

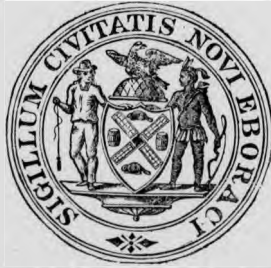

Report for the Quarter ending June 30, 1884.

Hon. FRANKLIN EDSON, Mayor, City of New York:

SIR—Pursuant to section 40, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York hereby respectfully submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending June 30, 1884.

#### REPORT.

On the 30th day of June, 1884, the number of members of the force of all grades, including Surgeons, was 2,888.

#### SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disability, and injuries, for the quarter ending June 30, 1884, and the details thereof, are shown in the annexed table, marked "A," from which it will be seen that the time lost was 6,318 days.

Schedule "B" exhibits a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

NOTE.—The discrepancy existing between the number arrested for particular offenses on felony report and on general report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the general report is made up from daily returns, and the felony report from quarterly returns. An offense charged in the station-house, at the time the arrest is made, is liable to be and frequently is changed to a greater or less offense, on evidence elicited before the magistrate.

In the sale of, or keeping for sale, any beverage or drink, no person shall keep or use any tap, faucet, tank, fountain or any other pipe or conduit in connection therewith, which shall be composed of or made with brass, lead, copper or other metal or metallic substances that are or will be affected by liquids so that dangerous, unwholesome or deleterious compounds are formed thereon or thereby, or such that beer, soda-water, syrups, or other liquids, or any beverage, drink or flavoring material, drawn therefrom shall be unwholesome, dangerous or detrimental to health.
