

The 960 deaths represent a death-rate of 25.80, against 26.08 for the previous week, and 30.20 for the corresponding week of 1893.

Contagious and infectious diseases varied little, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox, being respectively 178, 59, 57, 17 and 4, against 192, 61, 53, 9 and 11 for the previous week, a total of 315 against 326. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Tenth, Twelfth and Thirteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Eleventh, Twenty-second and Twenty-third Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Thirteenth Ward and the decrease in the Fourteenth Ward. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Tenth Ward, and the decrease in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards. Eight of the 17 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street and 5 were below Fourteenth street. Three of the 4 cases of small-pox were below East Fourteenth street and the other one was in the annexed district. annexed district.

The reading of the minutes of the proceedings of the last meeting was dispensed with.

The Commissioners then proceeded to take testimony offered on behalf of the City in the matter of the following claims: No. 61 (George and Mariana A. Hey) and No. 63 (Enoch C. Bell).

The following decision was then rendered:

Decision on Motion to Increase Amounts Claimed in Petitions to Conform to the Proofs. Before the Commissioners of Appraisal under chapter 537 of the Laws of 1893.

In the Matter

The motions on behalf of certain claimants to increase amounts claimed for damages to conform to proof.

Varnum, C.:

Motions were made on behalf of certain claimants at the session of the Commission on February 28, 1894, to increase the amounts claimed for damages in the petitions filed, to conform to the proofs (Stenegraphic Notes, pp. 1466 to 1476; Printed Minutes, p. 325).

Decision on said motions was then reserved.

We held in the matter of Ann Mullany (Claim No. 57), that under the provisions of chapter 537 of the Laws of 1893, this Commission is not restricted in making an award to the amount of damages specified in any claim filled, but can award such damages as the Commissioners, from the evidence, may deem just and equitable.

In view, however, of the apparent importance to the city authorities of having accurate and immediate information of the possible contingent liability of the City by reason of the claims filed under the provisions of the act above mentioned, we granted the motion in the Mullany case, and directed that a similar motion should be made in all cases before the close of the claimant's case, where the claimant desired to have his petition amended by increasing the amount of damages claimed. The present motions were made under such direction, and would have been granted upon the testimony, as it stood at the time when the opinion in the Mullany case was rendered.

Since then, however, the Commission has, in the Poillon case (Claim No. 52), rendered an opinion upon the general questions as to what damages can be allowed as just and equitable, within the provisions of the act, and in so doing, has passed upon numerous objections taken to testimony before given, and upon which decision had been reserved, the result of which has been the elimination of a considerable portion of the expert testimony first presented in support of claimant's case.

(See opinion of Hays, Commissioner, in Poillon case, and the cases cited, and also vide opinion of Bischoff, J., in Coltou against N. Y. Elevated R. R. Co., "N. Y. Law Journal," April 7, 1894; and Hunter against Manhattan Railway Co., 141 N. Y., 281.)

Under these changed conditions, there do not appear upon the record any positive expressions of opinion by experts as to the exact amount of damage suffered by claimants (as was before the case), but mere general testimony as to fee and rental values of property at various periods of time and certain ratios of increase or decrease, from which the Commission can only, after full examination and consideration of the same, and of the testimony on behalf of the City, estimate the actual amount of damages.

It thus appears that there is nothing now upon the record upon which to sustain, at this time, such motions to increase the amount specified in the petition filed to conform with the proof.

The reason for granting the motion in the Mullany case does not, therefore, seem to apply to the pending motions, and, as before stated, we do not deem action upon any such motions necessary for the protection of claimants, as the Commission holds that it has full power to make an

award in excess of the amount of any claim filed, where the evidence may, in its judgment, justify

For the reasons above stated all of the above motions are denied.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are lorever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to he was

att o'clock in the forenoon of that day, to hear the said parties and persons in relation thereto, and in case any such person or claimant shall desire, at such time and place, to offer further and additional proofs or testimony, such person or claimant will be heard, or said proofs or testimony will be received by us.

And at such time and place, or at such further or other time and place as we may appoint, we will hear the proofs and allegations of any owner, lessee, or other person in any way entitled to or interested in such real estate or any part or parcel thereot, and also such proofs and allegations as may be then offered on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York.
