

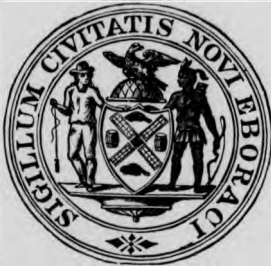

APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending Jan. 16, 1886.

AN ORDINANCE for licensing drivers of railroad cars driven on the surface of the streets in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. No person shall drive any railroad car while carrying passengers, in any of the streets of this City, unless he be twenty-one years of age, a resident of this State for one year, and of the City for four months, and have obtained license from the Mayor for such purpose, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner or owners of such railroad car, and from such driver, both or either.

Sec. 2. The Mayor is hereby authorized to grant licenses from time to time, to drivers of such cars, as often as may be necessary, and to suspend and revoke the same whenever he may deem it expedient; and every driver of such car shall, on receiving his license, pay therefor, to the Mayor, for the use of the City, the sum of one dollar, which will entitle every such driver to drive one such car for one year from the date of such license, and every renewal thereof shall be fifty cents, payable in like manner, and for a like purpose, to the Mayor.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect on the first day of January, A. D. 1886.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, December 29, 1885.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, January 12, 1886, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That Friday, the 29th day of January, 1886, at 12 o'clock M., and the chamber of the Board of Aldermen, be and are hereby designated as the time and place when and where the application of the Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth Streets Railroad Company to the Common Council of the City of New York, for its consent and permission for the construction, maintenance and operation of the City of New York surface railroad described in the petition of said company for such consent will be first considered; and that public notice be given by the Clerk of this Board, by publishing the same for fourteen days, exclusive of Sundays, in two newspapers published in this city, to be designated therefor by his Honor the Mayor, according to the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884; such advertising to be at the expense of the petitioner.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, January 11, 1886.

Approved by the Mayor, January 12, 1886, and the "New York Sun" and the "New York Star" were designated as the newspapers referred to in the resolution.

Resolved, That Tuesday, the second day of February, A. D. 1886, at eleven o'clock A. M., and the Chamber of the Board of Aldermen, be and are hereby designated as the time and place when and where the application of "The St. Nicholas Avenue and Cross-town Railroad Company" to the Common Council of the City of New York for its consent and permission for the construction, maintenance and operation of the street surface railroad proposed to be constructed by the said Company as mentioned in their petition for such consent, will be first considered, and that public notice be given by the Clerk of this Board, by publishing the same for fourteen days, exclusive of Sundays, in two newspapers published in this city, to be designated therefor by his Honor the Mayor according to the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, such advertising to be at the expense of the petitioners.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, January 11, 1886.

Approved by the Mayor, January 14, 1886, and the "New York Times" and "Evening Post" were designated as the newspapers referred to in the resolution.

Resolved, That Monday, the eighth day of February, 1886, at two o'clock P. M., and the Chamber of the Board of Aldermen, be and are hereby designated as the time and place when and where the application of the Citizens' Railway Company to the Common Council of the City of New York, for its consent for the construction, maintenance and operation of the street surface railroad proposed to be constructed and maintained by said company, as mentioned in their petition for such consent, will first be considered, and that public notice of such application, and of the time and place when such application will first be considered, be given by the Clerk of this Board, by publishing the same for fourteen days, exclusive of Sundays, in two daily newspapers of this City, to be designated therefor by his Honor the Mayor, according to the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, such advertising to be at the expense of the petitioner.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, January 11, 1886.

Approved by the Mayor, January 14, 1886, and the "New York Star" and "Daily News" were designated as the newspapers referred to in the resolution.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held January 13, 1886.

Present.—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held January 7, 1886, were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read and,

On motion, laid on the table to await action as stated, to wit:

From Green & Wright—Requesting permission to drive piles and make repairs at steamboat dock, One Hundred and Thirty-first street, Harlem river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From O'Brien Bros. & Norman—Requesting permission to erect a dumping-board for the purpose of receiving dock and building stone at the foot of Seventy-fifth street, East river. Referred to the Dock Superintendent to examine and report.

From New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company—Requesting permission to erect a platform between Piers 51 and 51½, East river. Referred to the President. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report, was approved.

From Manhattan Railway Company—Requesting permission to build foundation piers on the east and west sides of Second avenue, at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, extending as far as the present bulkhead lines. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Brown & Fleming—Requesting permission to locate a floating dump at the foot of Bogart street, North river, at a fixed rental of \$3 per day. Referred to Dock Master John M. Smith to examine and report.

From N. Park Collins—Requesting permission to build a retaining structure of close piles between One Hundred and Second and One Hundred and Third streets, Harlem river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From J. V. Jordan—Requesting permission to berth steamer "James T. Brett" on south side of Pier, old 42, North river. Referred to Dock Master John M. Smith to examine and report.

From East River Ferry Company—Requesting an extension of time to repair Pier at Eighth street, East river. Referred to the President.

From L. Hirsch—Offering oak plank to the Department. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief.

From Clayton Greenlee—Requesting the use of north half of Pier 34, North river, foot of Harrison street. The President directed to notify him to give definite information as to the nature of the business for which he desires to use the said premises.

From Peck, Martin & Co.—Requesting permission to retain tally-house on bulkhead between Ninety-fifth and Ninety-sixth streets, North river, and requesting the Board to cancel order to remove and rescind penalty imposed upon them, as they were not aware that they were violating any rule in placing the said tally-house thereat. Referred to the Dock Superintendent to examine and report.

From Engineer-in-Chief—Report on Secretary's Order No. 5035, in reference to the application of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company for permission to erect platform on the bulkhead between Piers 51 and 51½, East river. Referred to the President.

From W. C. Andrews, New York Steam Heating Company—Requesting permission to erect bulkhead on the Harlem river, between One Hundred and Fifteenth and One Hundred and Sixteenth streets, as per plans submitted. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The following communications were received, read and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Police Department—Reporting that part of stringpiece has fallen overboard at Pier 37, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair the same, approved.

From Department of Public Charities and Correction—Reporting that the bulkhead in front of Bellevue Hospital, Twenty-sixth street, East river, is in a dangerous condition. The President directed to advise that the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department has been directed to repair the said bulkhead, and will commence the work as soon as practicable.

From Thomas Costigan, Supervisor CITY RECORD—Requesting a list of subordinates in the employ of the Department. The action of the President in directing the Secretary to prepare the said list, was approved.

From Cornelius Morrison—Accepting the terms and conditions of resolutions adopted December 24, 1885, and January 7, 1886, authorizing him to retain machinery and erect structure over the same on bulkhead adjoining the dumping-board at East Seventeenth street, East river.

From Dutton & Townsend—Reporting that the East River Ferry Company are the owners of Pier at Eighth street, East river.

From John Monks—In relation to the penalty imposed upon Mr. Nelson Abbott, for not repairing bulkhead between Piers 52 and 53, East river, and requesting the Board to remit the said penalty, as it was impossible to make repairs thereat owing to a large quantity of brick obstructing the said bulkhead, and agreeing to repair the said premises as soon as the obstructions are removed. The President directed to notify Mr. Abbott that in consideration of the explanation offered by Mr. Monks, and also from the fact that the said bulkhead was obstructed at the time mentioned, the Board have remitted the said penalty, and as the said bulkhead is now free and clear, the Board expect him to at once commence the repairs thereat.

From Henry Du Bois' Sons—Requesting the privilege of keeping Pier, old 35, North river, in good working order for three years, without a permit from Department when such work is needed. Application denied.

From Thos. J. Donohue, Clerk General Repairs Force—Requesting three months' leave of absence, without pay. Application granted.

From George J. Eltz—Requesting permission to erect a temporary rigging on docks on North river, from Thirty-first to Fifty-ninth street, inclusive. Application denied, and the President directed to advise Mr. Eltz that he must state the exact location of the pier on which he desires to erect the same, before action can be taken on his application.

From Comptroller of the City—Inclosing triplicate copy of the lease from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of New York to the New York Ferry Company of the East Twenty-third Street Ferry, to and from Broadway, in the City of Brooklyn.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty other than to which they were appointed.

2d. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending January 9, 1886.

3d. Reporting the completion of dredging in half slip south of Pier, new 46, North river, under contract No. 229. The action of the President in notifying the Comptroller that the said work had been done by Henry Du Bois' Sons, under the terms of said contract, was approved.

4th. Reporting the amount of material excavated by the Union Dredging Company with Department dredges during the month of December, 1885. The Treasurer directed to make out bill, and collect the amount from the Union Dredging Company.

5th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4994, in reference to and stating that the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company desire to withdraw application for permission to erect platform on bulkhead between Piers 51 and 51½, East river, on which this order was issued. Application withdrawn.

6th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4991, that the inclined approach on Pier 37, East river, the portion referred to by the Department of Street Cleaning, is in a safe and sound condition, and does not require any repairs at present. The President directed to advise the Department of Street Cleaning that upon examination the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department reports that no repairs are required to Pier 37, East river.

7th. Reporting the amount of labor and material expended by Department in hoisting spud for Union Dredging Company. Treasurer to make out bill and collect the said amount.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5022, that he had repaired sheathing on deck of Pier 46, East river.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4959, that he had made requisition for dredging at dumping-board at East Forty-sixth street, East river, and had supervised the work thereat, which was done by the Union Dredging Company.

10th. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 4966 and 4929, that he had superintended and directed the driving of piles and the repairing of the bulkhead between Piers 50 and 51, East river.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5029, that he had superintended the repairing of the pavement at bulkhead, Pier 50, East river.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4907, that the repairing of the westerly half of Pier 62, East river, had been done under his supervision and direction.

13th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5020, that the pavement at entrance to bulkhead, Pier 22, East river, has settled slightly, but not sufficient to require repairing.

14th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5030, that he superintended the repairing of the pavement on bulkhead between Piers 51 and 52, East river.

15th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5018, that he had repaired bulkhead platform between Piers 18 and 19, East river.

16th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5019, that he had repaired Pier 19, East river.

17th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4999, that he had repaired bulkhead platform between Sixtieth and Sixty-first streets, East river.

From Edward Abeel, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting that about fifty feet of the stringpiece on the lower side of Pier 37, East river, is broken from its fastenings. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to do the work required thereat was approved.

Reporting that there is a hole in the dock of Pier 41, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair at once was approved.

From Chas. P. Blake, Dock Master—Reporting that the sheathing on Piers foot of Twenty-eighth and Thirty-seventh streets, East river, is in need of repairing. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Patrick J. Brady, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting that there is a dangerous hole in the Pier foot of Eighteenth street, North river, and reporting that the spikes in fender-piles on south side of pier at Sixteenth street, North river, project and are dangerous to boats berthed thereat. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to do the work required at the said premises was approved.

From Abram Durvee, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting that the scow "Jerry," loaded with stone, and consigned to Brown & Fleming, sunk on January 7, 1886, at Pier foot of Seventy-ninth street, North river.

2d. Reporting that on December 24, 1885, he had served a notice on William Brooks to remove sand obstructing the Pier at Ninety-sixth street, North river, on or before December 28. Said sand not removed January 8, 1886. The action of the President in settling the said claim approved.

From Joseph B. Erwin, Dock Master—Reporting that there are two holes in Pier foot of Fortieth street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair at once was approved.

From John M. Smith, Dock Master—Recommending that a new sliding door be made for the north side of Pier, new, 46, North river, as the old one has been lost. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to replace said door was approved.

From Eugene McCarthy, Dock Master—Reporting that on January 8, 1886, a canal-boat, loaded with coal, from F. A. Potts & Co., sunk on the north side of Pier 62, East river. The President directed to notify the owner or owners to commence to remove the said canal-boat, or the penalty for violation of the rules will be imposed.

From John Callan, Dock Master—Reporting that he had stopped dumping at One Hundred and Thirteenth street, Harlem river.

From George W. Wannaker, Dock Master—Reporting that on Sunday, January 10th, inst., the Department of Street Cleaning dumped snow in the street and on the bulkhead at Piers new and old 1, North river, causing a snow blockade thereat.

On motion of President Koch, the action of the Board on December 17, 1885, in designating the bulkhead north of Pier, new 1, North river, from which to dump clean snow and ice, was reconsidered, the said bulkhead stricken from the list, and the President directed to notify the Department of Street Cleaning, the Police Department, and Dock Master George W. Wannaker, of the action of the Board.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Matthews, submitted his report for the week ending January 12, 1886, which was received, read, and ordered to be placed on file, and the Secretary directed to enter the same in full on the minutes, as follows:

NEW YORK, January 13, 1886.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Matthews, reported that he had approved of the renewal of contract with the Metropolitan Telephone and Telegraph Company for the use of their services at the different offices of this Department, with the understanding that the said contract can be terminated or changed at any time when deemed advisable by this Department. His action was approved.

The President stated that he had forwarded to the Counsel to the Corporation the orders from the New York Supreme Court in reference to the proceedings respecting Ames & Nicholson. His action was approved.

The claim of the schooner "Katie Du Bois," for damages received by the tug "Manhattan," was referred to the President, with power.

The following requisitions were read, and, on motion, approved:

5483. For 150 pieces spruce, 120 feet black-walnut, for tug "Manhattan"..... \$70 00

The Board then went into executive session.

The President offered the following preamble and resolution, which were adopted:

Whereas, The Pennsylvania Railroad Company has leased from this City, Piers Nos. 27 and 28 (new numbers) North river, including the bulkhead, with the right of approach thereto, and now use the same under a lease dated the 30th day of August, 1884; and,

Whereas, The said Company has shedded or inclosed the greater portion of the space between West street and the front of said piers and bulkheads; and,

Whereas, This Board has objected and does object to the shedding or inclosing of so much space in front of the said piers and bulkheads, and upon reading and filing a communication from the said Company, dated December 4, 1885, requesting permission to erect a shed in front of said Piers 27 and 28 (new numbers), North river, and the bulkhead intervening, to be sixty-five feet in depth easterly from the bulkhead line, and to run from the south side of Pier 27 to the north side of Pier 28, as in said communication stated.

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company to alter or change the present shed or structure, and instead thereof to erect and maintain a structure or shed and flooring opposite said Piers 27 and 28, North river, and intervening bulkhead, provided that the said shed or structure when so changed or altered shall not exceed sixty-five feet in width easterly from the established bulkhead line, and shall not extend beyond the north side of said Pier 28 and the south side of Pier 27. The work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

This permission is granted upon the express condition that the said shed or structure when changed or altered, and all title and interest therein, shall revert to and be vested in the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of New York, upon the termination of the present lease of said piers and bulkheads, or any extension thereof, to the said railroad company.

And provided further that this Department reserves and shall have the right to do all necessary filling in that may be required at any time when it deems it necessary and proper so to do, through the floor of said shed or structure, or otherwise, as the Department shall deem best.

And provided further that the plans and specifications for said new shed or structure shall be submitted to and approved by the Commissioners of Docks and the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department before any work on the shed or structure is begun.

And provided further that the said railroad company shall, within ten days after the passage of this resolution, accept the provisions hereof, in writing.

Commissioner Matthews offered the following preambles and resolutions, which were adopted:

Whereas, The Board governing this Department did, on December 4 and 27, 1882, enter into two several agreements for the purchase by the City of New York of certain bulkhead rights or wharf property situated on South street, in front of and opposite Nos. 40 to 55 South street, inclusive, together with all the private interests in Piers 12, 13 and 14, East river, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and the Counsel to the Corporation; and

Whereas, After several renewals of the time within which said contracts were to be closed, they were only conditionally approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; and

Whereas, This Department deems it for the interests of the City to confirm the action of the Board governing this Department, of December 4 and 27, above recited; and

Whereas, Said private owners, as this Board is informed, are willing to sell and convey the same for the consideration named in said contracts or provisional agreements; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the letter of Mr. Simon Stevens, dated October 20, 1885, representing the several private owners of the bulkhead rights or wharf property on South street, in front of and opposite to Nos. 40 to 55 South street, inclusive, together with all private interests in Piers 12, 13 and 14, East river, be referred to the Counsel to the Corporation to prepare such a supplemental or other provisional contract or agreement for the consideration and action of this Board for submission for the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, subject, in all respects, to the provisions of law relative to this Department; and be it further

Resolved, That in the event of the approval of said supplemental contract by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, if any questions of law shall arise as to the rights and titles of said private owners in and to said property agreed to be conveyed to the City by said private owners, "a case" may be submitted to the General Term, under 1279 section of the Code, reserving to either party the right to take the "case" to the Court of Appeals for final adjudication.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, setting and resetting curb, flagging and reflagging, and paving with Telford pavement One Hundred and Tenth street, from First avenue to Riverside Drive, with record of awards for damages to buildings by change of grade on the line and objections of Sidney S. Harris, Henry Hilton and others, filed by T. H. Baldwin, attorney; The Manhattan Railway Company and others, filed by James A. Deering, attorney; A. B. Johnson, attorney; L. and S. Bernheimer, by Shipman & Acker, attorneys; William H. Phillips and others, by Lancaster & Smith, attorneys; O. H. P. Archer and others, by John F. Kavanagh, attorney; Thomas W. After hearing Mr. Baldwin, on motion, the objections were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.
