Sept. 18, and that the budget was still under consideration.

Dr. Brannan referred to the fact that the sub-committee of the Board of Estimate in considering the departmental estimate for 1919 refused to allow any new and additional places or increases in salaries of employees receiving over \$1,800 a year. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to make appeals to the Board of Estimate on such requests set forth in the departmental estimate for 1919 as originally presented to the Board of Estimate.

Dr. Brannan referred to a letter under date of September 12th from the Mayor, directing that no positions be filled, no increases in salaries allowed or transfer of funds for personal or other service until after the adoption of the budget. The General Medical Superintendent was instructed to comply with this request.

Commissioner Coler referred to a report he made to the Board of Estimate under date of August 14 regarding the Trustees' request for permission to use as much of the \$40,000 as may be necessary from the corporate stock appropriation for the roof ward of Fordham Hospital for the construction of five wooden buildings to be used for wards. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to amend the request to the Board of Estimate upon the receipt of a report of the action taken by the Board of Estimate on the subject.

A letter, dated Sept. 13, was presented from Joseph H. Freedlander reporting that the contract of Charles J. Daly for the installation of the new areas and ash hoist to the power house at Harlem Hospital is not finished and that no attempt has been made by the contractor to complete the work and also recommending that the contract be declared abandoned, which recommendation was approved by the Inspector of Construction of the department. After consideration and discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, on the recommendation of the Building Committee to declare the contract abandoned, and to call upon the surety, the Globe Indemnity Company, to complete the work.

The Building Committee presented a certificate of overtime, completion and acceptance on the work of the Eclipse Lighting Company for the installation of lighting fixtures in the building for the Out Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, To adopt the above certificate of completion, acceptance and determination pursuant to clause "R" of the contract of the Eclipse Light Company, and that the same be attached to and be made a part of the certificate of acceptance of the work on this contract to be filed in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York.

A report from the Auditor's Office, dated Sept. 19, setting forth the anticipated deficits in the appropriation of the department, amounting to \$124,500, particularly in the appropriation for fuel supplies was presented as follows:

2072, Fuel Supplies, \$75,000; 2078, Motor Vehicle Supplies, \$1,500; 2079, General Plant Supplies, \$7,000; 2082, Medical and Surgical Supplies, \$2,000; 2084, Wearing Apparel, \$3,500; 2086, Materials, \$2,000; 2087a, Repairs, Bellevue, \$8,500; 2087b, Repairs, Harlem, \$2,300; 2087c, Repairs, Gouverneur, \$1,000; 2087d, Repairs, Fordham, \$1,200; 2087f, Repairs, Miscellaneous, \$1,000; total, \$105,000.

After consideration it was moved, seconded and carried to authorize a request to the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate for an issue of special revenue bonds or the transfer of funds from appropriations of other City departments which may be available.

COMMUNICATIONS.

Under date of Sept. 13, F. R. Andrews, Chief of Survey Party, United States Engineer's Office, asked for permission to construct a small sectional house on the dock at the foot of East 28th st., which house is to be used, for a month as a drafting room in connection with a survey of the river in the vicinity of Bellevue Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this request was approved.

A letter, dated Sept. 16, was presented from George D. Stewart, asking permission to have Dr. Fluhrer, Consulting Physician at Bellevue Hospital, do some active work in the hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to inform Dr. Stewart that the Trustees gladly accept as much of Dr. Fluhrer's services as he is willing to give the hospital, Dr. Stewart to make the ar-

rangements necessary for Dr. Fluhrer to come on duty.

Reference was made to a letter received from the Secretary to the Mayor, under date of Sept. 18, requesting Dr. Brannan to serve on a committee of city and county officials to promote the sale of Liberty Loan bonds among city and county employees, and also to a letter of the same date setting forth that a Liberty Loan parade will be held in the City on October 12th, in which city and county employees are asked to participate. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to have Bellevue and Allied Hospitals take part in the parade with as large a delegation as possible, and Dr. Brannan, the President of the Board was requested to take charge of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals section.

Reference was made to the fact that arrangements were being made in the department to conduct a drive among employees for the sale of the Fourth Liberty Loan bonds.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was moved, seconded and carried.
