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BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

Report for the Quarter Ending March 31, 1905.

New York, April 1, 1905.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor:

Sir—We have the honor to present the following report for the three months just closed:

The most important action taken by the Trustees during the past quarter affecting the entire Department entrusted to their care was, perhaps, the resolution adopted at their meeting of January 12, creating the position of General Medical Superintendent of all the hospitals in this Department and calling upon the Municipal Civil Service Commission to set a date upon which a competitive examination of applicants for this position may be held. This resolution expresses the settled conviction of the Board of Trustees that to deal adequately with all the problems at present confronting the management of the city hospitals, including the plans under way for their improvement and extension, a practical physician is needed, and it is the hope of the Trustees that in providing for this examination the Civil Service Commissioners will allow much weight to the item of experience in the management of a similar institution here or elsewhere. In this way it is probable that a physician of large experience, practised in the discipline and control of younger doctors like those comprising the house staffs of the various hospitals, and entirely familiar with the requirements of modern hospital construction, will be found to undertake the difficult duties attaching to the new position he will be called upon to fill.

A rule of importance to the welfare of patients has been adopted recently. This rule requires the inspection of a patient by the attending physician or surgeon on the day of his transfer to another hospital before this transfer shall be permitted. In other words the patient must be seen and pronounced fit for removal by a medical authority higher than that of the young physician or surgeon of the house staff before such removal shall be permitted. This rule, adopted first for Bellevue Hospital, has had its application extended to all the other hospitals of the Department and is confidently expected to yield satisfactory results.

By resolutions of the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the matter of arranging the grades of stenographers (male at \$900 per annum and female at \$720) has been adjusted, and approval has been obtained of the change of title from Resident Physician and Assistant Resident Physician in the Psychopathic Wards to Alienist and Assistant Alienist, the salaries of these positions being fixed at \$3,500 and \$1,500 respectively.

At its first meeting in February, the Board of Trustees organized for the year by the re-election of Dr. John W. Brannan as President, and of Mr. James K. Paulding as Secretary. At this meeting was present for the first time Mr. Leopold Stern, appointed to succeed Mr. Marcus Stine, whose term expired on February 1. His fellow Trustees, by reason of their high opinion of the value of Mr. Stine's services to the Board, united in petitioning him to allow his name to be presented to the Mayor for reappointment, but private reasons compelled him to decline.

BELLEVUE HOSPITAL.

Mr. Mead, of the firm of McKim, Mead and White, architects for the new Bellevue Hospital, was present at the meeting of the Board of Trustees held on March 10, and laid before the Board the general plan for the new hospital plant, and in more detail the plans for Pavilions A and B, to be erected on Twenty-sixth street, on the site of the present erysipelas and alcoholic wards, these new pavilions to form the south-east wing of the main hospital. A resolution requesting of the Board of Estimate and the Board of Aldermen an appropriation of \$850,000 for the construction of these first pavilions was then adopted and communicated to the authorities named.

Increased Facilities.

In the meanwhile the work of constructing the Ducker portable buildings, designed to meet the immediate need for increased provision for patients, has progressed so rapidly that two of these buildings were opened by the latter part of February and the other two during March. Delay on the part of the prison authorities in supplying beds and blankets was responsible for such slight delay as occurred here. Already relief has been felt as a result of opening these buildings, and this has

been particularly noticeable in the increased facility enjoyed for retaining patients really too ill for transfer, but who, under the old system, had to be removed in order to make room for those still more acute cases that could not be refused admission. The assignment of one of these buildings to the purposes of a tuberculosis ward for men will, it is hoped, do much to relieve the strain arising from lack of sufficient room for these cases, which has been a cause of complaint in the past. Many advanced cases of consumption come to Bellevue straight from the street in a condition too precarious to admit of immediate transfer to the Metropolitan Hospital on Blackwell's Island. These cases must frequently be cared for in the general wards of the hospital, where they are sometimes a menace to the health of other patients being cared for there. The opening of this new ward, capable of thorough ventilation and exposed to the fresh air and sunshine, will be an excellent place for these patients, besides making it possible thoroughly to enforce the rule against admitting them to the general wards of the hospital.

As a consequence of the increased number of patients cared for by the erection of the additional pavilions and the heavy census of the quarter, it has been necessary to increase the number of persons employed to care for them, and the Board of Trustees is accordingly grateful for the recent action of the City's financial authorities in appropriating the \$20,000 in special revenue bonds requested by us for the purpose of renting and equipping a house to be used as a home for the additional nurses already required. This house will be managed by the Bellevue Training School for Nurses, which is itself under the jurisdiction of the Board of Trustees.

Already, at the beginning of the year, it was found necessary to engage a room outside of the hospital for two members of the house staff whose quarters in the old building were disgracefully crowded.

Medical Appointments.

On February 24 Dr. Alvin M. Pappenheimer was appointed Assistant Pathologist under Dr. Charles Norris, the appointment to date from March 1, and on March 24 Dr. Thomas Flournoy was appointed to a second position bearing the same title, his appointment to date from April 1. These positions carry a salary of \$1,500 per annum. With these appointments the new department of pathology is fully organized, and provision is made for scientific work of a kind recognized and provided for in the best hospitals here and abroad.

Dr. Michael J. Thornton, of the Manhattan State Hospital at Central Islip, was appointed Assistant Resident Alienist on February 15, having been certified on the list of candidates eligible to this position by the Municipal Civil Service Commission after its examination for this position established by them.

On January 12 Dr. Claude A. Frink was appointed Visiting Physician to Out Patients on the First Division of the Out-Patient Department.

Census.

The total number of patients in the hospital during the quarter was 8,021, as compared with 8,667 in the same period of 1904, but the census has been steadily increasing and promises to be much larger in the next quarter than it was last year, as is shown by the number remaining March 31, which was 966 this year and 904 in 1904. Of those discharged the number recovered was 2,099, a slightly larger proportion of the total number of patients than was the number of recovered in 1904. The number of improved was 2,209, as compared with 2,428, and the unimproved were 302, as compared with 256. The number of deaths was much smaller.

Rules Affecting the Service, Etc.

The Board of Trustees has approved of a new rule suggested by the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital to the effect that patients suffering from poison or from coma, providing that they are not under arrest, shall be treated in the general wards instead of being assigned to the alcoholic wards, as has been the custom in the past.

Another rule, admitting to the gynaecological service post-partum patients referred from Emergency Hospital, has also been approved.

A recommendation that the medical teaching of graduate and undergraduate students be extended to the Out-Patient Department has likewise met with the approval of the Board of Trustees.

The thanks of the Board were extended to Dr. Dow and his associates of the Committee on Clinical Records for the admirable manner in which the important tables of statistics regarding operations, etc., for the year 1904 were prepared. The matter of providing more space for the work of the record room was referred to the President for investigation.

Miscellaneous.

The work of filling in the extension within the new bulkhead has progressed steadily, and it will be necessary to build a fence along the south side of Twenty-eighth street to protect the new ground.

The erection of the Ducker buildings has deprived the doctors of their tennis court. As it is quite essential that these hard worked young men should have some means of recreation at hand, the Acting Superintendent has been instructed to find a new site for the court.

GOUVERNEUR HOSPITAL.

Progress upon the new wing of Gouverneur Hospital has not been very rapid during the past quarter. For this the weather has been to blame, and the contractor appears also to be at fault, judging from the small force of men he has sometimes had at work there. To observe this (among other matters) continuously and make report to the Trustees, an inspector of construction is needed, and it is hoped that the eligible list of the Civil Service Commission will soon be available. A proposition from the contractor to begin work on the basement of the old wing now used for the Out-Patient Department has just been received and referred to the President for settlement. It will involve the temporary abandonment of the children's ward, as this will be needed for the accommodation of the dispensary patients.

A communication was received early in January from the Committee on Prevention of Tuberculosis of the Charity Organization Society offering to pay \$40 apiece per month to two physicians, to be employed under Dr. Huddleston, a member of the Gouverneur Hospital Medical Board, in the tuberculosis clinic of the Out-Patient Department, this payment to be continued for an experimental period of six months. These physicians were already attached to the staff of the Out-Patient Department, where they had been doing excellent work, but were on the point of resigning by reason of the large demands upon their time in the service of the City, for which no compensation was made. The offer of the committee was therefore accepted by the Board of Trustees, the new plan being regarded in the light of an experiment.

Census.

The number of patients admitted during the quarter was 1,069, as compared with 1,087 for the first quarter of 1904. The number of patients in the hospital at the end of the quarter was 114 this year and 94 in 1904. The proportion of recovered was larger and of unimproved was smaller than for last year, showing a more satisfactory service.

HARLEM HOSPITAL.

Work on the interior of the new hospital has been slow, owing to weather conditions.

The resolution approving the issue of corporate stock in the sum of \$144,329.48 in payment of the award, interest thereon, and costs and expenses in the matter of acquiring title to the land for the new power house, ambulance stable, etc., passed the Board of Aldermen on February 16. A few days before this the Board of Estimate took action recommending an issue of \$213,000 in corporate stock for these new buildings, including an electric light plant, laundry equipment, etc., and this was approved by the Aldermen on March 1. The Trustees lost no time in advertising for bids for the work of construction, and these bids being presented to them on March 24, the contract was awarded on that day to Luke A. Burke & Sons for \$199,750, this being the lowest bid received. Plans for these new buildings had in the meanwhile been approved by the Bureau of Buildings, and everything is now in readiness for the beginning of work upon them.

The advisability of constructing and operating a local electric light plant having been questioned, the matter came up again in the Board of Trustees, which voted unanimously to recommend its construction and operation.

The Present Hospital.

The present hospital continues crowded, compelling the use of the isolation room, even where the case is of a non-contagious character. The question of erecting a temporary building of a portable kind to care for the excess of patients over the capacity of the hospital has recently been referred to the Acting Superintendent for his consideration and report.

A new rule which is expected to work in the interest of patients directs that they shall be carried directly to the hospital hereafter instead of being taken to the station house first, as has been done in some cases.

Two ambulance drivers were dismissed for intoxication.

The ground floor of the annex building, occupied by the Out-Patient Department, has been repainted throughout.

We regret to report the death of one of the trained nurses (from the City Training School on Blackwell's Island) from cerebro-spinal meningitis, contracted in the performance of her work.

Medical Appointments.

Dr. Thomas H. Manley, Visiting Physician to the hospital and member of the Medical Board, died on January 13, 1905. The Trustees decided not to fill the vacancy occasioned by his death for the reason that the Medical Board is already too large, and it is deemed best for the service to reduce its size so that each physician or surgeon may have at least three months of continuous service, it having been found elsewhere that this is conducive alike to the interest of patient and doctor, inasmuch as the patient has the benefit of the same doctor for a longer period, and the doctor has a better opportunity of studying each individual case.

Dr. Bernard McBride was on March 24 appointed Chief of the Surgical Clinic in the Out-Patient Department.

Census.

The number of admissions during the quarter shows a decrease from last year, being 604 as compared with 652, but the daily census is increasing, and the census for the coming quarter promises to be very high as shown by the number of patients in the hospital on March 31, which was 43 in 1904 and 54 this year. The character of the service shows no marked changes.

FORDHAM HOSPITAL.

Work upon the new Fordham Hospital and its outbuildings has been progressing as satisfactorily as weather conditions have permitted.

There is little new to report concerning the present hospital. The new depot wagon for the transfer of doctors, clergymen and others to and from the station has been purchased and is in constant use in the manner intended.

The new pavilion for the reception of patients has not been used during the winter on account of the difficulties of making lighting and sewer connections, but the matter of supplying it with heat, light, plumbing, etc., is now under way, the Supervising Engineer having been directed to procure estimates. When the pavilion is ready for patients two additional nurses will be required.

Census.

The census of the hospital for the quarter shows a decided improvement in every way. The number of admissions was 268, as compared with 241 in 1904. The census on the first day of the quarter was 43 and 32, respectively, for the two years, and for the last day of the quarter the census was 53 this year, as compared with 31 in 1904. The numbers of recovered and improved were larger also.

Resolved, That the objections filed with the Board of Elections by Justus Ebert, Secretary of the State Executive Committee of the Socialist Labor Party, and one Arthur Miller, to the designation and use of the word "Socialist" as the party name in certain certificates filed with the Board on October 3, 4, 5, 9 and 11, 1905, by the political party known as the Socialist Party, purporting to place in nomination candidates for Mayor, Comptroller and President of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York and certain other offices in the counties of New York and Queens, be and are hereby not sustained.

The President then stated that the Board was ready to hear arguments on the questions raised by the objections filed with the Board on October 6, 1905, by John T. Dooling on October 6, 1905, to the designation and use of the word "Democratic" as a part of the party name in any certificate of nomination filed with the Board of Elections under the party name Social Democratic Party be and are hereby sustained.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
