### WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU

During the Quarter ending June 30, 1899.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health; with the execution of the orders of the Board; with the care of contagious diseases; with the inspection of foods and offensive trades; with the inspection of mercantile establishments and issuance of employment certificates; with the pathological, bacteriological and chemical research and investigations, and with the inspection of scholars attending the public, parochial and private schools.

The number of inspections and reinspections made was 537,946 classified as follows:

The number of complaints received from citizens was 8,212, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instructions and authority of the Board, granted 608 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers of the Health Officer of the Port; and 4,015 miscellaneous permits, under the Sanitary Code.

## OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY--NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the quarter ending June 30, 1899, the number of notices issued by the Board was 14,915. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 355, Laws of 1873.

The subjects of the notices of the Board above referred to are as follows:

Air-shafts cleaned, disinfected, graded, paved, connected with sewer.

 Cellars cleaned, made water-tight, cemented, connected with sewer, ceilings plastered, doors repaired.  
 Cellars vacated as places of living or sleeping.  
 Cesspools disinfected, emptied, cleaned, filled, constructed, repaired or covered.  
 Chimneys repaired, extended, cleaned or obstructions removed.  
 Cisterns disinfected, emptied, cleaned or covered or provided.  
 Clothes-poles reset.  
 Coops cleaned, disinfected or removed.  
 Cows removed.  
 Dogs removed.  
 Drains cleaned, constructed, covered, repaired, removed, obstructions in removed, or connected with sewer.  
 Excavations cleaned, repaired, relaid, graded, or connected with sewer.  
 Fences repaired or constructed.  
 Fire-escapes cleaned or obstructions removed.  
 Fixtures trapped and waste-pipes therefrom connected on outlet side of water-closet traps.  
 Flashings provided over woodwork or sinks.  
 Floors cleaned, repaired, relaid, graded, cemented or connected with sewer.  
 Fowls removed.  
 Gas-mains and pipes repaired, and gas provided in dark halls and rooms.  
 Garbage and ash receptacles provided, removed, cleaned and disinfected.  
 Gutters (house or street) provided, repaired, cleaned, disinfected, obstructions in removed, connected with street sewer, street gutter, or cesspool.  
 Halls cleaned and filthy or defective floor coverings removed.  
 House drains provided with running traps and fresh-air inlets.  
 Hydrants repaired, constructed or removed.  
 Housekeepers provided for tenements.  
 Ice-boxes connected with properly trapped, water-supplied, open sinks.  
 Joints closed or calked with lead.  
 Leaders repaired, provided, extended, adjusted, connected with sewer, street, gutter, or privy vault.

 Lots (vacant) cleaned, disinfected, inclosed, filled, graded, connected with sewer or street gutters.

Minutes of meeting of November 21, 23 and 24, 1899, were read and approved.  
The following communications were received and placed on file :  
From McCarty & Baldwin, Attorneys, dated November 15, 1899, stating that none of the claims filed by said firm in the matter of the regulating and grading Brook avenue had been filed with the Change of Grade Commission.

From the Department of Finance, dated November 24, 1899, calling attention to the removal of the different auditing bureaus from the several boroughs to the Manhattan office.

The following assessment lists, having been duly advertised and no objections received, were declared confirmed and ordered sent to the Comptroller for entry and collection :



Grading and paving Forty-seventh street, from Fifth to Sixth avenue, with cobblestones.  
Grading and paving Fifty-fifth street, from Fifth to Sixth avenue, with cobblestones.  
Grading and paving Fifty-third street, from Fifth to Sixth avenue, with cobblestones.  
Grading and paving Forty-fourth street, from Fifth to Sixth avenue, with cobblestones.  
Grading and paving Fifty-second street, from Fifth to Sixth avenue, with cobblestones.  
Grading and paving Sixth avenue, from Thirty-ninth street to Forty-first street, with Belgian blocks.

Sewers in Kingston avenue, from St. John's place to Eastern parkway; in Albany avenue, between Eastern parkway and Union street; in DeGraw street, between Kingston and Albany avenues; in Eastern parkway, north and south sides, between Kingston and Albany avenues, and in Eastern parkway, north and south sides, to summits westerly from Kingston avenue.

Repaving South Elliott place, from Atlantic avenue to Hanson place, with asphalt pavement.  
Grading Forty-third street, from Fifth avenue to old city line (excepting between Fifth and Seventh avenues).

Objections were filed to the assessment for regulating and grading Tremont avenue, from the New York and Harlem Railroad, by Charles V. Gabriel, John J. Brady, Bowers & Sands, Charles P. Hallack, Clarence C. Ferris, Robert L. Luce, T. H. Baldwin and T. S. Bassford, Attorneys, and at the request of counsel hearing was adjourned until December 5, 1899, at 11 A. M.

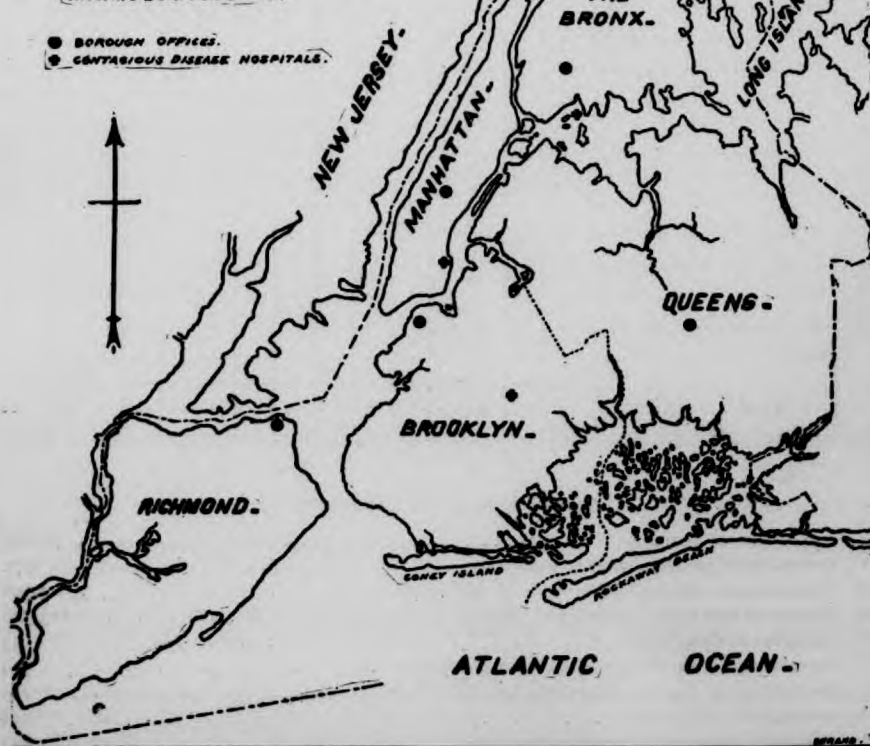

## BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

NEW YORK, November 24, 1899.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 11 o'clock A. M., at the office of the Mayor.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General McCoskry Butt.

The minutes of the meeting held November 10, 1899, were read and adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General McCoskry Butt.

Mr. Ellis, representing the Comptroller, appeared, and in response to the advertisements in the CITY RECORD, and in the five corporation newspapers in the Borough of Brooklyn, dated October 11, 1899, the following bids were received for materials and work in furnishing improvements and alteration to the rifle range in the Fourteenth Regiment Armory Building, Borough of Brooklyn, and to the Seventy-first Regiment Armory Building, Borough of Manhattan, viz.:

Kelly & Kelley, No. 220 Broadway, Manhattan.....	\$7,498 00
Charles Hart, Fourth avenue, corner Degraw street, Brooklyn.....	6,954 00
P. K. Lantry, No. 206 East Fiftieth street, Manhattan.....	10,324 00

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered the following: Resolved, That the bid of Charles Hart, Fourth avenue, corner of Degraw street, Borough of Brooklyn, for an alteration and improvement to the rifle range in the Fourteenth Regiment Armory Building, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and an alteration to the Seventy-first Regiment Armory Building, in the Borough of Manhattan, amounting to six thousand nine hundred and fifty-four dollars (\$6,954), be accepted as being the lowest for said work, and that the same be submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their concurrence and to the Comptroller for his approval of the sureties thereon, and when so approved the Chairman of this Board be authorized to execute the contract on behalf of this Board.

Which was adopted by the following vote: Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General McCoskry Butt.

A communication was received from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, notifying the Board of the adoption of resolutions, concurring in the alterations and improvements to the rifle range in the Fourteenth Regiment Armory Building, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and in an alteration to the Seventy-first Regiment Armory Building, in the Borough of Manhattan; also concurring in the payment of ninety-two dollars and twenty-five cents to Wyckoff, Seamans & Benedict. Ordered filed.

A communication was received from the Deputy Comptroller, notifying the Board that the sum of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) had been deposited in the City Treasury to the credit of the Armory Board. Ordered filed.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, in relation to quarters for the Second Naval Battalion, and recommending a site along the New York Bay front, below Sixty-fifth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, as a suitable location for the erection of an armory for that organization.

A communication was also received from the Secretary of the Board of Education, stating that the old Thirteenth Regiment Armory Building, which had been suggested as a suitable place for winter drills for that organization, was at present occupied for school purposes, and that they were therefore unable to comply with the request.

On motion of the Mayor it was resolved that the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies continue his efforts in finding a suitable location.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, stating that the Twelfth Regiment Armory roof was in such a bad condition that it was useless to try to repair it, and recommended that a roof similar to those on the Ninth and Twenty-second Regiment Armories be furnished, and offered the following:

Resolved, That the application for an alteration and improvement to the roof of the Twelfth Regiment Armory Building be approved, and that the same is hereby authorized; that plans and specifications be prepared and that the sum of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) is hereby deemed necessary and appropriated for said work, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be respectfully requested to concur in the same; that the Secretary be directed to have the contract and specifications printed, and when approved by the Corporation Counsel as to form, insert advertisements in the CITY RECORD, inviting proposals for doing said work.

Which was adopted by the following vote: Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General McCoskry Butt.

A communication was received from W. J. K. Kenny, transmitting bills for advertising the proposals for the Fourteenth Regiment armory building, etc., in the "Daily Eagle," "Daily Times," "Daily Citizen," "Standard Union" and "Freie Presse," amounting to the sum of two hundred and twenty-two dollars (\$222). The Mayor stated that in his opinion these bills should be paid from the appropriation made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for that purpose, and offered a resolution that the Corporation Counsel be requested to give his opinion as to whether these bills were properly chargeable to the Armory Board Fund.

Which was adopted by the following vote: Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General McCoskry Butt.

A communication was received from Messrs. Charles M. Childs & Co., No. 225 Pearl street, New York, offering free of charge a quantity of tan bark for use in the armories. Referred to the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies.

A motion to adjourn was adopted by the following vote: Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General McCoskry Butt.
