BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met at the Mayor's office on Friday, January 18, 1889, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to the following notice :

OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT, }
MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, JANUARY 15, 1889.

SIR—You are respectfully requested to attend a regular meeting of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York, to be held in the Mayor's Office, in the City Hall, on Friday, January 18, 1889, at 2 o'clock P. M., at which meeting it is proposed to consider unfinished business, with such other matters as may be brought before the Board.

The Secretary called the Board to order, and, calling roll, the following ex-officio members were present and answered to their names :

Hugh J. Grant, Mayor; Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller; D. Lowber Smith, Commissioner of Public Works; J. Hampden Robb, President of the Department of Public Parks. Absent—J. H. V. Arnold, President of the Board of Aldermen.

The election of Chairman of the Board being then in order, the Comptroller moved that the Hon. Hugh J. Grant, Mayor of the City of New York, be elected as Chairman of this Board, which was seconded by the Commissioner of Public Works.

The motion was put and carried, and the Mayor took the chair.

The minutes of December 28, 1888, were read and approved.

The President of the Department of Public Parks not being present at the time the vote was taken for the election of Chairman, requested that his vote be registered in favor of the Mayor.

OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

To the Honorable the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York :

GENTLEMEN—I respectfully report that, on the 27th day of December, 1888, at the office of the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen in the City Hall in the City of New York, I caused to be delivered to the Clerk of said Board and left with him copies of resolutions adopted by this Board on the 21st day of December, 1888; copies of said resolutions being hereunto annexed. They provide for the laying out of certain streets, and for the closing and discontinuance of certain other streets, lying northerly of the northerly line of Dyckman street, in the Twelfth Ward of the City of New York; and that I also caused to be published in the CITY RECORD the notice required by law, a copy of which, together with the proof of the publication thereof, is hereunto annexed.

Whereas, At a meeting of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York, held on the 21st day of December, 1888, the following resolutions were adopted by the said Board :

“Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York deem it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of the City of New York by laying out, opening and extending certain streets, roads and avenues in the Twelfth Ward of the City of New York, as follows, viz. :

“1. Tenth avenue, from Academy street to Two Hundred and Eleventh street—Beginning at a point in the easterly line of the Tenth avenue produced northerly, said point being distant 12,289 27-100 feet from the southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street; thence continued northerly 2,501 39-100 feet to a new street to be known as Two Hundred and Eleventh street; thence westerly and parallel with said One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, distance 100 feet; thence southerly and parallel with the first course and 100 feet westerly therefrom, distance 2,431 36-100 feet, to the northeasterly line of a new street to be known as Academy street, and to be hereinafter described; thence southeasterly along said line 122 08-100 feet to the point or place of beginning. This avenue is designated as a street of the first class.

“2. Ninth avenue, from Two Hundred and First street to Two Hundred and Sixteenth street—Beginning at a point in the southerly line of a new street to be known as Two Hundred and Second street, said point being distant 12,412 16-100 feet northerly from the southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, and distant 500 feet easterly from the new avenue to be known as Tenth avenue; thence northerly and parallel to said Tenth avenue, distance 3,717 67-100 feet, to the southerly line of a new street to be called Two Hundred and Sixteenth street; thence easterly 75 feet; thence southerly 3,917 50-100 feet to the northerly line of a new street to be called Two Hundred and First street; thence westerly along said line 75 feet; thence northerly 199 83-100 feet to the point or place of beginning. This avenue is designated as a street of the first class.

“3. Post avenue, from Dyckman street to Tenth avenue—Beginning at a point in the northerly line of Dyckman street, distant 1,100 58-100 feet southeasterly from the easterly line of Kingsbridge road; thence northerly 2,060 feet to the westerly line of a new avenue to be known as Tenth avenue; thence southerly and along said line, distance 139 45-100 feet; thence southerly 1,945 76-100 feet to the easterly line of Dyckman street; thence northwesterly along said line 80 feet to the place of beginning. This avenue is designated as a street of the first class.

“4. Isham street, from Kingsbridge road to Tenth avenue—Beginning at a point in the easterly line of the Kingsbridge road, distant 2,192 17-100 feet northeasterly as measured along the easterly line of Kingsbridge road; thence southeasterly and parallel with Dyckman street and distant 2,190 00-100 feet northerly therefrom, distance 952 30-100 feet, to the new avenue to be known as Tenth avenue; thence northerly along said line 97 66-100 feet; thence northwesterly, distance 886 58-100 feet, to the easterly line of Kingsbridge road; thence southwesterly along the line of Kingsbridge road 80 56-100 feet to the point or place of beginning. This street is designated as a street of the first class.

“5. Emerson street, from Post avenue to Tenth avenue, and from Seaman avenue in a northerly, westerly and southerly direction to its end near Nichols place—Beginning at a point in the easterly line of a new street to be known as Post avenue, distant 1,760 00-100 feet northerly from Dyckman street; thence southeasterly and parallel with said Dyckman street, distance 130 10-100 feet, to the

westerly line of a new avenue to be known as Tenth avenue; thence northerly along said line 97 66-100 feet; thence northwesterly 74 07-100 feet to the easterly line of the new avenue to be known as Post avenue; thence southerly along said line 80 feet to the point or place of beginning. Also beginning at a point, the northwesterly corner of the new streets to be known as Seaman avenue and Emerson street; thence northwesterly and at an angle with said Seaman avenue of 89 degrees 18 minutes and 52 seconds, distance 163 59-100 feet; thence northerly in a curved line, radius 206 51-100 feet, distance 203 60-100 feet; thence northeasterly and tangent thereto 160 89-100 feet; thence northerly and in a curved line, radius 175 feet, distance 94 68-100 feet; thence northerly and tangent thereto, distance 308 45-100 feet; thence northerly and westerly and in a curved line, radius 195 00-100 feet, distance 354 53-100 feet; thence westerly and tangent thereto, distance 358 35-100 feet; thence southerly and in a curved line, radius 225 00-100 feet, distance 171 62-100 feet; thence southerly and tangent thereto, distance 549 75-100 feet; thence westerly and at a right angle, distance 50 feet; thence northerly 549 75-100 feet; thence northerly and in a curved line, radius 275 feet, distance 209 76-100 feet; thence easterly and tangent thereto, distance 358 35-100 feet; thence easterly and southerly in a curved line, radius 245 feet, distance 445 44-100 feet; thence southerly and tangent thereto 308 45-100 feet; thence southerly and in a curved line, radius 225 feet, distance 121 74-100 feet; thence southwesterly and tangent thereto, distance 105 5-100 feet; thence southerly and in a curved line, radius 193 49-100 feet, distance 190 76-100 feet; thence southeasterly and tangent thereto, distance 164 55-100 feet, to the northeasterly corner of said Seaman avenue and Emerson street; thence southwesterly and along the northerly line of Seaman avenue 80 feet to the point or place of beginning. This street is designated as a street of the first class.

“6. Hawthorne street, from Sherman avenue to Tenth avenue—Beginning at a point in the easterly line of a new avenue to be known as Sherman avenue, distant 1,180 00-100 feet northerly from Dyckman street; thence southeasterly and parallel with said Dyckman street 926 30-100 feet to the westerly line of a new avenue to be known as Tenth avenue; thence northerly along said line 97 66-100 feet; thence northwesterly 870 27-100 feet to the easterly line of the new avenue to be known as Sherman avenue; thence southerly along said line 80 feet to the point or place of beginning. This street is designated as a street of the first class.

“7. "And that this Board proposes to alter the map or plan of said city by laying out, opening and extending said streets, roads and avenues, as aforesaid; and

"Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York deem it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of the City of New York by closing and discontinuing certain streets, roads and avenues, and portions thereof, in the Twelfth Ward of the City of New York, which have been heretofore laid out by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, and shown on a map filed by said Commissioners in the offices of the Department of Public Parks and the Register of the City and County of New York on or about the 16th day of April, 1884, and in the office of the Secretary of State of the State of New York on or about the 17th day of April, 1884. Said streets, roads and avenues, and portions thereof, so proposed to be closed and discontinued are colored gray on five similar maps prepared by the Department of Public Works, each of which is entitled 'Map or plan of streets, roads and avenues within that part of the Twelfth Ward of the City of New York lying northerly of the northerly line of Dyckman street (formerly known as Dyckman street and Inwood street), under authority of chapter 360 of the Laws of 1883,' and under authority of chapter 185 of the Laws of 1885, submitted to this Board on November 16, 1888, and which this Board proposes to file in the offices required by law.

"And that this Board proposes to alter the map or plan of the City of New York by closing and discontinuing said streets, roads, avenues, and portions thereof as aforesaid.

"Resolved, That such proposed action of this Board be laid before the Board of Aldermen, and that full notice of the same be published for ten days in the CITY RECORD.

"Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board be and he hereby is directed to transmit to the Board of Aldermen a copy of the foregoing resolutions, and to cause to be published the notice required by law."

And Whereas, Said proposed action of the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement has been duly laid before the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York and full notice of the same has been published for ten days in the CITY RECORD, as appears by the report of the Secretary of this Board and the papers thereto attached; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of the City of New York by laying out, opening and extending certain streets, roads and avenues in the Twelfth Ward of the City of New York and establishing the grades thereof, as follows, viz.:

1. Tenth avenue, from Academy street to Two Hundred and Eleventh street—Beginning at a point in the easterly line of the Tenth avenue produced northerly, said point being distant 12,289 27-100 feet from the southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street; thence continued northerly 2,501 39-100 feet to a new street to be known as Two Hundred and Eleventh street; thence westerly and parallel with said One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, distance 100 feet; thence southerly and parallel with the first course and 100 feet westerly therefrom, distance 2,431 36-100 feet, to the northeasterly line of a new street to be known as Academy street, and to be hereinafter described; thence southeasterly along said line 122 08-100 feet to the point or place of beginning. This avenue is designated as a street of the first class.

Two Hundred and Fifth street, from Tenth avenue to the bulkhead-line, Harlem river—Beginning at a point in the easterly line of the new avenue to be known as Tenth avenue, said point being 13,251 66-100 feet northerly from the southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street; thence easterly and parallel with said One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, distance 975 22-100 feet, to the United States bulkhead-line; thence southerly along said line 60 40-100 feet; thence westerly 968 22-100 feet to the easterly line of the new avenue to be known as Tenth avenue; thence northerly along said line 60 feet, to the point or place of beginning. Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York does now proceed to certify five similar maps showing certain streets, roads and avenues in that part of the Twelfth Ward of the City of New York lying northerly of the northerly line of Dyckman street (formerly known as Dyckman street and Inwood street) laid out, opened and extended by the said Board on this 18th day of January, 1889, and the grades thereof, which said grades are hereby fixed and established as the grades of said streets, roads and avenues, so laid out, opened and extended, and certain streets, roads and avenues, and portions thereof, in the same part of the Twelfth Ward of said city, closed and discontinued by the said Board, on this 18th day of January, 1889; and that the Secretary of this Board be and he is hereby directed to file one of said maps so certified in the office of the Department of Public Works of the City of New York, one in the office of the Counsel to the Corporation of the City of New York, one in the office of the Secretary of State of the State of New York, one in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York, and one in the office of the Department of Public Parks of the City of New York.

SIR—I am directed to return herewith the resolution and petitions relative to the opening of Aqueduct avenue, from Boscobel avenue to Van Cortlandt, forwarded by you on 13th ultimo, and to state that it is the opinion of the Board of Parks that the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, by consulting the petitioners and other owners of property along the avenue, can best arrive at a proper conclusion as to how far the avenue should be opened for the present. To said that Board in arriv-

ing at such conclusion, I herewith furnish a list of distances along Aqueduct avenue, from Boscobel avenue to the several intersecting thoroughfares northward, viz.:

From Boscobel avenue to Featherbed lane, 800 feet.
From Boscobel avenue to Tremont avenue, 3,000 feet.
From Boscobel avenue to Burnside avenue, 4,300 feet.
From Boscobel avenue to Fordham road, 8,200 feet.
From Boscobel avenue to Kingsbridge road, 10,500 feet.
From Boscobel avenue to Van Cortlandt avenue, 15,350 feet.
The total length of Aqueduct avenue is 19,850 feet, or about 3¾ miles.

Mr. Bartlett, Mr. Field, Mr. Peck and others were heard, urging the necessity for the opening of Aqueduct avenue. The Secretary was then directed to re-submit the matter to the Department of Public Parks with request that the Department furnish the Board of Street Opening and Improvement with a drawing, map or diagram, showing Aqueduct avenue, from Wolf street to Van Cortlandt avenue, and especially designating those portions where this avenue would occupy, follow or coincide with the Croton Aqueduct or McComb's Dam road or any lands the title of which is already in the City.

The Secretary presented the following communication, with map, from the Department of Public Works, requesting the Board of Street Opening and Improvement to take the necessary action to acquire title to a strip of land required at One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street to the Harlem river, needed as a sewer outlet; which was directed to be transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation for his opinion as to the powers and authority of the Board of Street Opening in the matter and for his advice as to what action or course the Board should take, and for information in regard to the necessary forms or resolutions to be used.

Hon. ABRAM S. HEWITT, Mayor and Chairman, Board of Street Opening and Improvement:

SIR—Several years ago this Department began the construction of a sewer in Tenth avenue, from One Hundred and Sixty-second to One Hundred and Seventy-third street, to perfect which an outlet is needed at One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street to the Harlem river. This outlet was not included in the contract for the Tenth avenue sewer for the reason that, to construct it, the City would have to acquire title to a strip of land twenty feet in width from the line of the Aqueduct property to the river, and it was thought that, under the then existing laws, such land could be acquired by the City by the ordinary proceedings for the appropriation of land for public purposes. The Counsel to the Corporation advised, however, that, under the provisions of the Consolidation Act of 1882, embodying all prior laws relating to the city, land could not be acquired for sewerage or drainage purposes. The Department was thus prevented from rendering the Tenth avenue sewer perfect by the construction of an outlet to the Harlem river, and the sewer has remained useless for house drainage, and available only for surface drainage. The sewer and its proposed outlet are designed to drain all the area east of Audubon avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-second and One Hundred and Seventy-third streets. By chapter 423, Laws of 1888, section 327 of the Consolidation Act is so amended that lands for sewerage and drainage purposes may be acquired in the manner prescribed in the Consolidation Act. I, therefore, now respectfully apply to the Board of Street Opening and Improvement for its action to acquire the strip of land needed for the sewer outlet as shown on the map and description herewith transmitted.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH
of the Health Department of the City of New
York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, August 2,
1888, the following resolution was adopted:
Resolved, That under the power conferred by law
upon the Health Department, the following additional
section to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and
health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared
to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:
Section 270. In every public hospital and dispensary
in the City of New York there shall be provided and
maintained a suitable room or rooms and place for the
temporary isolation of persons infected with contagious
disease, who shall immediately be separated from the
other persons and other patients at such dispensary or
hospital. It shall be the duty of the physician or phy-
sicians, of the officers, managers and of every one in
charge of a hospital or dispensary, and of every one who
has any duty or office in respect to patients in the course
of treatment, or persons who apply for treatment or care
at a dispensary or hospital, to see that a report is im-
mediately made to the Health Department of the City of
New York of every person infected with a contagious
disease who comes to their knowledge, and that such
person or persons so infected are properly isolated and
kept separate from other persons and other patients.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT, No. 301 MOTT STREET,
NEW YORK, January 31, 1888.
AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH
of the Health Department of the City of New York,
held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, January 27, 1888,
the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 13 of the Sanitary Code be
and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:
Sec. 13. That no owner or lessee of any building,
or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the
same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any per-
son, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which,
or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said build-
ings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ven-
tilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all
respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesome-
ness, for which this Code or any law of this State pro-
vides, or in which they or either of them require any
such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person
rent, let, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the
same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence,
any portion or apartment of any building, which apart-
ment or portion has not at least one foot of its height
and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk
and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the
floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or
which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive
gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this
section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occu-
pancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid
and as a part of any building rented or let, when they
are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any
person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole
dwelling apartment.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and
secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their
duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their
clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any
attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.
REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE
OF WATER RENTS AND RULES
GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER,
FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY
ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COM-
MISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS
350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter
559, Laws 1887, as follows:
"The commissioner of public works shall, from time
to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of
water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now
provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to
different classes of buildings in said city in reference to
their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses
for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other
common purposes, number of families or occupants, or
consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and
modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to
time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and
establishments. All extra charges for water shall be
deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall
become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon
which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid,
shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears.
Such regular rents, including the extra charges above
mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occu-
pants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be
situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said
city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be
laid, and from which they can be supplied with water.
Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall
become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots,
respectively, as herein provided, but no charge what-
ever shall be made against any building in which a
water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as pro-
vided in this act. In all such cases the charge for
water shall be determined only by the quantity of water
actually used as shown by said meters. * * * * *
The said commissioner of public works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not
exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for
permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of
such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time,
prescribe for the prevention of the waste of water; such
fines shall be added to the regular water rents."
The regular annual rents to be collected by the
Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width
fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the
Commissioner of Public Works.
The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-
houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy
the same, and for each additional family, one dollar
per year shall be charged.
Meters will be placed on all houses where waste of water
is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the
Department for all the water passing through them.
The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows,
to wit:

BAKERIES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each
barrel, three dollars per annum.
BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty
dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Com-
missioner of Public Works; an additional charge of
five dollars per annum shall be made for each bath-
tub therein.
BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be
charged at three dollars per annum each, and five
dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-
houses, and bathing establishments. Combination
stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in
the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be
charged the same as bathing tubs.
BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid,
or for stone-work to be measured as brick—ten
cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per
hundred yards.
COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.
DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from
five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Com-
missioner of Public Works.
FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per
annum each.
For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows:
HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged
six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse,
two dollars.
HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceed-
ing thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each
per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.
HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar
per annum.
HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half
barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars
per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper
ball-cock to prevent waste.
HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the
regular rate for private families, be charged for each
lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner
of Public Works.
LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars
per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of
Public Works.
LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an
annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional
charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for
each tap or wash-box.
PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate
of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the
Commissioner of Public Works.
PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged
at such rates as may be determined by the Commis-
sioner of Public Works.
SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS
shall be charged five dollars per annum each.
STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by
the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power
up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars
per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over
fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents
each and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum
of five dollars.
WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a
lot one water-closet having sewer connection is al-
lowed without charge; each additional water-closet or
urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All
closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be
charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether
in a building or on any other portion of the premises.
Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.
WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when
water is supplied direct from the Croton supply,
through any form of the so-called single or double
valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks,
or any valve or cock of any description attached to
the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.
For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger,
or other water-closet not before mentioned, sup-
plied with water as above described, per year, ten
dollars.
For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from
the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock,
and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe
to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the
hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective,
or from which an unlimited amount of water can be
drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five
dollars.
For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from
any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that
are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct,
which are so constructed that not more than three
gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the
handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are
provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe
must not connect with the water-closet, but be car-
ried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of
Health regulations, per year, two dollars.
Cistern answering this description can be seen at

METERS.
Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act
1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be here-
after placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops,
hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-
houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished
for business consumption, except private dwellings.
It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all
expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water
rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton
water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water
is supplied, as now provided by law." * * *
All manufacturing and other business requiring a large
supply of water will be fitted with a meter.
Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred
cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily
or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent per ton (Cus-
tom House measurement) for each time they take water.
Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per
ton (Custom House measurement).
Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board,
twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.
All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved
for special contract by and with the Commissioner of
Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.
No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to
another person or persons.
All persons taking water from the City must keep
their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures
connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost,
at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste
of water.
The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons,
railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be per-
mitted.
No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be
permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a
license or permit taken out for that purpose. All
licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the
first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order
and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning
the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter
by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.
No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the
front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley,
attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left
running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste
from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in
winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the
penalty of five dollars imposed.
Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals
must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars
for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.
Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-
saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly
prohibited.
The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas,
house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about
stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided
with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of
hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this depart-
ment may understand that the permission is not for the
use of Croton water.
Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other
vessels will not be allowed.
The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding
rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense,
and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the
premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid
water rates. By order,

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT
in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559,
Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 352 of the New
York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887,
the following changes are made in charging and collect-
ing water rents:
1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after
June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in
arrears in the same manner as regular rents have hereto-
fore been treated.
2d. In every building where a water meter or meters
are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water
by meter measurement shall be the only charge against
such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through
meter.
3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the
year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirma-
tion of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall
include all charges and penalties of every nature.
4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established,
and will be imposed in each and every case where the
rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the
use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful man-
ner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on
the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings
or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears
in like manner as other charges for water.
5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every
nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will
be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER
CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN
made to this Department by citizens claiming
reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through
meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by
defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful
waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be
turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., with-
out the knowledge or consent of the owners of the prem-
ises.
The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable
this Department to detect and check the useless and un-
warrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential
to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-
ject can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for
the water wasted.
Under the law all charges for water supplied through
meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the
law therefore holds the owner of the premises res-
ponsible for the amount of water used or wasted.
Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all
further applications for reduction of water rents, no
allowance will be made on account of waste of water
occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or
plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occu-
pants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may
have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the
owners of the buildings.
House-owners are further notified that whenever their
premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant,
they must notify this Department in writing, and that
unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in
extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one
year.

GRANTS OF LANDS UNDER WATER.

THE OWNERS OF LANDS IN THE CITY OF
New York, which were formerly under water, and
which were granted by the City of New York, are not-
ified that nearly all of the grants of such lands contain
covenants, on the part of the grantees, and their suc-
cessors and assigns, to maintain and keep in repair the
adjacent streets. The condition of many of these streets
is such as to make it necessary that they should be re-
paired and repaved, and that the obligation resting upon
the present owners of adjacent lots to do this work should
now be enforced. Many of such owners have requested
that such covenants be commuted, and wholly released,
upon the payment by them of a certain sum per lot.
The matter will shortly be presented to the Commis-
sioners of the Sinking Fund for their consideration, and
the adjustment of the basis of commutation, and applica-
tion for releases should therefore be made at once.
