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Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, March 4, 1913.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair, and Messrs. Farley, O'Keeffe, Paulding, Robbins and Stern, Trustees. Excused—Messrs. Drummond and Sachs.

Bids were received for the supply of gauze. Action upon the bids was deferred. The minutes of the meeting of February 18 were approved.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

The daily average census at the various hospitals during the month of February was as follows: Bellevue, 1,178; Gouverneur, 175; Hudson, 206; Fordham, 125.

The Women's Auxiliary requests the privilege of appointing, at their own expense, a Social Service Nurse for Harlem Hospital, who will attend the children's clinic and follow up the cases in their homes.

Approval is asked for the adoption of some suitable badge as a means of identification for certain of the hospital employees whose duties take them to court and various parts of the City where some means of identification is necessary.

At the dispensaries of Harlem and Fordham Hospitals, since an Investigator

has been employed, cases from other hospital districts have been referred to the hospitals in those districts for treatment. Inasmuch as the City has not been divided into dispensary districts, and there is no uniformity regarding this matter, some definite rule is requested for guidance at Bellevue and Gouverneur.

In reference to the pension bill for employees, and the proposed eight-hour bill for Nurses, the majority of the employees express themselves as being anxious to take advantage of the pension bill as proposed, while the Nurses are not in favor of the eight-hour rule if it involves continuous service.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

To approve of the request of the Women's Auxiliary for permission to add one Nurse to the social service department of Harlem upon the conditions noted.

The General Medical Superintendent was authorized to select an appropriate badge and to designate those employees who are to have the privilege of wearing it.

It was resolved to adopt the same rule at the Gouverneur dispensary as at Harlem and Fordham, that cases coming from outside the hospital district be referred to

the hospital nearest to which they live, the Bellevue dispensary to be excepted for the present from this rule.

To inform the Assistant Corporation Counsel at Albany of the favorable opinion of the majority of the employees at Bellevue Hospital on the proposed pension bill, and upon the recommendation of the President to suggest an amendment to this bill, so as to include in the fund available for pensions the interest on salaries and wages whose payment has been delayed by the City, as this money properly belongs to the employees who have earned it, and there seems no reason why the accumulated interest should remain in the hands of the City.

Reports of Committees.

The Gouverneur Hospital Conference Committee reported on the matters referred to them at last meeting and recommended that Dr. Parounagian be given discretion to administer salvarsan in the dispensary, where in his judgment it could be done with advantageous results to the patients, and that cases requiring hospital treatment should be referred to the hospital for admission, after which Dr. Parounagian should ask the Visiting Surgeon for permission to see the patients and their records, and, if necessary, to take part in their treatment. Second, the Committee recommended that Dr. A. A. Greenberg

be appointed Assistant Physician to Out-Patients (nose and throat). Third, in regard to the report of the Special Committee of the Medical Board appointed to consider a communication from the State Charities Aid Association, containing suggestions and recommendations regarding the children's service at Gouverneur Hospital, the Conference Committee recommended that a separate room be provided for tonsil and adenoid cases, and that a room adjacent to the maternity ward be used as a nursery for new born infants, as soon as the Nurses now living in the hospital can be transferred to the Nurses' residence. The Committee further recommended that the remaining suggestions of the State Charities Aid Association should be considered in connection with the preparation of plans for the new dispensary building. This report was approved and the recommendations were adopted.

The President referred to the provision for the cure of tonsil and adenoid cases at the different hospitals of the department, and in view of the lack of uniformity in their methods of treatment, recommended that the same method be adopted in all hospitals.

It was resolved that a uniform method of treating tonsil and adenoid cases be adopted at all the hospitals of the department, and the General Medical Superin-

tendent was directed to carry this into effect.

Communications.

The President submitted a communication from the Charity Organization Society in regard to a request from the Associated Charities of Waterbury, Conn., for a reduced rate for the care and treatment of a patient whom they are planning to send to Fordham Hospital.

Resolved, To inform the Charity Organization Society that the Trustees cannot reduce the charge of \$1.50 per day, as under the Charter non-residents of the City can only be received, provided they pay the rate fixed by the Trustees and their presence in the hospital is not to the exclusion of residents of the City.

A communication was presented from the State Board of Charities enclosing copy of a report of an inspection of the Bellevue dispensary, which had been placed in class 1 as to plant and management. The summary of needs and defects was considered, and it was reported that an Investigator had been appointed, and that the public notice had been hung in a more conspicuous place. The report was referred to the General Medical Superintendent, in order that the other needs and defects could be remedied as far as possible.

A communication was presented from the State Board of Charities enclosing copy of a report of a recent inspection of the Gouverneur dispensary, which had been placed in class 3 as to plant and class 2 as to management. The summary of needs and defects was considered, and it was reported that it was impossible to carry out all of the recommendations in the present building, owing to the limited space available and the large number of patients who attend the dispensary. The General Medical Superintendent was instructed to correct the defects as far as it is possible.

The minutes of the meeting of the Fordham Hospital Medical Board held on February 14 were presented. The nomination of Dr. Telfair as Visiting Obstetrician was referred to the Conference Committee.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital held on February 25 were presented. The resignations of Dr. L. B. Groeschel and Dr. A. J. Goldman as Assistant Surgeons to Out-Patients were accepted; the request that a baby scale be provided for the children's clinic was referred to the General Medical Superintendent. The recommendation that a salaried clinical microscopist be appointed for the dispensary was disapproved. The awarding of diplomas to Drs. Hobbs and Pratt was approved, as well as the advancement of those members of the house staff who have served full time.

A communication dated February 18 was presented from the Secretary of the Board of Managers of the Training School, referring to the crowded condition of the Bellevue Nurses' residence and asking whether any appropriation had been requested from the City for the enlargement of this building. The Secretary reported that a copy of this letter had been sent to each member of the Corporate Stock Budget Committee. This action was approved and the communication ordered placed on file.

A communication was presented from the Committee on Standardization of Salaries and Grades of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting the assignment of three employees to meet with this Committee from time to time. The President reported that the General Medical Superintendent, the Assistant Medical Superintendent and the Supervising Nurse of Gouverneur Hospital had been appointed to confer with this Committee in the inauguration of the standardization work in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. This action was approved.

A communication dated March 1 was presented from J. M. Knopp, requesting an additional extension of time on his contract for the erection of balconies on pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital. This was referred to the Building Committee.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital held on March 1 were presented. The resignation of Dr. Louis Nagorsky as Assistant Physician to Out-Patients was accepted, and Internes were appointed as follows: Dr. Daniel F. Patchin, July 1, 1913, two years; Dr. Carl S. Moore, July 1, 1913, two years; Dr. Hubbard T. Buckner, January 1, 1914, two years; Dr. Clarence S. Gardner, July 1, 1913, one year; Dr. Lawrence D. Roche, July 1, 1913, one year.

The General Medical Superintendent presented the contracts for telephone service at Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for the year 1913, which had been signed by the President. This action was approved.

A communication was presented from the Department of Finance, requesting information in regard to claim filed in that department by Catherine Keeley for injuries alleged to have been sustained while in the employ of Bellevue Hospital. A report in regard thereto was presented from

the General Medical Superintendent and it was resolved to transmit a copy of this report to the Finance Department, and to place the communication on file.

A communication was presented from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting copies of two resolutions, (1) amending rules adopted on November 27, 1912, whereby personal property may be exchanged or sold, and (2) requesting list of personal property not required and available for transfer to other departments. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

A communication was presented from the Contract Clerk and Auditor, requesting transfers within the appropriations of this department for the years 1911 and 1912, and also the transfer of \$871.77 from unencumbered balances in the appropriations of other City departments.

It was resolved to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer the sum of \$4.20 within the appropriations of this department for the year 1911, and \$3,505.38 within the appropriations for the year 1912; and it was further resolved to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer \$871.77 to the appropriations of this department for the year 1912 from the appropriations of the following departments: Department of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn, \$400.17; Board of Inebriety, \$447, and Borough President of Richmond, \$24.60.

A communication was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copies of three resolutions adopted on February 13, (1) authorizing the issue of \$42,869.46 special revenue bonds to meet deficiencies in 1912 accounts, (2) modifying schedule 202 for the year 1912, and (3) modifying schedules 221, 222, 223, 225 and 233 for the year 1912. This communication was placed on file.

A copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on February 11, authorizing the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$6,250 for the purpose of providing additional facilities and help for the psychopathic department at Bellevue Hospital, was presented and ordered placed on file.

A communication was presented from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting copies of two resolutions authorizing the renewal of the leases of the premises at 115 and 117 W. 136th st. This communication was ordered placed on file.

A communication was presented from the Department of Finance, transmitting executed copy of renewal of lease for the premises at 113 W. 136th st. for one year from April 1, 1913. This communication was ordered placed on file.

A communication was presented from Dr. Alexander J. Alexion, tendering his resignation as Assistant Genito-Urinary Surgeon to Out-Patients on the 4th Division of Bellevue Hospital. This resignation was accepted.

A communication was presented from Dr. Herbert L. Wheeler, recommending the appointment of Dr. Joseph Wesserman as Assistant Visiting Dentist to Gouverneur Hospital. This recommendation was approved and Dr. Wesserman appointed accordingly.

Reports were presented from General Inspector of Construction and referred to the Building Committee for their information.

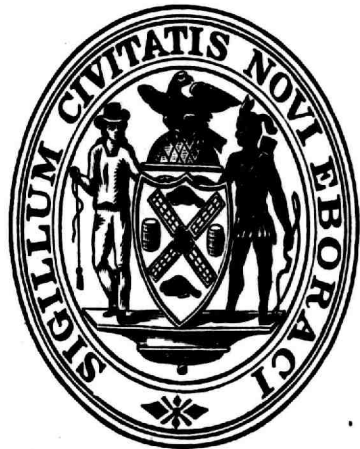
