NEW YORK, September 20, 1893.

To the Honorable the Committee on Construction:

GENTLEMEN—I beg to submit herewith the report of the operations of this Department in abating nuisances in the parts of the Croton water-shed which are under your jurisdiction, or which have been put under my supervision by the Commissioner of Public Works.

This report is so arranged that in case of litigation the principal features of the action taken in each case and the names of the witnesses who could testify in behalf of the City can be readily determined. It does not contain a detail of the numerous smaller cases, such as the removal of piles of manure and of other nuisances which will not cause any litigation, and which are too insignificant to mention.

The work, although completed as regards the removal or destruction of buildings and other actions of a permanent description, is of a continuous character, as constant supervision must be exerted to prevent recurrent accumulations of noxious matters.

In many cases, also, barns and other buildings have been ordered vacated, but it is expected that, at this time of the year, they will be occupied again, and I have requested the Department of Public Works, through Mr. Dykman, to define the policy which is to be followed; as, in a number of cases, the value of the property involved is of sufficient importance to make me desire the opinions of those in power in regard to it.

In view of the necessity of maintaining a certain amount of supervision, a certain number of men, nine in all, are kept on the pay-rolls; their number may be shortly increased for the reasons above given.

The amount of expenditure incurred by the Aqueduct Commissioners to date, for labor and materials of all kinds, is as follows:

The 758 deaths represent a death-rate of 20.77 against 20.81 for the previous week, and 20.73 for the corresponding week of 1892.

The number of deaths was almost precisely the same as during the previous week. There was an increase of 7 in the deaths from cerebro-spinal meningitis, of 9 from diphtheria, and of 32 from diarrhoeal diseases, virtually offset by decrease of 8 in the deaths from cancer, of 29 from phthisis, and of 9 from puerperal diseases.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth Ward and 2 deaths from measles in the Eleventh and Twelfth Wards, and the single death from scarlet fever was in the Nineteenth Ward.

N. B.—Permission will not be given for the withdrawal of any bid or estimate. No bid will be accepted from, or contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.

Bidders are required to state in their estimate*, under oath, their names and places of residence; the names of all persons interested with them therein; and if no other person be so interested, they shall distinctly state the fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making any bid or estimate for the same purpose, and that it is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and also, that no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders of the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract shall be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested.
