Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor of the City of New York:

Dear Sir-The Board of Elections of the City of New York hereby submits its Annual Report of the affairs and proceedings of the Board during the year 1910.

Annexed hereto are statements giving the party enrollments for the year 1910. the number of enrolled voters who participated at the official Primary Election of their respective parties, also the number of voters who registered prior to the General Election of November 8th, and the number who voted thereat; also the number enrolled for 1911; also the vote for Governor in 1910.

After the adjournment of the Legislature and before the filing with this Board of the list of persons for appointment as election officers, this Board prepared a summary of the essential provisions of the Election Law, and furnished each applicant for appointment as an election officer with a copy thereof, with a request that he study the same prior to his examination; these examinations were subsequently held by and under the direction of the chief clerks of the respective Borough Offices in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, at the offices in such Boroughs, and in the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond, at the offices in those Boroughs and in other places more convenient to the applicants for examination.

The examinations were conducted in accordance with law, and after such examinations the successful candidates were certified to this Board by the Chief Clerks of the respective Borough Offices for appointment; subsequently, and relying upon the reports of the Chief Clerks of the respective Borough Offices, the election officers so certi-

fied were appointed as provided by law. A statement of the number of election officers examined, the number of those who qualified and who were appointed, the number rejected, the number who resigned, or who were removed as required by Section 308 of the Election Law, and the number appointed at the polls to fill vacancies, is annexed hereto and is submitted as part of

Notwithstanding the bitterness of the political contest which preceded the work of the voters at the polls on Election Day, the Election was conducted without disturbance or confusion anywhere; we are pleased to state that the work of the election officers has, during the past few years, steadily improved, and this Board hopes, with 10 the changes in the Election Law suggested, which are anticipated during the coming session of the Legislature, more improvement, and, perhaps, even better men. may 12 be secured for service at future elections.

With the work of the election officers on Election Day there seems to be uniform satisfaction; in any event, this Board has not been informed that in any district of the 15 seventeen hundred districts in this City any election officer failed to perform his 16 duties as required by law; the returns of the election officers this year were in better shape than in any previous year, so much so, that the work of the County Canvassers 18

was very much hastened and their task rendered easy. All possible aid was furnished to the Attorney General and the District Attorneys of the various counties in this City, in the prosecution of persons indicted and against 21 whom information had been filed, and against whom proceedings were instituted in the 22 Criminal Courts for violation of the Election Law and the statute regulating the 23 sale of liquor within the limited distance of polling places.

During the year one Commissioner of Deeds, who had falsely certified to the signatures of alleged voters purporting to form an independent certificate of nomination.

and who had been placed under arrest at a hearing before the Board, was convicted on his own plea and sentenced to imprisonment in the City Prison for thirty days.

During the year complaints were made, from time to time, by the State Superintendent of Elections and individual citizens respecting the conduct and qualifications of election officers; every complaint was carefully and thoroughly investigated and where the facts warranted it, the guilty officials were removed, and where the Board deemed it sufficient to reprimand the officers they were reprimanded, and in cases where a reprimand would not be fair or the charges were not sustained appropriate action was taken.

The Board was a party to a considerable number of proceedings, instituted by a number of voters in this City with respect to their party enrollments at the time of their registration, and in many cases the enrollment of the voter was changed by order of the court; during the year a decision of considerable importance respecting Primary enrollments was handed down, which, in effect, overruled the provisions of the law requiring the use of a black lead pencil in the marking of Primary enrollmet ballots; this provision of law was held to be directory and the use of a fountain pen

was held not to invalidate the Primary enrollment.

There was appropriated for use of the Board during the year the sum of \$1,056,-750; of this sum there was, or it is anticipated there will be, spent the sum of \$947,-685, leaving, it is anticipated, the sum of \$109,065 to be turned back into the City

The Board has endeavored to co-operate with all public officers and with the representatives of the various political parties in enforcing all of the provisions of law 249 relating to registration, enrollment and the Primary and General Elections: it has. at all times, endeavored to furnish in a prompt and courteous manner information to all citizens respecting election matters; it is especially thankful for the prompt, intelligent and efficient co-operation of the Police Commissioner and the officers and mem-240 bers of his department, without whose aid this Board could not have executed the provisions of law.
