#### Report for the Quarter Ending September 30, 1899.

POLICE DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,  
NEW YORK, October 1, 1899.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor, New York City:

SIR—Pursuant to section 1544, chapter 376 of the Laws of 1897, the Police Board of the Police Department of The City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and Force, for the three months ending September 30, 1899:

#### REPORT.

On the 30th day of September, 1899, the number of the Force of all grades (including Patrolmen 52, Doormen 13, and Matrons, 22, on Probation), was: 7,479.

#### SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the Force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received, for the quarter, and the details thereof, will be found in Schedule annexed, marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 17,559 days. Sick time paid, 8,779½; sick time unpaid, 8,779½ days. Total, 17,559 days. Total days' time of the Force was 676,671 days. Per cent. of sick to full time, 2.59. Amount paid for sick time, \$29,797.51. Amount paid for preceding quarter, \$28,608.56. Increase, \$1,188.95.

#### ARRESTS.

The total number of persons arrested by the Police Force during the quarter was: Males, 28,351; females, 7,699. Total, 36,050. Number arrested for principal felonies, 2,662; number discharged without trial, 706; number acquitted, 362; number convicted, 370; number sent to other authorities, 51; number died, 10; number pending, 1,163. Total, 2,662.

#### LOST CHILDREN—(see Schedule "B").

Males, 539; females, 271. Total, 810. Restored to parents or guardians, 781. Other dispositions, 29. Of this number there were disposed of from Central Office, 481.

Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

NOTE—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in Felony Report and General Report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the General Report is made up from the daily returns from the Station-houses, and the Felony Report is made from the quarterly returns. An offense charged in the Station-house at the time the arrest is made is liable to be, and often is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the Magistrate.

The minutes of the meeting held January 12, 1900, were approved.

John U. Brookman appeared and protested against the driving of piles in front of the bulkhead between Eighteenth and Twentieth streets, East river. He was informed that the Board desired to acquire the property in order to proceed with the work of improvement thereat, and,

On motion, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The Board of Docks is desirous of acquiring in the name and for the benefit of The City of New York the following described premises to wit:

All that certain bulkhead, wharf or dock property beginning at a point where the northerly line of East Eighteenth street intersects the existing bulkhead fronting on the East river; thence running northerly along the line of said bulkhead or water-front about 282 feet to the southerly side of the Pier at the foot of East Nineteenth street; also, all that certain bulkhead, wharf or dock property beginning at a point where the northerly side of the Pier at the foot of East Nineteenth street intersects the existing bulkhead fronting on the East river; thence running northerly along the line of said bulkhead or water-front about 265 feet to the southerly line of East Twentieth street, together with all wharfage rights, terms, easements, emoluments and privileges appurtenant to and connected with said bulkheads.

Also, all that certain piece or parcel of made land lying between the northerly side of East Eighteenth street and the southerly side of East Nineteenth street, and bounded and described as follows: Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the northerly line of Eighteenth street with the westerly line of the marginal street, wharf or place established by the Dock Department December 19, 1888; running thence northerly along said westerly line of marginal street about 240 feet to the southerly line of Nineteenth street; thence easterly along said southerly line of Nineteenth street about 31 feet to the existing bulkhead; thence southerly along said existing bulkhead about 268 feet to the northerly line of Eighteenth street; thence westerly along said northerly line of Eighteenth street about 70 feet to the point or place of beginning; and

Whereas, It appears that John U. Brookman is the owner in fee simple of the above-described premises, together with all hereditaments, including the riparian and wharfage rights;

Resolved, That this Board offers to purchase the above-described premises, with all hereditaments, and to pay for a good and sufficient title thereto, free from all incumbrances, the sum of \$54,700, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Resolved, That a copy of these preambles and resolutions be served upon said John U. Brookman, and that he be and is hereby requested, within ten days from receipt thereof, to notify this Board, in writing, whether he will sell the said riparian rights and interests as aforesaid, to The



City of New York for the price above mentioned; and in the event that the said John U. Brookman shall fail to notify this Board of his willingness to so convey the respective rights and interests as aforesaid, it shall be deemed that no price can be agreed upon for the purchase of said property between the owner thereof and this Department.

The communication from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund transmitting certified copy of resolution adopted by said Commissioners December 28, 1899, approving the map or plan as prepared by this Department, for a new breakwater south of Pier "A," North river, was taken from the table, placed on file, and,

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed with the work of building a new breakwater south of Pier "A," North river, within the lines of the new plan adopted by this Board and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and that all the work pertaining thereto be performed otherwise than by contract, as provided by section 821 of the Greater New York Charter; and that it be done by the force of this Department by day's work, except so much of the labor as is now or may hereafter be contracted for; and that all material, tools and implements necessary for the above-mentioned work, not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer, otherwise than by contract.

The communication from the Edison Electric Illuminating Company of New York, requesting a lease of the lands and lands under water at the foot of East Thirty-ninth street, East river, with privilege of making certain improvements thereat, was tabled.

The following communications were referred to the Treasurer:

From the Carroll Box and Lumber Company—Requesting a renewal lease of the Pier foot of East Eighteenth street, for a term of five years from the date of expiration of the present term, the rental to be determined by a disinterested person.

From Wichman Brothers—Requesting a lease of 100 feet of the Pier foot of Twentieth street, East river; and protesting against the granting of any further privileges on said pier to H. L. Herbert & Co.

From H. L. Herbert & Co.—Requesting a ten years' lease of the Pier foot of East Twentieth street.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Brown & Fleming, to dredge under the dumping-board foot of Fortieth street, East river.

John Klenk, to repair sewer between King and Charlton streets, North river; all pavement to be relaid by the force of this Department at the cost and expense of the permittee.

From the Bridgeport Steamboat Company, to drive eight piles on the easterly side of Pier 39, East river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

William Hastorf, to dredge at the bulkhead foot of Thirtieth street, East river.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Dr. J. N. O. Hill, to construct a bulkhead north of Neptune avenue and westerly of Henry street, Coney Island Creek, Borough of Brooklyn.

F. P. Gallagher—To extend the jetty on the easterly side of West Eighth street, Coney Island, Borough of Brooklyn, for a distance of about 200 feet from low-water mark.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Comptroller, in relation to substitution of surety on Contract No. 669.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted for the substitution of the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company as surety in the place of Charles S. Hirsch, on the estimate of Bernard Rolf, contractor, for building two new wooden piers, with appurtenances, in the Wallabout basin, Borough of Brooklyn, under Contract No. 669.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Approving forms of Contracts Nos. 673, for furnishing granite stones, and 674, for furnishing and delivering piles.

2d. Approving form of lease of Pier, new 56, North river, with the land under water adjoining same, to the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company. Commissioners authorized to execute said lease.

3d. Transmitting bills of costs in proceedings for the acquisition of wharf property at the south half of the block between Bank and Bethune streets; between Watts and Canal streets, North river, and Pier, old 39, East river, and adjoining bulkhead. From the Chrome Steel Works—Requesting permission to construct an open shed on their property at Wallabout canal, Borough of Brooklyn.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Chrome Steel Works to construct an open shed on its property, southerly of Keap street, Wallabout canal, Borough of Brooklyn, this work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, in accordance with plans submitted to and approved by him; it being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Chrome Steel Works file in the Department a written agreement, the form of which shall be approved by the Corporation Counsel, that in the event that the Board of Docks shall decide that the said property is needed for the improvement of the water-front, that then and in such event no additional item of value shall be claimed or allowed by reason of the erection of said shed in any proceeding instituted for the acquisition of said wharf property, either by purchase or condemnation; said agreement to contain a mutual covenant to the effect that it shall be binding upon the heirs, executors, administrators, assigns and successors of the parties thereto.

From the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company—Requesting permission to reconstruct a portion of the inshore end of Pier, new 16, North river, and to erect iron sheds on the bulkhead thereat.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Rhinelander and others, dated December 16, 1897, said shed to be erected in accordance with plans, specifications and form of contract to be submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, all the work to be done under his direction and supervision.

From the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company—Requesting permission to erect a one-story shed, and to make certain other improvements on the bulkhead south of Pier 18, North river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company to erect an iron shed eighty-nine feet nine inches long, and forty-five feet five inches wide, on the bulkhead adjoining the southerly side of Pier 18, North river, in accordance with the agreement made by the City with Frederick W. Rhinelander and others dated March 22, 1897; also to make certain alterations in the existing shed opposite said Pier 18, the work to be done in accordance with plans and specifications submitted, and under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

From the Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen—Submitting proposition for the sale of its property at the foot of Pike street, East river.

On motion, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That, in pursuance of section 822 of the Greater New York Charter, an agreement be entered into between this Department and the Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen, in the City and Port of New York, for the purchase of bulkhead, wharf and dock property on the south side of South street, commencing at a point three hundred and twenty-nine feet ten inches easterly from the easterly side of Market slip, produced, and extending easterly along the southerly side of South street a distance of fifty-one feet three inches, more or less, for the sum of two hundred and fifty (250) dollars per lineal foot; provided, however, that a good and sufficient title, in all respects, to the said property, together with all rights, terms, easements and privileges pertaining thereto and connected therewith, can be acquired by, conveyed to and vested in The City of New York, free from all incumbrances, subject, however, to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen, in the City and Port of New York, to moor a floating church in the vicinity of Pike slip, East river, at a location to be hereafter designated by the Board of Docks, and upon the completion of the work of improvement under the new plan, permission be and hereby is granted said society to moor the present church or a church which may hereafter be constructed by it, at a point on said bulkhead-wall to be designated by the Board of Docks, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of said Board; all the expense of moving the present or future church and driving piles for the protection thereof, shall be done at the cost and expense of the Department of Docks and Ferries; the said society shall pay as compensation for the use of said berth, the sum of twenty-five (25) dollars per annum, payable yearly at the end of each year to the Treasurer of this Department, commencing from the time the berth is assigned to said society.

It being understood and agreed that the above resolutions shall be of no force or effect unless the said Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen, in The City and Port of New York, shall file in this Department, within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof, its written acceptance of the terms and conditions of these resolutions.

From the Treasurer—Recommending that permission be granted T. G. & W. R. Patten, to use and occupy Pier, old 59, North river, for the season of 1900, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Board, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$250 per month, commencing April 1, 1900, payable at the end of each month to the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted.

A representative of the firm of Brown & Roberts, contractors, appeared and requested an extension of thirty days in which to complete Contract No. 643, for furnishing granite stones for bulkhead or river wall.

On motion, the reports of the Engineer-in-Chief recommending that the stone already furnished by Brown & Roberts under said Contract No. 643 be recut where necessary, by the force of this Department, at the cost and expense of the contractors, and also recommending that said contract be canceled and that the material necessary be purchased by the Treasurer under Treasurer's Order, any loss occasioned by said purchase to be charged to the contractors, were placed on file, said recommendations approved, and the following preamble and resolutions unanimously adopted:

Whereas, The City of New York, acting by the Board of Docks, as party of the first part, entered into a certain agreement (Contract No. 643), dated July 12, 1899, with Andrew D. Brown and Walter A. Roberts, composing the firm of Brown & Roberts (contractors), as party of the second part, whereby said party of the second part agreed to furnish and deliver a certain quantity of granite stones for bulkhead or river wall, as provided in said agreement, to which reference is hereby made; and

Whereas, Said agreement contained among other things, a certain provision, as follows:

"Article 22. The said party of the second part further agrees that if the work to be done under this contract shall be abandoned, or if this contract shall be assigned, or the work sublet, by the party of the second part, otherwise than as is herein specified, or if at any time the said Engineer-in-Chief, or other officer or officers designated by him as aforesaid to have charge of the inspection of said work, shall be of the opinion, and shall so certify in writing to said Board, that the prosecution of said work, or any part thereof, is unnecessarily or unreasonably delayed, or that the said contractor is willfully violating any of the conditions or covenants of this contract, or executing this contract in bad faith, or if the work to be done under this contract be not fully completed within the time specified herein for its completion, the said Board shall have the power to notify the said contractor to discontinue any or all work under this contract, by a written notice to be served upon the said contractor, either personally or by leaving the same at his residence or with his agent in charge of the work; and thereupon said contractor shall and will discontinue said work, or such part thereof as said Board may designate; and the parties of the first part shall thereupon have the power, in the manner prescribed by law, to procure such quantity of material and such machinery, implements and appliances, and to employ such labor and to use such materials as they may find upon the line of said work, and to do such work as may be necessary to fulfill this contract, or such part thereof as may be deemed necessary, and to charge the cost of said material, machinery, implements and appliances and labor to the aforesaid contractor, and the expense so charged shall be deducted and paid by the parties hereto of the first part out of such moneys as may then be due, or may at any time thereafter become due, to the said contractor, under and by virtue of this agreement or any part thereof; and in case such expense shall be less than the sum which would have been payable under this contract if the same had been completed by the said contractor, then the said party of the second part shall and will forfeit all claim to the difference; but in case such expense shall exceed the said last-named sum, then the said party of the second part shall and will pay the said amount of such excess to the parties of the first part. And when any particular part of said work is being carried on by the said Board by contract or otherwise under the provisions of this clause of this contract, the aforesaid contractor agrees to continue the remainder of the work in conformity with the terms of this agreement and in such manner as in nowise to hinder or interfere with the persons or workmen employed as above provided by the said Board, by contract or otherwise, to do any part of the said work, or to complete the same, under the provisions of this clause of the contract."

Whereas, The Engineer-in-Chief of this Department is of the opinion, and has, under date of January 26, 1900, certified in writing to this Board, as provided in said agreement, that the prosecution of said work is and has been unnecessarily and unreasonably delayed, and that the work to be done under this contract has not been fully completed within the time specified therein for its completion;

Resolved, That said Brown & Roberts be and hereby are notified to discontinue any and all work under said contract above mentioned and described.

Resolved, That, in accordance with section 821 of the Greater New York Charter, the Treasurer be and is hereby directed to procure such quantity of material and such machinery, implements and appliances, and the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to employ such labor, and to use such materials, machinery, implements and appliances, and to do such work as may be necessary to fulfill said contract, and that all the work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract, and that all machinery, implements and appliances necessary not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby directed to notify and inform the said contractors and their sureties that all the expense of fulfilling said contract which now remains, will be charged to said contractors, as provided in Article 22 of said contract.

The communication from the Corporation Counsel transmitting approved form of renewal lease to the Long Island Railroad Company of the franchise of the ferry from Pier 17, East river, at the foot of Pine street, to Long Island City, was tabled for one week.

The matter of the proposed improvement of the water front in the vicinity of Pier 36, East river, and the removal of the extension to said Pier, was tabled for two weeks.

The communications from the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company requesting a thirty years' lease of Pier, new 4, East river, when completed, together with the half bulkheads adjoining same, the premises to be shedded by this Department, and also requesting a twenty years' renewal lease of the southerly half of the bulkhead at the foot of Sixtieth street, North river, at an annual rental of \$250, were referred to the Treasurer.

The application of the Central Vermont Railroad Company for a lease of Pier, new 33, East river, when completed, together with the adjoining bulkhead, with the privilege of erecting a shed thereon, was referred to Commissioner Meyer.

The communication from Weber & Bunke requesting permission to place and maintain, for their exclusive use, a tool-house and coal-hoist on the bulkhead foot of West Ninety-sixth street was referred to the Dock Superintendent.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Company, to make necessary repairs to Pier, new 36, North river.

Robert M. Ferris, to make necessary repairs to the north side of Pier 16, East river.

D. Brinkman, to replace cluster of piles at the bulkhead between Eighty-first and Eighty-second streets, East river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York, to make general repairs to its ferry premises foot of Roosevelt, Grand, East Tenth and East Twenty-third streets, East river; and at the bulkhead between East Twenty-third and East Twenty-fourth streets, Borough of Manhattan; and at the foot of Greenpoint avenue, Grand street, and from South Sixth to South Ninth streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, during the ensuing six months, the work to be kept within existing lines, and at least twenty-four hours notice to be given the Engineer-in-Chief before the commencement of any such work.

Poillon Estate, to dredge to a depth of twelve feet at low water at its piers and bulkheads foot of Bridge Street, Borough of Brooklyn.

Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, to dredge in the slips adjoining its Pier No. 6, at St. George, Staten Island.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Henry Hanjers, to construct a dock on his property at the foot of Bay Nineteenth street, Bath Beach, Borough of Brooklyn.

Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, to erect a coal-hoisting tower on its property between First and Bond streets, Gowanus canal, Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with plans submitted.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Mayor—Requesting information as to the ownership of the bulkhead between West Twenty-sixth and Twenty-seventh streets, North river; and also as to any leases that may have been granted therefor. Action of the President in furnishing the desired information approved.

From the Comptroller—

1st. Approving sureties on Contract No. 669, for building two new piers at the Wallabout Basin, Borough of Brooklyn.

2d. Advising that his certificates have been indorsed upon Contract No. 670, for building a platform at the foot of Railroad avenue, Harlem river; No. 671, for paving at the Wallabout Basin, Borough of Brooklyn, and No. 672, for dredging on the North river, between the Battery and West Thirty-fourth street, and that the same are now valid contracts.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Approving form of lease to John H. Starin of the 78.17 feet of bulkhead between Piers, new 13 and 14, North river. Action of the Commissioners in executing same approved.

2d. Transmitting check for \$39.50 in settlement of the claim against C. C. Henry, for the cost of repairing the pier at the foot of West Thirty-fourth street, North river, where damaged by the tug "Gracie."

3d. Requesting that the lease of Pier, new 31, North river, to the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company, be sent to his office for use in the proceedings for the condemnation of 125 feet of the bulkhead at the foot of Watts street, North river. Secretary directed to furnish same.

4th. Requesting information in relation to the claim against Sarah T. Jackson for the cost of erecting a fence on the bulkhead between Jackson and Corlears streets, East river. Secretary directed to furnish same.



5th. Requesting information as to the date when this Department entered into possession of the 100 feet of bulkhead owned by the Miller Estate in the vicinity of Perry street, North river. Secretary directed to state that the Department took possession of the premises in question on May 1, 1899.

From the Manhattan State Hospital—Protesting against the granting of any permit for the establishment of a manure-dump at the foot of One Hundred and Fifteenth street, Harlem river. On motion, the permit granted H. I. Smith January 5, 1900, to maintain a manure-dump at the foot of said street was revoked.

From John Porth—Requesting permission to berth his oyster-boat at the location heretofore occupied by Matthew Foster, Jr., in the oyster-basin at the foot of Gansevoort street, North river. Application granted, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to drive the necessary piles thereat, and to report the cost thereof for collection from said Porth.

From P. J. Casey—Requesting a lease of the lower deck of the Recreation Pier at the foot of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, North river, for a term of ten years, with the privilege of renewal. Application denied.

From the Bridgeport Steamboat Company—Requesting a lease of Pier, old 39, East river, with adjoining bulkheads. Application denied, and the Secretary directed to state that it is the intention of the Board to remove said Pier.

From William Simmons—Requesting an extension of time on Contract No. 668.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the first delivery of 200,000 feet of yellow pine timber under Contract No. 668, William Simmons, contractor, be and hereby is extended to and including January 26, 1900, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract is filed in this Department.

From John U. Brookman—Declining offer of \$54,700 for the purchase of his bulkhead rights, between Eighteenth and Twentieth streets, East river.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request the Corporation Counsel to have a commission appointed for the condemnation of said property, and that the City be placed in possession thereof at the earliest practical date.

From the President—Recommending that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$3,000,000 for the uses and purposes of this Department during the year 1900.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to the authority vested in them by section 180, chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, be and they are hereby requested to direct the Comptroller to prepare and issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of three million dollars, for the uses and purposes of this Department for the year 1900.

From the Dock Superintendent—Report for the week ending January 20, 1900.

Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the week ending January 20, 1900.

2d. Recommending that the less-es be directed to make necessary repairs to Piers, new 14 and 15, North river, and to Pier 60 and the bulkhead between Piers 60 and 61, East river. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that repairs be made by the force of this Department to the Pier foot of East One Hundred and Twelfth street, Harlem river, where damaged by transfer boats "Kuper" and "No. 11," the cost of the work to be collected from the owners of said transfer boats. Recommendation adopted.
