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### REPORT OF THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, FOR THE THREE MONTHS ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1874.

Hon. WILLIAM F. HAVEMEYER, Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—The Board of Health of the Health Department of the City of New York, respectfully submits the following report, for the three months ending September 30, 1874, with the vital statistics of the city for the same period:

#### THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases:

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors, was as follows: Forty-five public buildings, twelve thousand eight hundred and twenty-seven tenement houses, one hundred and thirteen fat and lard rendering establishments, one offal boat, two thousand three hundred and seventy-four private dwellings, twenty hundred and forty-five other dwellings, two hundred and thirty-one manufactories and workshops, three hundred and sixty-two stores and warehouses, one cemetery, one thousand and twenty-three stables, three hundred and eighty-nine slaughter-houses, seventeen markets and market places, one pier and dock, twenty-eight dumping grounds, twenty-four gut-cleaning establishments, twenty-one manure dumps, twenty-three piggeries, seventeen breweries, fifty public sewers and drains, seven hundred and thirty sunken and vacant lots, seven hundred and sixty-three yards, courts and areas, nine hundred and thirty-nine cellars and basements, eight hundred waste pipes and drains, twenty-one hundred and seven privies and water-closets, eleven hundred and sixty streets, gutters and sidewalks, eighty-eight dangerous stairways, sixty cisterns and cesspools, two hundred and fifty-seven other nuisances, two hundred and seventy-four visits to contagious diseases, nine head-cleaning establishments, thirteen water-courses, two smoke-houses, one rag and bone house, two gas works, two dangerous buildings, four lakes, swamps and ponds, forty-three ash and garbage carts, and thirty-nine violations of the Sanitary Code.

The number of complaints received from citizens during the three months ending September 30, 1874, was eleven hundred and seventy-five, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period granted, under instructions and authority of the Board, nine hundred and thirty-seven permits to vessels to discharge cargoes upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; nineteen hundred and thirty-two permits to scavengers to empty privies, their work being inspected by officers of this Board detailed for that purpose; thirty-nine permits to remove and transport manure; and seventy-nine permits were granted to land rags (in bulk) under bonds.

The number of places visited where cases of contagious diseases was found and reported was seven hundred and seventy-eight; the number of persons sick with contagious disease, who could not be properly isolated or cared for at their own houses and were therefore removed to hospital, was one hundred and eighty-seven; the number of families visited for the purpose of vaccination was fifteen hundred and fifty-six; and the number of vaccinations performed was nine hundred and sixty-six. The number of premises disinfected and fumigated, where contagious diseases had prevailed, was five hundred and ninety-seven. The number of bodies removed to the Morgue was fourteen.

The following tabulated statement gives the amount of work performed by the Disinfecting Corps for the purpose of preventing the spreading of contagious diseases. The methods of disinfection employed were the same as described in former reports.

The supply of zinc iron liquor, originally obtained from the Manhattan Metal and Chemical Co., commenced to fail during July, and arrangements were then made with J. Oesterricher to supply a liquor of chlorides and sulphates, which, however, was free from zinc, containing only iron. The liquor is obtained in working a similar process as the one adopted by the Manhattan Co., and described in former reports. It was furnished at a specific gravity averaging 25° B. The formerly extended disinfection of street gutters was limited to the use of two barrels, carts, and one tank truck on August 31. The apparatus thus released were at once used for the disinfection of privies, yards and cellars. The tank of one truck was for this purpose filled with about two hundred and forty-eight gallons of iron liquor, and the barrel of one cart with one hundred and thirty gallons of dead oil and six gallons of cresylic acid. This quantity enabled six men to disinfect on the average some five hundred privies and from forty to fifty yards and cellars per day.

The amount of meat and fish condemned by officers of the Sanitary Company during the quarter ending September 30, 1874, was as follows: Sheep, forty-seven (47) carcasses; veal (bob), thirteen (13) carcasses; veal (cut), three hundred and sixteen (316) pounds; poultry, seventeen hundred and fifty-two (1,752) pounds; fish, thirty-five thousand seven hundred and twenty-four pounds; cattle, fifteen carcasses; calves (case), two hundred and fifteen (215) carcasses; calves (bobs), thirteen (13) carcasses; lambs, twenty-nine (29) carcasses; beef, twenty-two hundred and nineteen (2,219) pounds; mutton, three hundred and sixty-five (365) pounds; scollops, twenty-five gallons; and antelope, two hundred and seventy pounds.

The total mortality in the city during the third quarter of the present year, was less than that of the corresponding quarter of the year 1873 by 474 deaths. The total number of deaths in the third or summer quarter this year was greater than that in the second or spring quarter by 1,961. By referring to the foregoing tables, the important fact appears that there were 2,303 more deaths of children under five years of age than during the spring quarter, and that this excess of mortality in infants and young children exceeded that excess (1,961), which is recorded as the total at all ages for that quarter; and that the excess of infant mortality exceeded the total excess by no less than 342 deaths. Thus the fact plainly appears that in all that portion of the population which has passed the fourth year of life, the chance of living through the summer quarter was somewhat greater than the expectation of life in the spring quarter. This fact is believed to be associated with a considerable improvement in the sanitary condition of the people. Even the death-rate among young children is less than in previous years, but it is the later years of childhood, and in the most active periods of human life that the decrease in the death-rates has been most noticeable during the last two summers.

The chief reported causes of the infant mortality are recorded, as certified under the head of diarrhoeal diseases, yet these are only symptomatic of the actual causes, which in the crowded tenements and among the ignorant classes endanger and destroy the lives of a vast number of the young children of the city. With the exception of these causes, the most destructive disease of childhood, during the past three months, and even for more than twelve months past, is diphtheria. The increased prevalence of this disease and of whooping-cough and small-pox, has caused a slight increase in the total mortality by the contagious diseases, as a class, over their total in the corresponding quarter of 1873, but, comparing the summer with the last spring quarter, there was a decrease of 33 deaths from these contagious diseases.

The following abstract presents a comparison of the mortality of the chief pulmonary diseases during the third quarter of the year in the past five years; also of the total number of deaths in the first year and in the first five years of life, and of the total mortality in public institutions:

During the three months ending September 30, 1874, eight thousand six hundred and seventeen (8,617) permits were granted for burials. During the same period four hundred and thirteen (413) applications for transit permits were received, and permits granted; five hundred and eighty-nine (589) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; seven hundred and seventy-three (773) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; three hundred and twenty-nine (329) searches of the records of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and two hundred and fifty-seven (257) transcripts of the record of deaths, fifty-five (55) of marriages, and thirty-seven (37) of births from said records were issued. There were 3,832 persons registered as married during the quarter. The statistics of marriage during the second and third quarters of the year compare as follows:

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The total number of births registered in the last quarter amounts to 6,868. This is an increase of 904, as compared with the number registered in the previous quarter, and 568 more than were registered in the corresponding quarter of the previous year. The ratio of publicly registered births to the estimated population of the city the last six months, is equivalent to 24.67 per 1,000 annually. The birth-rate the last quarter was equal to 26.41 per 1,000.

The number of births reported and registered in the Bureau, although showing a satisfactory increase, does not exceed 80 per cent. of the total number which takes place annually in this city, while the marriages represent an annual rate per 1,000 for the last six months of 8.20 or one in 121.83 of the present population, which is estimated at 1,040,000 inhabitants. The number of marriages registered does not represent more than 85 per cent. of the total which are annually solemnized in this city.

It will be impossible to procure a complete registration of the births and marriages which take place in the city annually, unless, the present law, regulating the return of these important branches, be so amended as to impose and enforce a heavy penalty for non-compliance, and also proper facilities, offered for the collection of the certificates.

## ORDERS OF THE BOARD.

The orders of this Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of the premises complained of. During the three months ending September 30, 1874, the number of orders issued by the Board was four thousand eight hundred and eight (4,808). Of this number two thousand two hundred and ten (2,210) were issued under the first subdivision of section 14, chapter 74, Laws of 1866, by the terms of which the party sued is allowed three days in which to demand a hearing by the Board of the testimony which may be presented to show that the order should be modified or revoked. In cases where no hearing has been asked for, and the orders have not been complied with, final orders, in the original or an amended form, to the number of five hundred and ninety (590) have been issued, and the Board has directed the Attorney to commence actions for penalties for non-compliance with such orders. All other written orders, in number two thousand five hundred and ninety-eight (2,598) have been issued under the second subdivision of section 14, chapter 74, Laws of 1866, and are of a peremptory character, requiring that the nuisance be abated within five days, and if not complied with, directing the Sanitary Superintendent to enforce the same, without further notice unless the Board shall elect to commence a suit for penalty in lieu of the execution of the order by its officers or agents.
