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## OFFICE OF THE MAYOR.

The following communication has been sent to the head of each of those Departments under the immediate jurisdiction of the Mayor:

July 27, 1917.

Dear Sir—The Mayor directs me to send you the following communication:

As the result of the Federal Draft, a situation has arisen with reference to City employees which requires immediate action by the Mayor. In all Departments considerable numbers of employees have received roll numbers which are almost certain to bring them within the first contingent for Federal service. In order that there may be no uncertainty regarding the policy of the Mayor in the discharge of his responsibilities imposed by chapter 435 of the Laws of 1917 (the Fenner Law), it is necessary that definite information be in his hands at the earliest possible moment.

Besides the question of permitting employees to enlist, the Mayor will have the duty of presenting to the exemption boards for discharge from Federal service the names of those employees who are indispensable to the Municipal Government. There is obviously danger that some will themselves urge their indispensability as a ground for discharge, and that the responsible heads of Departments and Offices will be asked to certify this alleged indispensability.

The principles upon which both classes of cases will be disposed of by the Mayor are as follows:

1. The Mayor will approve applications under the Fenner Law for permission to enlist by employees likely to be drafted, even though they must be replaced by substitutes, provided they are unwilling to or cannot urge grounds for exemption by reason of dependents, and provided they are not indispensable to the City service. Will you please submit immediately a complete list of all officers and employees of your Department, Bureau or Office who have been drawn under the Federal Conscription Law in the serial order of their draft in their respective exemption districts?

2. No applications for discharge will be submitted to exemption boards on behalf of employees by the Mayor or by Department heads, unless such employees are indispensable to the City service. The fact that the services of a given employee must be rendered by a substitute if not by him, does not establish the indispensability of the employee. The indispensability must be personal to the employee and not applicable merely to the service which he renders. There must be full and specific reasons given for requesting discharge of each officer or employee. For the Mayor's guidance in acting upon requests for applications for discharge on the ground here mentioned, the Mayor will desire a certification by his advisory committee on war service, to the effect that the services of the employee are indispensable to the City Government.

Will you please submit at the earliest possible date lists of employees for whom you believe it is necessary to request discharge by the Board of Exemptions on the ground of the indispensability of the employee to the City service? Very truly yours,

**Oral Examination**—Candidates will appear before an examining board for the oral test as to their personal qualifications and fitness for the position. A thorough cross-examination will be included in this part of the examination.

Candidates must be at least 30 years of age on or before the closing date for the receipt of applications.

The compensation rate has not been fixed, but \$7,500 per annum has been recommended to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for this position. Full time service will be required.



The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

#### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

#### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, endorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.
