

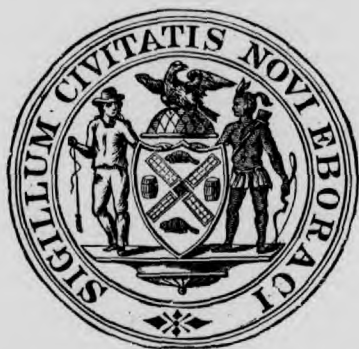

## DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

Report for the Quarter ending September 30, 1879.

NEW YORK, October 1, 1879.

Hon. EDWARD COOPER, Mayor, etc.:

SIR—Pursuant to the provisions of section 27, chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments respectfully

### REPORT:

That, in compliance with the requirements of section 13 of chapter 302 of the Laws of 1859, the assessment rolls for each of the several wards, duly certified, were delivered to the Board of Supervisors on the first Monday of July.

The assessment of the real and personal property in the city was commenced on the first Monday in September, as required by section 7, chapter 302 of the Laws of 1859.

The following writs of certiorari, returnable at the Supreme Court in October, were received, and, upon motion, were ordered to be transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation.

On the petition of Samuel Lord, John T. Lord, Manuel Lopez Blanco, Coudert Brothers, New York Market Co., Henry Draper, Anthony Pauchon, August Ferrari, Marie L. Zacharie, Domingo Blanco, S. D. Babcock, et al., Trustees, for the reduction of the assessed valuations of real estate for the purposes of taxation for the year 1879; and also on the petition of the following surface railroad companies, for a review on the merits of the Commissioners' decision and action in assessing railroad tracks in the City of New York as real estate.

Also, on the petition of The Chesebrough Manufacturing Co. for a review, by the court, of the assessment made on its personal estate by the Commissioners for the year 1879.

At a meeting of the State Board of Equalization, held at the office of the Secretary of State in the City of Albany, September 19, 1879. The President of the Board of Tax Commissioners appeared before the Board in behalf of the City of New York, and urged its claims for a reduction in the equalized valuation, instead of an increase of over \$148,000,000, as proposed in the table reported.

The report, however, as submitted by the State Assessors, and hereto appended, adding the above increase, and making the total equalized value of real and personal estate, as assessed for the City and County of New York, \$1,246,872,411, was adopted by the following vote:
