COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioner of Public Charities:

Department of Public Charities of The City of New York. Foot of E. 26th St., July 10, 1911.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Sir—We are informed by the Board of Ambulance Service, that, owing to the increased demands caused by the excessive heat, the ambulance service has broken down in all parts of the City and that this Department should make provision for an additional automobile ambulance at our Emergency Hospital, foot of E. 70th st., which has been assigned a territory in the crowded district of the East Side, from 70th st. to 110th st., and also for an additional automobile ambulance for the South Brooklyn district, to be located at our Coney Island Hospital, at which point we have at present only one ambulance.

This 70th st. emergency station has been established only since May 1, but it has grown to such an extent that an additional ambulance to take care of the service is necessary.

I would, therefore, respectfully request that special revenue bonds be issued to the amount of seven thousand, four hundred dollars (\$7,400) to provide the means with which to purchase two (2) automobile ambulances at \$2,500 each, for this Department, to be used as stated above, and \$2,400 to employ four (4) Automobile Enginemen at the rate of \$1,200 each for the two ambulances. These two men are on duty twelve hours. We, therefore, need four men for these two ambulances, and their salaries for six months from July 1 will amount to \$2,400, as stated above.

We would also respectfully request permission to purchase these two automobile ambulances without public letting.

Trusting that this matter will have favorable consideration and that a resolution in the enclosed form, or other suitable form, will be passed by the Board at an early date, I am

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—The Board of Aldermen at a meeting held on June 27, 1911, received a report from its Committee on Parks, relative to a communication of the West End Improvement League of Coney Island in relation to the construction of a boardwalk, in which said Committee recommended that the matter be referred to the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for investigation as to the feasibility of the idea, with a request for a report thereon.

The communication of the West End Improvement League, which was addressed to his Honor, the Mayor, the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, recites that as Coney Island is the playground of Greater New York and vicinity, the City authorities should use the natural advantages of the place by doing all in their power to conserve the rights not only of the property owners, but the crowds who visit this resort during the summer months. It states that the main attraction is the ocean front, the enjoyment of which is curtailed by certain property owners who have built over and obstructed the beach so that it is impossible to reach the ocean except at the foot of three streets between the Ocean parkway and West 37th st., or even to Coney Island Point, a distance of about 1.5 miles. The communication refers to a project to further obstruct the ocean front by a boardwalk built by private enterprise between West 5th and West 21st sts., and projecting into the ocean about 150 feet outside of high-water mark. The League expresses the opinion that this enterprise should be undertaken by the public, and that the necessary legislation should be secured to acquire an easement permitting the construction of such a boardwalk, reserving to the property owners all of their rights except that of building on or obstructing the land south of high water.

A suggestion for the construction of a boardwalk was submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in 1908, and a report of the Chief Engineer of the Board upon the subject was on December 4 of that year referred to a Committee. In this report it was pointed out that an improvement of the kind proposed is not recognized by the Charter as one which could be included in the City plan unless it were considered a part of the street system. This would mean the laying out of a street for pedestrians well outside of the high-water line, the acquisition of such title as might be required, and the construction of the street or walk. The plan submitted to the Board at that time provided for a walk beginning at the foot of the Ocean parkway and skirting the beach at a distance several hundred feet beyond high water. This street was to be 60 feet wide, while West 5th, West 21st, West 23d, West 25th, West 28th, West 30th, West 32d and West 35th sts. were to be extended to it at a width of 30 feet, the outer walk itself turning into the beach on lines coincident with those of West 37th st. extended. The walk proposed would have a total length of 9,500 feet, and it would, as planned, include within its lines portions of the Steeplechase pier at West 17th st., the Dreamland pier and ballroom recently destroyed by fire, and what is now known as the "Iron Pier." The original resolution submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was accompanied by an estimate giving the probable cost of constructing the walk and its approaches, which cost, if the construction were of steel and concrete, would be about \$775,000, while if timber were used, the cost would be reduced to about \$570,000. In answer to an inquiry at the Department of Docks and Ferries, this office was advised that land grants have been given affecting about one-half the length of the proposed walk, and the Tax Department has assessed the land under water with the upland, so that it is not possible to secure any estimate of the value of the property which would be needed. Its commercial value is probably small, but if acquired by condemnation proceedings, the expense to the City might be fully as great as the estimates above given for construction.

The effect of such a walk upon the bathing beaches would probably be serious, as the surf would be broken and they would have a shut-in appearance which would make them unattractive. This would apply to the beach in front of the bath house recently erected by the City and soon to be opened to the public. The construction of such a walk would probably increase the value of the property in its rear very much, as great crowds would be brought directly to the various amusement resorts located on this property, and with this effect in mind the project was first put forward as an assessable improvement. In the spring of 1910 the matter was again revived, but with the statement that the improvement would probably be undertaken by private capital.

That the City greatly needs on ocean beach which will be entirely free to the public cannot be denied. Whether the money which would be required for the construction of a boardwalk outside of the present shore line could not be expended much more advantageously in acquiring a beach which could be preserved in its natural condition, is at least a debatable question. A large proportion of the people who frequent Coney Island probably like it as it is and go there because it is what it is. The enormous crowds now frequenting this resort present a serious transportation problem, and it is possible that the acquisition of another beach for those who wish to use the ocean, leaving Coney Island as it is for those who wish the amusements, might be a wiser policy.

In view of these considerations it appears to me that if a boardwalk of the kind proposed is to be constructed, it should be treated as a local improvement and the entire cost should be assessed upon the locality, while an ocean beach for the free use of the public and provided at the expense of the City at large would be more beneficial and more satisfactory to those using it if it were located elsewhere.

The propriety of a walk of this kind being constructed by private capital and used for selfish purposes is at least questionable. The only return which capital could secure for such an investment would be by levying a toll upon those using it or upon those conducting amusement resorts which would be benefited by the crowds. This, in my judgment, would not be in the public interest.

It is recommended that a copy of this report be forwarded to the Board of Aldermen, thus complying with the request contained in their resolution of June 27.

Gentlemen—On May 4, 1911, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment requested that the President of the Borough of Brooklyn continue the experimental work begun at the 26th Ward Disposal Plant in this Borough (which experiments have been carried out on a small scale by Col. Black and Prof. Phelps at the above-named disposal plant), in accordance with the report of the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate, dated March 23, 1911.

I enclose herewith copy of report submitted relative to these experiments by Mr. E. J. Fort, Chief Engineer of our Bureau of Sewers, recommending that an appropriation of \$50,000 revenue bonds be authorized for continuing these experiments.

I concur in the recommendation of Mr. Fort and respectfully request that your honorable body adopt a resolution authorizing an issue of special revenue bonds for this purpose amounting to \$50,000. Location of Sewer Outlets and the Discharge of Sewage Into the Waters About New York.

The following communication from the Chief Engineer submitting final report of Colonel William M. Black and Professor Earle B. Phelps giving the result of their investigations as to the location of sewer outlets and the discharge of sewage into the waters about New York was presented:

Report No. 115.

March 14, 1911.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—I beg to submit herewith the final report of Colonel William M. Black and Professor Earle B. Phelps, giving the result of their investigation as to the location of sewer outlets and the discharge of sewage into the waters about New York, which was authorized by resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 12, 1909.

Five preliminary reports have already been submitted to the Board as follows:

1. Drainage of Flushing District, April 22, 1910.
2. Drainage of Corona District, June 17, 1910.
3. Oxygen content as a standard, July 1, 1910.
4. Drainage of Jamaica District, January 12, 1911.
5. Drainage of Richmond District, March 9, 1911.

The present report gives the general result of their study of the circulation of the waters in the harbor and the capacity of these waters to receive sewage without undue pollution, with recommendations as to the standard of purity which should be maintained in the different portions of the harbor. These studies are based upon the constitution of the water in the different portions of the harbor as the result of the tidal movements and the mixture of sewage-bearing waters with clean sea water entering the harbor from the sea at Sandy Hook, and from Long Island Sound at Throggs Neck, and the water from the Hudson River, which is already more or less polluted. For the purpose of this investigation and the computations, they have divided the harbor into seven different areas, namely, the lower and upper bays, the Hudson River below and above 96th st., the East River below and above Hell Gate, and the Harlem River.

The degree of pollution and the capacity of the harbor waters to care for additional sewage is expressed in terms of the dissolved oxygen remaining in the water, and the recommendation in this final report is that 70 per cent. of the saturation value of dissolved oxygen would be a proper standard of purity to be maintained if possible.

The report contains a discussion of the renewal of the oxygen content of water by absorption from the atmosphere and by aeration through disturbances caused by wind, by passing vessels, and by tidal currents. It appears to be conclusively shown that the extent of the renewal of the normal oxygen content by these agencies has been greatly overestimated, and that their effect is so slight as to be almost negligible. The belief is expressed that were all the sewage of the City discharged at Throggs Neck or at the Narrows, that is, at the points of entrance of unpolluted sea water into the harbor, a safe limit of pollution could be maintained without treatment of the sewage until the population shall have reached more than 7,000,000. It is also believed that crude sewage can safely be discharged in the vicinity of Rikers Island or the Narrows for some years to come, but that at other points partial purification will soon be necessary, at least during the summer months, while even with such partial purification a proper system of discharge and dispersion will be necessary.

The report gives the results of a series of experiments to determine the practicability of a system of forced aeration following a short period of septic treatment, the estimated cost of which is given at \$2 per million gallons of sewage treated, with the probability of a material reduction as the result of further experiment. The suggestions in this and previous reports, as to the details of the sewerage plans for different parts of the City must not be considered as anything more than suggestions, but they appear so reasonable that it is believed that they will be found in their general features to be logical and practicable and along lines which will commend themselves to the several Borough Presidents in the completion of their drainage plans.

The amount of work which has been done within the limits of time and funds which were available is quite remarkable, and these results could not have been obtained except for the fact that the investigations of the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey and of the United States Engineer Corps were duly availed of. In discussing the question of the pollution of the waters of the harbor and the necessity for treating sewage discharging into them, the absence of any accepted standard by which the degree of pollution and the necessity for treatment could be judged, has been a serious handicap. It may be that the use of the percentage of the saturation value of dissolved oxygen will furnish a standard which can be generally accepted. Colonel Black and Professor Phelps have suggested that 70 per cent. of this value would be a proper standard of purity which the City should endeavor to maintain, but they admit that this whole matter is one upon which there is at present much difference of opinion, and I believe that if this question could be submitted to a committee of especially qualified engineers for a report as to a proper standard for the harbor waters, the conclusions of such a committee would be accepted not only by The City of New York, but by other cities similarly situated, and that a valuable contribution would be made to the vexed subject of the protection of navigable waters from undue pollution by the sewage of great sea-coast cities.

The experiments already referred to may, if continued, produce results of considerable economic value. They were started at the 26th Ward sewage disposal plant, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and they could be continued at this plant under the supervision of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn at an expense which would be small in comparison with the value of the results which may be attained. An enlargement of this plant will probably be necessary in the near future, and in planning such enlargement provision could well be made for experimental work on the lines suggested.

I would recommend that the Board appoint a commission of five engineers, to consist of Colonel William M. Black, a representative to be designated by the Metropolitan Sewerage Commission, and three others who are generally recognized as authorities in this particular field of engineering work, and that such commission be instructed to advise the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at as early a date as possible of their conclusions as to the percentage of the saturation value of dissolved oxygen which the City should strive to maintain in the waters of the harbor of New York.

I would also recommend that the President of the Borough of Brooklyn be requested to continue the investigation inaugurated by Colonel Black and Professor Phelps to determine the feasibility of an economic application of the treatment of sewage by forced aeration, and to advise the Board of the result of such investigations and experiments.

It is further recommended that the Secretary be authorized and directed to have five hundred (500) copies of this report printed as a pamphlet, together with the five preliminary reports as appendices. Respectfully,

On motion further consideration was then postponed for two weeks, and the Secretary was directed to send copies of the report to the members of the Board and to the Metropolitan Sewerage Commission.

Hon. WM. J. TAYLOR, Superintendent of Sewers:

Dear Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate on November 12, 1909, the Chief Engineer requested that expert advice be obtained relative to the location of sewer outlets, etc., along the City's waterfront, and Col. Black, U. S. A., was retained to investigate the matter and to also determine the extent of purification required in sections where the discharge of raw sewage would result in objectionable harbor pollution. It was also arranged that experiments should be made of a process of sewage treatment or purification by forced aeration, and these experiments were carried out by Col. Black and Prof. Phelps, who was associated with him, being conducted at the 26th Ward Disposal Works, in this Borough.

In submitting their report to the Chief Engineer of the Board on February 16, 1911, they state that the merits and possibilities of the new process have only barely been indicated, and that a fruitful field has been opened for investigation. The Chief Engineer of the Board states in submitting the report to the Board of Estimate that these experiments if continued may produce results of considerable economic value, and that the experiments could be continued at the 26th Ward Disposal Plant at an expense which would be small in comparison with the results which may be attained. At the meeting of May 4, 1911, in accordance with the Chief Engineer's request, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn was requested by the Board of Estimate to continue the experimental work begun at the 26th Ward Sewage Treatment Plant, in the Borough of Brooklyn, along the lines indicated in the report of the Chief Engineer submitted to the Board on March 23, 1911.

The subject of the treatment of sewage under varying circumstances and conditions has not yet reached a permanent solution, and Engineers have not agreed as to which process or combination of processes will accomplish the best results in all cases, or even in such cases as the somewhat unusual one with which The City of New York has to deal.

It is assumed that the Board in wishing these experiments continued desires to obtain results somewhat commensurate with the interests at stake, and it would seem that these can only be obtained by conducting them on a scale sufficiently large and broad as will enable us to determine not only whether the method of reference is an economical and efficient method, but will also enable us to determine whether some of the other recent methods, the results of which so far seem promising, may not also be of equal value both from the standpoint of final purification to be obtained and of economy of operation as applied to the sewage of this Borough. The territory in The City of New York to which sewage treatment will apply is very large, and the installation of sewage treatment plants will approximate millions of dollars. It would seem, therefore, proper and fitting that an initial appropriation of \$50,000 from the proceeds of revenue bonds should be set aside for the first year for providing for the necessary supervision and labor, and for providing for the assembling and installation of an experimental plant at the 26th Ward Disposal Works, where several of the recent methods can be thoroughly tried out and comparisons made of the results under exactly like conditions, and extending over a sufficient length of time to obtain results of sufficient value or weight to establish beyond all question the best installation and method of treatment which should be applied to the sewage of The City of New York.

Should it be necessary, I am prepared to furnish at the proper time estimates and plans in such detail as may be required, and I would respectfully urge that there is no question of more importance to The City of New York at the present time than the proper method of sewage disposal. As the Board of Estimate is now committed to this investigation, it would seem most advantageous to make these funds available at the earliest possible moment, so that the experimental plant can be put into immediate operation and the collection of data begun.

Plans for the extension of the 26th Ward Disposal Works, which at the end of this year will receive the dry weather sewage from about 4,000 acres of tributary territory, must be held in abeyance until this vital question is settled and the present chemical treatment plant, besides being antiquated, is now much too small for the purposes intended. The Local Board has acted favorably upon petitions for the reconstruction and extension of these works, and public sentiment among those who will bear the expense of the work seems to be generally favorable to carrying out the improvement as expeditiously as possible. Dear Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held July 13, 1911, the matter of the establishment of the grade of position of Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving with a salary at the rate of \$1,800 per annum, for an unlimited number of incumbents, in the office of the President, Borough of Brooklyn, was withdrawn from the consideration of the Board of Aldermen, and referred to a Committee consisting of the Presidents of the Boroughs of The Bronx and Brooklyn.

The resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted July 6, 1911 (Calendar No. 82), requesting the establishment of said grade of position, as above, was transmitted to the Board of Aldermen under date of July 10, 1911.

REPORTS OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES.

No. 3983.

New York, July 18, 1911.

The Special Committee of this Board appointed on July 11, 1911, to confer with the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Accounts and the Chairman of the Mayor's Committee on Municipal Celebration of the 4th of July, in reference to investigation of alleged fraud in fireworks display in the Borough of Brooklyn, July 4, 1911, respectfully reports:

That it has interviewed the Commissioner of Accounts, who has made a complete investigation of the fireworks display throughout the entire City, which he has submitted to his Honor the Mayor, and excerpts from which have been published in the daily press of this date. The Commissioner of Accounts reports "that the City for an agreed payment of \$31,630 for fireworks displayed in all Boroughs received in actual value but \$13,800, a figure which includes expenses and reasonable profit." The report also states that "Considerable testimony was taken during the investigation in regard to the matter of alleged irregularities in the letting of the fireworks contracts. It was found impossible, however, to secure conclusive evidence."

The Committee also called upon the Comptroller, and was informed by his Secretary that the Comptroller had ordered an investigation of the matter, but that same was not yet completed and would not be ready until after the Commissioner of Accounts had finished his investigation.

The Committee also called upon the Chairman of the Mayor's Committee, Mr. Ridder, who informed them that he had been in consultation upon this matter with the Commissioner of Accounts, and had nothing further to offer than appeared in the report of that officer.

Subject: In the matter of an examination of the contracts for the purchase of fireworks for the Fourth of July celebration, 1911.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor:

Sir—I beg to present herewith a report of our investigation of the purchase of fireworks by The City of New York for the Fourth of July celebration, 1911.

On May 9, 1911, the Board of Aldermen passed a resolution requesting the authorization of \$50,000 to provide means for a municipal celebration on July 4, this sum to be under the control of a special committee appointed by the Board. On May 16 this resolution was approved by the Board of Estimate. On June 13 a special committee of nine members, with Alderman Walsh as Chairman, was appointed by the Board of Aldermen to arrange for the celebration. At the same time a Citizens' Committee of several hundred members was appointed by the Mayor. Among the sub-committees named by this Citizens' Committee was a committee on fireworks, of which Alderman Samuel Marx was the Chairman. It appears that Mr. Marx held a similar position for the celebration in 1910.

On June 10 Alderman Marx, as Chairman of the fireworks committee, sent invitations to bid to fifteen fireworks concerns. It was proposed that they should present programs of displays to be furnished for \$500, \$420 and \$250. The names of all but three of these concerns appear in the classified business directory. On June 13 an invitation to bid was sent to two more concerns. It appears that no invitation was sent to the United Fireworks Company, which subsequently obtained the contract for Brooklyn and The Bronx. Alderman Marx testified that his first acquaintance with this company dated from June 15, 1911, when Hugh W. Kelly, Vice-President of the concern, called upon him with a letter of introduction from William A. Johnston, Secretary of the Citizens' Committee, requesting that the company be given a chance to bid on the fireworks.

Programs of displays based upon the amounts above noted were received from fourteen fireworks concerns. Alderman Marx, representing the Citizens' Committee, thereupon conferred with the Aldermanic Committee above mentioned. The minutes of this joint meeting, which occurred June 23, read as follows:

"Alderman Marx, on behalf of the Mayor's Committee, then recommended to the Committee that the orders for fireworks be distributed to the following concerns in the amounts specified:

Manhattan—Lloyd Mfg. Co.	\$13,740 00
Brooklyn and Bronx—United Fireworks Co.	13,990 00
Queens—Pain's Fireworks Co.	2,520 00
Richmond—Nordlinger-Charlton Co.	1,250 00

"On motion, the Committee unanimously ratified the above distribution and directed Alderman Marx to prepare contracts for same."

The contracts for the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond, let respectively to the Pain's Fireworks Company and the Nordlinger-Charlton Company, were, as noted in the minutes above quoted, for small amounts. Very little, if any, criticism attaches to the quality of fireworks furnished by these two concerns, the pyrotechnic expert whom we retained estimating a fair value received by the City, with a possible slight deduction in the Pain's Company bill.

In regard to the contract held by the Lloyd Manufacturing Company, which furnished the displays for Manhattan, it appears, from the investigation of our expert, that the programs furnished by the concern were substantially complied with in the various districts. The contract price, however, was greatly in excess of the value of the fireworks displayed. Making an allowance for all expense and a 50 per cent profit, it appears that the City contracted to pay approximately \$5,000 more than the reasonable value of the goods furnished in the Borough of Manhattan.

The United Fireworks Company, which received the City's contracts for Brooklyn and The Bronx, is a New Jersey corporation, organized in 1909, with an office in Trenton. For two years prior to that time it appears to have been in existence under a business certificate. Its President is one Aubrey Love, a stenographer employed by the Hewitt Rubber Company, of 111 Broadway, New York. The stock of the concern is held entirely by Love and one Hugh W. Kelly, who is also Vice-President and Secretary. This concern maintains no factories. It operates entirely as a jobber and does but a small business, apparently approximating \$10,000 per year in actual sales. The contract which this concern received from the City this year represents a sum larger than its total annual sales for any previous year.

The fireworks which the United Company sold to the City for display in Brooklyn and The Bronx were purchased from two sub-contractors, the North Bergen Fireworks Company of North Bergen, N. J., and the North Beach Fireworks Company of Astoria, L. I. The contract between the United Company and the North Bergen Company is dated June 21. In this contract the North Bergen Company agreed to furnish and fire twenty-four displays of fireworks in the Borough of Brooklyn on the night of July 4, for the sum of \$3,000. For those twenty-four displays the City contracted to pay the United Fireworks Company \$9,490. The contract between the United Fireworks Company and the North Beach Fireworks Company is dated June 27, 1911. In this contract the North Beach Company agreed to furnish and fire fourteen displays in the Borough of The Bronx for the sum of \$1,750. For these fourteen displays the City agreed to pay the United Fireworks Company \$4,500. The profit of the United Company for the Brooklyn displays was, therefore, \$6,490, and for The Bronx displays \$2,750. The only expense to which the company was put was a bond for the faithful performance of the contract, filed with the Comptroller's office. This bond, according to the testimony of the Vice-President of the company, cost \$35.

Mr. Love, of the United Company, attempted to justify these profits on the ground of risk in case of negligence or damage. This idea, however, did not seem to be shared by the other concerns which obtained City contracts for fireworks, or by various experts whom we consulted. The character of the fireworks furnished this year, together with the extraordinary precautions of the Police and Fire Departments, were such as almost to preclude the possibility of serious mishap. Moreover, it appears that even in the event of accident the City, and not the company, would be primarily responsible.

An endeavor was made by this office to determine the actual value of the fireworks furnished for Brooklyn and The Bronx. Frank Anzalone, manager of the North Beach Fireworks Company, testified that in the \$1,750 which he charged the United Company for The Bronx fireworks there was a \$500 profit. Victor Reisenberger, of the North Bergen Company, admitted a profit in the \$3,000 which he charged for the Brooklyn exhibition. He refused, however, to state its amount. Some idea of this profit can be had from the fact that one Michele Nanna acted as a sub-contractor for the North Bergen Company for four of the twenty-four displays used in Brooklyn. Nanna furnished these four displays for \$100 each. The North Bergen Company received from the United Company \$125 each. Nanna's profit we were unable to ascertain.

It was possible, however, to approach the question of value from a more direct angle. In two districts in Brooklyn, the 50th and the 59th, the Chairmen of the Committees refused to use the fireworks consigned to them, sealing the boxes for future examination. In the 59th District, where a \$420 display had been planned, the pyrotechnic expert retained by this office for the investigation reported that the fireworks contained in the boxes and their values were as follows:

To this should be added a reasonable profit and a charge for firing, which latter perhaps would amount to \$15 or \$20.

In the 50th District, at Sunset Park, two \$420 displays were grouped for a common exhibition. The boxes of fireworks consigned for this double display contained in all 177 shells and 49 batteries. These were worth approximately \$75, to which should be added profit and a \$20 charge for firing.

On the day of the fourth of July, the expert above-mentioned, whom we retained on the preceding Friday, visited two exhibitions in The Bronx and one in Brooklyn with the Inspectors of the Finance Department. The following figures are based on the actual amount of fireworks consigned to these various districts:

We endeavored to ascertain why the United Fireworks Company, a relatively small concern engaged in a jobbing business, was awarded the contracts in Brooklyn and The Bronx over the bids of half a dozen well known manufacturers. Alderman Marx testified that as there appeared to be no appreciable difference in the various programs submitted by the competing companies, his choice in the matter was largely an arbitrary one. This statement would seem to be hardly in accord with the facts, as of the 14 programs received, which are of varying merit, that of the United Company palpably shows to the poorest advantage.

According to Alderman Marx, the Lloyd concern was selected for Manhattan because it held a similar contract last year; the Nordlinger-Charlton concern was selected for Richmond because its factory is located there; the United Fireworks Company was chosen for Brooklyn and The Bronx because of Secretary Johnston's letter above referred to. Alderman Marx admitted that he made no investigation of any of the companies to determine whether they were in a position to furnish the fireworks described in their programs. He testified that in giving the contract to the United Fireworks people, he was under the impression that they manufactured their own fireworks. He later stated that the company had submitted a memorandum of its past business, which appeared to him to be entirely satisfactory. It is to be noted, however, that this memorandum which we received in evidence is dated June 22, 1911, whereas the contract which the United Fireworks Company made with the North Bergen Fireworks Company for the display which it sold for the Brooklyn exhibit was dated June 21. Attention is also called to the fact that the meeting of the joint committee at which Alderman Marx' recommendation in regard to the United Fireworks Company was ratified was held on June 23, two days after the contract between the United Company and the North Bergen Company had been signed.

In connection with these contracts, attention must be called to the gift of fireworks which Alderman Marx received from the successful competitors. The following letter written by Mr. Love of the United Fireworks Company to a fireworks manufacturer in New Jersey, is self-explanatory:

Aubrey Love, President. Bell Telephone, Trenton 1298. Hugh W. Kelly, Vice-President. United Fireworks Company, Manufacturers of High-Grade Fireworks, Trenton, N. J., June 24, 1911.

JOSEPH GIRONI & BROTHER, 608 Monroe Avenue, Hoboken, N. J.

Gentlemen—Please enter our order for one display of fireworks to be given at Belle Harbor, Long Island, on the night of July 4, 1911.

Ship prepaid, in our name, using our tags, to Mr. Samuel Marx, Villa Roma, Orienta ave., Belle Harbor, Long Island, N. Y. Be sure to prepay the freight. Shipping tags enclosed.

Give your man our card enclosed herewith. This display is to be fired in our name. Send us shipping receipt same day shipment is made. Cost, \$100 delivered and fired. Send him a good display for the money, mostly aerial work. Include a Magnesium shell and Magnesium wheel. Let us know at once what lumber you will require. Yours very truly, UNITED FIREWORKS COMPANY.

1 card. 4 tags. We furnish the lumber.

Fireworks were also sent to Mr. Marx by the Nordlinger-Charlton concern and by the Lloyd Manufacturing Company. The Pain concern appears to have furnished a man to fire off Alderman Marx' display. Mr. Lloyd testified that he furnished his share of fireworks because he was requested to do so by Max Marx, a brother of the Alderman. The amount which he furnished he said approximated in value about \$20.

Alderman Marx freely admitted the receipt of those fireworks. He insisted, however, that they were unsolicited on his part. His testimony on this point was as follows:

"They were displayed at Belle Harbor, at the beach, Rockaway Beach. I notified St. Malachi's Church and the Rockaway Park Sanitarium to keep their children up to see the fireworks displayed on the beach; the same as last year in City Hall Park—there was no arrangement made for City Hall. When we found City Hall Park was left out, I induced the Lloyd Manufacturing Company to give a display for City Hall Park—or Pains, I mean, and this year when they got talking, somebody said, 'Where do you live?' and I said, 'Belle Harbor,' and they said, 'I am going to send down some fireworks.'"

It appears that this private display was given on the beach, about five hundred feet from Alderman Marx' summer home. That it was of a private character is fully borne out by the testimony of the neighbors of the community. The representatives of St. Malachi's Church and Rockaway Park Sanitarium denied that they were notified in regard to the display.

Considerable testimony was taken during the investigation in regard to the matter of alleged irregularities in the letting of the fireworks contracts. It was found impossible, however, to secure conclusive evidence. Pending the appearance of several witnesses for whom subpoenas have been issued, it has seemed desirable to hold the record open and to report at a later date in case any new evidence is discovered.

From the facts before us it would appear that the contracts for fireworks were awarded without regard to the programs submitted or the professional standing of the competing firms; that the United Fireworks Company was recommended by Alderman Marx for Brooklyn and The Bronx without adequate inquiry as to its ability to perform the contract; and that the City for an agreed payment of \$31,630 for fireworks displayed in all boroughs received in actual value but \$13,800, a figure which includes expenses and reasonable profit. That Alderman Marx consented to receive from the contractors free fireworks for his private exhibition we regard as highly improper. Respectfully submitted,

It, therefore, recommends that the said resolution be adopted.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting held June 8, 1911, adopted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen the establishment in the Court of Special Sessions of the grade of position, in addition to those heretofore established, as follows:

Department of Finance, City of New York, Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, June 6, 1911.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On March 11, 1911, the Chief Justice of the Court of Special Sessions requested the establishment in the Court, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, of the grade of position of Probation Officer, at \$1,200 per annum, for eighteen additional incumbents. In connection therewith, we report as follows:

The Chief Probation Officer is at the rate of \$5,000 per annum. Thirteen probation officers are provided for in the 1911 Budget. The twelve appointed are covered by the following table:

Manhattan and The Bronx (male).....	5 at	\$1,200 00
Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond (male).....	3 at	1,200 00

The Chief Justice states that the eighteen additional officers are necessary for the probationary work in the four Children's Courts. Only two officers now are assigned to the Children's Courts. There are ten officers assigned to the various parts of the Court of Special Sessions.

The parole work of the Children's Courts, since their establishment in September, 1902, has been performed by representatives of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, the Juvenile Probation Society, the Hebrew Protective Aid Society, the Big Brothers Club and other religious, civic and philanthropic associations. The reports of the various associations show that during a period of eight years, only five per cent. of the paroled children have been listed as incorrigible, while only ten per cent. have been reported for recurrent misbehavior or for violation of parole. These figures agree with the records of the Children's Courts.

The Superintendent of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children states that the work of the Society has increased more than thirty per cent. during the past two years; the investigation of cases of neglect and abuse, the preliminary home investigations and the additional parole work have been done by twenty-three men and women representing the Society. This staff investigated 7,947 Court cases during 1910.

The Superintendent is of the opinion that the work of the Society should be confined to the prevention of neglect and abuse and not include the education and reformation of children. He further states that he and other officers of organizations interested in wayward, abused or neglected children approved of the legislation providing for an increase in the number of salaried probation officers in the Court of Special Sessions, and permitting of the appointment of probation officers in the Children's Courts. Were the religious, civic and philanthropic associations to be relieved of the volunteer parole work in the Children's Courts, they would be enabled to deal exclusively with the prevention and amelioration of conditions which make probationary work necessary.

The Probation Officers representing the various organizations in the Children's Courts do not represent the Courts or the Justices, and are without official standing. The Justices have no appointive, removal or supervisory authority over them. The number of volunteer probation officers in attendance varies, without regulation, from day to day. There are about sixty volunteer Probation Officers.

Mr. Frank L. Polk, a member of the Committee on Criminal and Inferior Courts, states that, in his opinion, twenty-five additional probation officers should be appointed. He stated further, as follows:

"If they (Sub-Committee on Probation of Board of Justices) would raise the number to twenty-five, I can assure them that they will have the support of the Committee on Criminal and Inferior Courts, of Mr. John Glenn, of the Sage Foundation, and of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children."

The Board of Justices of the Court of Special Sessions, on May 10, 1911, adopted the following resolutions:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that of the eighteen additional Probation Officers previously deemed as necessary to put the probation system of the Court upon a satisfactory and effectual basis, the fifteen are to be taken from the existing Civil Service eligible list; and the other three from the remaining volunteer Probation Officers, two male and one female, now serving without pay.

Resolved, That in filling such fifteen places from the Civil Service list, selection shall be made in accordance with the spirit of chapter 659 of the Laws of 1910, with the view that the entire probationary force of the Court, in the matter of religious belief and training shall bear substantially the same proportion of Catholics, Protestants and Hebrews as those religious faiths bear in the total arrangement of prisoners as disclosed by the record of the Court.

It is proposed to assign ten of the additional officers to the Children's Courts in Manhattan and The Bronx, and eight of the three Children's Courts in Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond.

Section 96, chapter 659, Laws of 1910, provides as follows:

"The majority of the Justices of the Court of Special Sessions * * * may, from time to time, appoint such additional Probation Officers as the Board of Aldermen, upon the recommendation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, may authorize."

Chapter 659 of the Laws of 1910 directs the Comptroller, with the action or concurrence of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to make provision for additional Probation Officers by the issue and sale of special revenue bonds.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution approving the request, and authorizing special revenue bonds in the amount necessary for the eighteen incumbents from July 1 to December 31, 1911, and approving a schedule for the fund.

No. 2716.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to which was referred on January 24, 1911 (Minutes, page 644), the annexed ordinance to amend section 364 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "stands within the stoop lines," respectfully

REPORTS:

That, having examined the subject, it finds that the privileges exercised under the ordinance have been granted continuously since 1882. The Consolidation Act and acts amendatory thereof, provided for them, and with the advent of the Greater New York Charter they were continued. While true that many persons, in the erection of stands and booths have exceeded the dimensions prescribed by the ordinance, the authorities have been tolerant with respect thereto until recently. It is believed, however, that the dimensions named in the ordinance have been too prescribed and the one herewith submitted grants a little more space. During all the years that privileges of this kind have been permitted, particularly in certain sections of the city, persons have established little businesses which have been sought and patronized by their neighbors, businesses with which they have become acquainted and for whose staples there is a demand. They know of no other business since, and to deprive them of the only means of a livelihood at their command would mean a real hardship. Moreover, these privileges have been granted only by and with the consent of the property owners and without apparent objection on the part of storekeepers.

The Committee believes that some additional space should be granted for these stands and any extension beyond it should be halted by the authorities within whose jurisdiction such matters come, and it is recommended that the herewith annexed substitute ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE amending section 364, article 4 of the City Ordinances of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Sec. 364. Every such stand must be strictly within the stoop line and shall not be an obstruction to the free use of the sidewalk by the public, and shall not exceed the space of (6 feet long by) 4 feet wide, except that in the case of a boot-black stand, a space of more than 3 feet wide (and 4 feet long) may be occupied by each chair of such stand. The construction and erection of all stands permitted by this ordinance shall be at the expense of the applicant and under the direction of the President of the Borough in which said stand is located. No person shall be permitted to sleep in any portion of the structure or hold more than one license. The Mayor, or Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, shall have the power to transfer a permit or license to any location for the period of its unexpired term; provided, however, that the application of such transfer shall be accompanied by the written revocation of the owner's consent previously given therefor by the consent of the owner of the premises to which the proposed transfer is to be made and by the consent of the Alderman of the district in which said premises are located.

Every such stand must be strictly within the stoop line and shall not be an obstruction to the free use of the sidewalk by the public, and shall not exceed the space of (6) 10 feet long by 4 feet wide, except that in the case of boot-black stands, a space not more than 3 feet wide and 4 feet long may be occupied by each chair of such stand. The construction and erection of all stands permitted by this ordinance shall be at the expense of the applicant and under the direction of the President of the Borough in which said stand is located. No person shall be permitted to sleep in any portion of the structure or hold more than one license. The Mayor, or Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, shall have the power to transfer a permit or license to another location for the period of its unexpired term; provided, however, that the application for such transfer shall be accompanied by the consent of the owner of the premises to which the proposed transfer is to be made and by the consent of the Alderman of the district in which such premises are located.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Dear Sir—The appropriation made to this Department for the year 1911, entitled "Water Supply, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, Collection and Storage, Pumping Stations, Temporary Employees," provides for ten days only for extra time for each of the different classes of mechanics. This allowance is insufficient owing to the greatly increased pumpage in all the stations, which requires that the pumps be maintained in service practically every day in the year, so that it is necessary to do a large amount of the repair work on holidays, Sundays and at night, in order that the pumps may be kept in service.

The aggregate amount of the Budget for the year 1911 is one hundred and seventy-three million nine hundred and sixty-seven thousand eight hundred and thirty-five dollars and sixteen cents (\$173,967,835.16), which includes County charges and expenses for the four counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, aggregating five million four hundred and fifty-three thousand eight hundred and five dollars and twenty-five cents (\$5,453,805.25), leaving one hundred and sixty-eight million five hundred and fourteen thousand twenty-nine dollars and ninety-one cents (\$168,514,029.91) as the amount of the Budget, which affects the general tax rates of The City of New York.

Compliance with this provision of the law will, of course, forever prevent a uniform tax rate from prevailing in The City of New York.

Your Committee recommends that in fixing the actual tax rates in the tax levy ordinance the decimal fractions of such rates be not carried beyond five figures, i. e., hundred thousandths of one per cent. as any smaller fraction would have no practical effect on individual assessments, while increasing enormously and unnecessarily the difficulties of extending the tax rolls and preparing tax bills. The total loss by omission of such remote decimals will be only four hundred and eighty-three dollars and nineteen cents (\$483.19) in the whole tax levy of one hundred and forty-two million two hundred and forty thousand six hundred and fifty-four dollars and fifty-six cents (\$142,240,654.56).

As there is nothing to be gained by separate extensions on the tax rolls of the City and County rates, your Committee recommends that the aggregate thereof, or, in other words, the total tax rates in each Borough, as the case may be, be fixed in the ordinance levying the taxes for the year 1911. Such an ordinance has been prepared and is submitted herewith for approval and adoption by the Board of Aldermen.

Special Assessments in the Borough of Brooklyn, to Be Collected With the Annual Taxes.

The Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments have added to the assessment rolls of the Borough of Brooklyn:

First—The amounts required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for the payment of principal and interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for flagging, curbing, guttering and paving certain streets in the Twenty-sixth Ward of said Borough (late Town of New Lots).

Second—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for sewerage improvements in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said Borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889 and amendments thereto.

Third—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for street improvements, in the Thirty-first Ward of said Borough (late the Town of Gravesend), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892 as amended.

Fourth—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said Borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889, as amended by chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894.

The amount to be raised for the payment of the principal and interest on the New Lots bonds is fifty-three thousand four hundred and two dollars and forty-seven cents (\$53,402.47); the amount of the Flatbush sewer installment is four thousand nine hundred and fifty-one dollars and twenty-seven cents (\$4,951.27); the amount of the Thirty-first Ward improvement installment is forty-three thousand eight hundred and fourteen dollars and twenty-five cents (\$43,814.25); the amount of the Flatbush avenue improvement installment is thirty-one thousand five hundred and eighty-one dollars and thirty-four cents \$31,581.34).

The law requires that these assessments and installments be included in the tax levy ordinance to be levied and collected with the annual taxes.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of The City of New York and the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1911.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of one hundred and thirty-six million three hundred and fifty-nine thousand six hundred and eighty-six dollars and ninety-six cents (\$136,359,686.96), to pay the expenses included in the Budget for the year 1911, for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each Department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the City debt, and an amount provided for deficiencies in taxes, pursuant to chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, amounting in the aggregate to one hundred and seventy-three million nine hundred and sixty-seven thousand eight hundred and thirty-five dollars and sixteen cents (\$173,967,835.16), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of five million four hundred and fifty-three thousand eight hundred and five dollars and twenty-five cents (\$5,453,805.25), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, included therein, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of thirty-two million one hundred and fifty-four thousand three hundred and forty-two dollars and ninety-five cents (\$32,154,342.95), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York in a communication dated June 5, 1911, transmitting his certificates of the amount of the appropriations made for the year 1911, copies of which communication and certificates and of the said Budget are as follows:

City of New York, Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office, June 5, 1911.

To the Honorable, the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows: "It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said City to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen, at least four weeks before its annual meeting in each and every year, for the purposes of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the Corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, or for City purposes within said City as created by this act, and purposes for which said City is liable, and on account of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the City Treasury during the then current year from all sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the Sinking Funds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York and of any of the municipal and public corporations, or parts of municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated with the municipal corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, other than the surplus of revenues of any such Sinking Funds for the payment of interest on the City Debt of the municipal corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, or the like debts of the municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which by law they are required to order and caused to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows: "In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum

or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the County officers and the other County charges and expenses in the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said Counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of County officers and other County charges and expenses of such County; to the end that each of said Counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the County for County as distinguished from City purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law, I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body statement as follows:

First—The Budget in detail for the year 1911.

Second—The amount of County charges and expenses in the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said Budget, as well as the amount of County charges and expenses paid during the year 1910 from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, which amounts together are to be raised respectively, by levy upon taxable property within each of said Counties, as provided by section 902 of the Charter.

Third—The estimated receipts of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation.

BUDGET FOR 1911.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, viz., one hundred and fifty-eight million six hundred and twenty-five thousand five hundred and twenty-nine dollars and ninety-one cents (\$158,625,529.91); second, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year, viz., five million four hundred and fifty-three thousand eight hundred and five dollars and twenty-five cents (\$5,453,805.25), and, third, the amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1910, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, viz., ten million dollars (\$10,000,000); be it further

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, with the exception that the items contained in the schedules under the titles of "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Compensation, Temporary Employees," in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments, shall be administered under the following terms and conditions:

First—

- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees."
- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries, Temporary Employees."
- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages, Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages, Regular Employees."
- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages, Temporary Employees."
- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Compensation, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Compensation, Temporary Employees."

- That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein for the various kinds of supplies and contingencies to any other than to a supply or contingency account.

Second—That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an Office, Bureau or Department in the City or County Governments in the schedules of "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Compensation, Temporary Employees," herein contained, except (a) when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and (b) in the case of schedules under the title of "Salaries" or "Salaries, Regular Employees," or "Wages, Regular Employees," when such change will not increase the monthly rate of the total amount herein appropriated for the said schedules of "Salaries," "Salaries, Regular Employees," or "Wages, Regular Employees," in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments, and (c) in the case of schedules under the titles of "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Compensation, Temporary Employees," when such change will not increase the total amount herein appropriated for the said schedules of "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Compensation, Temporary Employees," in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments.

Third—

- That the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance in accordance with the items of the aforesaid schedules, entitled "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Compensation, Temporary Employees," or in case these items have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in accordance with the items of the schedules as changed, and
- That each and every payroll shall be accompanied by a recapitulation showing the exact amount expended to and including said payroll for every item appearing on the schedules supporting any of the appropriations against which all or any part of the moneys involved in said payroll is to be charged, and that this recapitulation shall contain the full schedules supporting any such appropriations, or in case these schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the full schedules as changed.
- That each payroll of any Department, in addition to any other departmental number, shall be numbered during the year serially beginning with number one for each specific account, and such payroll shall bear a certificate signed by a person cognizant of the facts, stating that the recapitulation attached thereto is the correct recapitulation for the payroll bearing said number.
- That in all instances where changes in schedule items have been made by twelve votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, all sums which have been expended against such schedule items as are changed shall be apportioned against the new lines in the same ratio as the new totals of the schedule items bear to the old totals.
- That on all payrolls against schedules entitled "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees," and "Wages, Regular Employees," there shall be set forth the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules, or in case the items on such schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules as changed.
- That there shall be affixed to all payrolls a certificate made by the person preparing such payrolls to the effect that there is a time record on file in said Board, Office, Bureau or Department, certified by the person or persons having knowledge of the facts, showing the character of service and the exact time of employment of such person or persons on said payrolls, and that the distribution or division of the time of such person or persons as shown on such payrolls is in accordance with such time record.

—be it further

Resolved, That all appropriations for (1) supplies; (2) general supplies; (3) materials for repairs and replacements; (4) fuel, and (5) forage, to any Board, Office, Bureau or Department of the City or County Governments, made in this Budget, be made under the following conditions:

First—That, in so far as practicable, all contracts and open market orders for the purchase of such "Supplies," "General Supplies," "Materials for Repairs and Replacements," "Fuel" and "Forage" be based upon specifications which are definite and certain as to character and quality, and which conform with standard specifications for the various classes of supplies, materials, fuel and forage hereafter to be promulgated by this Board.

Second—That, in so far as such standard specifications may hereafter be established by this Board, the Comptroller at the time of certifying as to the sufficiency of appropriations out of which contracts for "Supplies," "General Supplies," "Materials for Repairs and Replacements," "Fuel" and "Forage" are to be paid shall also certify that the specifications for such supplies or materials for which standard specifications have been prescribed, are in conformance with such standard specifications.

Third—That all open market orders issued by any Department for supplies or materials, from which standard specifications shall have been prescribed, shall contain a description of the goods ordered, conforming with such standard specifications.

Fourth—That the Comptroller shall, in auditing claims for goods delivered on open market orders, determine, through inspection or otherwise, whether the goods delivered conform with such standard specifications; be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with section 56 of the Greater New York Charter:

First—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules entitled, "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments for the number of incumbents shown in said schedules, except that in all cases where a position or grade of position has previously been established for an unlimited number of incumbents, or for a number of incumbents greater than the number shown in said schedules, nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to reduce the number of incumbents previously authorized.

Second—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules entitled "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees," and "Compensation, Temporary Employees," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments.

Third—Nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to nullify or abolish any position or grade of position in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments which has been previously established, but which does not appear in the schedules entitled "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees," and "Compensation, Temporary Employees," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven.

THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

CONDITIONS GOVERNING PAYMENTS TO CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

The appropriations in this Budget are made subject to the following conditions, and acceptance of moneys by an institution shall be an acceptance of such conditions:

1. The accounts and records of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show receipts from all sources, all expenditures, population, addresses of parents, guardian or nearest relatives of inmates and such other information as shall be designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to make provision for dependents in the institution, and shall be in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys and all their books of record and accounts relating to all funds and from whatsoever source received shall at all reasonable times be open to the visitation, inspection and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Finance, and at all proper times the Department of Public Charities shall have access to the record of inmates.

4. All institutions receiving public moneys shall, not later than March 31 of each year, submit to the Comptroller an annual report covering the period of the preceding calendar year, showing receipts from all sources and expenditures for all purposes in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller.

5. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an apportionment has been made, he shall, in his discretion, suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and, upon the determination of said Board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.

6. Where apportionments are made upon a per capita basis for inmates of

private charitable institutions, there will be no payments unless the inmates shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as proper charges against the City; and except in emergency cases the Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support, or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public hospitals.

In determining the acceptance of patients, in private hospitals as proper charges, the Commissioner of Charities shall first consider the nature of the services actually rendered to the patients by the hospitals. The records of the institutions and the bed-card notes showing the treatment given shall be received as the essential evidence in deciding acceptances or rejections. *The City shall not be liable for any payment to charitable institutions in excess of the apportionment which may have been made to such institutions, notwithstanding the acceptances of the Commissioner of Charities or any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.*

7. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

8. No money shall be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers.

9. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions for five (5) hours daily for a period equal to the public school year, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of five years of age and over during ten months in the year, except that for abnormal or atypical children a special ruling may be made by the Comptroller. Institutions receiving money under this section shall be under the general supervision of the Board of Education, as required by the general conditions relating to institutions receiving corporate school money, as provided in section 1154.

10. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City, and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities and has been placed in this Budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This order has no relation to the class of children of such mental and physical condition as those cared for in the City Institution at Randall's Island.

11. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows: Provided that where the Comptroller finds, after proper investigation, that the per capita rates hereinafter provided are too high, he is hereby authorized, on the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to reduce such per capita rate or rates for any or all institutions.

There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of New York, the sum of three million three hundred and seventy-eight thousand one hundred and sixty-one dollars (\$3,378,161), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1911, included in the Budget, and the further sum of three hundred and sixty thousand and eighty-two dollars and eighty-seven cents (\$360,882.87), paid during the year 1910, from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of three million seven hundred and thirty-eight thousand two hundred and forty-three dollars and eighty-seven cents (\$3,738,243.87).

Sec. 3. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Kings, the sum of one million six hundred and twenty-one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three dollars and thirty-three cents (\$1,621,853.33), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1911, included in the Budget, and the further sum of forty-four thousand five hundred and fifty-one dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$44,551.39), paid during the year 1910, from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of one million six hundred and sixty-six thousand four hundred and four dollars and seventy-two cents (\$1,666,404.72).

Sec. 4. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Queens, the sum of three hundred and thirty-six thousand two hundred and ten dollars and forty-five cents (\$336,210.45), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1911, included in the Budget, and the further sum of eleven thousand four hundred and seventeen dollars and ninety-six cents (\$11,417.96), paid during the year 1910, from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of three hundred and forty-seven thousand six hundred and twenty-eight dollars and forty-one cents (\$347,628.41).

Sec. 5. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Richmond, the sum of one hundred and seventeen thousand five hundred and eighty dollars and forty-seven cents (\$17,580.47), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1911, included in the Budget, and the further sum of eleven thousand one hundred and ten dollars and thirteen cents (\$11,110.13), paid during the year 1910, from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of one hundred and twenty-eight thousand six hundred and ninety dollars and sixty cents (\$128,690.60).

Sec. 6. The assessment rolls of the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within The City of New York, for the year 1911, are hereby ratified, approved and confirmed, and the aggregate amount of the assessed valuations of said estates for such year is hereby fixed at the sum of eight billion two hundred and sixteen million seven hundred and sixty-three thousand two hundred and eighty-seven dollars (\$8,216,763,287), in accordance with the returns of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments for said year, submitted to the Board of Aldermen on the 3d day of July, 1911.

In addition to the sums mentioned in the preceding sections of this ordinance, to be levied and imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within The City of New York, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-sixth Ward (late Town of New Lots) of the Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward improved by flagging, guttering, curbing and paving under authority of chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued for the above purposes, the sum of fifty-three thousand four hundred and two dollars and forty-seven cents (\$53,402.47), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land, in the proportion of benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Commission charged with making such improvements; there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by the construction of sewers authorized by chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889 and the amendments thereto, the sum of four thousand nine hundred and fifty-one dollars and twenty-seven cents (\$4,951.27), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Board of Street and Sewer Commissioners of said town and its successor; and there shall be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Thirty-first Ward (late Town of Gravesend), in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by local improvements for which the unpaid assessments heretofore levied in said town exceeding the sum of one hundred dollars are under the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, and the amendments thereto, to be levied in forty annual installments, the sum of forty-three thousand eight hundred and fourteen dollars and twenty-five cents (\$43,814.25), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined; and there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush), in said Borough of Brooklyn, situated within the district of assessment fixed and determined by the Board of Assessors of The City of New York, for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, under authority of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889, and amendments thereto, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on the bonds issued for said improvement, the sum of thirty-one thousand five hundred and eighty-one dollars and thirty-four cents (\$31,581.34), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by said Board of Assessors on each lot, piece or parcel of land lying within the boundary lines of said assessment districts.

Section 1. "An ordinance regulating the placing of electric signs in The City of New York, and providing that the same shall be licensed," adopted April 30, 1907, and approved May 7, 1907, as amended by ordinance approved July 1, 1909, is hereby further amended to read as follows:

Section 1. "An ordinance regulating the placing of electric signs in The City of New York, and providing that the same shall be licensed," adopted April 30, 1907, and approved May 7, 1907, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 1. Any electric letter, word, model, sign, device or representation in the nature of an advertisement, announcement or direction erected at right angles to any building shall be deemed to be an electric sign.

Section 2. Electric signs may be hung or attached at right angles to buildings and extend not to exceed six feet therefrom in said space, and to be ten feet in the clear above the level of the sidewalk, *excepting that signs hung no lower than the floor of the second and higher than the floor of the third story, the first floor being the ground floor, may extend to but not beyond the curb line of the sidewalk*, in front of such building upon the payment of an annual license fee of 10 cents for each square foot of sign space or part of square inch of such sign space, to be collected by the City Clerk of The City of New York. The square feet of sign space on one side of an electric sign, however, shall be deemed to be the entire number of square feet of sign space for the purpose of computing the license fee herein referred to and required to be paid.

All electric signs shall be constructed entirely of metal, including the uprights, supports and braces for the same, properly and firmly attached to the building, and shall be so constructed as not to be or become dangerous.

Before any permit is issued by the City Clerk plans and statements of the proposed sign and method of attachment to the building must be filed with the Superintendent of Buildings having jurisdiction, as provided in part 2, section 4 of the Building Code, and his certificate of approval be obtained as to the sufficiency of the construction and method of attachment to the building. A certificate must also be obtained from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, certifying that the proposed electric wiring and electric appliances are in conformity with the rules and regulations of that Department.

A license issued hereunder, before its expiration, or within thirty days thereafter, may be renewed upon payment of the license fee, without the filing of a new set of plans and statements, provided that the old license be surrendered, accompanied by satisfactory proof to the City Clerk in the form of an affidavit that the method of hanging, size and syte of sign are the same as when originally licensed and that the wiring of said sign is in good condition.

Section 3. No certificate shall be given by the Superintendent of Buildings, and no permit shall be issued by the City Clerk, for the erection of electric sign or signs on any building when such building adjoins a building occupied exclusively as a private residence, unless the written consent of the owner or owners of said private residence for the erection of such electric sign be first obtained.

Section 4. No electric sign shall be placed, hung or maintained, except as in this ordinance provided, under a penalty of ten dollars for each offense, and a further penalty of ten dollars for each day or part of a day the same shall continue.

Section 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

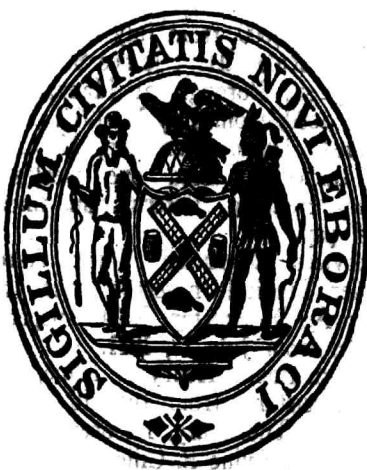

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period. The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant, fire, or rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made, according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
