The Committee on By-Laws and Legislation, to which was referred the report of the Committee on Elementary Schools relative to the confirmation or rejection of certain persons nominated by the Board of Superintendents for Teachers, all the nominees, with one exception, being married women (see Journal, pages 605, 606 and 773), with a request that it investigate as to the legality of the nomination and assignment of each individual recommended in the report for appointment as a Teacher, respectfully reports that it has made a careful examination into the facts and circumstances connected with the case of each of the above-mentioned nominees. Where proof has been produced that the nominee comes within the scope of the provisions of subdivision 12 of section 66 of the By-Laws, or where the Teacher has never resigned, or resigned practically under compulsion, your Committee has decided to recommend that the nomination be confirmed. Where it has been found that the nominee does not come within the scope of the provisions of subdivision 12 of section 66 of the By-Laws, and voluntarily resigned from the school system, your Committee has decided to recommend that the nomination be rejected. As it appears that certain of the persons nominated may, at a later date, come within the scope of the provision of subdivision 12 of section 66 of the By-Laws in reference to abandonment, in these cases your Committee has decided to recommend the rejection of the nominations without prejudice.

Your Committee therefore submits the following resolutions as a substitute for the first resolution attached to the above-mentioned report of the Committee on Elementary Schools:

In connection with the foregoing Mr. Schmitt presented the following:

I concur in the majority report except so far as the nominations of Grace G. Hess, Josephine M. Raab, Leonora C. Cusimano and Sue S. Manee are concerned. I do not recommend their appointment for these reasons:

The by-laws provide, section 66, subdivision 12, as follows: "No married woman shall be appointed to any teaching or supervising position in the day public schools unless her husband is incapacitated from physical or mental disease to earn a livelihood or has continuously abandoned her for not less than three years prior to date of appointment; provided proof satisfactory to the Board of Superintendents is furnished to establish such physical or mental disability or abandonment."

In all the cases in which I have concurred with the majority report, recommending appointment, the married women applying could be appointed under the provision of this by-law, because either the husband is incapacitated as required by the by-law, or the applicant has been continuously abandoned for not less than three years prior to the appointment. In the cases recommended in which I do not concur, the married women who are applying for the positions cannot be appointed under the provision of this by-law, because in every case they have a husband with whom they are living and who is not incapacitated to earn a livelihood. My colleagues, however, state that some of these teachers, when they were married, were told that by reason of marriage they could no longer teach, and thereupon gave up the position, and that under the decision in the Murphy case no right existed to prevent them from teaching by reason of such marriage. There is a complete answer to this claim, and it has been stated by the City Superintendent at the last meeting, namely, that these persons do not claim a reinstatement, but have applied for an appointment de novo. This is a material distinction, and it will be conceded that if these applicants were to apply to the courts to compel the Board to appoint them de novo, they could not succeed, though they might succeed if they were to apply for reinstatement. Their application and the proceedings founded thereon are therefore irregular, and I submit that a teacher should not be appointed on such an irregular and improper application. But, even assuming the fact to be that they surrendered their positions because of marriage, and of their being told that they could not hold their positions by reason thereof, and assuming that they applied to the courts for reinstatement, I think that their applications would be successfully defeated, because they did not offer to continue their services, but upon the suggestion that they could no longer teach by reason of marriage they voluntarily surrendered their positions.

For these reasons, and as it is the policy of the Board not to employ married women as teachers, I recommend that the following named for appointment be rejected: Grace G. Hess, Josephine M. Raab, Leonora C. Cusimano and Sue S. Manee.

The minimum salary for a woman principal of a model school in a training school for teachers shall be \$2,700 per annum, the maximum salary shall be \$3,000 per annum, and the rate of annual increase shall be \$100. No increase for any year, however, shall be made unless the service of the principal shall have been approved, after inspection and investigation, as fit and meritorious by a majority of the Board of Superintendents.

Organizing Public School 80, Borough of Brooklyn, as an elementary school for boys and girls of all grades, and organizing Public School 146, Borough of Brooklyn, as a school for boys of the grades of the first four years and for girls of all the elementary grades.

Transferring John S. Roberts from the Principalship of Public School 75 to that of Public School 62, Grammar, Borough of Manhattan, said transfer to take effect on assignment by the City Superintendent.

Mr. Wilsey presented the following:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Elementary Schools respectfully reports that it has had under consideration a communication from the Department of School Administration of the National Educational Association, referred to it at the meeting of the Board of Education held on April 12, 1905, extending an invitation to the members of the Board to send a delegation to the annual convention to be held at Asbury Park, N. J., on July 5 and 6, 1905. It being ascertained that none can be admitted unless they are or become members, your Committee feels that it cannot make any recommendation in the matter, as it concerns the individual members, and begs to refer said communication back to the Board of Education for its action. As the Board as a whole, however, is a member now, it is entitled to send one delegate, and your Committee respectfully suggests that the President be selected as its representative.

Mr. Collier moved that the President be requested to act as the delegate of the Board of Education at the annual convention of the Department of School Administration of the National Educational Association, to be held at Asbury Park, N. J., on July 5 and 6, 1905.

The Secretary put the question whether the Board would adopt the motion offered by Mr. Collier, and it was decided in the affirmative by a unanimous vote.

Mr. Wilsey presented the following:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Elementary Schools respectfully reports that it has had under consideration a communication from the Local School Board of District No. 18, referred to it at the meeting of the Board of Education held April 5, 1905, transmitting a resolution adopted April 3, 1905, transferring Miss Anna Slater from Public School 166, Primary, to Public School 105, Boys, Manhattan, subject to the approval of the Board of Superintendents. This matter was referred to the Board of Superintendents, which disapproved of said transfer at a meeting held May 8, 1905, giving for its reasons the following extract from the report of its committee on Nomination, Transfer and Assignment:

"Miss Slater's application for transfer has been on file for some time and has been given consideration. Her desire to be nearer home has not seemed to be a sufficient reason for recommending her transfer, especially in view of the proximity of her home, West One Hundred and Fifth street, to the school in which she is teaching, West Eighty-ninth street. The recommendation of the Local School Board comes at a time when transfers are particularly undesirable. The Board of Superintendents has rigidly carried out its policy of making no transfers at this time, except where the reasons advanced in support of the requests have been particularly urgent. Moreover, Miss Slater's transfer from a Primary Department, in which she teaches a class of 2A girls, to Boys' Grammar Department, the lowest grade of which is 4B, is not one which would tend to strengthen the school or make it possible for Miss Slater to render her best services."

In addition, your Committee begs to call attention to section 58, subdivision 18, of the By-Laws, as follows:

Section 58, Subdivision 18—"They (the Local School Boards) shall have power to transfer teachers from school to school within their respective districts, but only after hearing the principals of the schools affected by such transfers and subject to the approval of the Board of Superintendents; provided, however, that such transfer shall not involve promotion or increase of salary. A transfer, under the terms of this by-law, shall be understood to mean only an exchange of teachers of the same grade, and such transfer shall take effect only at the beginning of the school term."

In view of the above facts, your Committee is of the opinion that a recommendation is unnecessary.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
