On motion, the record of the proceedings of the Commission for March 20, 1908, as printed in the CITY RECORD for March 24, 1908, was approved.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a resolution adopted March 20, 1908, relative to the application of the Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad Company for a franchise to the exclusive use of two of the tracks provided for elevated railroads upon and across the Manhattan Bridge and approaches, and an opinion of the Corporation Counsel thereon, which were ordered filed. The resolution was as follows:

Whereas, The Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad Company has, under date of September 9, 1907, made application to this Board for the right or franchise to the exclusive use of two of the tracks provided for elevated railroads upon and across the Manhattan Bridge and approaches when constructed across the East River; and

Whereas, The Corporation Counsel, in an opinion dated March 18, 1908, has advised that such application should be made to the Public Service Commission for the First District, instead of to this Board, now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the petition of the Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad Company be filed, and that the Secretary be directed to notify the Company of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, and also to furnish a copy of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel to the Public Service Commission for the First District for its information.

The Hearing on the Motion of the Commission on the Question of Improvement in and Addition to the service of the Long Island Railroad Company, in re-spect to the Safety Precautions at the Grade Crossing at Fresh Pond Road and Sherman Street, Borough of Queens, City of New York of New York.

OPINION.

This matter was brought to the attention of the Commission by the Board of Aldermen and after examination of the premises, the Bureau of Inspection recommended that gates be operated at this point during the entire year, for the following

(1) Because a public school within three blocks of this crossing on Fresh Pond Road is about to be opened.
(2) Because by tabulations made, traffic is considerably heavier at this point than

at other roads now guarded by flagmen.

(3) Because of obstructions which prevent a view of approaching trains.

(4) Because drivers approaching this crossing from the north are unable to see

eastbound trains

eastbound trains.

The Long Island Railroad Company operates, during the summer months, from about the first of June to the early part of September, a large number of trains across Fresh Pond Road, to the various race tracks. During the winter months only four trains a day, in each direction, are operated across this road, no gateman or flagman is on duty and the gates dismounted from their pedestals. There is a sign and an alarm bell at the crossing.

The testimony of the railroad officials is to the effect that the entire cost of maintaining a flagman at this crossing during the winter months is not over \$50 a month and as they have the gates there would be no additional expense. At the end of the hearing it was stated by the railroad officials that there had been an accident at this point in which an automobile was run into, but that the accident occurred at a time when the gates were in operation and when a flagman was stationed there. It was also stated by the railroad officials that they would rather send a flagman ahead of each train operated across this crossing during the winter months than station a flagman at the road crossing. the road crossing.

While it might be less expensive for the railroad company to send its brakeman ahead of each train with a flag at this point, I believe, nevertheless, that in practice the employees would be apt to neglect this precaution and I do not favor an order of this Commission directing this means of reducing the danger. I recommend the adoption of an order directing the company to maintain a flagman at this crossing and operate the gates from May I, 1908, for a period of two years. The school mentioned in the testimony will undoubtedly be opened by the middle of September and until it appears that the Fresh Pond Road will not be much used by these school children, it will, in my opinion, be reasonable to require an expenditure of \$50 a month on the part of the railroad company. railroad company.

OPINION.

Upon February 14th, this year, the Commission adopted an order requiring the Third Avenue Railroad Company, the Dry Dock, East Broadway and Battery Railroad and the 42nd Street, Manhattanville and St. Nicholas Avenue Railway Company, or their receiver, to thoroughly inspect, overhaul and repair the cars operated upon these lines prior to May 1st, 1908. The order also provided that the companies, or their receiver, should notify the Commission daily in writing, in the form prescribed by the Commission, of the number of cars overhauled and repaired upon that day; and, further, that the companies, or their receiver, should forward daily, from and after the 1st of March, a transcript of the entries in the "run-in" book or books.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: From February 9 to February 22, inclusive, 71 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 13 at Gouverneur Hospital, 24 at Harlem Hospital, and 26 at Ford-

The Board of Aldermen on January 21, 1908, fixed the salary of Stationary Enginemen in City Departments at \$4.50 a day. The appropriation for salaries of this Department did not provide for such salaries, and it is recommended that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be asked to issue Special Revenue Bonds to cover \$366 at Bellevue, \$183 at Gouverneur, \$366 at Harlem, and \$183 at Fordham, a total

Authority is requested to have specifications prepared for floors on the balconies Harlem Hospital similar to the floors that are on the balconies at Gouverneur

at Harlem Hospital similar to the floors that are on the balcomes at Gouverneur and Fordham hospitals.

The Supervising Nurse of Gouverneur Hospital has asked to have a tiled floor laid in the office of that institution, and, as it is believed that this is desirable from a sanitary standpoint, authority is requested to have the work done.

The President of the Board of Trustees advises that dressing rooms be made at the west end of the hall in Harlem Hospital. It is recommended that specifications be prepared and estimates obtained on this work.

The Board of Health directs that additional partitions be placed in the tent used as an isolation ward at Bellevue Hospital. The changes recommended will probably cost \$320.

as an isolation ward at Bellevue Hospital. The changes recommended will probably cost \$320.

It is very desirable to have some system by which patients who are very excited can be treated by continuous baths. Estimates have been obtained for the installation of continuous baths in the male and female psychopathic wards, and authority is requested to have them installed at a cost not to exceed \$563.

As there has been an increase in the personnel of the Mills Training School, preparation must be made for additional accommodation for some extra Nurses pending completion of the Nurses' home. The General Superintendent of Training Schools has asked that an apartment at No. 200 East Twenty-seventh street be rented at \$40 a month, and that authority be granted to purchase the necessary furniture to furnish it. The rental would have to be done through the Finance Department, and it is recommended that this be done.

The Director of Laboratories has asked for an additional helper at a salary of \$20 a month, and it is recommended that one be granted.

Attention is invited to the fact that in the Departmental Estimate for 1008 the Trustees asked for funds to increase the salaries of Hospital Helpers. The Department of Finance made the special recommendation that \$7,200 be allowed for the purpose, and, in view of this, authority is requested to make the increases automatically when the Helpers complete one and two years' service, as provided by the rule of the Board of Trustees.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS FOR THE YEAR 1907.

Offices of Commissioner of Public Works, Nos. 13 to 21 Park Row, New York, February 8, 1908.

Hon. JOHN F. AHEARN, President, Borough of Manhattan:

Dear Sir—I inclose herewith a report of the Bureaus of this Department for the year 1907. As the reports of the work of the Department are set forth in detail by the various heads and the Chief Engineers of the different Bureaus, I will confine myself to making a few general recommendations which I think should be carried out at as early a date as possible.

Since my advent to this office on the 15th of last May, I have devoted my time to reorganizing, as far as possible, the Department and putting it on a basis where

its work could be done more expeditiously and effectively.

I have taken up very carefully the matter of keeping in repair the streets of this Borough, and I believe if you are successful in obtaining from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen the necessary funds for the establishment of an asphalt plant that this will go a long way towards solving the problem.

I find that the paving of asphalt streets is practically in the control of three companies. There are many subsidiary companies but they are more or less under the control of the three large companies, namely, the Barber, Sicilian and Uvalde

Asphalt Companies.

These companies are always behind in their work and it seems almost an impossibility to get them to comply promptly with the orders of this Department. I think the establishment of an asphalt plant would have a good effect, keeping the companies up to their contracts and work, as we would then be able to do the work and charge it to them if they did not make repairs when ordered by us. The plant is also needed to maintain the large number of streets where the guarantees have

I have also suggested to the Chief Engineer that he incorporate in his specifications the following: That after the forty-eight-hour notice has been served upon the asphalt companies, and in the event of their not complying with the orders, a penalty of ten dollars per day should attach for every day that the streets have not been repaired after they have received the above forty-eight-hour notice under the terms of the contracts. of the contracts.

I have also suggested that ten per cent, of the contract price be retained, in addition to the guarantee of the sureties, until the terms of guarantee of their con-

tracts have expired.

The inspection system which was established shortly after I entered upon the duties of this office has proved very satisfactory and we are now able to tell from our records just what the condition of a street is, when orders have been issued for the repair of same, and also the date of repair.

Although this inspection system was not fully in operation over the entire Borough until August of last year, the books show since starting that we have repaired nearly sixty thousand holes in the streets. If the system had been in working order earlier the result would have shown even a much larger number of holes repaired.

With the co-operation of the Police Department, and by this inspection system, we have saved this year over \$100,000 over the preceding year in the cost of fire burns after the past election.

In regard to the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, a great amount of work has been done to straighten out the records of this Bureau and bring it up to a system which can handle the purchase of supplies to the best possible advantage.

In practically every case, except where emergency demanded otherwise, figures have been taken from reputable contractors for work that has had to be performed and we are now preparing lists of the amount of supplies, as nearly as can be estimated, for the coming year, and intend to advertise for bids for these supplies and award contracts to the end that by buying in bulk lower prices may be secured for the different articles needed in running the various buildings.

In the Bureau of Sewers we have endeavored to keep the sewerage system up to as high a point of efficiency as possible, but I wish to urge upon you the necessity of obtaining funds for the reconstruction of a large portion of the sewerage system in this Borough.

The sewers, as you know, were built many years ago, and conditions have become so changed by the construction of large buildings that they are in many cases inadequate under the present conditions.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER OF THE BUREAU OF HIGHWAYS, BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN, FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEM-BER 31, 1907.

Bureau of Highways, Borough of Manhattan, January 31, 1908.

Hon. HENRY S. THOMPSON, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—I submit herewith the report of the operations of the Bureau of Highways for the year ending December 31, 1907. I assumed the duties of my present position on June 1 of that year.

The work of the Bureau has consisted in superintending the work of laying all new pavements, regulating and grading work, repairs to asphalt pavements and sidewalks, as well as all the work attendant thereto; repairs to granite pavements being under the charge of the Superintendent of Highways.

These contracts will probably be registered before work begins in the spring, so that there should be available for work, when the season opens, 10.83 miles of pavements as stated above.

On the first of the year a large number of streets were being regulated and graded. These have been nearly all completed, there remaining to be finished only six streets, which will be completed early next season.

Th work on both sections of the Riverside Drive has been carried on satisfactorily

to such an extent that the work will be completed on Section 2, Ryan & Parker, contractors, in a very short time, there being very little left to be done. The work on Section 3, John C. Rodgers, contractor, should be completed before the end of the year. This latter contract would have been finished before this had it not been for an injunction suit which delayed the work.

During the year there were served 6,936 notices on property owners for repairing sidewalks, and 4,242 permits were issued to repair same. Five hundred and fifty-seven permits were issued to builders for excavating purposes. Many complaints on account of defective sidewalks have been received from citizens, and promptly investigated and remedied.

# NEW WORK.

# Granite Block Pavement.

During the year work has been carried on upon six different contracts for repaving with granite, the most important of which were West street, from the Battery to Gansevoort street, and South street, from Whitehall street to Corlears street. Of these six, four have been completed and two remain to be completed next season. The average cost of all granite pavement for which contracts were awarded during 1907, including six inches of concrete base, was \$3.11.

This pavement must be the most desirable pavement for heavy traffic streets, and as far as economy is concerned, it would undoubtedly be the most economical for all streets; but other conditions must be taken into consideration, such as noiselessness, slipperiness, etc., so that other kinds of pavements must be used on certain streets, even if they do cost more, as the Borough of Manhattan deserves the pavement that is most desirable for the street without regard to cost.

# Sheet Asphalt Pavement.

During the season work has been carried on upon twenty-seven different contracts, all of which have been completed.

This class of pavement is deservedly popular in this Borough, there being at the present time 240.56 miles, which is considerably more than that of any other kind of pavement. This pavement requires considerable repairing under the traffic of the Borough, but on account of its smoothness, it is particularly desirable, and, for this reason, popular with the citizens.

Contracts were awarded for considerably more of this pavement, but all were not registered, and others too late to be completed. The average cost per square yard of awarded contracts for pavement, including six inches of concrete base with a fiveyear guarantee, was \$2.44.

#### Asphalt Block.

During the year work has been carried on on twenty-six contracts, twenty-four of which have been completed. The most important of the asphalt block contracts is that for repaying Seventh avenue, from One Hundredth to One Hundred and Fifty-third street. This has been completed as far north as One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, the work being delayed on account of a water main being laid in advance of the pave-

This is another form of asphalt pavement which is laid in blocks 12 inches long, 5 inches wide and 3 inches thick, the blocks being laid flatwise. It is in use to a large extent in the northern part of the Borough and is especially adapted for streets which have too heavy a grade for sheet asphalt. The blocks being made of coarser material than the sheet asphalt, the pavement is less slippery, and, for this reason, better adapted to heavy grades, and is practically as smooth as the sheet asphalt. Its cost, laid upon ½ inch of mortar cushion and 5½ inches of concrete base, with a five-year guarantee, is \$2.42.

#### Wood Block.

This is a pavement that has come into vogue in the East during the last five or six years, and has attained a great popularity on account of its noiselessness

Work has been carried on upon four contracts, all of which have been completed.

The material used has been principally long leaf yellow pine, but this material having been in so great demand for this and other purposes during the last few years, has increased rapidly in price, so that it is extremely desirable that some other wood be used, if possible. The United States Government has been experimenting with this end in view, and black gum wood has accordingly been used in a number of cities; our specifications allow either black gum or long leaf yellow pine. One street only in this Borough has been laid with the black gum, namely, State street. Washington street, in Boston, has also been paved with black gum, but neither of the pavements has been down long enough to tell by actual experience what its durability will be.

The principal objection to wood as a paving material is its slipperiness, as it undoubtedly is the most slippery of all paving materials that are used. This is true when the streets are wet or frosty, but when they are dry, under ordinary conditions, although smooth, they are not slippery.

In determining what kind of pavement shall be laid in any street, the desires of two classes of people must always be considered: the people living or doing business along the line of the street and those who use the street for traffic purposes. The former are almost unanimously in favor of wood, and the latter opposed to it, to a certain extent, on account of its slipperiness. For this reason great care must be exercised in making a decision on streets where there is heavy traffic, and it would seem that where it is deemed necessary to lay wood, under the above conditions, arrangements, should be made for sprinkling the same with sand when it is nearligible by ments should be made for sprinkling the same with sand when it is particularly

The cost of all contracts awarded for wood pavement, including 5½ inches of concrete and a mortar cushion of one-half inch for base, is \$4.05. This includes a ten-year guarantee.

The wood blocks are 3 inches wide, 3½ inches deep and 8 inches long, and treated with a mixture composed of resin and creosote oil in the proportions of 25 per cent. of resin to 75 per cent. of the creosote oil, the latter having a specific gravity the quantity of the mixture being at least 20 pounds per cubic foot. The specifications require that these blocks, after having been subjected to a temperature of 100 degrees for twenty-four hours and then immersed in water for twenty-four hours longer, shall not absorb more than 3½ per cent. of water. If the blocks are treated according to these specifications, there will be no trouble in maintaining these requirements.

The concrete used in the foundation of all pavements consists of Portland cement concrete mixed in proportion of one part cement, three of sand to six of stone.

# Regulating, Grading, Etc.

In addition to the actual paving, work has been carried on upon twenty-one contracts for regulating and grading, thirteen of which have been completed.

# REPAIRS.

# Sheet Asphalt.

At the beginning of 1907 there were 690,000 square yards of sheet asphalt out of At the beginning of 1907 there were 690,000 square yards of sheet asphalt out of guarantee, and during the year enough more expired to make a total amount out of guarantee on January 1, 1908, 1,001.892 square yards. There have been expended during the year for repairing these pavements \$145,200.82; \$29,842.42 being expended under a contract made in 1906, and the remainder on the contract made in 1907. Figuring on the entire area out of guarantee, the average cost per square yard would be 14 cents. This, of course, is not quite fair, as all of it was not maintained for the entire year; but if it were figured up accurately the cost would probably be about 18 cents per yard. Of the different streets under guarantee forty-two cost over 30 cents per square yard, or a total amount of \$48,000. per square yard, or a total amount of \$48,000.

# Asphalt Block.

There were out of guarantee on the first of January, 1907, 243,307 square yards of asphalt block pavement, and the total amount expended for repairs on these pavements \$47,118.69; \$25,782.84 being expended under a contract made in 1906, and the remainder on a contract made in 1907, but registered so late that all of the streets could not be repaired. The area of the streets repaired amounted to 165,594 square yards. making the cost per square yard 28 cents. As the worst streets were repaired first, it is probable that if the entire contract had been carried out the average cost would have been considerably less.

There have been expended therefore during the year for asphalt repairs \$192,-319.51 for actual wear and tear.

In addition to this, there have been allowed for pavements damaged by fire in 1907, approximately \$55,000, or a total of \$247,319.51. In the Budget for 1908, there have been allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment \$250,000 for maintaining asphalt pavements, including fire burns, notwithstanding the fact that during the coming year the guarantees will expire on over a million square yards of sheet asphalt alone, making the area to be maintained at the end of the year practically double what it is at the present time if none of the streets are repaved. It is manifest, therefore, that this amount is too small, unless the cost of repairs can be materially reduced. The contract price during the past year has been low, and I doubt the cost can be reduced in that direction. The only way therefore will be be rest, therefore, that this amount is too small, unless the cost of repairs can be materially reduced. The only way, therefore, will be by careful supervision over the work and the repaving of some of the worst streets. It will probably, therefore, be advisable to repave at least the forty-two streets referred to above where the cost of repairs was \$48,000. To do this work would cost not more than four times the cost of repairs; so that it would seem to be very desirable. # Openings in Pavement.

One of the great obstacles to keeping asphalt pavements in good repair is the frequent openings that are made in them by corporations and other parties for repairs and the construction of new work. This is absolutely necessary, but the Department is doing its best to keep these openings down to a minimum. While this increases the amount of work, it does not necessarily increase the cost, as the actual expense of repaving openings is paid by the parties making them. As a matter of fact, however, the openings made do increase the wear and tear on the pavement as it often deflects traffic and thus condenses it, making extra wear.

During 1907, 31,273 cuts were made in the pavements, a decrease of 1,678 over A great many of these openings were made for laying water mains, gas mains, etc. During the year 128.8 miles of streets were opened for mains and connections over 100 feet in length. Taking into consideration the mileage of the openings of less than 100 feet, it is undoubtedly true that at least one-third of the total length of the above streets were opened for some purpose or other during 1907, and of these 44.3 miles were opened for laying water mains. This seems an enormous amount, but the Department has tried in every way possible to minimize it, but with the number, as well as the difference in the character and size of the new buildings being constructed, making it necessary to lay new mains and the constant tearing up of the streets for repairing the underground structures, it does not seem possible to materially reduce it. The building operations alone, although not many in number, keep the streets torn up for a great length of time as in most cases the excavation extends to the curb, making it necessary for the street pavement to be disturbed a long time. During the year there were 137 of these operations, rendering necessary the relaying of 8,579 square yards of pavement.

#### Fire Burns.

Allusion has been made to pavements damaged by fire. Few citizens understand how much this amounts to in dollars and cents. The asphalt repair contracts provide for the repairs to all pavements damaged by fire at a cost of from \$1.75 to \$2 per square yard. During the years of 1906 and 1907 there were measured up and allowed by the Department 106,853 square yards of pavement damaged by fire. To repair this cost approximately \$200,000. Of this amount 12,632 yards were allowed in 1906 and 94,221 yards in 1907. Of the amount allowed in 1907, however, 66,643 square yards were allowed previous to May 1, and I am informed that this represents the damage done to pavements by bon fires after the election of 1906, and should properly be charged to that year, the delay in the allowance being due to some dispute as to the amounts to be allowed. So that the actual yardage damaged in 1907 proper would be 27,578. This reduction is due to the special efforts of the Borough President, yourself, the Police Department, Inspectors on the work and the engineering department all working conjointly. It must be remembered too, that the election of last fall was a comparatively unimportant one, and for that reason the enthusiasm of Young America did not reach so high a pitch as in the previous year.

The system of inspection inaugurated in May, by which the Borough is divided into six inspection sections under the charge of a section Inspector, and each section subdivided into five or six divisions as areas may require, has worked very successfully, and there is no question in my mind both that it is bound to be a success in the future and that it is the only way in which the asphalt pavements of this Borough can be kept in repair. The streets are patrolled daily by the Division Inspectors, who report to the Chief Inspectors, and they in turn, to the engineering department, so that an exact condition of the streets is known at all times. While this has worked well during the past season, it must work better in the future, as the men become more accustomed to their duties and the small obstacles in the way of its operation have been removed.

#### Chemical Laboratory.

I quote herewith from the report of the Chemist regarding work performed by him.

"The number of samples which were submitted with bids reached a total of 447. The number of samples which were taken from the work during construction by our own Inspectors or agents amounted to 1,402. Analyses of these samples were made in such numbers and in such a manner that at all times adequate control was had of the quality of the materials delivered to the line of work.

"It can be stated in general that the asphalt wearing surfaces as well as the asphalt blocks have in almost every instance conformed to the requirements of our specifications. Where this was not the case, steps were taken to correct the error or the irregularity.

"The plants of the various asphalt companies have been visited and inspected from time to time, and samples of refined asphalt, asphaltic cement, residuum oil, topping, sand and mineral dust have been taken personally and analyzed.

"In regard to wood blocks, it is exceedingly gratifying to note the great improvement in the quality of the shipments of the treated blocks, since the new mode of inspection at the plant has been instituted. There is every reason for believing that from now on we shall be able to obtain blocks which have been uniformly well impregnated and which will conform to our requirements in every respect.

"In view that the creosote oil used for preserving timber should be of a heavy rather than of a light description, and that timber impregnated with a creosote oil of specific gravity of not less than 1.12 is water resistant, and therefore decay resistant to a high degree, has been amply borne out by numerous tests made during the past year.

"In addition to our routine work, experimental work has been carried on in connection with bitumen from various sources, as also with creosote oils of various kinds in relation to their adaptability for impregnating timber.

"Further tests with our impact machine have confirmed our former results, namely, that an asphaltic coment made from an asphalt obtained from the distillation of asphaltic oils shows far less resistance to an impact blow than does a cement made from Maracaibo, Trinidad or Bermudez asphalt. Moreover, that cements made from Maracaibo, Trinidad, Bermudez and oil asphalts resist impact blows best in the order named.

"During the past year samples of a specially refined Texas oil asphalt have been received, which contain only a minute amount of bitumen insoluble in carbon tetrachloride, which promise to compare more favorably in their physical properties with the natural asphalts. This matter is still under investigation.

"Numerous reports relative to the effect of prolonged and high heat in treated and untreated wood blocks and tests on various kinds of creosote oil are in your possession.

"In addition to our other work, specifications for soap powder and disinfectants have been drawn up for the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices and analyses of lubricating oils, bearing metals, soap powders and disinfectants have been made for said Bureau."

Of the new sewers added to the Borough's mileage were:

Dear Sir-Agreeable to instructions, I beg to transmit herewith a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Sewers for the year 1907. You will find accompanying this report, tables showing the work classified, together with the cost thereof.

From these tables it will be seen that there were constructed during the year 6.09 miles of sewers and 80 receiving basins, as follows:

Of the receiving basins, 68 were new and 12 were reconstructions. From the above it will be seen that 4.20 miles of sewers and 68 basins were added to the Borough's system, making a total of 517.97 miles of sewers and 6,271 receiving basins.

The work of the Bureau as indicated by the preceding statements differs from that of former years mainly by the comparatively large number of sewers built by private parties (see Statement No. 11), who found it to their interest to do work that ordinarily would have been done by the City, on account of the long delays in getting the preliminary authorizations through the various Boards.

In Statement No. 3 will be found a list of sewers petitioned for by property owners, and, after a proper examination, approved by this Bureau. These are now progressing slowly through the various stages required by the laws, and will, no doubt, be ultimately authorized and built.

In Statement No. 1 will be found a list of plans made. These are for work petitioned for and authorized by the various Boards. All of these can be prepared for letting contracts at very short notice, but have been withheld from advertisement on the notice of the Mayor and Comptroller, that the City's financial condition would not permit the assumption of further liabilities. Under such conditions it requires a special appeal to the financial officers, showing the urgent necessity of the work to induce them to agree to the expenditure. Such appeals have been effective in other boroughs, I am told, and I recommend that their example be followed with a view of putting under contract some very necessary works. Long delays in getting authority to proceed to build would probably result in interested property owners asking for private permits. Generally speaking, I think private construction should be discouraged. be discouraged.

For, when such permits are granted, although the conditions imposed, so far as possible, safeguard the City's interest, in the nature of such work, it does not in all instances conform with the standard conditions required by the City, and when the work is completed and paved over, only flagrant deficiencies would justify the tearing up and rebuilding of the same. In this way the City often becomes charged to maintain sewers which may be a source of future trouble.

Another source of variations from the standards long adopted by the City are the great changes in the system proposed by the building of the various subways, some of which are in my opinion of such a doubtful character, that I have in my previous reports requested the appointment of some acknowledged expert to report on them.

In response to these requests, Mr. Rudolph Herring was appointed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to report on these changes to the sewer system. When the construction of the subways was laid aside in consequence of the City's financial condition, Mr. Herring's investigations were suspended to be taken up again when the subway work is again under way, at which time his investigations will lead, I hope, to a thorough inquiry into the sewer system as a whole, so that we can determine whether the time has not come for a radical departure from the method now employed in carrying off the city's wastes.

The many changes already made by the subway work, with the enormous number still to be made, amounting, for instance in the case of the Lexington avenue route alone, to the rebuilding of about 16 miles of sewers, including a number of inverted syphons, the lower arm of which is more than 30 feet below mean high water. Such syphons are, so far as I know, something new, and even if they work under ordinary conditions, any stoppage in them would involve serious and perhaps disastrous consequences, while the removal of an obstruction at such a depth would be a slow and expensive matter.

and expensive matter.

The maintenance of a sewer system under such conditions would be uncertain, and for that reason unsafe, and would in all events compel a most careful and perpetual inspection with dependence for its working on a subordinate's judgment and

care. sewer system which is not reliable and practically automatic under all As a sewer system which is not related and practically activated and conditions is not a good system, and the question at once arises, will not these and the many other proposed changes compel the adoption of some other system, either that of pumping from reservoirs or the separation of the storm water from the house sewage, or some other method that will not be subject to frequent accidents or the dependence on the care of individuals.

The tendency to fill the street below the surface with structures is on the increase, and if the sewers are to be effectively maintained, action should at once be taken for the best permanent system which should not be subject to the necessities and convenience of every corporation or individual who desires to put something underground.

It was to this end that my request for expert investigation was made, and I again urge that provision be made for its continuance to a definite conclusion.

This Borough is now almost completely sewered, with the exception of a part of the extreme northwest end of the island, where the street system has not been finally determined. The last large tract where the system is now nearing completion being the old Dyckman property, where a little work is still to be done. In other parts of the city there are still a considerable number of blocks which for various reasons, were not sewered, because such sewers were unnecessary at the time, owing to the arrangement of the buildings thereon. Many of these are now being altered, and it will be paceasary to build sewers to accommodate them.

while the statement that the Borough is almost completely sewered is true, it is equally true that many of the sewers are old and in very bad condition, and were built without system and under conditions so different from those existing to-day, that a comparison is impossible.

The correction of these evils in the system cannot be begun too soon, and means for carrying them out should be provided.

By far, the most of the money provided for "reconstruction" during the last year, was used for the rebuilding of the sewers near the water-front, made necessary by the dock improvements like that at Chelsea and at West Forty-second street, and practically none of it was used for any general improvement of the system.

In addition to the contracts above enumerated, requisitions were drawn to the number of 1,814, the estimated cost of which is about \$80,000.

The Bureau has 45 buildings owned by the City, and 23 offices, including Departments, Bureaus, Courtrooms, etc., leased in various buildings, under its jurisdiction, which must also be supplied with supplies and repairs as required during the year. This incldes all of the Courts and Justices' Chambers in the Borough of Manhattan. In order to carry out the business of the Bureau, it requires a working force of over 800 employees.

over 800 employees.

The popularity of the permanent Baths has been established in this City and they appear to be a growing institution that will result in great benefit to the health and enjoyment of the community. The establishment of the pool baths seems to have passed the experimental stage and they are now regarded as indispensable to the bath system. Several important and largely attended exhibitions of aquatic sports have been held in the two new pool baths in this City, at which the greatest exponents in the art of swimming have appeared and added much to the popularity of the baths with the public. These institutions are not only useful to the community, from a physical standpoint, but the buildings themselves have been constructed with a view of improving the architectural features of the public buildings and have been approved in every instance by the Art Commission. Four additional baths are under construction, and when these are completed it will give the City twelve permanent bath buildings. In relation to the maintenance of these buildings, I would earnestly recommend that the Chief Attendants be increased from \$2.50 per diem to at least \$3.50, and that the Assistant to the Chief Attendant receive \$3 per diem. These men are responsible for the care and maintenance of the buildings and supervise the work of the other attendants, and keep all of the records in connection with the operation of the bath, and it will readily be perceived that their compensation is in no way adequate to the duties performed.

In addition to the amount of work performed under open orders and contracts, the

In addition to the amount of work performed under open orders and contracts, the Bureau has maintained a force of carpenters, roofers, electricians, painters, etc., who have been continuously employed in keeping public buildings in proper condition.

The usual quarterly reports heretofore submitted have contained detailed statements of the character of the work performed by the Bureau.

#### REPORT OF THE ENGINEER OF STREET OPENINGS.

Hon. HENRY S. THOMPSON, Commissioner of Public Works:

The Bureau of Buildings, No. 220 Fourth Avenue, New York City, January 14, 1908.

Hon. JOHN F. AHEARN, President of the Borough of Manhattan:

Dear Sir-I have the honor herewith to submit my report of the operations of this Bureau for the quarter and year ended December 31, 1907.

# Theatres.

The supervision of the theatres, music, halls, etc., by the regular Theatre Inspectors, was continued; and it would be well to state that the aforesaid general inspections by the regular Theatre Inspectors have resulted in keeping the theatres in a safe condition. In many, if not nearly all of the theatres, fire drills and the testing of fire, smoke and panic preventing devices are made at frequent intervals. However, it is necessary to maintain a close watch over places of public assembly, particularly in regard to the following important points:

1. That the main and emergency exits are free and unobstructed.
2. That there is no storage or rubbish in any part of the building or courts.
3. That the asbestos curtain and stage skylights are in working order and will operate from available points at the stage level.
4. That all fire doors are in perfect working order and ready for instant use.
5. That the woodwork, scenery, etc., are thoroughly fireproofed; together with other details, all of which require constant inspection.

# Fireproof Plaster and Block Partitions.

Tests of plaster and composition block partitions, to determine their fireproof qualities, have been made under the supervision of this division, and according to its regulations. Approvals have been issued to the following concerns after passing the prescribed tests, in addition to those mentioned in the Annual Report for 1905:

# Additional Regulations for Tests of Fireproof Partitions.

In addition to the information contained in the Annual Report for 1905, relative to the testing of fireproof partitions, the following conditions must also be complied with before an approval will be granted:

(a) A brand mark for identification must be impressed on or otherwise attached

to the material.

(b) A plant for the production of the material must be in full operation when the official test is made.
(c) The name of the firm or corporation, and the responsible officers, must be placed on file with the Superintendent of Buildings, and changes in same promptly

placed on the with the Supermedia.

(d) The ultimate compressive strength of partition blocks, when tested dry, must average not less than one hundred and seventy-five (175) pounds per square inch, and must not fall below one hundred and fifty (150).

(e) The ultimate compressive strength, when tested wet, must average not less than the strength of partition blocks, when tested dry, must average not less than the strength of partition blocks, when tested dry, must average not less than one hundred and seventy-five (175) pounds per square inch, and must not fall below unnet (90).

(f) The percentage of absorption (being the weight of water absorbed divided by the weight of the dry sample) must not average higher than forty-five per centum (45%), and must not exceed fifty per centum (50%) in any case.

(g) The tests must be repeated at any time when called for, on sample selected from the open market, where, in the opinion of the Superintendent of Buildings, there is any doubt as to whether or not the product is up to the standard of these regulations

(h) In case the results of these tests made under this condition (g) should show that the standard established by these regulations is not maintained, the approval of this Bureau will be at once suspended or revoked.

(i) Any proposed change in, or variation from, the preceding requirements must be submitted to the Superintendent of Buildings, in writing, and receive his written consent.

#### Tests of Sand-Lime Brick.

In addition to those mentioned in the Annual Report for 1905, tests were made on samples of sand-lime brick proposed for use in this Borough, and the product of the following plants, having complied with the regulations, have been approved for use in the Borough of Manhattan:

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
