the opening of such an office.

In defense of the large augmentation of the force of Water Meter Inspectors in the Borough of Manhattan, it is to be said that this additional corps is required in order to render the Bureau efficient in the discovery of frauds upon water meters. The numerous instances of frauds which, since January 1st, have come to light, show that the Water Register's office has need of an adequate number of Inspectors. No one, unless familiar with the water meter service and the variety and ingenuity of the methods employed to prevent full registration of the water supplied to consumers by the city, and of the various schemes and devices used to defeat the city of just water dues, can have an adequate conception of the importance of arming the Water Register's Office with a sufficient body of Inspectors. With a competent and adequate corps of Inspectors I should hope that the water revenues of the city should be enhanced a million dollars a year. The salaries of the new Inspectors should be returned to the city many times over.

Section 455 of the Revised Charter authorizes the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, when authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, to employ a Consulting Hydraulic Engineer and a Consulting Engineer of Lighting and Electricity. It is my present intention to apply to your Board and to the Board of Aldermen for such authority, and I therefore, deem it proper that the salaries for such Consulting Engineers be allowed in the revised Final Estimate.

By section 522 of the Revised Greater New York Charter the duty is imposed upon this Department of making inspections of the illuminating gas furnished for public lighting in the city. The Charter says that such inspections may be made as frequently as the Commissioner may think desirable, but not oftener than once a week. Although repeated complaints have for a number of years been made by the public regarding the quality of illuminating gas furnished for private consumption, which is obviously the same illuminant supplied by the gas companies in the public streets and in public buildings, I am informed that no appropriation has ever been made to enable proper tests of the quality of illuminating gas to be made. In my estimate I have included the salary of a chemist and supplies for a laboratory to permit of photometric examination of gas supplied. The additional expense of these tests is for salary of the chemist, \$2,000, and for equipment of a laboratory, \$4,500; total, \$6,500, a very moderate sum. In my judgment it will be wisely expended if it tends to insure the furnishing of such gas illuminant as the Charter requires.

Section 519 of the Charter imposes an obligation upon the head of this department to make tests of electric lighting. The importance of such tests is as obvious as is the importance of tests of illuminating gas. Owing to the fact that no appropriation has heretofore been made, I am informed that no tests of electric light were ever made by the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies. Unless this provision of the Charter is to be a dead letter, it will be necessary that a reasonable sum shall be set apart to pay the salaries of Inspectors of Electrical Conductors and the expense of furnishing and equipping an electrical laboratory for the testing of the electric current. It is proposed to employ six Inspectors of Electrical Conductors, at \$4 per day, total annual salary, \$7,512, and to expend for laboratory purposes, \$7,488, or an aggregate of \$15,000.

As to the wisdom of the contemplated expenditures, I entertain no doubt; in fact, unless appropriation is made for such purposes, it will not be possible for this Department to discharge its duty in making tests of gas and electric light.

As the expense of equipping a laboratory for testing gas and one for testing electrical current does not come under this division of the present Departmental estimate, the estimate of these laboratories will follow below.

The item of increase is solely in the salary of the Deputy Commissioner. Prior to January 1 there was a Deputy Commissioner, combining the necessary functions under the Departments of Water Supply, Highways and Sewers, each Department paying him one-third of his salary of \$5,000—viz., \$1,666.66. It is proposed to appoint a Deputy Commissioner in the borough for this Department, at a salary of \$3,000, when authority for the appointment is obtained from the State Legislature by amendment of section 468 of the Revised City Charter, which now limits the appointment of Deputies in this Department to one at the Central Office, one for the Borough of Brooklyn and one for the Borough of The Bronx.

I bespeak, also, an increase of appropriation to enable me to establish what may be denominated "A Bureau of Supplies." My purpose in establishing such a bureau is to secure the purchase of all minor supplies for use in the various boroughs through a central bureau. There are many supplies required in the various Pumping Stations and elsewhere which, inasmuch as they do not aggregate \$1,000, are purchased upon requisitions or orders and are not the subject of public bidding. The Department has aimed to establish a system of competition by requesting various manufacturers and dealers to send in bids.

The experience of two months has shown that large economies are possible if such a bureau should be established. There is no reason why a particular article required in the various bureaus should be purchased in each borough separately, when a supply for all the boroughs might be bought of a wholesale dealer or manufacturer at a liberal discount. The custom has heretofore prevailed of having an article required at the Pumping Stations in Manhattan and The Bronx bought at one place, while a similar article, when needed for use in the Pumping Stations of the Brooklyn Water Department, might be purchased at an entirely different place; and the same thing has happened in the boroughs of Queens and Richmond.

If these supplies are purchased in larger lots they can ordinarily be bought at lower figures. I may add that the articles in this category purchased this year are similar in quality to, if not better, than the articles purchased last year. The total of this class of small supplies (under \$1,000) bought for use in the various boroughs during the year 1901 was about \$157,000. The percentage of saving, taking the experience of the last two months as a basis, is about 23 per cent. on the average. If the saving should amount to 23 per cent. of the total expenditure, the city, for an outlay for the establishment of the bureau of, say, \$8,000, will save the difference between 23 per cent. of \$157,000 and \$8,000, or \$28,000.

There will be required for the organization of the bureau 1 Chief Clerk, a Stenographer, 2 Inspectors, 3 Clerks, at an estimated cost of \$8,000, which I have included in "Salaries, General Administration."

Not only will the supplies thus be bought at closer figures, but a system will thus be established whereby the articles purchased will be examined and the delivery of the same ascertained and checked. Under the method heretofore prevailing there has really been no plan for ascertaining either that the articles purchased conformed in quality with those required or that the articles were in fact delivered.

ESTIMATE FOR SUPPLIES AND CONTINGENCIES.

The appropriations asked in this estimate for "Supplies and Contingencies" are necessarily larger than those requested in September last, and probably larger than they will be next year, for the following reasons:

The consolidation of the Bureau of Gas and Electricity with the former Water Department makes it necessary that the business of the Department be systematized upon a new basis. New accommodations are needed and have been obtained in this building by arrangement with the President of the Borough of Manhattan, through the initiative of the Comptroller. New quarters for this Department in the Municipal Building, Borough of The Bronx, have been approved by resolution of your Board and will be assured as soon as the Board of Aldermen shall have concurred in such resolution. Additional rooms in the Municipal Building, Borough of Brooklyn, are also required, not only for the transaction of departmental business, but for sanitary reasons as well. The furnishing and fitting up of new quarters in the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn and the opening of a Water Register's office in the Borough of The Bronx, with necessary furnishings and fittings, as well as changes in other boroughs caused by the consolidation of new bureaus with the Department of Water Supply, partially explain the increase in the estimate for "Supplies and Contingencies."

I also include in the estimate the necessary amounts for equipping a laboratory for gas tests and a laboratory for testing electrical current, alluded to in a preceding part of this document.

Upon the request made in my communication of February 10, your Board transferred to the appropriation of this Department for "Supplies and Contingencies, 1902," the sum of \$1,500 from the appropriation made to the President of the Borough of The Bronx, entitled "Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Supplies and Repairs," and the further sum of \$2,587 from the like appropriation made to the President of the Borough of Manhattan, making a total of \$4,087 for the specific purpose of furnishing, fitting up and altering offices assigned to this Department on the 13th, 15th, 17th and 19th floors in this building. It remains, therefore, to provide for the current expenditures for supplies and contingencies for the year, with proper allowance for furnishing and fitting up additional offices to be assigned to the Department in the Municipal Building, Borough of Brooklyn. The larger part of the expense involved is to be provided for by transfers from appropriations made in the final estimate of December last to Borough Presidents for supplies to public buildings and offices, and to that extent the present estimate will add nothing to the budget for 1902 and should not figure as an increase in this estimate over the final estimate of December last.

With these explanations I present the following estimate:

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The late Board of Estimate and Apportionment in its Final Estimate for 1902 made no allotment to this Department for office furniture and supplies out of the appropriation of \$140,000 for "Supplies and Repairs" made to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, but inserted the proviso, "this appropriation to be subject to drafts by transfers to be made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to Departmental appropriations for the purchase of supplies."

This estimate shows an increase of \$500 for contingencies, Engineer's Office, and \$1,000 for contingencies, Water Registrar's Office, Borough of Brooklyn, over the amounts allowed in the Final Estimate of the late Board, it having been found in the course of the past year that the allowances in the Final Estimate were then inadequate and would be inadequate for the current year. My estimate also shows an increase of \$1,500 for contingencies, Laboratory. This becomes necessary by reason of the greatly increased work which will be performed in the Laboratory of analyzing gas and analyzing water supply in the Borough of Queens, this work being added to the ordinary work heretofore done.

No provision for contingencies for the Bureaus of Gas and Electricity was made in the Final Estimate of the late Board. When these Bureaus were part of the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies they shared in the appropriation for "Contingencies" made to that Department.

The increase of \$500 over the Final Estimate of the late Board is required for contingencies for account of the Bureaus of Gas and Electricity, added to this Department.

A brief comparison of the present estimate with the Departmental Estimates of August and September last, and with the Budget as fixed by the late Board of Estimate and apportionment may be instructive. The totals of the Departmental Estimates presented by the Commissioner of Water Supply and the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, so far as they are applicable to this Department are \$4,785,787 65. This included laying water pipes in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx and Queens, items, which, as heretofore explained in this estimate, the late Board of Estimate and Apportionment proposed to make the subject of bond issues under section 178 of the Charter.....

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The present estimate contemplates certain new expenditures which are distinctly in the public interest, viz., for additional Water Meter Inspectors in the Borough of Manhattan, Water Register's Bureau in the Borough of The Bronx, Inspectors and Laboratories for testing gas and for testing electric light. There is also absolutely required an advance of \$18,217 over Commissioner Kearny's estimate for lighting in the Borough of Queens, and \$10,000 for additional lighting in The Bronx over his estimates for such additional lighting, made last August.

The water revenue of the city can be greatly augmented if additional Water Meter Inspectors are employed. With the present force in Manhattan, which is not only relatively but even actually smaller than the force in Brooklyn, meter inspections cannot be frequently made, and frequency of inspection is a sure method of testing irregularities in a meter.

The quality of the gas supplied for city uses and the intensity of the electric current furnished for public lighting have never been tested for the simple reason that no appropriation has been made for such purpose. This policy of inaction should cease; appropriations should be made so as to qualify the Department to obey the law as to testing gas and electric light, or the law should be abrogated.

It is to be remembered that the great bulk of the expenses of maintaining the Brooklyn water system is payable out of the Brooklyn Water Revenue Fund, and that the appropriations for such maintenance do not appear in the present estimate. A comparison between the final estimate, made by the late Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in December last, and the present revised estimate, cannot be completely made unless the difference between the proposed cost of the maintenance for 1902 of the Brooklyn water system, on the basis of the December payroll of last year, and the estimate set forth in my letter to your Board of January 15, 1902, be considered. To make the comparison perfectly complete, it should be stated also that the proposed expense of \$21,567.50 for surveys of the Catskill watersheds, has been dispensed with by me.

The water supply of this metropolis cannot be managed upon a parsimonious basis. The water system is of vital importance; it is conducted not only so as to be self-sustaining but even profitable, for a reasonable margin of the water revenue remains, after expenses of maintenance and interest charges for the creation of a sinking fund. In the few instances where slight increases in appropriations are sought, the city will, it is believed, be amply compensated for the outlay. Every expense contemplated in the estimate will be conducive to the greater efficiency of the Department, and is, in my judgment, necessary for its proper operation.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Report for Quarter Ending September 30, 1901.

Honorable SETH LOW, Mayor, New York City:

Sir—Pursuant to section 1544, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, the Police Commissioner of the Police Department of The City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending September 30, 1901.

REPORT.

On the 30th day of September, 1901, the number of the force of all grades (including those on probation) was 7,565.

Sick Time.

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received for the quarter, and the details thereof, will be found in schedule annexed marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 20,020½ days; the sick time paid, 10,010½ days, and sick time unpaid, 10,010½ days. Total days' time of the force was 673,906 days. Per cent. of sick to full time, 2.97; for preceding quarter, 2.74.

Arrests.

The total number of arrests by the police force during the quarter was: Males, 28,245; females, 7,243; total, 35,488. Number arrested for principal felonies, 2,584; number discharged without trial, 746; number acquitted, 264; number convicted, 307; number sent to other authorities, 61; number died, 4; number pending, 1,202.

Lost Children.

Males, 507; females, 244; total, 751. Restored to parents or guardians, 720; other dispositions, 30. Of this number there were disposed of from Centrl Office 561.

Note.—In Felony Report the Nineteenth Precinct is omitted, the records being in possession of the District Attorney.

Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

Note.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in Felony Report and General Report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the General Report is made up from the Daily Returns from the station houses and the Felony Report is made from the Quarterly Returns. An offense charged in the station house at the time of the arrest is liable to be, and often is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the Magistrate.

## BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

Meeting held at the office of the Board, Rooms 516 and 517, No. 1 Madison avenue, New York, March 18, 1902.

Meeting called to order at 3 p. m.

Present—Messrs. F. C. Moore, W. J. Fryer, W. A. Conover, W. C. Smith, C. O'Reilly, Chief Croker and A. F. D'Oench, Chairman.

Minutes of the meeting of the 11th instant read, and on motion duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 44 of 1902, New Building 1680 of 1901 (previous Appeal No. 34 of 1902), premises No. 210 Fifth avenue, through to No. 1132 Broadway, John B. Snook & Sons, architects and appellants: "To omit additional line of stairs and offering amendment to original plans as follows: The main hall partitions enclosing entrance on Fifth avenue to be solid fireproof terra cotta blocks without access from hall and main stairway of apartments to basement. The elevator enclosing throughout to be solid fireproof terra cotta blocks with metal covered doors, casings and jams, and all glazed openings to be wire glass. The lower two stories (store and second story) to be shut off from floors above, so as to prevent spread of fire or smoke. The fire escapes in court afford two continuous lines of stairs, with access to each apartment and main hall at each story, and to roof of adjoining building on the north." Mr. Weekes appeared in explanation.

On motion duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 45 of 1902, New Building 1042 of 1901, Oscar Hammerstein, appellant, William E. Mowbray, architect, premises north side of Thirty-fourth street, 175 feet west of Eighth avenue, through to West Thirty-fifth street: "It is claimed that an equally good or more desirable form of construction can be employed for the construction of the proscenium wall of theatre, for the following reasons:

"1. Owing to the clear span of 67 feet 6 inches and the clear height of 55 feet of proscenium opening, the architect, after three lengthy consultations with Mr. Bowman, engineer in chief of the Phoenix Steel and Iron Company of Phoenixville, Pa., preferred to use the steel truss and the steel columns which are imbedded in brickwork, in connection with two partitions constructed of 6-inch 13-pound steel I beams with cross braces and filled in with 6-inch thick hollow burned clay terra cotta fireproof blocks set in pure Portland cement mortar, and with an intervening space 1 foot four inches wide, filled in to top with mineral wool, or asbestos packing, or other fireproof materials approved by the Superintendent of Buildings, in preference to a brick arch built of rowlock brick courses laid in cement mortar over box girder with skewbacks. Complete drawings in detail will be filed for this construction, as shown, by Mr. Bowman, engineer in chief Phoenix Steel and Iron Company of Phoenixville, Pa.

"2. The thrust resulting from a brick arch of such a great span and at such a great height above the earth surface will require an excessive strength in skewback, and in the box girder underneath the brick arch, to support the wall and arch.

"3. The principal duty of the brick wall and the brick arch over the proscenium is that of a fire stop or fire-resisting material between the stage and the auditorium, as well as to support a small section of the roof.

"4. The method of construction as proposed is the first known example of applying to the necessities of theatre construction the principles of modern steel construction, such steel construction not being thought a possibility at the time the law regarding the construction of proscenium walls in theatres was first passed.

"5. The construction as shown, of a truss supporting two six inch I beam partitions filled in with 6-inch hollow burnt terra cotta blocks, and with the intervening space filled in with mineral wool, asbestos fibre or other fireproof materials, as approved by the Superintendent of Buildings, will provide an equally good and more desirable form of construction."

Mr. Mowbray appeared before the Board in explanation, and was directed to prepare detailed drawings of the arch construction; the matter, on motion duly made and seconded, being laid over for two weeks.

Appeal No. 46 of 1902, Alteration 196 of 1902, premises Nos. 529 to 545 East Sixty-eighth street, The Rusling Company, architects and appellants. "The Central Brewing Company have a system of pipes on the roof for storing beer, over these pipes water is continually running to keep the same cool. It is proposed to inclose these pipes to keep the direct rays of the sun from them, at the same time to have the inclosure open as much as possible for a circulation of air. The frame of the house will be constructed of steel and covered with galvanized iron louvers about three inches apart, as per detailed plans."

A representative of the Rusling Company appeared before the Board in explanation of the appeal.

On motion duly made and seconded, approved.

The Chairman presented a communication from Messrs. Clinton & Russell, requesting a reconsideration of Appeal No. 21 of 1902, Matter of Iron Shutters, premises Nos. 69 and 71 East Eighth street. Mr. McDonald appeared in explanation.

On motion duly made and seconded, reconsideration granted; referred to Chief Croker for examination and report.

Appeal No. 43 of 1902, Matter of Iron Shutters, premises No. 59 East Eighth street, F. R. Walker, owner and appellant.

Appeal No. 37 of 1902, Matter of Iron Shutters, premises No. 42 West Ninety-ninth street, H. F. Bindseil, appellant. On presentation of report made by Chief Croker, dated March 15th instant appeal was denied.

Appeal No. 30 of 1902, Matter of Iron Shutters, premises No. 411 West Seventeenth street, Charles H. Peckworth, appellant. On presentation of report made by Mr. W. A. Conover, dated March 18th instant, appeal was granted.
