

SIR—There were 6,063 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the three months ending Saturday, June 30, 1877, which is an increase of 77, as compared with the number reported the preceding three months, and 640 less than were reported during the corresponding three months of the year 1876. The actual mortality for the three months ending June 30, 1877, was 6,047, which is 1,100.8 below the average for the corresponding three months of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.45 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,077,228.

The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents. the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer.
