(a) Resolution including in the classification of positions in the Exempt Class,  
Fire Department, the position of Superintendent of Fire Alarm Telegraph;

(b) Including in the classification of positions in the Exempt Class, Tenement  
House Department, the position of Messenger in the Commissioner's office;

—also that the following resolutions were laid over, pending the establishment of such  
positions by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen:

(a) Including in the Exempt Class the position of Stenographer to the Commis-  
sioner, Department of Bridges;

(b) Including in the Exempt Class the position of Assistant Superintendent of  
Parks, Brooklyn;

(c) Including in the Exempt Class the position of Deputy Superintendent of Parks,  
The Bronx;

(d) Including in the Exempt Class the position of two Division Superintendents

examination a fair test of the fitness of the candidates to fill the position of Fireman;  
that, with the exception of the paper on Government, the examination was even simpler  
in character than preceding ones; that the inclusion of the paper on Government or  
Civics was provided for in the rules adopted by the Commission on December 4, 1903,  
and took the place of the paper entitled "Rules and Regulations," formerly submitted  
to candidates in the examination for Fireman; that, with this exception, the examination  
was the same in character as those previously held, and that he had tried to make, and  
had hoped he had succeeded in making, the examination a simple one, calculated to  
bring out the qualifications and fitness of the applicants to fill the position sought; that,  
in view of the fact that the physical examination had been a severe one, he considered  
that the candidates who succeeded in passing both the physical and mental tests would  
fill the highest requirements of the position, both as to physical attainments and general  
intelligence. The Chief Examiner then retired.

After discussing the matter at some length, the Commission adjourned to meet on  
Monday, November 21, at 4 P. M.

## Notable Fires.

April 3, 6.23 P. M., Station 278.

Fire occurred at Nos. 26 to 30 Bleecker street, a seven-story brick building, 75 by 100, occupied by clothing manufacturers.

Fire occurred at Nos. 440 to 444 Canal street, extending through to Nos. 12 to 16 Vestry street, a seven-story brick building, 75 by 150, occupied by the Germania Netting Works.

Fire originated on the fifth floor and extended to the sixth and seventh floors by pipe recesses before the arrival of the Department; damage—considerable.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Chiefs of Battalion Larkin, Guerin, Hayes, Lucas, and Acting Chiefs of Battalion Walker and Ross.

The services of 13 engines, Search-light Engine No. 1, 4 hook and ladder companies and Water Tower No. 1 were required, and the duration of the fire was 4 hours.

April 7, 9.37 A. M., Station 127.

Fire occurred at No. 117 Walker street, a seven-story brick building, 25 by 75, occupied for business purposes.

Fire originated on the first floor and extended to second, third, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh floors and roof, by pipe recesses, belt holes and burning through flooring; damage—considerable.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Kruger, Chiefs of Battalion Hayes, Larkin and Guerin, and Acting Chief of Battalion McAuliffe.

## Notable Fires.

April 14, 1904—Fire at Nos. 76-80 Irving street, three-story brick building, 80 by 110 feet, occupied as cocoanut oil factory. Fire originated on the first floor and extended to all floors, considerably damaging building and contents. Chief officers present were Frank J. Duffy, Deputy Chief Acting in charge of boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens; Acting Deputy Chief James Cunningham, Chiefs of Battalion Cummings, Dooley and Matschke and Acting Chief of Battalion Friel. The services of fifteen engines, two fireboats, four hook and ladder companies and one searchlight engine were required. Duration of fire was about two hours. The first alarm was received at 4.38 P. M. At 4.42 and 4.56 P. M., respectively, the third and fourth alarms were sent out. Estimated damage, \$75,000.

April 13, 1904—Fire at Nos. 280-292 Gold street, three-story brick building, 150 by 60 feet, occupied as color works. Fire originated on third floor, and was confined to same, damaging building and contents considerably. Chief officers present were Deputy Chief of Department in charge boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Lally, Deputy Chief of Department Duffy, Chiefs of Battalion Matschke, Cunningham and Cummings and Acting Chief of Battalion O'Connor. The services of eleven engines and four hook and ladder companies were required, and the duration of the fire was about one and one-half hours. The first alarm was received at 12.35 A. M. Third alarm was sent out at 12.39 A. M. Estimated damage, \$16,000.

April 13, 1904—Fire at Nos. 76-94 Ninth street, four-story brick building, 125 by 50 feet, occupied as paint and whitening works. Fire originated on second floor and extended to third and fourth floors, damaging building and contents considerably. Chief officers present were Deputy Chief of Department in charge boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Lally, Deputy Chief of Department Murray, Chiefs of Battalion Dooley, Matschke and Root and Acting Chief of Battalion Rikel. The services of twelve engines and three hook and ladder trucks were required, and the duration of the fire was about one and one-half hours. The first alarm was received at 6.16 P. M. At 6.20, 6.21 and 6.25 P. M., respectively, the second, third and fourth alarms were sent out. Estimated damage, \$7,000.

#### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits, thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
