I am of the opinion that this is a violation of section 50 of the Greater New York Charter, which provides in part as follows:
“The Board of Aldermen shall not have power to authorize the placing or continuing of any encroachment or obstruction on any street or sidewalk, except the temporary occupation thereof during the erection or repairing of a building on a lot opposite same. * * *”

West Nineteenth Street, Between Eighth and Ninth Avenues,
New York City, September 11, 1908.

To the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Won't you do something to free this district from the awful din that has made it recently a perfect inferno. At 7.45 a. m. the procession of junk carts begins, and it lasts all day. Each one has two, and sometimes three, of those horrible cowbells, which have never been removed. One had a dinnerbell tied to the strap by the handle, and this, in addition to three small bells. A big junk wagon with two horses has two large cowbells and one small bell. Every day it passes slowly through Nineteenth street, and is almost unbearable.

At 10 a. m. the hucksters begin, and they bowl and bellow like mad bulls, hour after hour. Those in Eighteenth street seem trying to drown the cries of those in Ninth Avenue and in Nineteenth street, and we, who have to endure this horrible yelling, front and rear, are almost driven insane.

Then comes the scissors grinder, who toots his horn, followed by the man who shrieks "brooms! brooms!" and the crowds of hoodlums that add their yells to the din. This is a quiet block, when left to itself, but this week it has been bedlam. Even last Sunday morning one of the yellers made himself heard.

The police give not the least attention to any complaint, though this horrible din extends from Sixteenth to Twenty-third street. They simply stand on the street corners and talk to their friends for twenty minutes at a time.

Yesterday, when the din was at its height, about 1 p. m., I went out to Eighth Avenue. A Policeman stood on the corner of Eighteenth street (northeast) talking with three men. After a while he went round the corner, gave a cigar to a man sitting at the door of a stable, and then disappeared within. Yet, at that very time, the hucksters were howling on this block, and the junk wagon, with its two cowbells and one small bell, was making life hideous here.

What is the reason that in other sections these public nuisances are arrested, and fined, and in this section are allowed to do as they please?

Yesterday, from 7.45 a. m. to 1.30 p. m., I counted twenty-five junk carts on Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets. They must gather here from all the quarters where they have been expelled.

Do please help us, for we are being driven insane.

That this organization enters a most emphatic objection to the proposition to change the name of the Blackwells Island Bridge in any way that will disassociate its name from the sterling patriot after whom the island and bridge were named, and that we protest as an American democracy against the un-American scheme of perpetuating the names or titles of kings or queens in this republic, as is now proposed to do in the changing of the present name of this bridge.

By a further resolution I was instructed to officially transmit this action to you as President of the Board of Aldermen of our City for submission to said Board, and which duty I now have the honor of doing with due respect.

To the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

We, the undersigned, residents respectively of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Queens, Brooklyn and other Long Island Counties, representing practically all the civic organizations in the Borough of Queens, and many citizens having permanent business and property interests there and otherwise desirous of its prosperity, and representing likewise such organizations and individual citizens in the other Boroughs of the City in like manner interested in the matters here declared, do most respectfully submit to you this memorial and petition for your action thereon.

The cantilever bridge over the East River, connecting the Boroughs of Manhattan and Queens, is nearing completion, and the public interests urgently require that for the inappropriate name of Blackwells Island Bridge, heretofore given to the structure, shall be substituted the appropriate name, distinctly indicated by the existing conditions and the results they will evolve, namely, Queensboro Bridge.

Reasons why this change of name is urgently needed are:

First—The name Blackwells Island Bridge is inappropriate and injurious, because the name of the island has no historical or other significance and no essential relation to the bridge, such as to make the name apt or pertinent; because the suggestion therein contained of means of access by this bridge to the place supplying the name is false, and because the name by its association in the minds of all our people with moral uncleanness, from the use of the island as a prison site, is not only uninviting, but distinctly repulsive.

Second—The name Queensboro Bridge is eminently significant and appropriate. By means of this bridge the centre of industrial activity in the City is connected with the largest Borough, territorially, of the City, and the one destined, in great measure by this connection, to become the great place of homes for all classes of workers in the metropolis; and, if the change we urge be made, by the name alone in the decades to come, the homeseeker, the visitor, the traveller, the excursionist will be advised of the nature of the place to which approach is given, and thereby the bridge will add to its grandeur and beauty the charm of pleasing invitation. Already such method of naming bridges by the locality to which they give access has the authority of usage in this City.

Third—It is most important that all that shall be done in relation to this great improvement be done with due regard to its destiny. The bridge is not merely unique in structural design, huge in size, admirably adapted to all needs and methods of transit, noble triumph of engineer's science and artisan's skill—it is more than all this; it is a moral as well as a physical achievement; it marks an era in the advance of urban civilization, because this City, by its use bringing within the reach of all its toilers homes with sunlight and fresh air and yard-space, will avoid for its people the moral as well as physical curse of stifling congestion of population. Hence it is a high duty as well as continued exercise of the civic wisdom which created this blessing for the City's people, that it shall be fitly named.

Therefore we most earnestly petition your Honorable Body that by appropriate exercise of your function in the premises you cause the name of this bridge to be changed from Blackwells Island Bridge to Queensboro Bridge.

Kennedy, Commissioner, Department of Parks, in communication dated June 19, 1908, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of \$20,000 Corporate Stock for additional carving on the pediment over the main entrance of the Museum of Arts and Sciences, Borough of Brooklyn.

I would report that on January 1, 1908, a contract was made with Daniel C. French for \$115,190 for designing, modeling, carving and emplacing thirty (30) monolithic statues around the building and carving the tympanum over the main entrance.

The carving of the tympanum was originally intended to be done on the several blocks of stones at present in position, and the design originally made was for a centre piece and two figures on each side. It was found that to carve those figures on the stone in position would necessitate the joining of pieces in places where it would be difficult to hold them permanently and would mar the beauty of the work. It was also decided to change the design and substitute a carving to completely fill the space, consisting of eight figures and two end ornaments.

This design necessitates the removal of the present stone and the substitution of new stone so that each figure will be cut from a solid block rendering unnecessary the piecing of the figures.

The change involves a great amount of study by the architects and sculptor, and will be a great improvement in the design of the building.

The amount requested is reasonable, and I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, may properly authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding \$20,000 for additional carving on the pediment over the main entrance of the Museum of Arts and Sciences, Borough of Brooklyn, including architects' fees in connection with same.

Sir—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held March 30, 1906, adopted a resolution authorizing the acquisition of certain property on Sterling place and Flatbush avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, which was intended to be used as a site for a municipal court building. The property has a frontage of 186 feet 3 inches on Sterling place, 146 feet 1 inch on Flatbush avenue, the rear line being 120 feet (irregular) in width, and the whole premises being triangular in shape. You were directed to purchase the same at a price not exceeding \$1,000, subject to all taxes, assessments and water rates, and sales for the same. At the same meeting an additional resolution was adopted authorizing an issue of Corporate Stock in the amount of \$1,000 to provide for the acquisition of the above property, and to pay for the examination of title and surveys of the same.

The interest of the City at the time of the acquisition was very large, it being held under tax sale certificates, and the property being subject to taxes for over twenty years last past.

There was paid out of the fund, in addition to the \$1,000, the sum of \$40 for a survey of the premises, which would leave the balance remaining in the fund of \$60. The cost of examination of title, as shown by the bills of the title company, amounts to \$153.75, leaving a deficiency of \$93.75.

I would respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of an additional authorization of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$93.75, in order that the bill of the Title Guarantee and Trust Company may be paid.

The appropriation for the above account for the year 1908 was the sum of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000), of which bills have been presented and approved amounting, at the present time, to the sum of \$5,293.32, and very heavy expenses have been incurred for which bills have not been received, probably amounting to more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

There were forty-eight indictments waiting trial at the close of the Trial Term of our County Court, July 10, and there are eighty-six new charges awaiting investigation and indictment by the Grand Jury, including seven murder charges.

The trial of Peter C. Hains and Thornton J. Hains will necessitate a very large expenditure in the preliminary investigation and employment of expert witnesses to meet the defense of insanity and of special counsel and temporary stenographers and detectives.

Gentlemen—Your favorable consideration and action upon the enclosed draft of resolution authorizing this Department to make a contract without public letting with James Tregarthen, Son & Co., for repairs to the steamer "Thomas S. Brennan," to the amount of \$1,569. The facts which make necessary this contract for repairs are as follows:

On May 25, 1908, the steamer "Thomas S. Brennan," belonging to the Department, was damaged by collision with the steamship "Maraval." A joint survey was held May 27, when the extent of the damage was determined. As the "Brennan" was at that time the only boat of this Department capable of doing all the work required, it became necessary to hire a steamer at once, at a cost of \$30 per day, to take her place. We therefore immediately invited bids or proposals from several firms, for repairing the damage, and on June 1, the following proposals were opened by the undersigned:

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Department of Street Cleaning:

No. 1075.

Department of Street Cleaning of The City of New York,
Nos. 13 to 21 Park Row, New York,
September 22, 1908.

Hon. PATRICK F. McGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of a communication from the Board of Aldermen, in the form of a resolution under date of July 21, 1908, requesting certain information "showing under what warrant or color of law, if any, City refuse is dumped on Rikers Island, what use, aid or assistance of workhouse or convict labor, if any, the present contractors have in their work of dumping."

In reply I have the honor to state that Rikers Island belonged to The City of New York in 1884, in which year it was purchased by the Commissioner of Public Charities and Corrections of The City of New York.

By the Greater New York Charter, Rikers Island, together with Blackwells Island, was placed under the direction of the Department of Correction. I can find no record when the work of filling at Rikers Island was begun by this Department, but on December 18, 1901, after having been interrupted at some previous time, the filling in was resumed with City ashes, street sweepings and light refuse. This was in pursuance of an arrangement entered into between the Commissioners of Correction and of Street Cleaning. Shortly after this date the work of filling was actively entered upon, and has since been prosecuted without interruption.

Although street sweepings and light refuse are included with the ashes, no garbage or other organic or putrescible material, nor decaying matter of any sort which would cause danger to the public health, is deposited at Rikers Island, and the fill is at all times kept in sanitary condition.

In this connection I would call attention to the fact that the Greater New York Charter specifically requires that the ashes and other refuse collected by the Department of Street Cleaning shall be disposed of by the Commissioner. In pursuance of this requirement about half of the entire quantity of material collected in the form of ashes and rubbish is sent to Rikers Island, where it is used for filling in along the water front and extending the island.

Under the above circumstances it is clear that no other warrant than those stated would appear to be necessary.

In reply to the question regarding convict labor, I have the honor to state that neither the Commissioner of Street Cleaning nor the parties who unload the material at Rikers Island employ either workhouse or convict labor.

In conclusion I respectfully call attention to the fact that as a result of the filling at Rikers Island the City is annually adding a considerable and valuable acreage to its possessions. The new Penitentiary, which it is proposed to erect on the island, will need additional area in connection therewith, which it is possible to provide in this manner with an additional expense to the City. After the filling with ashes and rubbish is completed the surface is to be covered over with earth and planted. It is apparent, therefore, that the discontinuance of the use of Rikers Island as a receiving point for ashes and rubbish would be against the City's interests.

Recognizing the value and importance of the continuance of this work, it was made a feature of a new form of contract, prepared by me as Commissioner, and approved as to terms and conditions by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 19, 1908, who subsequently approved the award of said contract to run for a period of five years.

Sir—In connection with a resolution adopted by the Board of Health on June 3 requesting your Honorable Board to authorize the equipment of the Measles Pavilion at the Kingston Avenue Hospital, pursuant to the provisions of section 419 of chapter 366 of the Laws of 1901, to an amount not to exceed \$15,000, I beg to submit the following facts:

This Department has just completed the erection of a Measles Pavilion at the Kingston Avenue Hospital which will accommodate two hundred and fifty patients. As this building is urgently needed to relieve the overcrowded condition of the above hospital, the Department is desirous of equipping this building at the earliest possible moment, which can probably be done in a week or ten days if your Board will grant the authorization requested; otherwise if obliged to equip same under advertised contracts, it will no doubt delay the opening of this building for three or probably four months.

Mr. M. J. Rickard, the Acting Superintendent, reported as follows:

From August 9 to August 22, inclusive, 71 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 15 at Gouverneur Hospital, 23 at Harlem Hospital and 18 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their Assistants were present.

Fire drills were held in accordance with the regulations of the Board of Trustees on August 17 and 24 at Bellevue Hospital, on August 18 and 24 at Gouverneur Hospital, on August 13 and 21 at Harlem Hospital and on August 15 and 21 at Fordham Hospital.

In order to avoid further complaints in the matter of transfers, it is recommended that the old system of sending a copy of the medical history with every patient transferred be revived, and that a Helper, at a salary of \$30 a month, be appointed to attend to these histories. A woman Clerk who has been substituting here for a number of weeks is recommended for this position and authority is requested for the appointment.

Dr. Alvin M. Pappenheimer, who was granted a leave of absence by your Board for the year 1908, in order that he might study abroad, has returned and authority is requested to reinstate him as Pathologist, from the 17th of August.

Dr. James A. Miller, the Director of Tuberculosis Clinics at this institution, recommends that the Nurse who is now serving half time on half salary, namely \$37.50 a month, be employed the full time on full salary, \$75 a month. The work of the clinics has grown very rapidly and there seems to be need of the services of this Nurse, who makes from 400 to 500 visits each month and instructs the patients.

Information has been received from Chief Higgins, of the Fire Department, that cotton or linen hose would not receive the approval of that Department. The linen hose is not desirable because it cannot be tested. The rubber-lined hose in use here since 1902 has given entire satisfaction and has worn well, and it is therefore recommended that hose of this kind be purchased for the institution in order to afford the best possible protection in case of fire.

In the plans for Pavilions A and B a gate valve was omitted on the proposed temporary connection between the fire standpipe system in those pavilions and the existing fire main outside of the building. The Supervising Engineer recommends that such a valve be placed in the branch between the check valve and the supply, so that it will not be necessary to shut off the water from the training school building should anything happen to the fire line service in the pavilions.

Attention is called to the fact that at the end of the year there will be a deficit of about \$72,300. On the various accounts this deficit will be as follows:

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for the City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bid required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either included in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to include the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
