

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Report for the Quarter ending December 31, 1891.

CITY OF NEW YORK-DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS, Nos. 49 AND 51 CHAMBERS STREET, January 1, 1892.

SIR—Pursuant to the requirements of section 49 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, as amended by chapter 62 of the Laws of 1887, the Department of Public Parks hereby submits the following statement of its transactions during the three months ending December 31, 1891.

During the period named much attention has been given the matter of the proposed new bridge over Harlem river at One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, to take the place of old McComb's Dam Bridge, and to connect with the viaduct now building on said street. Proposals for constructing the bridge proper were advertised for and received early in October. It was deemed best, after careful consideration, that the bridge, with the approaches, should be built under one contract; and, accordingly, the bids were rejected and plans and specifications for the entire work were prepared, and after receiving the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the work will be again advertised. Steps are also being taken to commence proceedings for acquiring the lands required for the Jerome avenue approachs.

Maps showing the lands required for approaches, which it is proposed to build to the footways of the bridge of the New York and Northern Railroad Company over Harlem river at Eighth avenue, have been prepared and forwarded to the Board of Street Opening and Improvement at the request of that Board.

The bridge leading to City Island from Pelham Bay Park, which is owned partly by this City and partly by the County of Westchester, has required and received attention. A proposition to the effect that this Department will contribute \$800 for repairs and maintenance for the year 1892, provided the said county undertook the work of maintenance, has been made to the Supervisors of Westchester but not accepted by them.

Litigation between the City and the Suburban Railroad Company has resulted in a judgment of the Court of Appeals maintaining the claim of the Suburban Company, that it has the right to construct its road through St. Mary's and Bronx Parks. This result is to be deplored, as the beauty of Bronx Park and St. Mary's Park will be in a great measure destroyed, but on the other hand, access to these parks will be greatly facilitated. A bill will be introduced providing for the change of such route.

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The matter of the application of L. J. Callanan and others, requesting the removal of the elevated railway from the Battery Park, has been considered in connection with the testimony taken at the several hearings and denied. A statement of the reasons for the denial of the application has been placed on the records of the Department.

The plans and conclusions of the Rapid Transit Commission, as set forth in a report of the Commission made to the Common Council, have been approved by this Department and its consent given to the construction of a railroad thereunder, pursuant to the provisions of section 5 of chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891.

At the request of the Washington Memorial Arch Committee, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has been asked to include in the estimate for the year 1892 the sum of \$2,500, to be used for placing granite-posts in the plaza surrounding the Washington Arch in Washington Square.

A request has also been made of said Board to authorize the issue of bonds to the amount of \$10,000, for payment of a bill of Alfred P. Boller for that sum on account of professional services in the preparation of surveys, plans, estimates, specifications, etc., for a bridge over Harlem river at One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, as provided by chapter 207 of the Laws of 1890.

been given to Charles Buck & Co.

The use of the second floor of the Arsenal Building has been given the Teachers' Association for a period of 30 days for an exhibition of geographical appliances, provided no entrance fee be

The Naval Reserve Battalion has received permission to use Castle Garden until such time as it is definitely determined as to what its permanent use is to be, upon the understanding that the floor is to made safe by the Battalion, and the Department is to be held harmless from all liability for damages of any kind.

GARDENING WORK.

The Gardening force has been engaged in caring for the flower beds and shrubbery on the

parks.

The bedding plants were taken up and removed to the greenhouse for propagation from

The beds were manured and ninety thousand tulip bulbs were planted for the early spring

The force has also been engaged in pruning and caring for the trees and shrubs.

The usual work of propagating and preparing plants for spring bedding has gone forward at the greenhouses at One Hundred and Second street and Fifth avenue in the Central Park.

MAINTENANCE WORK.

The general maintenance work on the park has consisted of-Cleaning, watering and rolling of the drives, also the cleaning and watering of the Transverse Roads, Fifth avenue, West Seventy-second street and the bridle-paths.

The sweeping of the walks and raking leaves off the lawns.

The cleaning of the road and walk basins and hauling of refuse to the dump.

Cleaning shores of the three lakes in Central Park.

Manure was hauled daily from the Menagerie, and the material was also hauled from the yard Seventy-ninth street and Eighth avenue for the erection of the Skate Building on Large Lake,

at Seventy-ninth street and Eighth avenue for the erection of the Skate Building on Large Lake, and also for the building on the Harlem Mere.

The Fourth Avenue, Park Avenue, East River Park and Manhattan Square received attention and were kept as clean as possible, considering the force and demands of other places.

The playing of games, such as tennis and croquet, continued on the park until Thanksgiving. At Mount Morris Park the usual maintenance work was carried on, such as cleaning of the walks and lawns and repairing washout on the side-hill.

The cottages on the Central and City Parks were kept open in charge of Attendants from 8 A. M. to 5 P. M.

The small City Parks, such as Abingdon Square, Jackson Square and Christopher Street Park, were closed at 5 P. M.

At Riverside Park the force was engaged in the general maintenance work of cleaning and watering the drive and bridle-path, cleaning lawns and gutters, repairing curb and gutters, and flagged walks.

Manure was hauled and spread on the grass plots.

The washouts on side-hills were also repaired.

At Morningside Park the force has been engaged in cleaning basins and walks and repairing

washouts.

The force from this park were detailed for a part of the time in spreading manure on the Ball Ground, First Division, Central Park, on the Green, Second Division, Central Park, on the Tennis Grounds, Fifth and Sixth Divisions, Central Park.

On the lower City Parks the usual maintenance work has been attended to—walks cleaned and leaves raked off the lawns.

The Carpenter force has been engaged in general repairing, the main items of which were—Repairs on 27 pieces of rolling stock. This work consisted of putting in new spokes, bottoms, etc.

97 settees and 65 signs were repaired for the Central and City Parks.
At the Ladies' Cottage, Madison Square, the partitions were repaired and closets generally

About 2,000 running feet of new rail fence was erected at Mount Morris Park.

At the Eighty-fifth Street Stables the floors and stalls were extensively repaired.

At the Skate Building on Large Lake platform was erected outside the building, shelving and counter set and water-closets built.

At the Harlem Mere a platform was built on the outside of the Skate Building.

The force of painters has been engaged in the following miscellaneous work:

Painted, two coats, 5 pieces of rolling stock, also repairs on 18 other pieces.

Painted repairs at the following buildings: Shops, Arsenal, Harlem river bridges and 3 cottages on the Central Park.

135 lights of glass were put in the cottages and buildings on the Central and City Parks.

At the paint shop there were painted 200 settee slats, 75 spare truck-wheels, 28 settees, 34 lamps and 38 signs.

The Mason force has been engaged chiefly as follows:

At Mount Morris Park laid 1,500 feet of cement walk, rebuilt 1 receiving-basin and cut and set 3 blue-stone steps.

On Central Park rebuilt 12 brick piers and pointed 200 feet of retaining wall at McGown's Pass Tavern, also repaired 8 neighboring walk basins.

At Eighty-fifth Street Stables relaid 50 square yards of pavement, also cut and set gramte

manhole-head in Eighty-fifth Street Transverse Road.

Built furnace at Skate Building, Large Lake, and laid 50 feet of 6-inch pipe.

On the City Parks, built 6 new basins and repaired 37 old ones, also repaired flagging at Cooper Park and Madison Square. The Plumbing force has been engaged in repairing bursts in water-mains and general repairs

of the plumbing work of the cottages and terminals on the Central and City Parks, also in the repair of the hydrants and fountains.

The Mechanical force, not included in the above, has been engaged as follows:

Harness-makers in repairs to harness and making of new harness.

Steam Engineers in attendance on boilers at the Arsenal, Eighty-fifth street shops.

The force of Engineers, Bridgetenders and others on the Harlem River Bridges have been engaged in the operation of these bridges, which require attention both day and night.

The force at the stables at Eighty-fifth street has been engaged in the care, etc., of the main-

tenance and driving horses stabled there.

The Horseshoers have been attentive to the necessary shoeing of these horses.

CONSTRUCTION WORK.

CENTRAL PARK.

Regulating, grading and improving the public place or plaza at Fifth avenue and One Hundred and Tenth street. A contract for this work was executed June 24. The contractor was notified to commence work on July 6, and it was fully completed November 16.

The amount of work done during this quarter was:

849 cubic yards of filling placed in embankment.
199 cubic yards of garden mould placed in tree plots.
189 lineal feet of straight 6-inch curb furnished and set.
221 lineal feet of curved 6-inch curb furnished and set.

11,817 square feet of pavement of concrete and mortar of Portland cement for walks laid.
677 square yards of new granite-block pavement laid.
39 square yards of old granite-block pavement relaid.
2,422 square feet of new bridge-stone furnished and laid.
87 square feet of old bridge-stone relaid.

136 cubic yards of concrete in place.

Regulating and Grading for Entrance at One Hundred and Sixth Street and Central Park, West, and about 150 feet of Driveway connecting same with the West Drive in Central Park.

10, and is still in progress.

Repaving and Resurfacing the Macadamized Roadway of a Certain Portion of the Plaza at Fifty-ninth Street and Fifth Avenue, and the "Circle" at Fifty-ninth Street and Eighth Avenue.

This work was done under contract dated October 5, was commenced October 8, and completed

The quantities of work done are:
292 square yards of new granite-block pavement furnished and laid.
12,064 square yards of macadamized roadway repaired and resurfaced.

MORNINGSIDE PARK.

Erection of Granite and Blue-stone Steps, Platforms, etc., etc., Required on Morningside Park, at the three Bays and three Entrances Adjoining the Avenue on the Westerly Side of the Park, and the Entrance at One Hundrea and Touth Street and Manhattan Avenue.

MOUNT MORRIS PARK

RIVERSIDE PARK.

This work was done under contract, dated October 10, was commenced October 12 and fully completed on November 28.

The quantity of work done is:

33.393 square feet of asphalt pavement laid with concrete base.

CITY PARKS-FOURTH AVENUE PARKS.

The Construction of Mason and Granite Work for Seven Parks in Park Avenue, between Sixtieth and Sixty-seventh Streets.

A contract for this work was executed on September 11, work was commenced October 13, and is now completed.

Repairing and Repaving with Rock Asphalt the Walks within the City Parks, other than Central Park.

The contract for this work was executed July 14, work was commenced on July 22, and was

fully completed October 12.

The work done during the quarter consisted of the clearing up and removal of the surplus material, rubbish, etc., from the site of the work.

HARLEM RIVER BRIDGES-MADISON AVENUE BRIDGE.

The special repairs made during the quarter consisted of the taking up and lowering of 391 lineal feet of water-pipe, supplying this bridge.

THIRD AVENUE AND MCCOMB'S DAM BRIDGES,

No special repairs have been made during the quarter.

PELHAM BAY AND CITY ISLAND DRIDGES.

The work done on these bridges during the quarter consisted of the placing of new wheels under the draw of the City Island Bridge.

Fourth—That, our supplemental or amended report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, at a Special Term thereof, to be held at the Chambers thereof, in the County Court house, in the City of New York, on the seventeenth day of August, 1892, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.
