On motion, tabled: From the Wholesale Lumber Dealers of the west side—Requesting the Board to erect a Pier at

the foot of West Twenty-third street.

From H. C. F. Koch & Company—Renewing their application of June 2, 1892, for the removal of the dump of the Department of Street Cleaning from One Hundred and Twenty-ninth to One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, North river.

From the Cedar Hill Ice Company—Requesting a berth at the bulkhead south of the Pier foot of Little West Twelfth street, with permission to erect a platform 110 feet long and 12 feet wide, and to locate thereat scales and weigh-office.



The 793 deaths represent a death-rate of 22.15, against 24.15 for the previous week and 27.65 for the corresponding week of 1892.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively 113, 82, 187, 9, 29 and 9, against 128, 76, 192, 7, 33 and 4 for the previous week, a total of 429 against 440. Diphtheria increased slightly in the Tenth, Twelfth, Thirteenth and Nineteenth Wards, while there was a marked decrease in the Eighth, Seventeenth, Eighteenth and Twentieth Wards. The increase of measles was most noticeable in the Eleventh, Seventeenth and Nineteenth Wards, the decrease being chiefly in the Twenty-first and Twenty-second Wards. Scarlet fever increased in the Ninth, F.fleenth, Seventeenth and Twenty-first Wards and decreased chiefly in the Eleventh, Twentieth and Twenty-second Wards. Typhus fever decreased only slightly, owing to an outbreak in the Workhouse on Blackwell's Island, whence 11 cases were reported. Five of the 9 cases of small-pox were in the Twenty-third Ward.
