Whereas, This Board did in conformity with notice published accord public hearing thereon, at which no person appeared in opposition thereto; and

Whereas, It is the opinion of this Board that compliance with said petition would be to the best interests of this city; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it give the subject matter of the petition its prompt and favorable consideration and action.

Also,

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did submit to this the Local Board of the borough aforesaid at its meeting held October 5, 1900, the petition of owners of real estate on South street, from Wyckoff street to Allen street, thence north to Humboldt Boulevard, a distance of thirteen hundred feet (1,300'), in Fourth Ward of borough in city aforesaid, wherein said petitioners set forth their desires that water-mains be extended along said streets with necessary fire-hydrants attached thereto; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it extend to the wishes of the petitioners such favorable consideration and action as will enable the Jamaica Water Supply Company to make full response to the requirements of the inhabitants along the aforesaid streets within the territory of its franchise and the terms thereof, and the law in the matter makes obligatory so to do.

Also,

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did submit to this the Local Board of the borough aforesaid at its meeting held October 5, 1900, petition of owners of real estate on Trains Meadow road, from Jackson avenue to Flushing avenue, in Second Ward in borough of city aforesaid, wherein said petitioners set forth their desires that water-mains be extended along said road from and to the points above named; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it extend to the wishes of the petitioners such favorable consideration and action as will enable the Citizens' Water Supply Company to make full response to the requirements of the inhabitants along the aforesaid road within the territory of its franchise and the terms thereof, and as the law in the matter makes obligatory so to do.

Also,

Whereas, Under date of August 14, 1900, a communication was directed to the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, of which the following is a copy:

"In compliance with requirements of me by the Local Board of this Borough, at its meeting held on the 10th inst., I beg to inform you that the electric lighting of streets between Flushing and Little Neck, in Third Ward, this borough, is very unreliable, irregular and hence unsatisfactory to the people along the line, and should not be tolerated any longer, much less payment permitted to be made for services not rendered, to remedy which this appeal is made to you in the interest of the public that is concerned therein."

And, Whereas, Apparently no attention has been given by the Commissioner to the foregoing as the state of affairs complained of remain unchanged; and

Whereas, In order not to be considered as being too indefinite in statement, additional representation is hereby made that it is estimated that the City is receiving but about two-thirds of the lighting contracted for, and also of same ratio of power without corresponding deductions being made from bills presented for lighting said district; now, in view of the foregoing

Resolved, That this, the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, in meeting assembled this October 5, 1900, does hereby most emphatically protest to the Commissioner of Public Lighting against such "public be damned" policy being practiced upon the common people in this borough in addition to taxing them to pay for such imposition.
