#### WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU

During the Quarter ending March 31, 1902.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health; with the execution of the orders of the Board; with the care of contagious diseases; with the inspection of foods and offensive trades; with the inspection of mercantile establishments and issuance of employment certificates; with the pathological, bacteriological and chemical research and investigations, and with the inspection of scholars attending the public, parochial and private schools:

The number of inspections and reinspections made was 368,984, classified as follows:

By the Division of Inspections.....	300,159
By the Division of Contagious Diseases.....	67,073
By the Division of Bacteriology.....	1,752

The number of complaints returned was 11,127, classified as follows:

By the Division of Inspections.....	10,920

The number of complaints received from citizens was 9,031, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instructions and authority of the Board, granted 728 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, and 2,551 miscellaneous permits, under the Sanitary Code.

## OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the fact and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the quarter ending March 31, the number of notices issued by the Board was 8,442. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repairs, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 355, Laws of 1873.

The subjects of the notices of the Board above referred to are as follows:

In order to construct a wagon bridge at East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street the grades of East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, from Webster avenue to Washington avenue, and of Park avenue, east and west, from East One Hundred and Eighty-third street to East One Hundred and Eighty-fifth street, will have to be changed.

East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, from Webster avenue to Park avenue, and Park avenue, from East One Hundred and Eighty-third street to East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, are regulated and graded. The other streets affected by this change of grade are not regulated and graded as yet, but a number of houses are built which will have to be raised, making the bridging of the New York and Harlem Railroad a very expensive affair.

There is at the present time a bridge, 60 feet in width, and a railroad depot at East One Hundred and Eighty-third street, and it seems to me that the construction of a wagon bridge at such a close distance should not be recommended.

I wish to recommend, however, that a foot bridge be built at East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, in which case no change of grades nor consequent claims for damages will be made. The original petition in this matter was returned June 7, 1902.

## BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

## (PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.)

A meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York was held in the old Council Chamber (Room 16), City Hall, on Thursday, August 7, 1902, at 10.30 o'clock in the forenoon.

After the consideration of financial matters the Board took up the consideration of the public improvement calendar.

Present—The Mayor, Comptroller (Deputy Comptroller Stevenson), the President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan. President of the Borough of Brooklyn (Commissioner of Public Works Redfield), President of the Borough of The Bronx, President of the Borough of Queens and President of the Borough of Richmond.

## REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON WEST ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-FIFTH STREET, MANHATTAN.

Mr. J. A. Flannery appeared in support of the petition, together with Mr. Westcott, as attorney for Mr. Jenks, and asked for an adjournment until Mr. Jenks could be present.

The Mayor moved that the hearing be adjourned until September 5, which was carried by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn and President of the Borough of Queens—11.

Negative—The Comptroller—3.

## REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT FOR OPENING QUARRY ROAD, BRONX.

The Board took up for consideration the resolution determining the proportion of the cost of opening Quarry road, from Third avenue to Arthur avenue, Borough of The Bronx, which was laid over at the meeting of August 4.

The following report from the Engineer of the Finance Department was read:

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,  
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,  
June 5, 1902.

In re, reduction of assessment for opening—

- 1st. Quarry road, from Third avenue to Arthur avenue.
- 2d. Belmont place, from Third avenue to Arthur avenue.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Proceedings were initiated by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement on June 18, 1897, for the opening of both of the above-named streets, and resolutions provided that the entire cost and expense should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby. Title vested in Belmont place on August 6, 1900, and in Quarry road on December 10, 1901.

A meeting of the Board of Public Improvements held December 30, 1901, resolutions were adopted providing that the City should bear 75 per cent. of the expense of opening Belmont place and 66 2-3 per cent. of the expense of opening Quarry road.

This action was taken pursuant to petitions presented by the Home for Incurables, by Roosevelt & Kobbe, attorneys, praying that the entire cost of the proceedings should be borne and paid by The City of New York.

The petition in the matter of Quarry road recites that this is the widening of an old road which is about 30 feet in width, to an 80-foot street, with an open space 166 feet wide at the junction of Third avenue.

That the property of the petitioners is confined to a limited use, and it is not and will not for many years to come, on the market, being improved with a permanent building, recently erected at great cost, and the wide streets and plaza surrounding this property are therefore of no benefit to them, while the holdings of the petitioners are so extensive that they are obliged to bear nearly the whole assessment.

The petition in the matter of Belmont place recites that the same is laid out as a public place upon the final maps of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and was primarily intended to accommodate a great mass of traffic that was necessarily converged at that point on account of the intersecting streets.

That in the case of other public places, it has frequently been the custom for the Board of Public Improvements to direct that the entire cost should be borne and paid by the City at large.

In reply I would state that Quarry road and Belmont place were laid out as streets, each 80 feet in width, and at the junction of Quarry road and Third avenue there is an open space in addition to the regular width of Quarry road and One Hundred and Eighty-first street, consisting of a triangle whose sides are 60 feet, 60 feet and 90 feet respectively, and at the intersection of Belmont place and Third avenue there is also a widening.

These two streets, namely Quarry road and Belmont place, together with an open space which was taken in the proceeding for opening Arthur avenue, bound the property of the Home for Incurables on all sides, excepting the westerly side, which is bounded by Third avenue, which plot contains an area of about 9.41 acres, or 164 city lots.

The Home for Incurables is a charitable institution, and its property, which is valued on the tax books at \$300,000, is exempt from taxation. I understand the institution is partly endowed and also makes a per diem charge for patients.

The old Quarry road appears mainly on the map of Gouverneur Morris, filed at White Plains October 3, 1849, as Map No. 180, and in smaller parts on other filed maps. From these maps it would appear that it was an old road running from Mount Hope in a general northeasterly direction until it ends at the Kingsbridge road, or East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, immediately to the east of the property of the Home for Incurables.

It does not seem to be of any established width, but a general average of 30 feet would be correct. It evidently derived its name from a marble quarry on the line of the road, just west of Third avenue.

A road of 30 feet in width is certainly not sufficient for even the local traffic of the City, and in the layout of the district, section 14 of the final maps of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards this street was widened to a width of 80 feet.

The proceeding for Belmont place covers but about 380 feet in length of an 80-foot roadway, with the widening at Third avenue, which is likewise the widening of an existing road, which was known as the Kingsbridge road, and was the road leading from West Farms to Fordham. It appears to have had an average width of about 40 feet, which would certainly have been insufficient for traffic.

Under these conditions I see no reason why it is incumbent upon the City to bear all of the expense or even 75 per cent. and 66 2-3 per cent. imposed by the former Board of Public Improvements.

Belmont place is not a public place, as claimed by the petitioners, but an 80-foot street.

An open space between Quarry road and Belmont place was acquired in the proceeding for opening Arthur avenue, and the entire expense of that proceeding was borne by the property deemed to be benefited.

To show, however, that the Home for Incurables has not suffered unreasonably by reason of the opening of any of these streets, I give below a table, showing the awards made to the Home for Incurables, together with an amount which will approximate the assessment to be imposed, should the entire amount be assessed upon the property:

—showing that without any assistance from the City, their awards exceed their assessments by about \$28,000 on these three proceedings alone.

Should the assessments be confirmed as they now stand, with the City to bear 66 2-3 per cent. on Quarry road and 75 per cent. on Belmont place, the difference in favor of the Home for Incurables would be over \$46,000.

For the benefit, however, of other property owners owning small plots of land on the easterly side of the said streets, from whom little or no land was taken, but who must bear the share of the assessment, it would not seem unreasonable that the City should assume a portion of the expense, being what might be termed approximately one-half the difference, or the increased cost of an 80-foot street over a 60-foot street, as only nominal awards were made for the bed of the old street.

I would therefore suggest that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment consider the advisability of reviewing the action of the former Board of Public Improvements, in placing 75 per cent. of the cost of Belmont place and 66 2-3 per cent. of the cost of Quarry road on the City, by making the City bear but from 12½ or 15 per cent. at the outside, in each case.

Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York did, on December 30, 1901, amend the resolution of the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement in said proceedings by providing that one-third of the entire cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby, and two-thirds should be borne and paid by The City of New York; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment believes it to be fair and equitable that the property benefited by such street opening should bear 77½ per cent. of the cost and expense thereof; therefore

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that 22½ per cent. of the cost and expense of opening and extending Quarry road, from Third avenue to Arthur avenue, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said improvement.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the President of the Borough of Queens—14.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON BELMONT PLACE, BRONX.

The resolution determining the proportion of the cost of opening Belmont place, from Third avenue to Arthur avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, which was submitted to the Board on August 4 and laid over, was brought up for consideration.

After hearing Mr. Joseph A. Flannery, representing the petitioners, the President of the Borough of Queens moved to amend the resolution so that 27½ per cent. of the cost would be borne by the City, which was carried, and the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, The Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the Corporation, known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, did on June 18, 1897, institute proceedings for the opening and extending of Belmont place, from Third avenue to Arthur avenue, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, and determined that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York did, on December 30, 1901, amend the resolution of the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement in said proceedings by providing that one-quarter of the entire cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby, and three-quarters should be borne and paid by The City of New York; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment believes it to be fair and equitable that the property benefited by such street opening should bear 72½ per cent. of the cost and expense thereof; therefore

Resolved, That in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that 27½ per cent. of the cost and expense of opening and extending Belmont place, from Third avenue to Arthur avenue, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said improvement.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the President of the Borough of Queens—14.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON EXTERIOR STREET, BRONX.

The Board took up for consideration the resolution which was laid over on August 4, determining the proportion of the cost for opening Exterior street, between One Hundred and Fiftieth street and Cromwell's creek, Borough of The Bronx, to be borne by the City.

The following report from the Engineer of the Finance Department was read:

In re reduction of assessment for opening Exterior street, between One Hundred and Fiftieth street and northerly side of Cromwell's creek, Borough of The Bronx.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Public Improvements held December 24, 1901 (Minutes, page 2403), a resolution was adopted amending the resolution adopted by said Board on the 27th day of December, 1899, by placing one-half of the entire cost and expense of the above proceeding upon The City of New York instead of the entire amount upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

This action was taken upon petitions signed by L. H. Mace & Co. and Henry Lewis Morris, praying that the entire cost of the proceeding be borne and paid by The City of New York, for the following reasons:

"That said Exterior street was laid out as a wharf or marginal street of The City of New York for the general benefit of commerce, and said street is part of the wharf and dock system of the Borough of The Bronx, and pursuant to section 819 of The Greater New York Charter the Board of Docks is given exclusive power to regulate the use of marginal streets, so that the land and building upon all such marginal streets may be used to the best advantage in connection with the wharves and bulkheads.

"That said Exterior street connects at One Hundred and Fiftieth street with the approach to the new bridge over the Harlem river, between One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, and One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, and forms the principal avenue of entrance and exit from said bridge.

"That said Exterior street at the northerly end connects with Cromwell creek, which is a navigable stream and an arm of the Harlem river, and forms the principal entrance to and exit from said Cromwell creek."

Public hearings were held on December 11 and 18, 1901, at which the petitioners were represented by counsel. Mr. John C. Shaw, being heard on behalf of the petitioners, states:

"This is a case when the City has laid out a street 100 feet wide immediately in the rear of docks on the Harlem river. Now the policy of The City of New York has been for years to acquire all private docks. They are acquiring them as fast as they can get money to do it. Now they have laid out a street about 300 or 400 feet east of the bulkhead line of docks, and they intend to assess the entire expense locally upon adjoining property owners."

On December 18, 1901, a resolution that the City pay 20 per cent. was offered and lost; also, a resolution that the City pay 40 per cent. was offered and lost.

On December 24, 1901, the matter was reconsidered. Mr. John C. Shaw being again heard for petitioners, spoke as follows:

"I have now a map showing the plan for the improvement of Exterior street and the docks which have been built. It is 100 feet wide, and runs between Cromwell's creek, which is at the northerly end, to the new bridge across the Harlem river at One Hundred and Forty-ninth street."

"Mr. Shea—

"The construction of this street gives access to these bulkheads?"

"A. It does, and gives access to the water front, so that it brings up for consideration the question of the improvement of the entire water front of the City. Now the importance of this is that it gives access to this water front, and as I said last week and can repeat again, the ultimate result is that the City acquires title to the docks. Now in this case we have a wide street connecting a new bridge across the Harlem river at One Hundred and Forty-ninth street with Cromwell's creek, so that it seems to me to be a case where the City should take a portion of this burden upon itself.

By reason of the public character of this improvement this is a case where the Board ought to act.

President—

"Q. Is that the only access to these piers

"A. They have their river front. The business of the water front is from the water; it is not from the street. Why, take West street—a lot is worth \$15,000 on one side, and a pier is worth \$100,000. My proposition is that the Board should deal with this question as I first suggested they should—have the City bear 50 per cent."—and a resolution was adopted placing one-half of the entire cost and expense of said proceeding upon The City of New York.

In reply to the arguments raised in the petitions and by the attorney for one of the petitioners, I would state as follows:

The length of the street in question is about 2,080 feet, of which 1,130 feet is 100 feet in width and 1,550 feet is 60 feet in width. Its position on the map is parallel with the United States pier and bulkhead line of the Harlem river, and about 400 feet easterly therefrom.

The chief argument of the petitioners is that it was laid out as a wharf or marginal street, and that the same is a part of the wharf and dock system of the Borough of The Bronx, and that, in consequence, pursuant to section 819 of the amended Charter, the Board of Docks is given exclusive power to regulate the use of such a street.

I do not agree with the petitioners, for the reason that this street was laid out by the Commissioner of Street Improvement of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth wards, and is shown on the plan of Section 8, which was adopted September 13, 1894, and proceedings for the opening of the street were initiated by the Board of Public Improvements irrespective of the Dock Department, and, in consequence, I believe that the street is not a wharf or marginal street within the meaning of section 819 of the amended Charter.

It would appear from the minutes and proceedings of the Department of Docks that proceedings for opening and improving marginal streets and wharves have always been taken by that Department.

The further argument of the attorney that it is the policy of the City to acquire all private docks as rapidly as it has the money to do so, and, in consequence, should pay for this improvement of opening a street 400 feet from the water front, has, to my mind, no force.

If the City eventually acquires all the water front and property between the bulkhead line and this street it will certainly pay the market price at the time, and the fact that the cost of opening said street was paid wholly or in part by the City would in all probability not then be considered.

The street as now laid out is certainly in the interest of the adjoining and abutting property owners, for without it no means of access is had to the property fronting on the river.

A comparison is drawn by the attorney with West street, in the Borough of Manhattan, which is not, to my mind, a parallel case. However, West street is not under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries, and it is only that portion of the now widened street, which lies to the west of the former West street, that is known as a marginal or wharf street, and under the jurisdiction of the said Department of Docks.

Again, there is no land between the easterly side of West street and the bulkhead which is not used as and for a street, whereas in the present instance there is 400 feet between the westerly side of Exterior street and the pier and bulkhead line, all private property.

In conclusion I would say that the assessment for opening Exterior street, from East One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street to Gerard avenue at Cheever place, initiated October 9, 1890, and which street is a continuation of the street in question, provides that the entire expense of opening shall be borne by the property deemed to be benefited.

In consequence I see no reason why the City should bear any portion of the assessment for the opening of Exterior street from One Hundred and Fiftieth street to the northerly side of Cromwell's creek.

Mr. John C. Shaw and Mr. Joseph A. Flannery appeared on behalf of property owners, and Mr. Flannery requested, on behalf of his clients, that the Board take steps to discontinue the opening proceedings.

The resolution submitted was then adopted, as follows:

Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York did, on December 27, 1899, institute proceedings for the opening and extending of Exterior street, from the northerly side of Cromwell's creek to One Hundred and Fiftieth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, and determined that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The said Board of Public Improvements did, on December 24, 1901, amend the aforesaid resolution by providing that one-half of the cost and expense of said proceedings should be borne and paid by The City of New York, and one-half should be assessed on the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City of New York believes it to be fair and equitable that the property benefited by such street opening should bear 90 per cent. of the cost and expense thereof; therefore

Resolved, That in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that 10 per cent. of the cost and expense of opening and extending Exterior street, from the northerly side of Cromwell's creek to One Hundred and Fiftieth street, Borough of The Bronx, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said improvement.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—15.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON SPOFFORD AVENUE, BRONX.

The resolution which was submitted and laid over on August 4, determining the portion of the cost to be borne by the City in the proceedings to open and extend Spofford avenue, from Longwood avenue to Tiffany street, and from Tiffany street to the Bronx river, Borough of The Bronx, was brought up for consideration.

After hearing Mr. John H. Judge and Mr. J. G. Baldwin, Jr., representing property owners, the Mayor moved to amend the resolution so as to provide that the City bear 23½ per cent. of the cost, which was carried, and the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, The Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York did, on November 19, 1897, and December 17, 1897, institute proceedings for the opening and extending of Spofford avenue, from Longwood avenue to Tiffany street, and from Tiffany street to the Bronx river, in the Twenty-third Ward, and determine that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York did, on December 30, 1901, amend the resolution of the said Board of Street Opening in said proceedings by providing that three-fifths of the entire cost and expense of said

proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby, and two-fifths should be borne and paid by The City of New York; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment believes it to be fair and equitable that the property benefited by such street opening should bear 76½ per cent. of the cost and expense thereof; therefore

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that 23½ per cent. of the entire cost and expense of opening and extending Spofford avenue, from Longwood avenue to Tiffany street, and from Tiffany street to the Bronx river, in the Twenty-third Ward, Borough of The Bronx, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said improvement.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—15.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON EDGEWATER ROAD, BRONX.

The Board took up for consideration the resolution submitted on August 4 and laid over determining the proportion of the cost to be borne by the City in the proceedings to open Edgewater road, from Westchester avenue to Garrison (Mohawk) avenue, Borough of The Bronx.

The following report from the Engineer of the Finance Department was read:

Reduction of assessment in the matter of opening Edgewater road, from Westchester avenue to Garrison (Mohawk) avenue, Borough of The Bronx.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Proceedings for opening Edgewater road as above were initiated by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement on December 24, 1897 (page 422), and the resolutions provided that the entire cost and expense should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited. Title vested on May 31, 1899.

The former Board of Public Improvements at a meeting held December 26, 1901, passed a resolution amending the action of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, by placing the entire cost upon The City of New York.

This action was taken upon three petitions, as follows:

1. William A. C. Dougherty, by Hawke & Flannery, attorneys, and Edward G. Faile by Charles H. Brush, attorney.
2. Charles C. Dickey and another, by Townsend & McIlvaine, attorneys.
3. The estate of William Simpson, by McCarty & Baldwin, attorneys.

The first two petitions request that the entire assessment be borne by the City, and the third asks for 50 per cent.

The main argument used is that the street lies between the railroad tracks of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad and the Bronx river, and in consequence there is little property fronting on the street which is benefited.

Again, that certain parties assessed for the benefit will derive no benefit from the opening of the street; that it was necessary to open this street in order to construct a main or trunk sewer; that the street is really a marginal or wharf street, and in consequence comes under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries, pursuant to section 819 of the Charter.

In reply I beg to report that the street is 100 feet wide, and has a length of about 2,450 feet. The New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad bounds the street on the westerly side for a distance of 1,400 feet of this length. On the easterly side the Bronx river is distant from a few feet at one point to 150 feet.

The sewerage plan of the district shows that the street carries no main sewer, and in consequence there was no necessity for the same being open for this purpose. The sewers shown are 12, 15 and 18-inch pipe sewers, emptying into a brick sewer of 2½ feet diameter.

If the property owners, however, receive no benefit from this street, I do not see that The City of New York is receiving any benefit by the opening of the same. It certainly makes no connection which was absolutely necessary at this time, and as shown before, was not required for an outlet sewer for the district.

The argument made that the street comes under the jurisdiction of the Dock Department, I think, has no foundation in fact, for the reason had the street been made or laid out by the Dock Department, proceedings for acquiring title to the same would have been conducted by that Department.

No title has been taken in this proceeding to the water front on the Bronx river, and in consequence no benefit will accrue to the City by the opening of this street on account of such water front, which is held by private parties.

I think the action taken in opening this street was premature, and that objection should have been made by the property owners interested at the time when the proceedings were initiated, or before the appointment of Commissioners and the vesting of title.

Had title not vested in the street, I should have recommended that proceedings be discontinued, but as the title has vested and without objection from the property owners until the assessment comes to be levied, I do not consider that the City should be charged with the entire expense.

I believe that if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should place the entire expense upon the property deemed to be benefited in this case, it would have a very salutary effect upon property owners, who would watch more closely the streets to be opened, and would not allow proceedings to continue, which were either premature or not in their interest, without strenuous objection.

Whereas, The Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, did on December 24, 1897, institute proceedings for the opening and extending of Edgewater road from Westchester avenue to Garrison (Mohawk) avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward, and determined that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York did on December 26, 1901, amend the resolution of the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement in said proceeding by providing that the entire cost of said proceedings should be borne and paid by The City of New York; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment believe it to be fair and equitable that the property benefited by such street opening should bear 75 per cent. of the cost and expense thereof; therefore

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that 25 per cent. of the cost and expense of opening and extending Edgewater road, from Westchester avenue to Garrison (Mohawk) avenue, Borough of The Bronx, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed on the property deemed to be benefited by the said improvement.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—15.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON WEST ONE HUNDRED AND SEVENTIETH STREET, MANHATTAN.

The resolution which was laid over on August 4, determining the proportion of the cost to be borne by the City for opening West One Hundred and Seventieth street, between Kingsbridge road and Haven avenue, Borough of Manhattan, was brought up for consideration.

After hearing Mr. Joseph A. Flannery, representing the property owners, the President of the Borough of Manhattan moved to amend the resolution as presented so as to provide that the City should bear 25 per cent. of the cost, which was carried by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—12.

Negative—The Comptroller—3.

The following resolution was then adopted:

Whereas, The Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the corporation, known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, did on October 15, 1897, institute proceedings for the opening and extending of West One Hundred and Seventieth street, between Kingsbridge road and Haven avenue, and determined that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York did, on December 30, 1901, amend the resolution of the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement in said proceedings, by providing that one-half of the cost and expense of said proceedings should be borne and paid by The City of New York and one-half should be assessed on the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment believes it to be fair and equitable that the property benefited by such street opening should bear 75 per cent. of the cost and expense thereof; therefore

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that 25 per cent. of the entire cost and expense of opening and extending West One Hundred and Seventieth street, between Kingsbridge road and Haven avenue, in the Twelfth Ward, Borough of Manhattan, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed on the property deemed to be benefited by the said improvement.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—15.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON EAST ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-SECOND STREET, BRONX.

The resolution determining the portion of the cost to be borne by the City in proceedings to open East One Hundred and Sixty-second street, from Jerome avenue to the Concourse, Borough of The Bronx, which was submitted to the Board on August 4 and laid over, was brought up for consideration.

The following report from the Engineer of the Finance Department was read:

Reduction of assessment in the matter of opening East One Hundred and Sixty-second street, from Jerome avenue to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Public Improvements, held December 24, 1901, a resolution was adopted amending a resolution passed by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement on November 5, 1897, by placing the entire cost and expense of the above entitled proceeding upon the City of New York instead of on the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

Title vested July 8, 1898, and the awards were confirmed August 27, 1901, and have since been paid.

The action was taken upon two petitions—

First—Signed by Joseph Richardson, by Hawke & Flannery, attorneys, praying that the entire cost be paid by the City at large, for the reason that East One Hundred and Sixty-second street, being 100 feet in width, was designed principally as an approach and entrance to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, and a large part of the property fronting on the same is below grade, and can never be developed or improved with reference to a frontage on the said street, and that in consequence the street is solely an approach to the Concourse.

That the Board of Public Improvements has frequently directed that the expense of acquiring 100-foot streets should be borne and paid largely by The City of New York.

That three-fourths of the cost of acquiring title to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse and the approaches thereto is borne by The City of New York, pursuant to law.

Second—Signed by George H. Huber, by Thomas S. Bassford, attorney, and recites that East One Hundred and Sixty-second street was laid out in 1899 as a 60-foot street, but was widened to a 100-foot street in 1895, in order to connect with the Grand Boulevard and Concourse.

That as the City assumes 75 per cent. of the cost of opening the Concourse, it should do likewise in this case. That the petitioner was assessed \$9,240, and that he does not believe, and is advised, that his property is not enhanced to such an amount.

That a 60-foot street would have made his property more salable than the present 100-foot street.

At the hearing on December 24, 1901, Mr. Flannery and Mr. A. C. Hottenroth were heard for the petitioners. Claim was made that after this street was laid out the Legislature laid out another approach to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse connecting with Macomb's Dam Bridge, and that in consequence it made it practically impossible to construct East One Hundred and Sixty-second street as an approach to the Concourse.

In reply to the above I beg to state that that part of East One Hundred and Sixty-second street included within this proceeding was an entirely new street, and substantial awards were made for each and every parcel of land taken.

That primarily it was designed as an approach to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, and is so shown on sections 8 and 9 of the final maps of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

That pursuant to chapter 57 of the Laws of 1896, as amended by chapter 697 of the Laws of 1897, another approach from Macomb's Dam Bridge to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse was laid out by the Legislature, and this approach made East One Hundred and Sixty-second street as an approach impracticable.

The only part, however, which it would be impossible to construct, out of a total length of about 1,550 feet, would be about 270 feet, or that part between Gerard avenue and East One Hundred and Sixty-first street. It would not be advisable, however, to construct that part between River avenue and Gerard avenue. The remaining part of the street, between Jerome avenue and River avenue, is not only a useful street, but is also a necessary one.

The claim that a large part of the property fronting on the street is so far below grade that it cannot be developed or improved with reference to the frontage on the street is hardly carried out by the existing conditions, for, from personal observation, I find that a part of this land has already been filled in to grade.

The awards made for the property between Jerome and River avenues, that part of the street which I consider a necessary street, and which it is perfectly feasible to construct, amount to \$89,853, out of a total award of \$129,333.50.

On the block between River avenue and Gerard avenue it is possible to construct this street on the plans as filed, but, as stated before, it may not be advisable to do so. The award made for the property in this block was \$19,500, leaving only \$19,992.50 paid for property which cannot be utilized for a street, and yet the City has been assessed for the entire benefit, namely, in the sum of over \$136,000.

I submit that this is a most unfair proposition, and the property owners, knowing the condition of affairs as they must have, having appeared before the Commission awarding damages by eminent counsel, that in view of the fact that they were to be assessed for the entire benefit, it was certainly in their interest at that time to make objection to the continuation of the proceeding, of which I can find nothing noted in the records.

The City of New York, as the owner of the property on the south side of East One Hundred and Sixty-second street, between Jerome avenue and Cromwell's creek, was assessed, irrespective of any action by the Board of Public Improvements for its own property, in the sum of \$23,340.93.

It is my opinion that the opening of this street between Jerome avenue and River avenue, at a width of 100 feet, will certainly be of immense advantage to the property on the north side of the street, and on the south side, east of Cromwell's creek, for the reason that the park acquired by the City in this vicinity, fronting on East One Hundred and Sixty-second street, and for which the property was not assessed, will make this one of the most valuable streets in the district.

Although I do not believe that the City at large will receive any special benefit from the opening of this street other than that assessed against its own property as noted above, in view of the fact that the street will not now be the entrance to the Concourse, as originally intended, and that in this case a 60-foot street might have been wide enough, I would submit for the consideration of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the proposition to place one-half of the increased width, namely, 100 feet over 60 feet, upon the City at large, which will be one-half of two-thirds, or 20 per cent.

After hearing Mr. Joseph A. Flannery and Hon. Charles L. Guy, representing property owners, the Mayor moved the adoption of the resolution, which was adopted, as follows:

Whereas, The Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York did, on November 5, 1897, institute proceedings for the opening and extending of East One Hundred and Sixty-second street, from Jerome avenue to the approach to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, at Walton avenue, and determined that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York did, on December 24, 1901, amend the resolution of the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement in said proceedings by providing that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings should be borne and paid by The City of New York; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment believes it to be fair and equitable that the property benefited by such street opening should bear four-fifths of the cost and expense thereof; therefore

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—15.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON PUBLIC PLACES AT ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-FIRST AND ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-SECOND STREETS, WASHINGTON AVENUE, ETC., BRONX.

The Board took up for consideration the resolution presented at the last meeting and laid over, determining the portion of the cost to be borne by the City in the proceedings for opening two public places at East One Hundred and Sixty-first street, Elton avenue, East One Hundred and Sixty-second street and Washington avenue; and East One Hundred and Sixty-first street, Washington avenue, East One Hundred and Sixty-second street and Brook avenue, Borough of The Bronx.

After hearing the Hon. Charles L. Guy, representing property owners, the President of the Borough of Queens moved to amend the resolution so as to provide that the City should bear the entire expense.

The President of the Borough of Brooklyn offered as a substitute amendment that the City should bear 75 per cent. of the cost.

The substitute was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the President of the Borough of Richmond—14.

Negative—President of the Borough of Queens—1.

Thereupon the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, The Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the corporation known as The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York did, on July 2, 1897, institute proceedings for the opening and extending of public place bounded by East One Hundred and Sixty-first street, Elton avenue, East One Hundred and Sixty-second street and Washington avenue; and also public place bounded by East One Hundred and Sixty-first street, Washington avenue, East One Hundred and Sixty-second street and Brook avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward, and determined that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York did, on December 24, 1901, amend the resolution of the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement in said proceedings by providing that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings should be borne and paid by The City of New York; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment believes it to be fair and equitable that the property benefited by such street opening should bear one-quarter of the cost and expense thereof; therefore

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that three-fourths of the cost and expense of opening and extending public place bounded by East One Hundred and Sixty-first street, Elton avenue, East One Hundred and Sixty-second street and Washington avenue; and also public place bounded by East One Hundred and Sixty-first street, Washington avenue, East One Hundred and Sixty-second street and Brook avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward, Borough of The Bronx, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said improvement.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—15.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON PUBLIC PLACE AT TREMONT AVENUE, BUCKHOUT STREET AND CONCOURSE, BRONX.

The Board took up the resolution laid over at the last meeting, determining the portion of the cost to be borne by the City in proceedings to acquire the public place formed by the intersection of Tremont avenue, Buckhout street and the Concourse, Borough of The Bronx.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan moved to amend the resolution so as to provide that the City would bear one-half the cost, which was carried by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—12.

Negative—Comptroller—3.

The following resolution was thereupon adopted:

Whereas, The Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York did, on December 3, 1897, institute proceedings for the opening and extending of public place formed by the intersection of Tremont avenue, Buckhout street and the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, and determined that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York did, on December 24, 1901, amend the resolution of the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement in said proceedings, by providing that the entire cost and expense of such proceedings should be borne and paid by The City of New York; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment believes it to be fair and equitable that the property benefited by such street opening should bear 50 per cent. of the cost and expense thereof; therefore

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that 50 per cent. of the cost and expense of opening and extending public place formed by the intersection of Tremont avenue, Buckhout street and the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said improvement.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—15.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON TIFFANY STREET, BRONX.

The Comptroller moved the adoption of the resolution presented at the last meeting, which was adopted as follows:

Whereas, The Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York did, on June 1, 1894, institute proceedings for the opening and extending of Tiffany street, from Longwood avenue to Intervale avenue, and determined that the entire cost and expense of such proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York did, on December 30, 1901, amend the resolution of the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement in said proceeding by providing that three-fourths of the entire cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby and one-fourth should be borne and paid by The City of New York; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment believes it to be fair and equitable that the property benefited by such street opening should bear 91½ per cent. of the cost and expense thereof; therefore

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that 8½ per cent. of the cost and expense of opening and extending Tiffany street, from Longwood avenue to Intervale avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward, Borough of The Bronx, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said improvement.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—15.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON RANDALL AVENUE, BRONX.

The Comptroller moved the adoption of the resolution which was presented on August 4, which was adopted as follows:

Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York did, on August 10, 1898, institute proceedings for the opening and extending of Randall avenue, from Truxton street and Leggett avenue to the Bronx river, in the Borough of The Bronx, and determined that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The said Board of Public Improvements did on December 30, 1901, amend the aforesaid resolution by providing that one-fourth of the cost and expense of said proceedings should be borne and paid by The City of New York, and three-fourths should be assessed on the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City of New York believes it to be fair and equitable that the property benefited by such street opening should bear 86½ per cent. of the cost and expense thereof; therefore

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that 13½ per cent. of the cost and expense of

opening and extending Randall avenue, from Truxton street and Leggett avenue to the Bronx river, in the Borough of The Bronx, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said improvement.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—15.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON WEST FARMS ROAD, BRONX.

The resolution presented on August 4 and laid over was brought up for consideration and was adopted as follows:

Whereas, The Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York did, on September 14, 1894, institute proceedings for the opening and extending of West Farms road, from the Southern Boulevard and Westchester avenue to the Boston road, in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and determined that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York did, on December 30, 1901, amend the resolution of the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement in said proceedings by providing that one-half of the cost and expense of said proceedings shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, and one-half should be assessed on the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment believes it to be fair and equitable that the property benefited by such street opening should bear 65 per cent. of the cost and expense thereof; therefore

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that 35 per cent. of the cost and expense of opening and extending West Farms road from the Southern Boulevard and Westchester avenue to the Boston road, in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, Borough of The Bronx, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said improvement.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—15.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON CLAY AVENUE, BRONX.

The resolution presented on August 4, and laid over, was brought up and was adopted as follows:

Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York did, on December 30, 1901, amend the resolution of the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement in said proceedings, by providing that seventy-five per cent. of the cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby, and twenty-five per cent. should be borne and paid by The City of New York; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment believes it to be fair and equitable that the property benefited by such street opening should bear 91½ per cent. of the cost and expense thereof; therefore

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that 8½ per cent. of the cost and expense of opening and extending Clay avenue (formerly Anthony avenue) from Webster avenue to East One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said improvement.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—15.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON VANDERBILT AVENUE WEST, BRONX.

The resolution presented on August 4, and laid over, was brought up for consideration and adopted, as follows:

Whereas, The Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York did, on November 16, 1894, institute proceedings for the opening and extending of Vanderbilt avenue West, from East One Hundred and Seventy-third street to Pelham avenue, and determined that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York did, on December 30, 1901, amend the resolution of the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement in said proceedings, by providing that 90 per cent. of the cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed on the property deemed to be benefited thereby, and 10 per cent. should be borne and paid by The City of New York; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment believes it to be fair and equitable that the property benefited by such street opening should bear 90 per cent. of the cost and expense thereof; therefore

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that 10 per cent. of the cost and expense of opening and extending Vanderbilt avenue West, from East One Hundred and Seventy-third street to Pelham avenue, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said improvement.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—15.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON CROTONA AVENUE, BRONX.

The resolution which was presented on August 4, and laid over, was adopted as follows:

Whereas, The Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York did, on May 8, 1896, institute proceedings for the opening and extending of Crotona avenue, from Boston road to the Southern Boulevard in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and determined that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited; and

Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York did, on December 30, 1901, amend the resolution of the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement in said proceedings, by providing that 75 per cent. of the cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby, and 25 per cent. should be borne and paid by The City of New York; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment believes it to be fair and equitable that the property benefited by such opening should bear 91½ per cent. of the cost and expense thereof; therefore

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that 8½ per cent. of the cost and expense of opening and extending Crotona avenue from Boston road to the Southern Boulevard, in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, Borough of The Bronx, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said improvement.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—15.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON MACOMB'S ROAD.

The resolution, which was presented on August 4 and laid over, was taken up for consideration, and adopted, as follows:

Whereas, The Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the corporation known as The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York did, on October 9, 1896, institute proceedings for the opening and extending of Macomb's road, from Jerome avenue to Aqueduct avenue, and determined that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York did, on December 30, 1901, amend the resolution of the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement in said proceedings, by providing that one-half of the cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby, and one-half should be borne and paid by The City of New York; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment believes it to be fair and equitable that the property benefited by such opening should bear 69 per cent. of the cost and expense thereof; therefore

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that 31 per cent. of the cost and expense of opening and extending Macomb's road, from Jerome avenue to Aqueduct avenue, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said improvement.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—15.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON PUBLIC PLACE AT ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-THIRD AND ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-FOURTH STREETS AND MORRIS AVENUE, BRONX.

On motion of the Mayor, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, the Board of Public Improvements did, on the 5th day of October, 1898, institute proceedings for the opening and extending of a public place, bounded by Morris avenue, East One Hundred and Forty-third street and East One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, and determined that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment believes it to be fair and equitable that the City should bear 50 per cent. of the cost and expense thereof; therefore,

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that 50 per cent. of the cost and expense of opening and extending the public place bounded by Morris avenue, East One Hundred and Forty-third street and East One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, shall be borne and paid by the City of New York, and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said improvement.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of The Bronx, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON MORRIS AVENUE, BRONX.

The following communication from the Corporation Counsel was placed on file:

LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE CORPORATION COUNSEL,  
NEW YORK, June 9, 1902.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—I have received your letter dated June 2, 1902, inclosing a communication to you from Harry P. Nichols, Assistant Engineer, dated May 29, 1902, in relation to the action taken by the former Board of Public Improvements in placing a portion of the assessment for opening Morris avenue from the easterly side of the New York and Harlem Railroad to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse upon the City at large, instead of the entire amount upon the property deemed to be benefited.

You ask me to advise you if I consider the point made by the Engineer well taken, so that you may know whether or not to present the matter to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or allow the assessment to be confirmed.

It appears from the report of the engineer that on December 30, 1901, the Board of Public Improvements adopted a resolution amending a resolution adopted by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement on the 20th of April, 1894. The resolution of 1894, however, was rescinded by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement on February 7, 1896. The Engineer considers that the action of the Board of Public

Improvements in amending a resolution which had been rescinded can have no force and effect, and hence the resolution of 1896, under which the entire cost and expense of the proceeding was to be assessed upon the property deemed benefited now governs, and therefore that no action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to review the action of the Board of Public Improvements is necessary, and that the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment should be instructed to levy the entire assessment on the property deemed to be benefited.

The position which the Engineer takes is probably technically correct, but I beg to submit the following:

An examination of the minutes shows that at a meeting of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, held April 20, 1894, a resolution for opening Morris avenue, from the east side of the New York and Harlem Railroad to the Twenty-third Ward line was adopted, and it was resolved "that the entire cost and expense of said proceeding shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited."

At a meeting of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, held February 7, 1896, the resolution referred to above was rescinded. A new resolution, however, was adopted at the same meeting to open Morris avenue anew, but within different limits. The new resolution called for the opening and extending of Morris avenue, from the east side of the New York and Harlem Railroad to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse; that is, the avenue was to be opened for a considerable distance further north than was provided for by the original resolution.

It was also provided in the resolution of February 7, 1896, "that the entire cost and expense of said proceeding shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited."

It appears from the minutes of the Board of Public Improvements that on December 30, 1901, a hearing was had on the petition for a reduction of the assessment for the opening of Morris avenue, from the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad to the Twenty-third Ward line, and the minutes proceed as follows:

"The President of the Borough of Brooklyn moved to amend the resolution by having the City bear 25 per cent., which was carried, and the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That so much of the resolution relating to the opening and extending of Morris avenue, from the east side of the New York and Harlem Railroad to the Twenty-third Ward line, adopted by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement on the 20th day of April, 1894, as provides 'that the entire cost and expense of said proceeding shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby,' is hereby amended so as to read 'that seventy-five (75) per cent. of the entire cost and expense of said proceeding shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby, and twenty-five (25) per cent. shall be borne and paid by The City of New York.'"

It is thus evident that the Board of Public Improvements assumed to amend a resolution of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement which had been rescinded by the latter Board.

I am inclined to think that the resolution of the Board of Public Improvements should be regarded as of no effect and that the resolution of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of February 7, 1896, should govern.

It can hardly be said that the reference in the resolution of the Board of Public Improvements to the resolution of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of April 20, 1894, is a clerical error, and that what was really intended was to amend the resolution of February 7, 1896, because the improvements referred to in the two ordinances were not the same.

Under the ordinance of 1894, as already intimated, Morris avenue was to be opened only to the Twenty-third Ward line, while under the resolution of 1896 Morris avenue was to be opened to a line much further north, that is, to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse.

Any question, however, that there may be upon this point can be easily avoided by the adoption now of a resolution by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment assessing either the whole of the cost or seventy-five (75) per cent. thereof upon the property owners as may be deemed just by the Board.

In my two letters to you, dated respectively March 15 and April 10, 1902, I have dealt with the general powers of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to take action in such cases.

On motion of the President of the Board of Aldermen, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, The Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the corporation known as The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York did, on November 6, 1896, institute proceedings for opening and extending Woodlawn road, from Jerome avenue to the Bronx Park, and determined that the entire cost and expense of the said proceedings should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment deems it fair and equitable that 12½ per cent. of the cost and expense of said proceeding should be borne and paid by The City of New York; therefore

Resolved, That in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that 12½ per cent. of the cost and expense of opening and extending Woodlawn road, from Jerome avenue to Bronx Park, in the Borough of The Bronx, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said improvement.

#### ACQUISITION OF LAND IN PUTNAM COUNTY FOR WATER SUPPLY.

In the matter of the acquisition of lands around Lakes Mahopac and Kirk and Mahopac Falls, etc., in Putnam County, for the preservation of the water supply, the report of the Secretary was presented, showing that the matter had been duly advertised as required by law.

Mr. Herbert Noble, representing the owners of Parcels Nos. 58 and 59; Mr. Clayton Ryder, representing the owners of parcels Nos. 50, 8, 64 and 51, and Mr. Thomas G. Barnes, representing the owner of Parcel No. 50, appeared and protested against the taking of the said parcels.

Whereas, This Board did cause public notice to be given that the said maps had been so prepared and submitted and that it would meet at Room 16 in the City Hall in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, on the 5th day of September, 1902, at 2.30 o'clock in the afternoon, at which time and place the said Board would afford to all persons interested a full opportunity to be heard respecting such maps, and the acquiring of the real estate shown thereon, which notice was given by publishing the same once a week in each week for three successive weeks prior to said meeting in the "City Record" and in the corporation newspapers, and in the Westchester News, Port Chester Daily Item and Mount Kisco Recorder, three newspapers published in the County of Westchester where the real estate to be acquired or affected is situated, and in the Evening Post and New York Press, two daily newspapers published in The City of New York. And the said Board having duly met pursuant to the said notice at the time and place mentioned therein and afforded to all persons interested a full opportunity to be heard respecting such maps and the acquisition of the real estate shown thereon, and all of such persons appearing having been heard, now be it further

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor of The City of New York:  
HONORABLE SIR—

DELANCEY STREET APPROACH TO WILLIAMSBURG BRIDGE—CONTINUATION TO ELM STREET.

As tenants of the building Nos. 406, 408, 410, 412 Broome street, Nos. 187 and 189 Elm street and Nos. 4 and 6 Marion street, we wish to enter our protest against the diagonal approach from the Bowery, which takes in this building from Elm to Marion street.

We deem it totally unnecessary to remove this building, as a proper plaza, if one is required, could be made by taking part of the Centre Market, an old building standing on a narrow block opposite the block between Marion and Mulberry streets, and if the little gore at the corner of Mulberry and Broome streets was removed ample space would be had there at very much less cost than the taking of this building.

The diagonal street will not only interfere with our building, but with many other large concerns in its path who have a large number of employees.

We understood this project had been given up and that the approach would stop at the Bowery. If the approach is necessary from Delancey street why not have it go straight to Elm street and take off the small half houses on this block at the rear, which will end the approach between Broome and Spring streets and right where the station of the underground railroad will be?

If this improvement is needed to reach the bridge only there is no necessity for taking this building away, as Broome street is wide; Centre street faces the Marion and Mulberry street block; Elm street is but 100 feet from it.

Broome street at the Bowery on the west side is only two or three hundred feet from where Delancey street will begin to cut through the block at the Bowery.

We inclose a sketch which is a copy of the plans said to be adopted. In this we have marked the Centre Street Market and Centre Market place, which was not shown on the drawing. If the two pieces marked with the red cross are taken away instead of this building they would cost less and would give easier access to the approach.

If the approach is intended for trucks to get to Williamsburg Bridge, by looking at the map you will see that trucks from down town will not come up to the approach, but will go through the wide streets below and cross to Delancey street east of Bowery by side streets, which is a shorter haul.

Teams from up town will not come down to the diagonal approach, as they would naturally go through the streets above Eighth street and down the nearest way, which is Fourth avenue and the Bowery to Delancey street.

The Spring street station of the underground railroad is one block away from Broome street.

The Hon. A. C. Hottenroth and Albert E. Hayes, President of the North Side Board of Trade, appeared in the matter.

On motion of the Mayor, the matter was referred to the Chief Engineer for a report as to the probable cost.

#### LAYING OUT SOUTHERN BOULEVARD APPROACH TO THIRD AVENUE BRIDGE, BRONX.

In the matter of the laying out of an approach to the Third Avenue Bridge, in the Borough of The Bronx, the report of the Secretary was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing.

After hearing Mr. Davis in opposition to the proposed lay out the matter was referred to the Chief Engineer to prepare an amended plan.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON WEST ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-FIFTH STREET, MANHATTAN.

Mr. Flannery and Mr. Jencks appeared. After hearing Mr. Jencks in support of the petition for a reduction of the assessment, on motion of the Mayor the matter was referred to the Comptroller for investigation and report.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON EAST ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY-THIRD STREET, BRONX.

The Hon. Charles L. Guy appeared in support of the petition for a reduction of the assessment.

The Mayor moved that the City assume 25 per cent. of the cost. The roll was called and the vote was as follows:

The Comptroller then moved that the City assume 20 per cent. of the cost, which was carried, and the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, The Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, did, on June 25, 1897, institute proceedings for the opening and extending of East One Hundred and Fifty-third street, from Mott avenue to the yards of the New York and Harlem Railroad, in the Twenty-third Ward, and determined that the entire cost and expense of such proceeding should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York deem it fair and equitable that 20 per cent. of the cost of said proceedings should be borne and paid by The City of New York; therefore

Resolved, That in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determine that twenty per cent. of the cost and expense of opening and extending East One Hundred and Fifty-third street, from Mott avenue to the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad, Borough of The Bronx, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, and the remainder of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said improvement.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of The Bronx, President of the Borough of Queens, and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

#### REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON PUBLIC PLACE AT BERGEN AVENUE AND EAST ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-NINTH STREET, BRONX.

The following petition and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

SUPREME COURT.

In the Matter  
of  
Opening a Public Place at One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street, Bergen Avenue and Gerard Street, and Gerard Street.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Petition of Marion W. Lawson.

The petitioner respectfully represents that she owns a lot of land upon the northeasterly corner of Bergen avenue and said Gerard street, with no other improvements, except a small frame house of comparatively small value thereon, fronting on said avenue 111 feet and on said Gerard street 79 feet.

That the proposed assessment on her said property to pay the costs and expense of said opening was \$1,897.71.

That she made objections to said proposed assessment through her attorney, who submitted a brief in that behalf, a copy whereof, with additional brief in support of this petition, is herewith submitted to this Honorable Board.

That after oral argument before the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, in support of said objections, said proposed assessment has been reduced from said sum of \$1,897.71 to \$1,700.75.

That your petitioner is informed and believes that said assessment of \$1,700 is more than twice the value of the benefit to her said premises from said public place were it to be retained for the purposes only for which it was originally intended.

That the petitioner is informed by her attorney that the Rapid Transit Commissioners have changed the route of the Rapid Transit Railroad since the hearing before the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment upon the objections of the petitioner, so that it will pass under and through said public place, making an open cut, which will begin at the southerly line of Gerard street, very near the northerly line of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, but 122.05 feet from the intersection of the northerly line of Gerard street with One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, and extend northeasterly across the whole width of Gerard street, thereby wholly destroying the only valuable, legal public thoroughfare along the southerly line of the petitioner's land, and the principal benefit to said land from said opening.

That the petitioner is informed by her counsel that the Rapid Transit Railroad is mainly for public use and public benefit, and that local benefit from it is only incidental; and that any benefit the assessed property may derive from the Rapid Transit Railroad will be a part of the general benefit, and not special benefit; that the use of the Rapid Transit Railroad will afford large private gain to the party who builds and runs it, and that it is a well-established rule of right that a local assessment cannot legally be levied to pay for the cost and expense of a local improvement, which local improvement has been wrenched from its original intended use and devoted to the use and the benefit of the public at large, or for the benefit of private parties. That the petitioner is informed by her counsel that the law under which the property in this proceeding was condemned provides that it shall be held in trust for the use for which it was taken.

The petitioners therefore pray this Honorable Board to take the necessary steps to put the cost and expense of this public place on the City at large, and as in duty bound will ever pray.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—I return herewith the petition of Marion W. Lawson, concurred in by Richard S. Alcock, secretary of the Young Men's Christian Union, and by the Weber Piano Company, asking that the City assume the entire cost of acquiring a public place bounded by East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Bergen avenue and Gerard street, in the Borough of The Bronx.

The petition states that the assessment is more than double any possible benefit and that the rapid transit railroad will pass through the public place referred to and will cross Gerard street in open cut, thereby destroying any benefit which might have been derived from the acquisition of the property as a public place.

This opening was authorized by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement on May 7, 1897, the entire cost being placed upon the property to be benefited. The opening included not only the acquisition of the public place, but Gerard street also, which is but one short block in length. Prior to this proceeding Gerard street had been in use as an old road of nearly the same width as the street as now opened, namely, 50 feet. The property actually acquired was as follows: For the public place, 2,126 square feet; for the street not before in use, 96.4 feet, previously acquired as street, 7,585.5 square feet.

The site of the public place was occupied by buildings, some of which encroached slightly upon the street, and the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, acting

under section 980 of the Charter, placed \$1,000 of the costs on the City. The area of assessment is approximately circular, extending for 750 feet in every direction. Title was vested in the City on May 27, 1898, and the awards were confirmed on June 25, 1901. Costs amount to \$18,501.52, the total of the awards being \$13,409.30.

The street being only 50 feet in width would not be covered by the general policy recently adopted by the Board of assuming a portion of the cost of acquiring streets over 60 feet in width. It seems impossible for me to consider the actual benefit to the property caused by this public place without taking into account the change in the proposed route of the Rapid Transit Subway, although this change, recommended by the Rapid Transit Commission, has not yet been approved by the Board of Aldermen. It will certainly cut Gerard street in two.

I have had several interviews with Mr. William H. Pierce, counsel for the petitioner, and have suggested that if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment granted any relief in this matter, that the property owners who were assessed should waive all claim for damage caused by the change in line of the Rapid Transit Subway. He is disposed to consider the suggestion favorably, and I beg to report the facts to the Board with the recommendation that an effort be made to secure such waivers from the property owners interested, after which the Board would consider the question on its merits.

I beg, therefore, to recommend that a hearing be given in this matter on September 12. This date is fixed because confirmation of the report of the Commissioners is now pending and has been adjourned for two weeks or until September 17, before which date action should be taken if at all.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
