

Report for the Quarter ending June 30, 1884.

Hon. FRANKLIN EDSON, Mayor, City of New York:

SIR—Pursuant to section 40, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York hereby respectfully submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending June 30,

On the 30th day of June, 1884, the number of members of the force of all grades, including Surgeons, was 2,888.

Note.—The discrepancy existing between the number arrested for particular offenses on felony report and on general report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the general report is made up from daily returns, and the felony report from quarterly returns. An offense charged in the station-house, at the time the arrest is made, is liable to be and frequently is changed to a greater or less offense, on evidence elicited before the magistrate.
