### REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

#### Report of Committee on Finance—

Nos. 1982 and 2116.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

The Committee on Finance of the Board of Aldermen, to whom was referred the assessment rolls of the estates, real and personal, of The City of New York, for the year 1905, together with a communication from the Comptroller of The City of New York, dated May 23, 1905, transmitting the Budget for the year 1905, accompanied by his certificate of the amounts authorized by law to be raised by tax in and for the year 1905, and an estimate of the revenues of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation during the current year, respectfully submits the following

#### REPORT:

The total Budget for the year 1905 is one hundred and nine million eight hundred and seventeen thousand five hundred and ninety-three dollars and three cents (\$109,817,593.03), which includes county charges and expenses for the four counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, aggregating four million and forty-two thousand three hundred and forty-eight dollars (\$4,042,348.00), leaving one hundred and five million seven hundred and seventy-five thousand two hundred and forty-five dollars and three cents (\$105,775,245.03), as the amount of the Budget which affects the general tax rates of The City of New York.

In addition to the amount of four million and forty-two thousand three hundred and forty-eight dollars (\$4,042,348.00), included in the Budget for County Charges and Expenses, the following amounts disbursed during the year 1904 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds for Judgments and Claims for county charges or liabilities, are to be raised by tax in the year 1905, in the respective counties, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the revised Greater New York Charter, viz.:

Section 902 of the Charter, referred to in the Comptroller's communication, directs that the amounts required for the payment of all county charges and expenses shall be levied and collected from the taxable property within each of said counties respectively, to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred for county as distinguished from City purposes. Compliance with the provision of law will, of course, forever prevent an uniform tax rate from prevailing in The City of New York.

#### AMOUNT TO BE RAISED FOR CITY AND STATE PURPOSES BY GENERAL RATES.

The following statement shows, therefore, the proportion of the Budget which is to be raised by taxation at uniform rates throughout the whole City:

#### PERCENTAGE TO BE ADDED FOR DEFICIENCIES IN COLLECTION.

Section 248 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"Section 248. It shall be the duty of the Board of Aldermen to include, in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per centum of said aggregate amount to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your Committee has conferred with the Department of Finance in regard to the amount that will be required to provide for and meet such deficiencies as may occur in the actual product of the taxes to be imposed and levied in and for the year 1905, and have concluded to recommend that two per centum (2 per cent.) of the amounts to be collected by taxation for State, City and county budgetary purposes be added to and included in the tax levy for this purpose, this being the same percentage adopted annually since consolidation and almost exactly the figure which has prevailed in The City of New York prior to consolidation for over twenty years. Further provision for meeting deficiencies in the collection of taxes levied upon personal property has been made by the enactment of chapter 639 of the Laws of 1905.

#### THE ASSESSED VALUATIONS.

Certain corporations which pay taxes directly to the State are exempt by law from local taxation for State purposes, so far as their assessment affects personal property. It is provided by section 202 of chapter 908 of the Laws of 1896, as follows:

"Section 202. The personal property of every corporation, company, association or partnership, taxable under this article, other than for an organization tax, shall be exempt from assessment and taxation upon its personal property for State purposes, and the personal property of every corporation taxable under section one hundred and eighty-seven of this article, other than for an organization tax and as provided in chapter 37 of the General Laws, shall be exempt from assessment and taxation for all other purposes, if all taxes due and payable under this article have been paid thereby."

This provision of law requires, therefore, a special rate of tax to be imposed upon the personal estates of corporations which are exempt from local taxation for State purposes, differing from and less than the general rate for State, city and county purposes.

The assessment rolls for the current year, transmitted to the Board of Aldermen July 3, 1905, show the following valuations by counties:

The county lines correspond with the borough lines in all the boroughs except Manhattan and The Bronx, which, together, constitute New York county, and, as the rate of taxation in these two boroughs happens to be the same, it will be convenient in dealing with the assessed valuations to use the county classification.

The assessed valuation of the personal estate of corporations, joint stock companies or associations which have been found to be exempt under section 202 of chapter 908 of the Laws of 1896 from taxation for State purposes in the year 1905, as appears by a detailed statement thereof on file in the Department of Finance, is as follows:

#### THE CITY TAX RATES: THE TOTAL TAX RATES.

As shown in the beginning of this report, the amount to be raised by uniform rates throughout the entire City for general City and State purposes is \$82,796,242 26

Adding 2 per cent. for deficiencies in collection..... 1,655,924 84

Amount to be levied..... \$84,452,167 10

It is to be noted that the quota of State taxes due from each of the respective counties is included in the Budget for City purposes and in the above stated amount of tax to be raised by general rates throughout the City. In 1901 the quota of State taxes due from the several counties was included in the county charges and expenses, levied and raised in the several counties. The amount of State taxes due from The City of New York is this year imposed and levied with the tax to be raised by general rates throughout the City, pursuant to an opinion of the Corporation Counsel, expressed in a communication to the Comptroller under date of October 25, 1901.

Separating the amount to be levied, so as to show the proportion thereof for State and local City purposes respectively, produces the following result:

Your Committee recommends that in fixing the actual tax rates in the tax levy ordinance the decimal fractions of such rates be not carried beyond five figures, i. e., hundred thousandths of one per cent., as any smaller fraction would have no practical effect on individual assessments, while increasing enormously and unnecessarily

the difficulties of extending the tax-rolls and preparing tax bills. The total loss by omission of such remote decimals will be only \$513.27 in the whole tax levy of \$88,985,645.75.

As there is nothing to be gained by separate extensions on the tax-rolls of the City, State and County rates, your Committee recommends that the aggregate thereof, or, in other words, the total tax rates in each borough, as the case may be, be fixed in the ordinance levying the taxes for the year 1905. Such an ordinance has been prepared and is submitted herewith for approval and adoption by the Board of Aldermen.

#### SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS IN THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN, TO BE COLLECTED WITH THE ANNUAL TAXES.

The Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments have added to the assessment rolls of the Borough of Brooklyn:

First—The amounts required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for the payment of principal and interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335, of the Laws of 1886, for flagging, curbing, guttering and paving certain streets in the Twenty-sixth Ward of said borough (late Town of New Lots).

Second—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for sewerage improvements in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889 and amendments thereto.

Third—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for street improvements in the Thirty-first Ward of said borough (late the Town of Gravesend), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, as amended.

Fourth—The amount required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 544 of the Laws of 1888, for flagging improvements in the Thirtieth Ward of said borough (late the Town of New Utrecht).

Fifth—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894.

The amount to be raised for the payment of the principal and interest on the New Lots bonds is twenty-six thousand eight hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-two cents (\$26,892.22); the amount of the Flatbush sewer installment is thirty-five thousand two hundred and thirty-five dollars and fifteen cents (\$35,235.15); the amount of the Thirty-first Ward improvement installment is fifty-two thousand and eighty-four dollars and fifty-eight cents (\$52,084.58); the amount of the Thirtieth Ward flagging tax is two thousand six hundred and sixty-six dollars and sixty-four cents (\$2,666.64); the amount of the Flatbush avenue improvement installment is thirty-eight thousand five hundred and ninety-nine dollars and forty-two cents (\$38,599.42).

The law requires that these assessments and installments be included in the tax levy ordinance to be levied and collected with the annual taxes.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of The City of New York, and the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for the payment of the quota of the State taxes due from said counties, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1905.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of eighty-two million seven hundred and ninety-six thousand two hundred and forty-two dollars and twenty-six cents (\$82,796,242.26), to pay the expenses included in the Budget for the year 1905, for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the City debt, and the quota of State taxes due from the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, which sum so imposed and levied by this section is that portion of the Budget for the year 1905, amounting in the aggregate to one hundred and nine million eight hundred and seventeen thousand five hundred and ninety-three dollars and three cents (\$109,817,593.03), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of four million and forty-two thousand three hundred and forty-eight dollars (\$4,042,348.00), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, included therein, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of twenty-two million nine hundred and seventy-nine thousand and two dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$22,979,002.77), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York, in a communication dated May 23, 1905, transmitting his certificate of the amount of the appropriations made in the Budget for the year 1905, copies of which communication and certificate and of the said Budget are as follows:

Sec. 2. In addition to the sum of eighty-two million seven hundred and ninety-six thousand two hundred and forty-two dollars and twenty-six cents (\$82,796,242.26) imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within The City of New York, in and by the first section of this ordinance, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon said estates, to be raised, collected and paid according to law, 2 per cent. of said sum, or one million six hundred and fifty-five thousand nine hundred and twenty-four dollars and eighty-four cents (\$1,655,924.84), the said amount being necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by the first section of this ordinance, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter.

Sec. 3. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of New York, the sum of two million five hundred and fifty-one thousand four hundred and sixty-nine dollars (\$2,551,469), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1905, included in the Budget, and the further sum of two hundred and eighty-eight thousand two hundred and nineteen dollars and seventy-three cents (\$288,219.73) paid during the year 1904, from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of two million eight hundred and thirty-nine thousand six hundred and eighty-eight dollars and seventy-three cents (\$2,839,688.73), and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county 2 per cent. of said last-mentioned sum, or fifty-six thousand seven hundred and ninety-three dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$56,793.77), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making the total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of New York, two million eight hundred and ninety-six thousand four hundred and eighty-two dollars and fifty cents (\$2,896,482.50).

Sec. 4. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Kings, the sum of one million two hundred and fifty-three thousand five hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$1,253,525), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1905, included in the Budget, and the further sum of one hundred and two thousand two hundred



and nine dollars and fifty-six cents (\$102,209.56), paid during the year 1904, from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of one million three hundred and fifty-five thousand seven hundred and thirty-four dollars and fifty-six cents (\$1,355,734.56), and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county 2 per cent. of said last-mentioned sum or twenty-seven thousand one hundred and fourteen dollars and sixty-nine cents (\$27,114.69), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making a total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Kings, of one million three hundred and eighty-two thousand eight hundred and forty-nine dollars and twenty-five cents (\$1,382,849.25).

Sec. 5. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Queens, the sum of one hundred and seventy-four thousand two hundred and sixty-nine dollars (\$174,269), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1905, included in the Budget, and the further sum of eleven thousand two hundred and eighty-three dollars and twenty-four cents (\$11,283.24), paid during the year 1904, from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of one hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred and fifty-two dollars and twenty-four cents (\$185,552.24), and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county 2 per cent. of said last-mentioned sum or three thousand seven hundred and eleven dollars and four cents (\$3,711.04), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making a total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Queens, of one hundred and eighty-nine thousand two hundred and sixty-three dollars and twenty-eight cents (\$189,263.28).

Sec. 6. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Richmond, the sum of sixty-three thousand and eighty-five dollars (\$63,085), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1905, included in the Budget, and the further sum of five hundred and twenty-six dollars and forty cents (\$526.40), paid during the year 1904, from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of sixty-three thousand six hundred and eleven dollars and forty cents (\$63,611.40), and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county 2 per cent. of said last-mentioned sum or one thousand two hundred and seventy-two dollars and twenty-two cents (\$1,272.22), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making a total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Richmond, of sixty-four thousand eight hundred and eighty-three dollars and sixty-two cents (\$64,883.62).

Sec. 7. The assessment rolls of the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, for the year 1905, are hereby ratified, approved and confirmed and the aggregate amount of the assessed valuations of said estates for such year is hereby fixed at the sum of five billion nine hundred and twelve million one hundred and forty-six thousand two hundred and twenty-seven dollars (\$5,912,146,227), in accordance with the returns of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments for said year submitted to the Board of Aldermen on the 3d day of July, 1905.

Sec. 8. The rates of tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, and the several counties and boroughs included within said City are, for the purpose of carrying out and making effective the foregoing sections of this ordinance, hereby fixed for the year 1905, as follows:

I. In the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (being also the County of New York), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.48065 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.49051 per centum.

II. In the Borough of Brooklyn (being also the County of Kings), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.55277 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.56264 per centum.

III. In the Borough of Queens (being also the County of Queens), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.54536 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.55523 per centum.

IV. In the Borough of Richmond (being also the County of Richmond), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.54834 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.55821 per centum.

Sec. 9. In addition to the sums mentioned in the preceding sections of this ordinance, to be levied and imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within The City of New York, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-sixth Ward (late Town of New Lots) of the Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward, improved by flagging, guttering, curbing and paving under authority of chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued for the above purposes, the sum of twenty-six thousand eight hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-two cents (\$26,892.22), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land, in the proportion of benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Commission charged with making said improvements; there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by the construction of sewers authorized by chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889 and the amendments thereto, the sum of thirty-five thousand two hundred and thirty-five dollars and fifteen cents (\$35,235.15), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Board of Street and Sewer Commissioners of said town and its successor; and there shall be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Thirty-first Ward (late Town of Gravesend) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by local improvements for which the unpaid assessments heretofore levied in said town exceeding the sum of one hundred dollars are, under the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, and the amendments thereto, to be levied in forty annual installments, the sum of fifty-two thousand and eighty-four dollars and fifty-eight cents (\$52,084.58), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined; and there shall be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Thirtieth Ward (late Town of New Utrecht) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward, improved by flagging, under authority of chapter 544 of the Laws of 1888, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued for the above purpose, the sum of two thousand six hundred and sixty-six dollars and sixty-four cents (\$2,666.64), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land situated in the flagging districts established by the Flagging Commissioners of said town; and there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush) in said Borough of Brooklyn, situated within the district of assessment fixed and determined by the Board of Assessors of The City of New York, for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, under authority of chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894, for the purpose of meeting the principal

and interest on the bonds issued for said improvement, the sum of thirty-eight thousand five hundred and ninety-nine dollars and forty-two cents (\$38,599.42), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by said Board of Assessors on each lot, piece or parcel of land lying within the boundary lines of said assessment districts.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said City to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen, at least four weeks before its annual meeting in each and every year, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in any year, on account of the corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, or for City purposes within said City as created by this act, and purposes for which said City is liable, and on account of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the City Treasury during the then current year from all the sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the Sinking funds of The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York and of any of the municipal and public corporations, or parts of municipal and public corporations, by this act consolidated with the municipal corporation known as The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, other than the surplus of revenues of any such Sinking Funds for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt of the municipal corporation known as The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, or the like debts of the municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which by law they are required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the county officers and the other county charges and expenses in the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of county officers and other county charges and expenses of such county; to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the county for county as distinguished from City purposes.

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law, I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body statement as follows:

First—The Budget, in detail, for the year 1905.

Second—The amount of county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said Budget, as well as the amount of county charges and expenses paid during the year 1904 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, which amounts together are to be raised, respectively, by levy upon taxable property within each of said counties, as provided by section 902 of the Charter.

Third—The estimated receipts of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation. Concerning the receipts of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation, the following are the items of my estimate:

The attention of your Honorable Body is respectfully called to the provisions of section 248 of the Amended Greater New York Charter, as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Board of Aldermen to include, in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them, imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes, as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per centum of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your attention is also specially called to the provisions of section 909 and 910 of the same act, prescribing the method of preparing and disposing of the assessment rolls and also to the provisions of section 911 of the same act, designating the fifteenth day of September as the date when the assessment rolls shall be finally completed, to be delivered to the Receiver of Taxes, with the proper warrant or warrants annexed thereto, directing him to collect the several sums mentioned in said rolls and to pay the same, from time to time, when so collected, to the Chamberlain of said City.

## FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show receipts and disbursements in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payment should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and except in emergency cases, Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. "That no money be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers."

8. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

For infants under two (2) years of age, and in infants' hospitals also between the ages of two and five, per day.....	\$0 38
For dependent children, from two (2) to sixteen (16) years of age, per week.....	2 00
For delinquent children, per annum.....	110 00
For adult inmates of reformatories, committed by the Courts, per annum.....	110 00

That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 35 cents per week for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

\* Institutions shall be paid \$18 for the care of the mother and child during fifteen days of her confinement, and for every day thereafter shall be paid at the rate of 38 cents per day for the support of the child, and also \$12 per month for the maintenance of the mother, if she remain in the institution nursing her own infant after the expiration of the fifteen days.

## NOTABLE FIRES.

January 3, 1905, 10.11 P. M., Station 212.

Fire occurred at Pier 36, North river, a two-story frame and iron building, 75 by 900 feet, occupied as steamship offices and pier.

Originated on second floor and extended to cock-loft, considerably damaging building.

Chief Officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief Kruger, Chiefs of Battalion Shay, Larkin, Hayes and Ross.

The services of fourteen engine companies, Searchlight Engine Company 1 and four hook and ladder companies were required, and the duration of the fire was thirty minutes.

Cause, unknown.

At 10.28½ p. m. and 10.31 p. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

January 4, 1905, 4.51 A. M., Station 438.

Fire occurred at Nos. 227 and 229 West Twenty-ninth street, a six-story brick building 50 by 95 feet, occupied by manufacturers of window blinds.

Fire originated on the fifth floor and extended to fourth and sixth floors by stairway, elevator shaft and pipe recesses, considerably damaging building.

Chief Officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief Duane, Chiefs of Battalion Howe, Kenlon and Devanny.

The services of twelve engine companies, Search Light Engine Company 2, four hook and ladder companies and Water Tower No. 3 were required, and the duration of the fire was one hour.

Cause unknown.

At 4.55 a. m. and 5.01 a. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

January 13, 1905, 5.51 P. M., Station 15.

Fire occurred at No. 47 Broad street, a four-story brick building, 25 by 125 feet, occupied by dealers in elastic surgical bandages.

#### NOTABLE FIRES.

February 28, 1905.

Fire at Nos. 941 to 965 Flushing avenue.

Fire originated in one-story brick building, size 50 by 60 feet, located in the rear of No. 951 Flushing avenue, on the north side, between Bushwick and Evergreen avenues, occupied as annealing room for metals by Ironclad Manufacturing Company; building and contents considerably damaged. Extended to two and three-story frame building, 60 feet deep, extending 265 feet along Flushing avenue, Nos. 941 to 965, to corner of Evergreen avenue; 180 feet along Evergreen avenue to Cook street, and 265 feet along Cook street, Nos. 186 to 216, occupied by the same company as factory and storage; damage to building, total on Flushing avenue and slight along Evergreen avenue and Cook street; damage to contents considerable on Flushing avenue side and slight on Evergreen avenue and Cook street sides.

Chief Officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department in charge boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Thomas Lally, Deputy

Chief Frederick W. Gooderson, Jr., Chief of Battalion Graham and Acting Chiefs of Battalion McGuire, Friel and Rieckenberg.

The fire was under great headway on the arrival of the Department owing to delay in sending in alarm, the flimsy construction of building and the immense amount of open floor space.

The services of twelve engine and three hook and ladder companies were required, and the fire was under control in about two and one-half hours.

The first alarm was received at 3.56 a. m., and at 4.01, 4.01½ and 4.19 a. m., respectively, the second, third and fourth alarms were sent out.

Estimated damage, \$55,000.

March 1, 1905.

Fire at Gardiner and Maspeth avenues.

Fire originated on second floor of two-story frame building, 25 by 25 feet, located at Gardiner and Maspeth avenues, south side, between Gardiner and Stewart avenues, occupied by Valvoline Oil Company as office and dwelling; fire extended to all floors; building and contents total loss. Extended to one-story frame building, 25 by 25 feet, same location, occupied by same company as stable; damage to building, trifling; to contents, none. Extended to one-story frame building, 25 by 25 feet, same location, occupied by same company as kerosene oil shed; building and contents total loss. Also extended to one-story frame building, 25 by 175 feet, same location, occupied by same company as stable; building and contents total loss. Also extended to one-story frame building, 25 by 225 feet, same location, occupied by the same company as tank shed; building and contents total loss.

Chief Officers present were Deputy Chief of Department in charge boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Thomas Lally, Acting Deputy Chief of Department McCarthy, Chiefs of Battalion Graham and Matschke, Acting Chiefs of Battalion Rieckenberg and Braisted.

While working at fire Assistant Foreman George W. McGeary, of Hook and Ladder Company 58, was struck by a hand-pope plate blown from a tank which had exploded. He was removed to St. Catharine's Hospital, where he died the following day. Foreman Marcus Fitzgerald, of Engine Company 132, while working at fire was struck on leg by 3½-inch pipe, which had become unmanageable, and his leg was broken in two places. He was removed to St. Catharine's Hospital.

The services of five engine and two hook and ladder companies and one fire-boat were required, and the fire was under control in about three hours.

The first alarm was received at 6.12 p. m., and at 6.25, 6.27 and 6.36 p. m., special call, second alarm and special call, respectively, were sent out.

Estimated damage, \$10,000.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
