Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending September 29, 1877:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,797, as follows, viz.: 8 public buildings, 724 tenement-houses, 210 private dwellings, 111 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 15 stores and warehouses, 57 stables, 18 slaughter-houses, 21 sunken and vacant lots; 76 yards, courts, and areas, 83 cellars and basements, 126 waste-pipes and drains, 135 privies and water-closets, 61 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 1 market, 1 stock-yard, 1 garbage dump, 3 manure dumps, 2 bladder dyeing establishments, 3 tripe establishments, 1 head picking establishment, 1 fat rendering establishment, 1 roadway, 2 public sewers, 1 swamp land, 1 dyeing establishment, 5 dangerous stairways, 9 smoky chimneys, 3 cesspools, 1 piggery, 56 other nuisances, 26 violations of the code; together with 63 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 794.

During the past week 97 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 84 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

Health Officer of the Port.

81 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 45 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 40 houses, 40 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of yellow fever was removed to the Quarantine Hospital by the Ambulance Corps, and one case of diphtheria to Reception Hospital.

During the week ending Saturday, September 29, 1877, there were issued from this Bureau 522 burial permits for city deaths, 14 for bodies in transitu, and 50 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 522 deaths, 121 marriages, 521 births, 50 still-births, 14 applications for transit permits, and 39 returns from coroners. There were 17 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 3 transcripts of marriage record, and 14 of death were issued from this Bureau.

SIR—522 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 29, which is an increase of 15 as compared with the number reported during the preceding week, and 63 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending September 22, was 497, which is 40.8 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death rate of 23.91 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,080,856.

Compared with the mortality of last week, the principal increase has been in the following diseases, viz.: Measles, 3; scarlatina, 3; diphtheria, 8; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 6; puerperal diseases, 4; cancer, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 1; 7 from bronchitis; diseases of the heart, 7; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 8; diarrhoæal diseases, 4; and Bright's disease and nephritis, 5; and a decrease in membranous croup of 7; whooping cough, 2; marasmus and scrofula, 2; diseases

diseases, 4; cancer, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 1; 7 from bronchitis; diseases of the heart, 7; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 8; diarrhoeal diseases, 4; and Bright's disease and nephritis, 5; and a decrease in membranous croup of 7; whooping cough, 2; marasmus and scrofula, 2; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 11.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 76 were in institutions, 278 in tenement houses, 163 in houses containing 3 families or less, 1 in a hotel or boarding-house, 3 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 110 on the first, 144 on the second, 111 on the third, 48 on the tourth, 13 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 518 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 4 non-residents; 65 were stated to be single, 110 married, 51 widowed, and the condition of 296 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 525 deaths and still-births, or 91.77 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish) 10, Calvary (Roman Catholic) 226, City (pauper burial ground undenominational) 53, Greenwood (undenominational) 36, Lutheran (undenominational) 89, Cypress Hills (undenominational) 24, Evergreen (undenominational) 36, Woodlawn (undenominational) 19, St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal) 7, Union (Methodist Protestant) 7, Holy Cross (Roman Catholic) 5, Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish) 5, St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic) 4 Washington (undenominational) 4.

SIR—There were reported to this Bureau during the quarter ending September 30, 1877, 8,182 deaths, 6,525 births, 1,610 marriages and 552 still-births, showing a decrease of 840 deaths, and an increase of 422 births, 38 marriages, and 22-still-births, compared with the number reported for the corresponding 3 months of 1876. The mortality for the quarter shows that I death was from small-pox, 49 from measles, 177 from scarlatina, 185 from diphtheria, 76 from membranous croup, 185 from whooping-cough, 23 from cerebro-spinal fever and 99 from malarial fevers. 34 of the deaths from measles, 121 from diphtheria, 50 from membranous croup, 114 from whooping cough, 17 from cerebro-spinal fever and 43 from malarial fevers were in tenement-houses. The average age of those who died from measles is I year, 9 months and 15 days; scarlatina, 3 years, 11 months, 7 days; diphtheria, 3 years, 6 months; membranous croup, 2 years, 5 months, 23 days; whooping cough, I year, 5 months, 20 days; cerebro-spinal fever, 10 years, 0 month, 3 days; malarial fever, 24 years, 9 months, 10 days, and small-pox 49 years. diphtheria, 3 years, 0.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, NEW YORK, October 2, 1877.

To the Board of Health :

Gentlemen—We have the honor to report that, pursuant to a resolution of your Board, adopted at a meeting held in the early part of August last, directing the Attorney and Sanitary Superintendent to prepare evidence with which to procure indictments against the persons responsible for the nuisances at Hunter's Point, Dr. E. Waller and Inspector Thomas J. Nealis were assigned to the difficult work of tracing the offensive odors which from time to time prevail in the eastern section of this city to the establishment at Hunter's Point from which these odors actually emanate. These officers accordingly repeatedly inspected the various establishments at Hunter's Point and Blissville, making careful surveys, observations and maps to verify their impressions, so that they could positively testify before the Grand Jury and in the courts to facts sustaining their complaints. They procured boats and made repeated experiments and observations along the river front. They also visited the institutions and buildings on Blackwell's Island, where the odors were plainly perceived. In this manner they were enabled to appear before the Grand Jury and testify, not from impressions or belief, but from accurate observation. Upon their testimony an indictment was procured in this county on the 26th ulto. against the proprietor of Coe's Fertilizer Works, under the provisions of chapter 415 of the Laws of 1851. With the active co-operation of the District Attorney it is believed that the indicted parties can speedily be brought to trial, and with their conviction there will no doubt be a permanent cessation of all cause for complaint from Hunter's Point. This method of proceeding through the Criminal Courts, by the aid of the District Attorney, has been taken as the only resource of this department. The ordinary mode of proceedure against nuisances under the Health Laws are non-applicable when the source of nuisance is outside of the city, and the efforts of the Department for two years in aid of the citizens, both in advising the neces is to be hoped that the labors of the Department in this direction will now have a practical result, and a success in remedying at least one nuisance and in furthering the abatement of others in the same

A Report on the Removal of Mr. Ohl, who was sick with yellow fever.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, NEW YORK, October 2, 1877.

New York, October 2, 1877.

It was reported to the Department on Sunday afternoon, September 23, by a physician of the Roosevelt Hospital, that there was a patient at that hospital, sick of yellow fever. It therefore became the duty of the Officers of this Department to co-operate with the Health Officer of the Port to carry out the State Laws applicable to prevent the spread of disease, especially the duty enjoint upon them under sections 15 and 16, chapter 74, Laws of 1866, the Quarantine Laws, chapter 757 of the Laws of 1873, section 12, chapter 636 of 1874, section 3 and section 5, 145 and 147 of the Sanitary Code. The Health Officer of the Port is required by law to receive into the Quarantine Hospital all cases of yellow fever originating at Quarantine or elsewhere, and it seemed to be the plain duty of the Health Officer of the city to direct the removal of any yellow fever patient to the hospital designated by the law for the reception of said sick. As to the removal of Mr. Ohl it was accomplished in such a manner that the Chairman of the Committee does not believe he suffered any harm. The Health Officer sent his steam yacht to the foot of Fifty-nint street and the North river. Mr. Ohl was carried in an ambulance from the hospital to the boat, a distance of two blocks. Dr. Janes, the Assistant Sanitary Superintendent accompanied him to the Quarantine Hospital on the boat. His mental condition was apathetic to that extent that he suffered no shock to the nervous system from this removal. system from this removal.

If there was no reason for his removal there is none for the retention of people sick with yellow fever at Quarantine Hospital, for they could be put in clean clothes and allowed to come home. And, on the other hand, if there was no reason for his removal there was equally none for disinfection. And, on the other hand, if there was no reason for his removal there was equally none for disinfection. Statements have been made that the weather was too cold for yellow fever to develop. Such persons have not studied the occurrence at Swansea, in Wales, in 1865, nor that mentioned in the reports of the health of the British navy as occurring in the harbor of Halifax, nor the continuance of the disease on previous occasions in this city and vicinity in the months of September and October, and even into November. Upon the question of contagiousness in yellow fever, there has been a great deal of difference of opinion. We would cite the article in Reynold's System of Medicine, written by Dr. MacDonald, a gentleman who had considerable experience with this disease (1876), also the article on yellow fever by Dr. Cochrane, of Mobile, presented to and published by the Alabama State Medical Society (1877). Dr. Cochrane is amongst the ablest physicians of the State and of Mobile, a city in which this disease prevails at times (the last in 1873). Aitken, also, seems to take the same view. The action of the French government after the epidemic at St. Nazire seems also to point to the same conclusion having been arrived at, and that is that there is a possibility of the spread of the disease by contagion. The Reports of the Health of the British Navy, made up from statements by different physicians and others, will present both sides of the case. There are a number of medical writers who take the opposite ground, and I think that there is no danger from contagion, providing that the clothing, etc., is removed. This diversity of opinion must have led the Legislature and the previous Boards of Health to adopt the laws cited.

NEW COURT-HOUSE COMMISSION.

Abstract of the proceedings of the Commissioners for the Completion of the New County Court-house.

August 8, 1877.

The Architect having certified that J. & W. C. Spears, the contractors for the mason work had completed the brick work of the rotunda, and therefore were entitled to the twelfth installment, amounting to three thousand dollars; that amount was certified to the Finance Department for payment to the Messrs. Spears.

Messrs. Sinclair & Milne having completed the stone work of the rotunda, as set forth in the certificate of the Architect, the sum of fifteen thousand dollars became due to them in accordance with the fourteenth installment specified in their contract; that amount was certified to the Finance Department for payment.
