### COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

*Abstract of the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held June 30, 1875.*

Present—Hon. William H. Wickham, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John K. Hackett, Recorder; Hon. Andrew H. Green, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Magnus Gross, Esq., Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The application of the Society of the New York Hospital, for vacant station-house either in Beekman or Chambers street, to be used as a "house of relief," or accident hospital, was received; whereupon the Comptroller, submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the premises No. 160 Chambers street, formerly used as a police station-house, and now vacant, be and the same are hereby appropriated to the New York Hospital for temporary use as a house of relief, on the condition that they maintain there, during such occupancy, a free house of relief or hospital for accidents, subject to the pleasure of this Board in regard to the period of such occupancy, possession to be given immediately upon the premises being turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by the Police Department.

The application of the New York and Staten Island Ferry Company "for a franchise to run a ferry from the foot of Whitehall street, known as Pier No. 1, East river, to the eastern shore of Staten Island," was received.

The Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, stated that the authority to grant the franchise for this ferry was vested in the Common Council.

While the question whether it was the right of this Board or of the Common Council to grant ferry franchises was being discussed, the Comptroller submitted a list of ferries for which awards were made under the advertisement of April 24, 1874, but no leases executed; and of ferries for which no award was made under the said advertisement; and also of ferries, the leases of which have expired since May 1, 1874—and submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller of the City of New York be and he is hereby authorized and empowered to take all necessary measures to lease the franchise of all existing ferries, the leases of which have expired, or for which no award has been made, such measures to be taken in accordance with the conditions approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at their meeting on April 1, 1874.

The discussion in relation to the application of the New York and Staten Island Ferry Company was resumed, whereupon the Recorder submitted the following resolution, viz.:

Resolved, That the application of the New York and Staten Island Ferry Company "for a franchise to run a ferry from the foot of Whitehall street, known as Pier No. 1, East river, to the eastern shore of Staten Island," be granted, and that said franchise be disposed of on sealed bids, and that this Board take the steps required by the Charter and law for that purpose.

The Comptroller stated that the ferry for which this franchise is asked had not been established by the Common Council, and it seemed to him, that this Board could only lease the franchise of ferries which had been thus established—and moved that the resolution be laid over for further consideration, which was not adopted. The resolution submitted by the Recorder was then adopted, the Mayor, Recorder, Chamberlain, and Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, voting in the affirmative, and the Comptroller in the negative.

The application of the Board of Education, for a site for a grammar school, east side of Lexington avenue, between Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets, was received, and, on motion, referred to the Comptroller.

### LAW DEPARTMENT.

#### OPINION OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION.

The powers of the Common Council in reference to the filling of sunken lands in the City of New York are derived from sections 267, 269, 270, and 271 of the act of April 9, 1813, and from the second section of the act of February 21, 1824.

The Common Council has power to pass ordinances for the filling of the sunken lands known as the Harlem Lots, and a valid assessment for the expenses thereof can be laid upon the lots benefited.

It is advisable that in the first instance the owners of said lots be directed and required to fill in the same.

After such provision in reference to the owner or owners ordinances should be drawn in the usual manner, reciting that the city believes it necessary for the more speedy execution of the work to do it at its own expense, and directing that the work be done by the Commissioner of Public Works.

#### *The Honorable the Common Council:*

GENTLEMEN—I have received a resolution adopted by your Honorable Body on the second of July instant, requesting my opinion as to the power of your Board to pass certain proposed ordinances for the filling of sunken lands in a portion of the city known as the Harlem Flats. The resolution referred to me mentions four proposed resolutions for such ordinances covering the following tracts: (1.) Lands from Third avenue to the Harlem river, between One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Eighth streets. (2.) Lands between Fourth and Fifth avenues, from Ninety-sixth to One Hundred and Fifth street. (3.) Lands between Third and Fifth avenues, from One Hundred and Fifth to One Hundred and Ninth street. (4.) Lands from Third to Fourth avenue, between One Hundred and Third and One Hundred and Fourth streets.

These resolutions are accompanied by a letter from the President of the Health Department, dated June 10, 1875, to his Honor the Mayor, urging the importance of their immediate passage; also by a letter from the Commissioner of Public Works, dated June 10, 1875, to his Honor the Mayor, requesting that such resolutions and ordinances be submitted to the Common Council, with a request for early action thereon; also a letter from his Honor the Mayor, dated June 10, 1875, to the Common Council, transmitting the proposed ordinances, and recommending that prompt action be taken upon the same.

The resolution adopted by your Honorable Body recites also that the Board of Aldermen has extraordinary powers in cases of emergency, but has taken no measures to enforce the filling in of the lots referred to in these resolutions, and that the Commissioner of Public Works has no appropriation to do this work; and also (in substance) that a doubt exists whether, if the Common Council should order the work in question to be done, a legal and valid assessment on the property benefited can be laid; and then requests my opinion whether any resolution or ordinance passed by your Board, in conformity with the recommendation contained in said communications, would, under the existing laws upon the subject, be valid; and also whether the Commissioner of Public Works would at

present be authorized, under such a resolution or ordinance, to incur any expense whatsoever, there being no appropriation from which the same can now be paid.

The powers of the Common Council in reference to ordering the filling up of sunken lands in the City of New York are derived from sections 267, 269, 270, and 271 of the act of April 9, 1813, and from the second section of the act of February 21, 1824. Under these laws the Common Council is authorized to pass such ordinances as it shall, from time to time, deem necessary and proper for the filling up and regulating of any grounds within the City of New York that may be sunken, damp, or unwholesome, or which the Common Council may deem proper to fill up or regulate. These laws also provide that the expense of such filling and regulating shall be borne by the owners of the lots so filled up or regulated, and they also authorize the city to do such work at its own expense in the first instance.

Under existing laws such expense must be met by the issue of assessment bonds, but is made a lien upon the lots benefited, and is to be collected from the owners of such lots in the same manner in which other assessments for local improvements are now collected.

The laws above referred to, of 1813 and 1824, are, so far as I am aware, in full force, and I see no reason to doubt that the Common Council has power to pass ordinances for the filling of the sunken lands in question, and that a valid assessment for the expense of such filling can be laid upon the lots benefited.

I would, however, respectfully suggest that in order to avoid objections which might possibly be made to the proposed resolutions and ordinances, the same be changed so as to direct and require the owner or owners of said lots to fill in the same. After such a provision in reference to the owner or owners, each resolution or ordinance should then be drawn in the usual manner, reciting that the city deems it necessary for the more speedy execution of the work to do it at its own expense, and, if the Common Council see fit, directing that the work be done by the Commissioner of Public Works in such manner as he deems most beneficial for the interests of the city.

I would also respectfully suggest that the resolutions and ordinances ought to provide with greater precision and definiteness as to what amount of filling is to be done thereunder.

The resolution transmitted to me is herewith returned.

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held June 30, 1875, present all the Commissioners, the following action was had :

*Applications for Leases.*

June 30.—From New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, and Union Stock Yard and Market Company, for lease of the bulkheads at foot of Fifty-ninth street, and the southerly half of the foot of Sixtieth street, North river, with the privilege to construct terminal improvements from foot of Fifty-eighth to Sixtieth streets, inclusive. Granted, if terms and rent of \$500 per annum are agreed to.

June 30.—From Suburban Gas-light Company, for lease of land, whether under water or not, with privilege to erect bulkhead in front of the easterly portion of the southerly boundary of the premises owned by said Company, situated on the Bronx river, easterly of Main street, in the Twenty-fourth Ward of this city. Granted, if terms and rent of \$1 per annum, in advance, are agreed to.

*Applications for Permits, etc.*

June 30.—Resolution adopted 2d June, 1875, granting permission to New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company and the Union Stock Yard and Market Company to erect bulkheads and pier on the North river, between Fifty-eighth and Sixtieth streets, rescinded and annulled.

June 30.—From W. F. Rowland, to fill in lots on southerly side of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, east of Fifth avenue, near Harlem river. Denied.

June 30.—From Old Colony Steamboat Company, to alter shed on the northerly end of the Bulkhead, adjoining Pier 28, North river, into an office. Granted.

June 30.—Superintendent Guthrie directed to cause repairs to be made, at a cost of \$25, to bark "Candida," injured by one of the Department scows.

June 30.—Action of the President, in loaning diver's apparatus to Peter Rafferty, approved.

June 30.—Health Department advised that this Department has not been served with an injunction restraining it from widening piers, etc.

June 30.—Action of the President, in accepting offer of James W. Jenkins to furnish two divers, two laborers, diving apparatus, and boat complete for work at new Pier 1, North river, for \$30 per day, approved.

June 30.—Secretary directed to effect an insurance of \$28,000 on shed situated on new Pier 43, North river, and \$35,000 on shed on new Pier 46, North river.

June 30.—Central Railroad Company of New Jersey informed, in reply to their communication, that section 6 of chapter 574, Laws of 1871, does not confer upon this Board the right to set apart the slip between Piers 48 and 49, North river, for the sole use of said Company.



June 30.—Comptroller informed that the issuing of a grant of land under water for such portion of the premises or sunken lots, situated southerly of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues, under application of W. J. Rowland, dated 22d April, 1872, will not interfere with the plans of this Department, provided that the northeasterly limit of said grant shall not be beyond the southwesterly line of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street.

June 30.—Six reports and twenty-three communications were received and read, and two communications were taken from the table, of which seventeen were placed on file, no further action thereon being required; four were laid on the table; two were referred to Commissioner Westervelt; four to the President; and two to the Executive Committee for consideration and report.

June 30.—President authorized to issue a requisition on Phelps & Kingsland for 1,150 spruce piles, more or less, 45 to 60 feet in length, 12 to 16 inches in diameter at the butt, and 6 inches at the small end, at \$3.20 per pile; also, for 200 spruce piles, 55 to 60 feet in length, of same diameter, at \$5 per pile; said piles being required in the work of construction at Canal and Clarkson streets sections.

I.—That we have completed our estimate and assessment in the above-entitled matter, and that all persons whose interests are affected thereby, and who may be opposed to the same, do present their objections in writing, duly verified, to the Commissioners, at our office, No. 57 Broadway (Room 24), in the City of New York, on or before the 30th day of June, 1875, and that we, the said Commissioners, will hear parties so objecting, within the ten week-days next after the said 30th day of June, 1875, and for that purpose will be in attendance at our said office on each of said ten days, at 3 o'clock P.
