Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, when considering the annual budget for the present year, in their eagerness in observing economy, with the intention of lightening the heavy burden of the taxpayers, have cut down many appropriations for maintenance; and

Whereas, Through their reduction in the allowance to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, it became necessary to reduce the number of street lights in the outlying section of our Borough; and

Whereas, Such false economy is not for the best interest to the taxpayers, as it deprives them of the proper protection that through the proper illumination of the City streets they are entitled to; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Taxpayers' Alliance, through its local representative, does hereby petition the Hon. Board of Aldermen to pass suitable resolutions requesting the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to erect additional street lamps on all streets regulated and graded and which are regular thoroughfares, and lamps to be at regulation distance not less than 150 feet to each other, and be it further resolved that the Board of Aldermen authorize the Comptroller to issue corporate stock or revenue bonds in sufficient amount to defray the expense for these additional lights.

Ordinance Amending the Code in Relation to Motor Vehicles.

Every motor vehicle, except motor cycles, which is driven by side chains, shall be equipped with a fender or guard to protect such side chains from coming in contact with any object or person.

Ordinance in Relation to Proper Care of Motor Vehicles When Stopped and Unattended.

Section 1. Chapter 24, Article 3 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 36b. Motor Vehicles. The motor of a gasoline propelled motor vehicle when at a standstill and unattended, must be stopped. On motor vehicles propelled by electricity, the control handle or the current cut-off switch, must be locked so that the vehicle is rendered inoperative when such vehicle is at a standstill or unattended. On all steam propelled motor vehicles the throttle of shut-off valve must be locked so as to render the vehicle inoperative when such vehicle is at a standstill or unattended. The emergency brake or brakes on any motor vehicle which is at a standstill or unattended, must be properly set so as to prevent such vehicle from moving or being moved.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The Committee on Finance, to which was referred on March 28, 1916 (Minutes, page 773), the annexed request of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for Special Revenue Bonds, \$1,434, to cover the cost of necessary repairs to a tunnel in Atlantic avenue, respectfully

REPORTS:

That this matter has been investigated by the Bureau of Contract Supervision, and its report, attached, hereto, indicates the dangerous condition at this point, and an urgent need for the repairs. The committee, therefore, recommends that the accompanying resolution be adopted.

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of nine hundred dollars (\$900), the proceeds whereof to be used by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for the purpose of defraying the cost of necessary repairs to and the strengthening of the arches of the old tunnel under the roadway of Atlantic avenue at its intersection with Court street. The Honorable Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Gentlemen—On the lower part of Atlantic avenue, from the South Ferry north-erly, there is an old subway or tunnel under the roadway which was constructed by the Long Island Railroad for the use of its trains by an ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Brooklyn adopted March 29th, 1844.

On April 28, 1860, the Long Island Railroad assigned to the Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company its right, title and interest in said tunnel by deed recorded in the Kings County Register's office and on the same day the two companies entered into an agreement with Commissioners appointed under chapter 484 of the Laws of 1859, by which they agreed to close the entrance to the tunnel in Atlantic avenue (then known as Atlantic street) and restore and pave the street.

It was reported by one of the inspectors of this department that the arch at Court street is in bad condition, due to the fact that several conduits have been cut through it and a number of bricks are so loose that every once in a while some of them fall. On August 9th, 1915, we requested an opinion from the Corporation Counsel as to the responsibility for the repairs to this tunnel, i. e., whether it de-volved upon the City or the Long Island Railroad Company and on November 24, 1915, the Corporation Counsel advised that, after a thorough search of the proceed-ings under which this tunnel was constructed and subsequently abandoned, that "The City of New York now is the owner of the tunnel in question and is charged with the duty of maintaining and keeping the same in safe condition."

If this tunnel should cave in it would cause a very serious accident and for this reason we believe that the work of repairs should be undertaken in the near future.

There are no funds available in this department for this work, and it will be necessary to secure an issue of special revenue bonds for the purpose. The estimate of the cost is as follows:

Earth fill, 954 cubic yards at \$1.00..... \$954 00
Concrete masonry, 48 cubic yards at \$10.00..... 480 00

Total..... \$1,434 00

I would therefore respectfully request that your Board of Aldermen adopt a reso-lution as early as possible providing for an issue of revenue bonds in the amount of \$1,434, to cover the cost of necessary repairs to the tunnel in Atlantic avenue.

No. 331—Request of the Borough of Brooklyn—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$1,434, to cover the cost of necessary repairs to a Tunnel in Atlantic avenue.

Dear Sir—An examination into this request indicates that owing to the weakening of the arches of an old tunnel at the intersection of Atlantic avenue and Court street, and the possibility of a serious accident in case the tunnel should cave in, it is advisable that the work necessary to make the highway safe, at this point, be un-der-taken as soon as possible.

It is proposed to break down the crown of the arch and fill up the tunnel with earth. This crown has been seriously weakened principally through the operations of public service companies in cutting away the masonry to obtain depth for their pipes and ducts. A concrete wall is to be constructed just west of Court street to retain the filling on the east side. On the west side it will be retained by the exist-ing rubble wall.

The Bureau of Contract Supervision has arranged with the Public Service Com-mission to have the contractor on a subway job in this vicinity, ordered, as is pro-vided in the contract, to furnish this fill free of cost to the City, since such disposal of material will not cost him more than his present method.

It is estimated that the cost of breaking down the arch, spreading and tamping the fill and the shoring of the roadway will be as follows:

Concrete wall, 50 cubic yards at \$8..... \$400 00
Shoring 250 00
Labor, spreading and tamping fill, 100 days laborer at \$2.50 per day..... 250 00

Dear Sir—In accordance with subdivision 8 of section 188 of the City Charter, I beg leave to make request for special revenue bonds to the sum of \$300,000 to be used in granting allowances to widows with dependent children who prove to be eligible for such assistance under chapter 228 of the laws of New York State of 1915.

When the Board of Child Welfare presented its budget for the year 1916 it asked that \$400,000 be allowed for the above purposes. That amount was reduced by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to \$100,000, it being thought best at that time that the Board should organize and conduct its work for a certain time before receiving the full amount requested. Since that time the Board has granted monthly allowances to 385 widows at a total cost of \$8,837.81 per month. On this basis the appropriation already made is now encumbered for the year 1916.

There are now waiting for action by the Board of Child Welfare 700 cases on which the investigations have been entirely completed. No action can be taken on these by the Board until further funds are available. Our experience to date leads us to believe that in addition to the 385 allowances already granted and the 700 applications now waiting for Board action, there will be approximately 2,500 addi-tional widows who will prove eligible for assistance under the law.

When the Board of Child Welfare made its original request for \$400,000, it felt quite sure that it was not asking more than would be needed for this year, and in the light of its further experience it would now renew the request that \$300,000 be added to the \$100,000 already appropriated. It must be borne in mind that the widows and children whose cases are now waiting action are quite as much in need as those to whom assistance has already been granted.

The Board of Child Welfare would, in behalf of these families, urge the Board of Aldermen to take immediate action in this matter. Yours very sincerely,

Memorandum to Hon. Frank L. Dowling, Re. Letter of March 31, requesting Special Revenue Bonds to the Sum of \$300,000 to be Used in Granting Allowances to Wid-ows With Dependent Children. (Chapter 228 of the Laws of New York State, 1915.)

The situation to date in regard to the number of applications received by the Board of Child Welfare since the date of its organization is as follows:

Total number of applications received at the offices of the Board, 7,800 (of this number 1,500 are from the Department of Public Charities, being families whose children are already in institutions).

In the investigation of 2,000 families to date it has been found that about 45 per cent. of this number have proved ineligible for allowances for one reason or another. On the basis of this experience we would deduct 45 per cent. of the 7,800 applications, which would leave us 4,290 cases that will probably prove eligible for and in need of assistance. Of this number 384 have already been granted allowances, \$100,100 having been provided in the budget for this number. This again would leave 3,906 families for whose relief funds are now asked, of which number 700 are awaiting immediate action by the Board as soon as funds are provided.

The average allowance per family of the 384 already granted is \$23 per month. Should this average continue in the cases of the 3,906 above mentioned, it would mean a total monthly payroll of \$98,670. However, in looking over the applications of the widows we are inclined to think that the heavier relief cases are among the earlier applications and that the average allowance will drop considerably as we reach the later applications. Further, as these allowances cannot now be granted for more than the remaining nine or less months of this year the above total monthly amount will not be incurred for more than six months at the most. Further, in case of families whose children are already in institutions it is hoped that the amounts needed for such families will be transferred to the Board of Child Welfare from amounts already appropriated in the 1916 budget for child caring institutions.

With the above facts in mind we would estimate the amount needed for the bal-ance of this year as follows (this not including the \$100,100 already appropriated and encumbered by the 384 families to whom allowances have been granted):

1,000 cases for 9 months at \$23 a month..... \$207,000 00
1,000 cases for 8 months at \$23 a month..... 184,000 00
1,906 cases for 7 months at \$23 a month..... 306,866 00

\$697,866 00

There should be deducted from this amount \$150,000 for families whose children are already in institutions.

It is in view of the above facts that the Board of Child Welfare at this time makes request of the Board of Aldermen to provide through revenue bonds \$300,000 to be used for allowances to widows' families as fast as investigation shall prove them eligible for and worthy of assistance.

Hon. FRANCIS P. KENNEY, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—On October 26, 1915, your Board recommended an issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$32,738 for the above purpose. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment concurred in this action on December 10, 1915.

On November 17, 1914, the Bureau of Fire Prevention of the Fire Department ordered that an open sprinkler system be installed at once to cover the entire area beneath the dumping boards, at practically all of the street cleaning Department dumps. On September 17, 1915, the Department of Street Cleaning was reminded by the Fire Prevention Bureau that this work had not been complied with.

The installation of fire fighting appliances at the street cleaning dumps is a desirable improvement and should eventually result in a considerable saving to the City. Much of the material handled is highly inflammable, and fires in the past have been quite frequent. In addition to the cost of replacing dumps destroyed by fires, there has been large consequential and resultant losses due to the necessity, in many instances, of hiring privately owned dumping boards for which high prices usually have to be paid. There is also to be considered the much longer haul, and wear and tear on horses and carts to reach the hired dumps.

The plans for the work were not completed until March 17, 1916. As it is necessary to have the form of contract approved by the Corporation Counsel, printed and advertised for at least ten days, as required by the Charter, it is evident that the extension of time should be granted. Respectfully,

Sir—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals have the honor to request the Board of Aldermen to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$5,000 for the purchase of the boat "Helen C. Juillard," now owned by St. John's Guild, to replace the boat "Westfield," formerly used as a day camp for tuberculosis patients in connection with Gouverneur Hospital. After many years of service the "Westfield" was discontinued upon the receipt of a report from the Department of Docks and Ferries that it was unsafe as a day camp, and the Trustees have since made every effort to obtain another boat or a suitable place for the patients, so that the great value of the work carried on may be conserved and to retain an effective tuberculosis control in the Gouverneur district. The department has been overwhelmed with letters of indignant protest and inquiries from residents in the vicinity of Gouverneur emphasizing the need of replacing in some way the services formerly afforded by the "Westfield." After extensive inquiries the department has learned that St. John's Guild is willing to sell the boat "Helen C. Juillard" for \$5,000. A report from the Department of Finance of an examination made by the Chief Engineer reads as follows:

"The boat is 210 feet in length over all and 39 feet in width over guards, and has a tonnage of 756 tons. The type of the boat is an excursion or bay barge with half of main deck inclosed to form cabins; second deck (full span) covered by hurricane deck; hull divided into three sections to form mass hall, crew quarters and boiler and pump room.

"Boat appears sound throughout, and has the appearance that it has been well cared for since built, about 16 years ago.

"The arrangement of partitions, etc., are well adapted for a hospital ship having shower baths, toilets, examining rooms, wards, kitchen with ice box, etc.

"I am informally advised that the boat cost \$35,000 to build.

"The price asked, \$4,500, appears reasonable and just."

The price mentioned in the last paragraph appears to be an error, the authorities of St. John's Guild asking \$5,000 for the boat, and having under consideration at the present time an offer for that amount. In view of the cost of building and the present excellent condition of the boat, there can be no doubt of the reasonableness of the price asked. In making this request, the Trustees also ask permission for the necessary authority to purchase this boat. Respectfully,

Hon. FRANCIS P. KENNEY, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—In compliance with your request, I have caused an examination to be made with reference to the proposed purchase of the boat "Helen C. Juillard."

The Trustees of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals propose to purchase this boat to replace the boat "Westfield" which is moored in the East River, in front of Corlears Hook Park, and which has been used during the past five or six years as a day camp for tuberculosis patients, in connection with Gouverneur Hospital.

In October last, this boat was pronounced unsafe by an Engineer of the Department of Docks and Ferries, and the patients were at once removed. In January, 1916, this Engineer stated at a meeting of the Trustees at Gouverneur Hospital that if temporary repairs to the boat were made and if piles were driven on both sides of it, the boat would be reasonably safe, but that, acting for the Department of Docks and Ferries, he would not, even then, assume responsibility for its safety.

I am of the opinion that it would be inadvisable to attempt to repair the boat.

The "Helen C. Juillard" is owned by the St. John's Guild. The boat is 210 feet long, with beam of 38 feet 6 inches; draws 6 feet of water when light and about 7 feet 6 inches when loaded; has three decks, main, second and hurricane; the main deck is partly inclosed. There is an equipped kitchen, boilers, water tanks and toilets; some small cabins, ward rooms, store rooms, Doctor's offices and Superintendent's room. The boat was built about 16 years ago at a cost of \$35,000, and appears in extremely good condition. The Captain in charge states that the boat has been on the ways every year. The boat is without propelling power and may briefly be described as a three-deck barge, built to be used as a floating hospital for children.

It is my opinion that the boat is well suited for the purpose stated and that the price is reasonable.

It has been stated that the St. John's Guild is selling because a new boat, for which \$100,000 was contributed to the guild, has been completed and is about to be put in Commission. Respectfully,

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, *President of Board of Aldermen*:

Sir—I have the honor to request permission to purchase, without public letting, two electric searchlights for the use of this department, at a cost of \$1,600.

These searchlights are made only by the Edison Company, and their substitution for the searchlight now in use in this department will make it possible to effect an economy amounting to \$7,900 per annum.

At the present time this department maintains two water towers in Brooklyn, and it is the intention to equip each with a searchlight at no extra expense beyond the purchase and installation.

The operating cost of the searchlights at the present time is as follows:

Salaries of two Engineers.....	\$3,200 00
Keeping of two horses.....	600 00
Twenty-five tons of coal.....	150 00

Total saving for each searchlight.....	\$3,950 00
Total saving for two searchlights.....	7,900 00

In addition to this, the engines used in connection with the searchlights can be returned to service and disposed of.

The light furnished by the new Edison searchlight is vastly superior to the light furnished by our old-fashioned searchlights. A demonstration of this searchlight was recently made before myself, Chief Kenlon, Deputy Chief Martin and a number of other high officers of the department, and was pronounced far more satisfactory than the present searchlight. In other words, we can effect a saving of \$7,900 per annum and at the same time procure a much better searchlight for use at fires. I would greatly appreciate your favorable action upon this request as early as possible, as we would then be able to assign four engineers and four horses to other service.

On December 16, 1915, permission was requested to purchase three of these to replace three searchlights then in operation in the Borough of Manhattan. These are to be mounted on water towers. Permission to purchase these three searchlights in the open market was granted by the Board of Aldermen on December 21, 1915.

All permits for [electric] *illuminated* signs shall be issued by the city clerk, upon applications therefor, approved by the commissioner of water supply, gas and electricity and the superintendent of buildings [having jurisdiction] in the case of electric signs, and, in the case of gas signs, by the fire commissioner and the superintendent of buildings. A permit or renewal thereof issued hereunder, upon the expiration thereof or within thirty days thereafter, may be renewed for a further period of one year; and, upon the payment by the applicant of the fee therefor and the surrender of the old permit, accompanied by satisfactory proof in the form of an affidavit that the illuminated sign is the same as when originally licensed, and that the wiring or piping of the sign is in good condition, the city clerk may issue the permit.

3. Definition. Any letter, word, model, sign, device, or representation, used in the nature of an advertisement, announcement, or direction, illuminated by electricity or gas, erected on any building and extending beyond the building line shall be deemed to be an [electric] *illuminated* sign. No such sign shall be illuminated otherwise than by electricity or gas.

4. Fee for permit. The applicant for a permit to construct or maintain an [electric] *illuminated* sign shall pay to the city clerk an annual fee of 10 cents for each square foot of sign space or part of square foot of [such] sign space displayed on such [electric] sign, to be computed and collected by the city clerk. The square feet of sign space on one side of an [electric] *illuminated* sign, however, shall be deemed to [be] constitute the entire number of square feet of sign space, for the purpose of computing the license fee [herein] referred to *herein* [and required to be paid].

5. Consent of owner of adjoining residence. No permit shall be issued for the erection of an [electric] *illuminated* sign upon a building which adjoins another occupied exclusively as a private residence, until the applicant for the permit shall have filed the written consent of the owner of such residence to the erection of the proposed sign.

6. Restrictions. a. No [electric] *illuminated* sign shall extend more than 8 feet from the building line, nor shall any such sign be less than 10 feet in the clear above the level of the sidewalk beneath the same.

b. All [electric] *illuminated* signs shall be constructed entirely of metal or other incombustible material, except the insulation thereof if *such sign is to be illuminated by electricity*, including the uprights, supports, and braces for the same, and shall be properly and firmly attached to the building [,] and [shall be] so constructed as not to be or become dangerous.

c. *If such sign is to be illuminated by gas, the gas burners for same shall be located entirely inside of the sign and so arranged and protected as to prevent the flame from being extinguished by the wind. A shut-off valve shall be placed on the gas piping extending from the building to the sign, and so arranged as to permit of the shutting off of the gas from the sign on the outside of the building, in case of necessity.*

Section 3. Section 218 of article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

§218. Alteration of existing signs.

No existing fence, sign, billboard, or roof sign or sign structure shall be enlarged, rebuilt, structurally altered, or relocated, except in accordance with the provisions of this article; provided that this requirement shall not apply to the relettering [or rewiring of electric signs] of *illuminated signs, except where such relettering requires a change of the wiring or piping of such signs.*

Sir—The department respectfully refers to the proposed amendment of article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances relating to signs and show-bills, which was introduced at the January 18 meeting of the Board of Aldermen.

It is noted that under the proposed revision of subdivision 3 of section 211 this department will, in addition to its present duty of certifying that the wiring and appliances of *electric* signs are in conformity with its rules and regulations as at present, be charged also with the duty of certifying that "the (gas) piping" of *gas* signs is "in conformity with its rules and regulations." Whether this particular portion of the revised ordinance was inserted inadvertently and without regard for the fact that this department now exercises no jurisdiction over, and consequently has no rules and regulations in relation to gas piping, or whether it was actually the intention to impose this duty upon this department rather than upon the Bureau of Buildings, is not clear. The department believes, however, that it is not wise to place upon it this particular duty for the reason that all matters relating to gas piping are now and have heretofore been under the supervision of the Bureau of Buildings, and it is believed that they should continue to receive attention therein where extended experience and special organization for such work will undoubtedly result in more efficient control thereof.

Ordinance Amending the Code in Relation to Fees Payable by Peddlers.

AN ORDINANCE Amending an Ordinance Relating to Peddlers.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Subdivision 1 of Section 130, Section 131 and Section 132 of Article 10, Chapter 14, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1, Section 130, Subdivision 1. Definitions. Any person hawking, peddling, vending or selling merchandise in the streets of the city shall be deemed to be a peddler, and shall be classified as follows: A peddler using a motor-driven vehicle, a peddler using a horse and wagon, a peddler using a push cart and a peddler personally carrying merchandise.

Section 2, Section 131. License fees; term. The annual license fees payable by peddlers shall be, for each peddler:

Using a motor-driven vehicle.....	\$8 00
Using a horse and wagon.....	8 00
Using a push cart.....	4 00
Personally carrying his merchandise.....	2 00

All peddler licenses shall be issued as of May 1 and shall expire on the 30th day of April next succeeding the date of issuance thereof.

All peddler licenses now in force, which shall not sooner expire, shall expire on the 30th day of April [next succeeding the date on which this ordinance takes effect], 1916, but all such licenses for peddlers [using a horse and wagon or a push cart] may be renewed by the licensees, if presented on or before [the said April 30th,] July 31st, 1916, and for each full calendar month of the unexpired term of the old license a pro rata amount of the fee paid therefor shall be applied toward the payment of the new fee [;]. [and all peddler licenses issued between the time this ordinance becomes effective and the following April 30th, shall be charged the full fees mentioned above, but all such licenses for peddlers using a motor-driven vehicle, or a horse and wagon, or a push cart, may be renewed by the licensees, if presented on or before the said April 30, at the pro rata rates heretofore prescribed in this section.]

All peddlers using motor-driven vehicles and operating as such at the time this ordinance takes effect under licenses issued to them as peddlers using a horse and wagon, may continue to operate under such license until [the following] April 30, 1916, unless sooner expiring, and upon such expiration may be renewed as peddlers using a motor-driven vehicle, as hereinbefore provided.

Section 3, Section 132. Designation of vehicles. Any vehicle used in peddling shall show on each outside thereof the words "Licensed Peddler," together with the figures of its official number, and any peddler duly licensed to use a horse and wagon or a motor-driven vehicle may employ two persons, and no more, to assist in selling and delivering the wares, but such person shall so act only when accompanying a licensed peddler.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Ordinance Amending the Code of Ordinances (the Building Code) in Relation to Courts.

AN ORDINANCE to Amend Section 135 of Article 7 of Chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Light and Ventilation of Buildings.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 135 of Article 7 of Chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 135. Courts. In every building hereafter erected every court provided under the provisions of this article for the lighting and ventilation of any room shall have a width at every point of not less than one inch for every foot that such point is distant from the lowest part of such court, but the minimum width shall be not less than three feet in case such a court extends for its full width and without obstruction along the entire length or breadth of the building and connects at either end with a street or other open public space, nor [not] less than four feet [in any case] otherwise. Every such court shall be open and unobstructed for the required widths from its lowest point to the sky, except for the ordinary projections of window sills, belt courses and similar ornamental projections to the extent of not more than four inches. When a court is located along a side of a lot or plot the lot line shall be deemed an enclosure of such court, except that when a court opens on a street or open public space, such street or open public space may be considered as part of that court.

Section 2. The provisions of this ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Wednesday, March 22, 1916, at 3.30 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Paulding, O'Keeffe, Farley, and Stern, Trustees. Excused—Mr. Sachs, Mr. Robbins, and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the meeting of March 7, 1916, were held as read and approved.

Doctor O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

Mr. Harkins, Supervising Engineer, who was ill for two weeks, has returned to duty.

The Purchasing Agent calls my attention to the fact that he was yesterday informed by the Central Purchasing Committee that they would not open bids for butter, cheese, eggs, bread and rolls until April 3, although the contract period should begin on April 1. We have already purchased all that is called for on the present contract, and will need between now and the date on which the bids are opened approximately 5,000 pounds. This

purchase in the open market is technically a violation of law, but this seems unavoidable owing to the delay of the Bureau of Contract Supervision. As the amount expended will exceed \$1,000, it will be necessary for us to obtain permission from the Board of Aldermen to buy this amount in the open market.

At the last meeting I was asked to report on the attendance of the physicians in the out patient department at Fordham Hospital recommended for salaries, and would report, out of 27 clinic days: Dr. Clifton, absent 2 days, late 0 minutes; Dr. Pasquerelli, absent 4 days, late 5 minutes; Dr. Weil, absent 1 day, late 9 minutes; Dr. Nelson, absent 4 days, late 15 minutes; Dr. Connell, absent 0 days, late 20 minutes; Dr. Joyce, absent 2 days, late 2½ minutes; Dr. Quinn, absent 2 days, late 12 minutes. Out of 15 clinic days: Dr. MacVean, absent 4 days, late 2 minutes.

I was also to report on the number of gynaecological cases at the Harlem Hospital, and find the daily average of these cases is about 10.

The department is very much in need of a light delivery car for making small deliveries to the different hospitals, particularly to Neponsit. We have a balance available in this appropriation. Upon investigation I find that such cars can be purchased for from \$525 to \$750. Your authorization for this expenditure is requested.

I am in receipt of a request from Mr. White for the following transfers within the appropriations for the years 1914 and 1915:

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried, in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The Board authorized the request to the Board of Aldermen to buy in the open market, without public letting, the supplies required in the department until the contracts beginning April 1 become effective.

The appointment of the men to the salaried places in the out-patient department of Fordham Hospital, mentioned in the General Medical Superintendent's report, was approved. In making these appointments it was understood that the physicians will be regular and prompt in attendance upon their clinics.

The report of the number of gynaecological cases at Harlem Hospital was considered in connection with the request of the New York City Visiting Committee to establish a separate gynaecological service at that hospital, but action thereon was again deferred pending further inquiry.

The purchase of a light delivery car for use in the department was authorized, the bid received for a Ford car having been accepted.

It was resolved to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer funds within the appropriations for the years 1914 and 1915 enumerated by the General Medical Superintendent.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

The President presented a tabulation of bids received on March 14, for the installation of transoms at Fordham Hospital, as follows: Samuel Rosen, \$1,741; Alpha Painting Corp., \$1,873; Feirman & Lee, \$2,223; Levin & Gewertz, \$2,530; A. W. King, \$2,631; William Werner, \$3,351; Cornelius Horgan, \$3,960. After discussion it was moved, seconded and carried, to request the Building Committee to inquire into the standing of the lowest bidder.

Mr. Paulding, on behalf of the Committee appointed to find a boat to replace the "Westfield," reported that on March 21 he made an inspection of the boat "Helen C. Juilliard" formerly used as a floating hospital and presented a letter from St. John's Guild relating thereto. In view of the favorable report from the Deputy and Acting Comptroller under date of March 16, the Committee recommended that this boat be purchased. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to approve this report and request the Board of Aldermen for an issue of revenue bonds and for the necessary permission to purchase this boat without public letting.

A letter was also presented from Dock Commissioner Smith under date of March 20, stating that there has been a misunderstanding on the part of the Local

Needs Association with respect to the construction of a pier at the foot of Corlears st. by the Dock Department, the suggestion having merely been made that a pier should be built there for the protection of the waterfront and a superstructure for a day camp erected thereon, the cost of the camp to come from private funds, to which he agreed to become a subscriber. It was moved, seconded and carried, to offer Mr. Smith the co-operation of this department in securing funds for this pier.

The Committee, consisting of Mr. Farley, Mr. Paulding and Mr. Stern, appointed with power by the Trustees at their meeting on March 7 to consider the request of the Andrews Building Company for a hearing on their application to the Trustees asking them to rescind their resolution declaring abandoned the contract for the construction of the machine room, etc., at Harlem Hospital, reported that they granted the contractor a hearing in the staff room on Friday, March 10, at 9.30 a. m., at which time, Mr. Phillips, Counsel, and Mr. A. Feldman, General Manager for the Andrews Building Company, appeared before the Committee. After giving the contractor full opportunity to present his case the Committee made further inquiry of the architect and the engineer, and after due deliberation considered it to be in the best interests of the City to allow the resolution declaring the contract abandoned to stand and to call upon the sureties to proceed with the work, which the Committee has done. After careful consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried, to approve the report of the Committee and to confirm the action taken by it.

The Conference Committee of Gouverneur Hospital reported that they had inquired into the suggestion of Dr. Francis Huber to establish a separate children's service at that hospital in charge of a Director and recommended the creation of such a service. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved.

The Conference Committee of Gouverneur Hospital also recommended the following appointments and reappointments for the year 1916:

The Committee also reported that it had communicated with the physicians whose average lateness at their clinics exceeded twenty minutes, calling for an explanation of their tardiness. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, the report of the Conference Committee was approved.

Dr. Brannan presented a communication from Miss Blanche Potter, dated March 13, requesting on behalf of the auxiliary of the Social Service Bureau, permission to incorporate the "Social Service Association of the Bureau of Social Service of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals." After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to refer this request to Mr. Paulding with power.

Dr. Brannan referred to the desirability of obtaining the strip of land 14 feet, 10 inches wide, and 98 feet, 5 inches deep from 25th st. and directly west of Osborn Hall. The possession of this strip of land would enable the department to construct two wings of equal size to the nurses' residence and also permit an open air shaft. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to appoint a special committee, consisting of Dr. Brannan and Mr. Paulding, to obtain the appraisal of the land, negotiate with the Bellevue Alumnae Association of the Bellevue Training School for Nurses and take the necessary steps to obtain funds.

Doctor Healy and Dr. Satterlee of the Fordham Medical Board conferred with the Trustees on the Medical Board's request for permission to change the term of service of the house staff from two years to one of 16 months. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to approve this change as an experiment to become operative at once for a period of two years.

Reference was made to the fact that the Board of Aldermen on Feb. 23 authorized an issue of special revenue bonds for the purchase of a motor ambulance for the psychopathic department of Bellevue Hospital. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to ask the Board of Aldermen for permission to buy this ambulance in the open market, without public letting, on account of the special character of the car.

After discussion on the unsatisfactory automobile service obtained by Bellevue and Allied Hospitals from the Municipal Garage, it was moved, seconded and carried, to instruct the Secretary to again bring this matter to the attention of the City Chamberlain with the request that the necessary steps be taken in order that Bellevue and Allied Hospitals may receive a car or have the car assigned to the Sinking Fund Commission under date of Dec. 23 returned.

It was reported that Mr. Sachs had communicated with Commissioner Kingsbury and presented a letter, dated March 7, in regard to the removal of the old morgue building. The Commissioner stated that the department would be glad to move from that building when a place could be found for the activities now carried on there. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to defer further action for the present.

The President referred to the desirability of transferring Dr. Dow from the First (Columbia University) Division to the Fourth (non-collegiate) division, in order to permit the complete reorganization of the First Medical Division under a Director as Doctor Dow is not affiliated with the university in a teaching capacity. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this matter was referred to the Conference Committee.

COMMUNICATIONS.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for March 8 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the resignation of Dr. Clarence Bandler as Surgeon to Out-Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeon, Neurological service, Second Division, was accepted with sincere regret; the plan of organization and nominations for the medical service of the Fourth Division were referred to the Conference Committee. The appointments to the house staff on the Second Division were approved as follows: Arthur F. Kraetzer and Carl C. Hervey, 2 years, July 1, 1916; Eugenia Ingerman and William V. 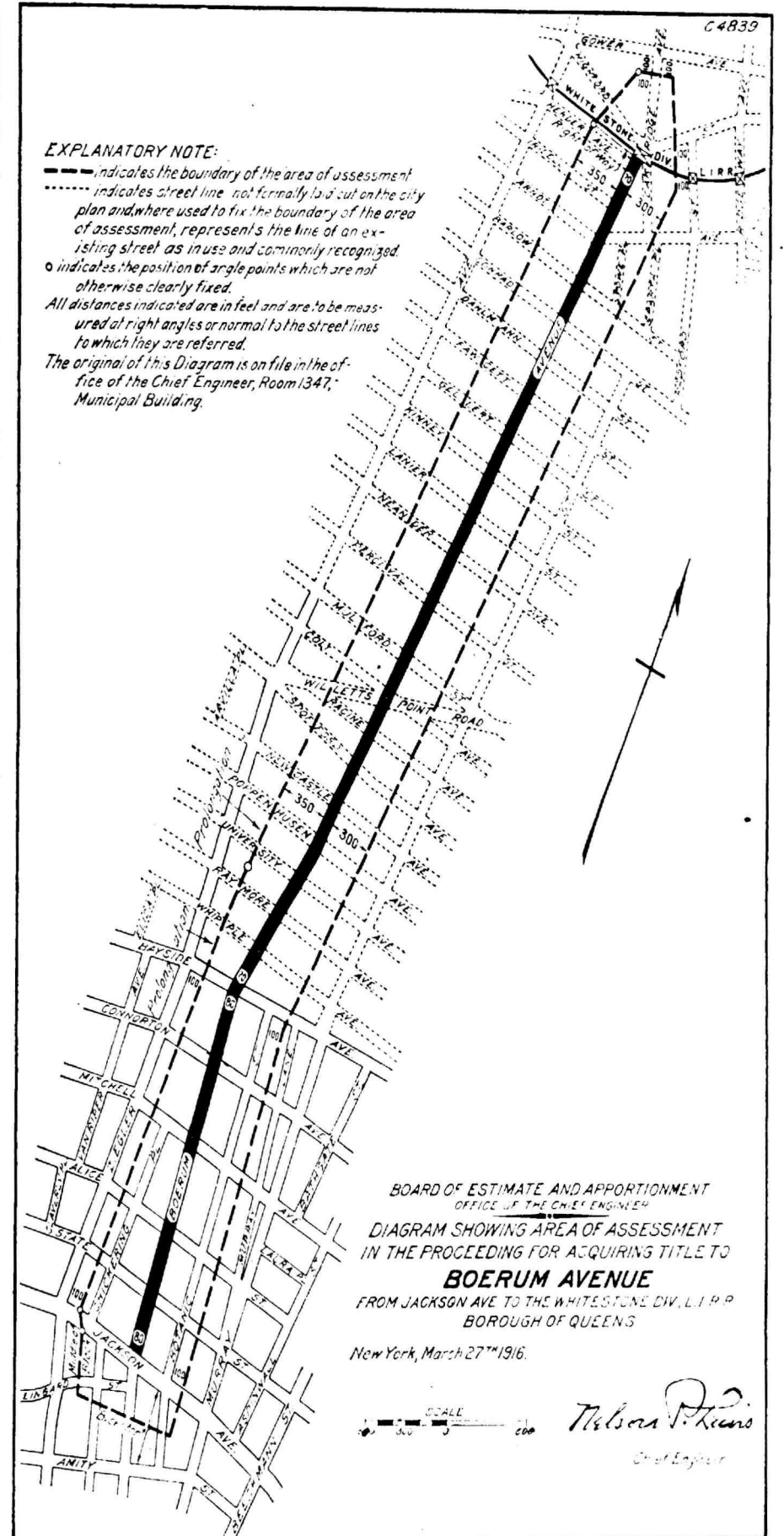

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him, to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal for or shall collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all openings in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days

from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, protecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.
