### BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,  
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,  
FRIDAY, October 31, 1879—11 o'clock A. M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present, all the members, viz.: Edward Cooper, the Mayor of the City of New York; John Kelly, the Comptroller of the City of New York; Jordan L. Mott, the President of the Board of Aldermen; John Wheeler, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The minutes of the meeting held October 30, 1879, were read and approved.

The Chairman moved the Board take up and consider the Provisional Estimate for the year 1880.

Which was agreed to.

The Chairman presented the following opinion, and preamble and resolution:

LAW DEPARTMENT,  
OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION,  
NEW YORK, October 31, 1879.

Hon. JOHN WHEELER, Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—I am in receipt of your communication of the 30th instant, inclosing a copy of the following resolution, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of that day:

“Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be requested to furnish this Board with his opinion whether, under chapter 383, Laws of 1878, it is imperative on the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in the absence of a certificate from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to include in the estimates for 1880 a sum not less than \$1,000,000 nor more than \$2,000,000, to meet the payment of bonds and stocks falling due in said year, in the event of the accumulations of the Sinking Fund being in excess of the amount of bonds and stocks payable from taxation falling due; and also whether any action which the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund can take under said act, before the making up of the estimates for 1880, would modify the duty of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the premises.”

At the time when chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878 was submitted to the Legislature, and when it became a law, I understood the scheme of the act to be that at least \$1,000,000 should be raised by taxation every year, and paid into the Sinking Fund, so that moneys might be accumulated, which, with the revenues of the Sinking Fund, would be sufficient to pay off all stocks and bonds of the city, as they should from time to time become due. Looking, however, solely at the language of the act, I am unable to discover anything in it which makes it imperative on the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to include in its estimate for any year the sum of one million of dollars, or any other sum, in the absence of a certificate from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, provided for in section 7 of said act. And if, as I understand to be the case, the accumulations of the Sinking Fund during the year 1880 will be sufficient to pay off all bonds and stocks of the city falling due during that year, I do not think that any action which the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund can take under said act, before the making up of the estimates for 1880, would modify the duty of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the premises.

I have no doubt, however, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has lawful authority in its discretion to include in the estimate for 1880 a sum of not less than one million of dollars, to be raised by taxation during that year, and paid into the Sinking Fund.

Whereas, The Comptroller has reported to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that the amount of the Sinking Fund for the redemption of the city debt is in excess of the amount of bonds and stocks for which that fund is primarily pledged, and that the total amount of bonds and stocks falling due in the year 1880 is—

Bonds payable from the Sinking Fund.....	\$2,147,000 00
Bonds payable from Taxation.....	2,206,265 49

Making a total of..... \$4,353,265 49

—and that the revenues of said Sinking Fund for the calendar year 1880 may properly be estimated at \$4,150,000; therefore

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do certify to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the amount of bonds and stocks to be paid during the year 1880 will be \$203,265.49 more than the estimated receipts of the Sinking Fund for the redemption of the city debt during that year, but that the amount so to be paid is less than the difference between the total amount of said Sinking Fund and the amount of bonds and stocks for which said Sinking Fund was pledged before the passage of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878.

Which were received and ordered to be printed in the minutes.

The Chairman moved that the estimate be taken up item by item.

Which was agreed to.

The various items were unanimously agreed upon except as follows, viz.:

The Chairman moved that the sum of \$15,000 be allowed for “Salaries—Clerks and Officers Board of Aldermen.”

The President of the Board of Aldermen moved to amend by substituting the sum of \$16,200.

The amendment was agreed to.

The original proposition, as amended, was agreed to by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

Negative—The Mayor—1.

The Chairman moved that the sum of \$162,000 be allowed for “Salaries—Department of Finance.”

Which was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen—2.

Negative—The Comptroller and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

The Chairman moved that the sum of \$225,000 be allowed for the “Expenses of Conducting the Finance Department.”

Which was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Negative—The Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

The Chairman then moved that the sum of \$235,000 be allowed for the said purpose.

The item was then laid over, and upon being taken up, was unanimously agreed to.

The Chairman moved that the sum of \$46,000 be allowed for “Boulevards, Roads and Avenues, Maintenance of.”

The Comptroller moved to amend by substituting the sum of \$40,000.

The amendment was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen—2.

Negative—The Comptroller and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

The item was then laid over, and upon being taken up the question was taken upon the original proposition.

Which was unanimously agreed to.

The Chairman moved that the sum of \$2,000 be allowed for “Flagging Sidewalks and Fencing Vacant Lots in front of City Property.”

The Comptroller moved to amend by substituting the sum of \$1,500.

The amendment was agreed to.

The original proposition as amended was agreed to by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

The Comptroller moved that the sum of \$300,000 be allowed for “Repaving, under chapter 476, Laws of 1875.”

The President of the Board of Aldermen moved to amend by substituting the sum of \$400,000.

The amendment was lost.

The question was then taken on the original proposition, which was decided in the negative by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Comptroller and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

Negative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen—2.

The item was then laid over, and, upon being taken up, the Comptroller renewed his motion, that the sum of \$300,000 be allowed for the purpose.

The President of the Board of Aldermen moved to amend by substituting the sum of \$400,000.

The amendment was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen—2.

Negative—The Comptroller and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

The Comptroller then moved that the sum of \$306,000 be allowed for the purpose.

The Chairman moved that the sum of \$200,000 be allowed for “Labor, Maintenance and Supplies—Department of Public Parks.”

Which was agreed to by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, and the President of the Board of Aldermen—3.

Negative—The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—1.



The Comptroller moved that the sum of \$71,500 be allowed for "Salaries and Contingencies—Department of Buildings."

Which was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Comptroller and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

Negative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen—2.

The Chairman then moved that the sum of \$60,000 be allowed for the purpose.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution and Provisional Estimate for the year 1880:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as provided by section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, and the amendments thereto, do, by the affirmative votes of all the members, hereby make the following Provisional Estimate of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty (1880), in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the City and County, which becomes due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable from taxes during the said year, and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State Tax required to be paid by the City and County in said year, to wit:

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Provisional Estimate of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, for the year 1880, made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on October 31, 1879, be transmitted to the Board of Aldermen, together with the following reasons, in detail, of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for said Provisional Estimate:

#### REASONS FOR THE PROVISIONAL ESTIMATE FOR THE YEAR 1880.

The several sums allowed and appropriated in the Provisional Estimate for the year 1880, for every purpose, and for each department and branch of the city government, have been agreed on and adopted, after careful consideration, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and for the following reasons:

##### The Common Council.

The sum of \$106,450 was allowed and appropriated, under the requirement of the provision of law fixing the salaries of the Board of Aldermen, and as necessary to pay the expenses of conducting the business of the Legislative Department of the city government in 1880.

##### The Mayoralty.

The sum of \$42,000, the amount of the Departmental Estimate, is allowed and appropriated under the provision of law fixing the salary of the Mayor at \$12,000 per annum, and as necessary to pay the expenses of conducting the business of the Mayor's office during the coming year.

##### The Department of Finance.

The sum of \$251,000 is allowed and appropriated, under the provision of law fixing the salary of the Comptroller at \$10,000 per annum, and fixing the compensation of the Chamberlain at \$30,000 per annum, and as necessary to pay the expenses of conducting the business of this Department.

##### The State Taxes.

The sum of \$3,571,322.91 is allowed and appropriated for this purpose as the proportion of the State tax, including the salary of the State Inspector, to be paid by the City and County of New York in the year 1880.

##### Interest on the City Debt.

The sum of \$8,459,319.51 is allowed and appropriated as the amount necessary to pay the interest on the city debt payable from taxation in the year 1880, under the statutes authorizing the issue of Stocks and Bonds of the Corporation.

##### Redemption of the Principal of the City Debt.

The sum of \$170,389.31 is appropriated for the payment of certain installments of the city debt, including the amount necessary to pay the portion of the debt of the territory annexed from Westchester County, falling due in 1880.

##### Judgments.

The sum of \$500,000 is the amount appropriated and deemed necessary to pay judgments against The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York in the year 1880.

##### The Law Department.

The amount appropriated to the Law Department, \$161,700, is deemed sufficient to pay the salaries of the Counsel to the Corporation, Corporation Attorney, Public Administrator, the Attorney for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes, and their clerks and assistants, the expense of procuring and presenting evidence relative to frauds on the city and county prior to 1872, the amount required to pay for the legal services of counsel for the city in the Brooklyn bridge litigation, and to meet the contingent expenses of the Law Department in the year 1880.

##### The Department of Public Works.

The sum of \$2,035,600 has been appropriated as the amount necessary to pay the salary of the Commissioner of Public Works and the officers, engineers, superintendents, inspectors, clerks and other employees of the Department of Public Works, and to meet the expenses of conducting the business of the Department for all purposes required in the interest of the city in the year 1880.

##### The Department of Public Parks.

The sum appropriated, \$561,500, is the amount required to pay the salary of the President of the Board of Commissioners, as fixed by law, and the expenses of conducting the business of the Department, including such expenditures as are deemed necessary, or as are authorized by acts of the Legislature.

##### The Department of Buildings.

The sum appropriated, \$65,000, is the amount deemed necessary for conducting the business of the Department in the coming year.

##### The Department of Public Charities and Correction.

The sum of \$1,294,183.34 has been appropriated for all purposes of the Department in the year 1880, and is believed to be sufficient for the purpose.

##### The Health Department.

The sum of \$236,000 has been appropriated to pay all the salaries of the Department and the expenses of conducting the public business in its charge, including the expense of inspecting the tenement houses of the city under the act passed by the last Legislature, and is believed to be sufficient for the purpose.

##### The Police Department.

The sum appropriated, \$3,988,040, is the amount deemed necessary to pay the salaries of the Commissioners of Police, and the officers and patrolmen, as fixed by law, and the expenses of conducting the business of the Department, including the sum of \$690,000 to pay the expense of cleaning the streets of the city.

##### The Fire Department.

The sum appropriated, \$1,302,670, is the amount required to pay the salaries of the Commissioners, Firemen, and other employees, and the expenses of conducting the business of the Department, including expenditures for supplies, etc., deemed necessary in the interest of the city.

##### The Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The sum appropriated, \$107,400, is the amount required to pay the salaries of the Commissioners as fixed by law, and the expenses of conducting the business of the Department.

##### The Board of Education.

The sum appropriated, \$3,500,000, is the amount required to pay the salaries of teachers and all employees, and also the expenses of conducting the public schools of the city, including expenditures deemed necessary for repairs and extension of school accommodation.

##### The College of the City of New York.

The sum of \$140,000 has been appropriated to pay the salaries of professors and officers in the College, the purchase of books and supplies, and for repairs to buildings, etc., and is deemed sufficient for the purpose.

##### Advertising Printing, Stationery and Blank Books.

The sum of \$143,200 has been appropriated to pay the expenses of publishing the "CITY RECORD," and to pay the salaries of the Supervisor and other employees; also to pay the bills incurred for the advertising, printing, stationery and blank books required by the various departments and offices of the city government. The amount appropriated is deemed necessary for the purpose.

##### The Judiciary.

The sum appropriated, \$1,193,360, is the amount required to pay the salaries of Judges, clerks, officers and attendants of the Courts, the County Clerk, the Surrogate, the District Attorney and his assistants, and the Commissioner of Jurors, as fixed by law, and such expenses for conducting the business of the courts and offices coming under this head as are deemed necessary.

##### Asylums, Reformatories, and Charitable Institutions.

The appropriation made, \$996,257.66, is the aggregate amount estimated to be required by all the charitable institutions in the City and State, which, under acts of the Legislature, are entitled to receive a fixed sum annually, or per capita allowances for the support of their inmates.

##### Miscellaneous Purposes.

The sum of \$471,680 was appropriated as the amount deemed necessary for the payment of the expenses of conducting the public business in various offices and affairs of the city government, as follows:

The total amount of the appropriations deemed necessary for all purposes in the year 1880, is \$29,297,072.73, from which is deducted the revenues of the General Fund not otherwise appropriated by law, estimated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at \$1,500,000, leaving the amount of the Provisional Estimate for the year 1880, \$27,797,072.73.

In presenting these reasons for the various appropriations made in the Provisional Estimate for the year 1880, it is proper to say that the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment were not unanimous on all the items of the appropriations so made, but have voted for the adoption of the Provisional Estimate as a whole, inasmuch as the law requires that the said Provisional Estimate shall be made by the concurrent vote of all the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, believing it to be more to the public interest that the Estimate should be adopted than that it should fail by reason of a difference of opinion as to some of the items of appropriation.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Chairman offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be requested to present, at the next meeting of the Board, a statement of the receipts and payments of the General Fund from January 1 to November 1, 1879, and also the estimated amount of the receipts and payments of said Fund for the remainder of the year.

Which was unanimously agreed to.

At a meeting of the Board of Examiners, held pursuant to the call of the Superintendent of Buildings, at the office of the Department of Buildings, No. 2 Fourth Avenue, on Wednesday, the 5th day of November, A. D. 1879, at 3 o'clock P. M.

There being present thereat, at the opening of the meeting, Superintendent Henry J. Dudley, Edwin Dobbs, and Henry Dudley; and shortly thereafter Messrs. John Banta and James M. McLean answered to their names.

Superintendent Henry J. Dudley presiding.

The Chairman submitted, for the action of the Board, the hereinafter-named petitions and applications, to wit:

Petition of John McCool for permission, in the erection of four three-story brick and brown stone dwellings (one to be 15 x 65 and three to be 20 x 50 feet, all 45 feet in height, with one-story extension on rear of three and a two-story extension on rear of one of said buildings), on the south side of East Sixty-fourth street, seventy feet east of Lexington Avenue, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit him to construct and build an eight (8) inch brick wall to easterly side of the 15-foot front house in East Sixty-fourth street, instead of using the 12-inch party-wall (now built as applied for in New Building Plan 801 already filed), thus making 20 inches of masonry between the buildings, and also to permit him to construct and build the outside walls of the several extensions but eight (8) inches in thickness, the party-walls throughout being twelve (12) inches in thickness, the said extension walls in all cases being but one story in height, with the exception of the extension to the easterly house, which will be two (2) stories in height, in all other respects the said buildings to be erected in conformity with the detailed statement of Specifications and Plans for New Buildings No. 801, filed relative thereto October 20, 1879. So much of which petition as permits of the construction of an 8-inch wall above the first story, and also permits of the erection of the extensions, was, upon motion, granted—Messrs. Henry Dudley, Edwin Dobbs, and Chairman Henry J. Dudley voting in the affirmative thereon.

Petition of John B. Snook, architect, on behalf of C. Wolfe, owner, for permission, in the erection of the five-story iron front and brick store on the southwest corner of Pearl and Centre streets, to be allowed to so far deviate from the strict provisions of the Building Law as will permit the openings of the iron work on the two fronts above the basement of said building, where there are no windows or doors, and the openings under the windows, to be filled up with eight (8) inches in brick work (in place of filling the same with four (4) inches in thickness of fire-proof material and cast-iron plates on the outside, as granted by Department of Buildings), and to also permit the granite caps under first story iron posts to be made 20 and 24 x 16 inches, and 10½ inches high, in place of 12 inches high; they will have two blue stone binders built in the wall under all of them, except on the corner and for isolated piers, which are to have three plates, one to set directly under each granite cap; in all other respects the building to be constructed in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 753, filed relative thereto September 30, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted—Messrs. Henry Dudley, Edwin Dobbs, and the Chairman, H. J. Dudley voting in favor of granting the same.

Petition of Richard Hayes, on behalf of Peter Hayes, owner, for permission, in the proposed alteration to the four-story brick tenement dwelling, No. 230 Madison street, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the erection of a brick extension thereto, 8 feet and 9 inches in width, 11 feet 10 inches in depth, and 20 feet 11 inches, or two stories, in height, and to construct the second story walls of such proposed extension but eight inches in thickness, in conformity with Alteration Plans and Specifications No. 1094, filed relative thereto October 22, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted by the unanimous vote of the Board—present, and voting, Henry Dudley, Edwin Dobbs, and the Chairman, H. J. Dudley.

After which the Board, upon motion of Edwin Dobbs, Esq., took a recess until Thursday, November 6, at 3 P. M.

THURSDAY, November 6, 1879.

Reconvened at 3 P. M. Present thereat, at commencement of proceedings, Superintendent H. J. Dudley, presiding, John Banta, and Henry Dudley, being a quorum. Business was resumed as follows, to wit:

Petition of Edward L. Brown for permission, in the proposed alteration and extension of the one story brick building occupied by the Nursery and Child's Hospital, on the east side of Lexington Avenue, seventy-five feet south of Fifty-first street, rear, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the same to be altered, and an addition built thereto, in conformity with Alteration Plans and Specifications relative thereto No. 1122, filed October 9, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, denied—Messrs. John Banta, Henry Dudley, and the Chairman, H. J. Dudley, voting to deny the same.

Petition of John Kennedy, owner, for permission, in the proposed alteration of the three-story brick factory building No. 341 East Eleventh street, twenty-five feet in width on front, sixty feet in width on rear, one hundred and thirty-six feet in depth, and thirty-eight feet in height (to be, when altered, five and six stories, or about sixty-four feet in height), to be allowed to so far deviate from the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the said building to be altered and enlarged in conformity with Alteration Plans and Specifications No. 1175, filed October 23, 1879. Which petition was granted, upon motion—Messrs. John Banta, Henry Dudley, and the Chairman, H. J. Dudley, voting to grant the same.

Petition of Charles Mettam, architect, on behalf of Smith & McNell, owners, for permission, in the proposed alteration of the five-story brick hotel building known as No. 199 Washington street, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the said building to be altered and raised, in conformity with Alteration Plans and Specifications No. 1174, filed relative thereto October 22, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted—Messrs. John Banta, Henry Dudley, and the Chairman, H. J. Dudley, voting in favor thereof.

Petition of John Brandt, architect, on behalf of the owner, Adam Brandt, for permission, in the proposed alteration and extension of the four-story brick building on north side of Eighty-seventh street, 200 feet west of First Avenue (known as No. 341 East Eighty-seventh street), to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the erection of the proposed extension thereto with walls of but eight (8) inches in thickness, in conformity with Alteration Plans and Specifications No. 1176, filed relative thereto October 23, 1879. Which petition was, on motion, granted—Messrs. John Banta, Henry Dudley, and the Chairman, H. J. Dudley, voting in favor of granting the same.

Petition of Terence Farley, on behalf of B. M. Farley, owner, for permission, in the erection of three 3-story and basement brick and brown stone dwellings, each 16 feet 8 inches by 50 feet, and 45 feet in height, on the south side of East Seventy-second street, 200 feet west of Second Avenue, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit him to line up the 12-inch brick wall adjoining on the westerly side of the present house and the easterly side of the three houses to be erected with eight (8) inches of brickwork, the same to be laid in cement mortar and anchored with iron anchors every 2 feet in height and 4 feet apart, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 810, filed relative thereto October 28, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted—Messrs. John Banta, James M. McLean, Henry Dudley, and the Chairman, H. J. Dudley, voting in favor of granting the same.

Petition of Bernard Munday, owner, for permission, in the erection of a five-story brick building, on the north side of Fifty-second street, between Eighth and Ninth Avenues, known as No. 348 West Fifty-second street, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit him to construct a "light shaft" on each side of the same by making a recess in the centre of each side wall, 7 feet long by 20 inches wide, and permit walls of such recesses to be constructed but eight (8) inches in thickness, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 797, filed relative thereto October 17, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted, by the unanimous vote of the Board.

Petition of J. H. Valentine, architect, on behalf of A. A. Whitney, owner, for permission, in the erection of the six 3-story and basement brick and brown stone dwellings, each 16 feet 8 inches by 36 feet, and 44 feet in height, on premises northwest corner of Walton Avenue and One Hundred and Fiftieth street, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the bearing wall (on line of street) of the corner house, on northwest corner of One Hundred and Fiftieth street and Walton Avenue, to be built but twelve (12) inches in thickness, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 836, filed relative thereto October 31, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted, by the unanimous vote of the Board.

Petition of John Knox, builder, on behalf of H. Lipps, owner, for permission, in the erection of three 3-story and basement brick and Ohio stone (front) dwellings, on west side of Alexander Avenue, fifty feet north of One Hundred and Forty-first street (to be each 16 feet 8 inches by 40 feet, and 42 feet high), to be allowed to so far vary or deviate from the provisions of the Building Law, as will permit the party-walls of the third stories of said buildings but eight (8) inches in thickness, and as will also permit the recesses for stairs, on the first and second stories thereof to be built but eight (8) inches in thickness, instead of twelve (12) inches, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications, No. 837, filed relative thereto November 3, 1879. So much of which petition as relates to the recessing of the walls for stairs, and as will permit said recessed portion to be constructed eight inches thick, was, upon motion, granted, and as to the remainder of the petition, it was denied—the Board voting unanimously to grant said petition as to the recessing of the walls for stairs, and to deny the remainder thereof.

Petition of Thomas H. McAvoy, architect, on behalf of Messrs. Lynch & McAvoy, owners, for permission, in the erection of a one-story brick structure fronting on Madison Avenue, east side, 200 feet, and running from Fifty-eighth to Fifty-ninth streets, in dimensions 200 x 60, and 30 feet in height, to be allowed to so far vary, or deviate from the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the walls of the proposed building to be constructed but eight (8) inches in thickness, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 838, filed relative thereto November 3, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted, by the unanimous vote of the Board.

Petition of Wm. H. Hume, architect, for and on behalf of Augusta T. Gillender, owner, for permission in the proposed alterations to the four-story brick and marble front office building on the northwest corner of Wall and Nassau streets (25 x 73, and 60 feet in height), to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the westerly wall of said building to be lined up with brick, so as to make said wall in cellar 28 inches thick, on first story 24 inches, on second, third, and fourth stories 20 inches, instead of 20, 16 and 12 inches, as at present, for the purpose of putting two additional stories on said building, all brickwork to be laid up in cement mortar, properly bonded and tied with old work, in conformity with Alteration Plans and Specifications No. 1190, filed relative thereto November 3, 1879. So much of which petition as relates to and will permit the wall above the first story floor to be lined up 8 inches thick with brickwork was, upon motion, granted, provided and upon the condition that the walls of basement and cellar be lined up with 12 inches of brickwork—the Board voting unanimously in favor thereof.

Franklin, architect, on behalf of Joseph McQuade, owner, for permission, in the proposed alteration to the building No. 57 McDougal street (four stories in height, 18 x 45 feet, with extension 12 x 15 feet, and 37 feet in height), to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the said building to be altered and enlarged, in conformity with the Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 1182, filed relative thereto October 30, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, denied, by the unanimous vote of the Board.

Petition of Frank Mark, builder, on behalf of W.
