PHYSICAL EXAMINATION OF SCHOOL CHILDREN BY PRIVATE PHYSICIANS.

An Experimental Study.
 In accordance with a suggestion made by the Committee on Hygiene of the Board of Education, two districts in the Borough of Manhattan have been selected in which to carry on an experimental study relative to the possible desire of parents to have their children examined by their own physicians. If these examinations of children entering school for the first time should be made in any considerable numbers by private physicians, it will allow the school medical inspectors of the Department of Health additional time in which to make examinations of children in the upper grades. If this experiment should prove a success, the system may be put into operation throughout the city.

MANUFACTURERS AND TRADE UNIONS TAKE NOTICE.

Sanitary Industrial Surveys Offered by the Department of Health—First Come, First Served.

Among recent developments in public health and sanitation none has received less attention than the improvement in industrial hygiene and sanitation effected through the voluntary co-operation of employers and workers themselves. Yet no other phase of sanitary development is worthier of consideration. The motives prompting the participation of employers in this movement are not especially altruistic. But therein they differ in no wise from the motive actuating the community itself in its support of an efficient municipal health administration. In both cases support of such activities is regarded as a profitable investment.

A striking instance of what can be done, even in the face of adverse conditions, is furnished by the Board of Sanitary Control of the Cloak and Suit Industry in this city. This Board, organized in 1910, formulated the following set of principles, which mark a radical departure from the recognized and accepted standards that have prevailed in industrial life since the rise and growth of the modern factory system.

1. An industry is responsible for the conditions existing in its establishments.
2. It is the duty of an industry to control, supervise and to improve the sanitary conditions of its industrial establishments without compulsion from outside sources.
3. The general public is directly and intensely interested in the sanitary conditions existing in industry.
4. Decent sanitary conditions of the workshops are the first requisites and a debt which manufacturers in the industry owe to the public and to the workers.
5. An efficient and permanent improvement in the conditions of industrial establishments can only be brought about by the efforts and by the co-operation of the manufacturers, of the public and of the workers themselves.

How well this organization has succeeded in its work can best be judged by those who have followed from time to time the published reports of its work. Certainly the results have been extremely gratifying. Perhaps the most important progress made has been in the education of both workers and employers. In fact, the main difference between the method of inspection and administration as adopted by the

Board of Sanitary Control and as conducted by State Labor Departments lies in the fact that the former have entirely abolished *police* and *detective* inspection. The object has not been to catch the manufacturer in a violation of the law or of the Board's regulations, or to force sanitation upon an unwilling and unsympathetic object of official attention, but to make employers and workers recognize the fact that sanitary standards are beneficial to both.

Personal interviews with employers, frequent bulletins, articles in the official organs of the workers as well as the manufacturers, lectures in public schools, noon lectures, etc., frequent conferences with leaders of the manufacturers, as well as the unions, etc., these are some of the means by which a close contact is sought with the manufacturers and the workers.

Because of its very direct relation to public health, it becomes important for public health administrators not merely to familiarize themselves with this important phase of industrial hygiene, but also to take an active and leading part in its further development. Since it is advantageous that the work be carried on through the voluntary co-operation of employers and workers, the activities of municipal health administrators should be limited, in the main, to initiating the movement looking toward the organization of the work in any given industry, overcoming inertia, and furnishing whatever assistance and advice may be required.

The Department of Health is prepared to undertake a sanitary survey of any industry, trade or group of manufacturing or mercantile establishments in this city, with a view to appraising existing conditions and in order to show to employers and workers alike what can be accomplished through a system of voluntary hygienic and sanitary control. Through its Bureau of Public Health Education the Department will be glad to assist in formulating sanitary industrial standards and measures for the prevention of occupational diseases. In addition to this the Bureau stands ready to prepare and furnish health leaflets specially designed for workers in any industry, and to supply popular lectures on health and sanitation to such workers, in co-operation with either employers or trade unions.

WHAT COLORS SHALL BE ALLOWED IN FOODS?

In connection with the general revision of the Sanitary Code which is now in progress, the suggestion has been made that a section be included prohibiting, for the purpose of coloring food or drink, the use of any coloring substance except the seven colors specifically permitted by the United States Department of Agriculture. The only section now in the Sanitary Code dealing with the use of coloring matters is a very general one prohibiting the sale of food substances containing poisonous ingredients, or colored or coated or polished or powdered in such manner as to conceal damage or to make the article appear better than it really is. The means at hand for coloring food products may be conveniently classified as vegetable, animal, mineral or inorganic, and synthetic or so-called coal tar colors or dyes. Representatives of each of these have, at one time or another, all been used in the coloring of food, and the laws of various European and American States have, from time to time, prohibited the use of certain specified members or all of each or some of the foregoing classes. Because of their endless variety, the main difficulty in legislating against the employment of dangerous color has come from the so-called coal tar colors. For years it has been known that it is unsafe to attempt to predict the harmfulness or the harmlessness of these colors by inference or analogy; therefore the ideally perfect "permitted" list should contain only such colors as have each been examined physiologically, separately, and specifically, and their harmlessness determined by actual test. The labor involved in such a study is, of course, enormous. Nevertheless, commencing in 1907 and continuing until January, 1910, the Bureau of Chemistry of the United States Department of Agriculture examined a large number of coal tar colors and finally permitted the use of the following list:

- Red shades: 107 Amaranth; 56 Ponceau 3 R; 517 Erythrosin.
- Orange shades: 85 Orange I.
- Yellow shade: 4 Naphthol Yellow S.
- Green shade: 435 Light Green S. F. Yellowish.
- Blue shade: 692 Indigo disulfoacid.

The Department of Agriculture concedes that many other coal tar dyes are available, the physiological effects of which, however, are unknown. It is not plain that these dyes are harmful, but no proof satisfactory to the Department of Agriculture exists to show that they are physiologically harmless.

In matters of this kind it would seem good judgment to prohibit the use of colors in foods whose harmlessness had not been clearly proven. Moreover, the burden of proof should rest with the manufacturer employing the same.

The whole subject is a very complicated one and needs careful consideration. The Department will welcome suggestions from those interested as to the advisability of prohibiting the use of all coal tar colors excepting the seven mentioned above.

CURTAIN RUNG DOWN ON THE FRIEDMANN FIASCO.

Readers of the Weekly Bulletin will recall the reports issued sometime ago concerning the alleged cure for tuberculosis exploited in this country by Dr. F. F. Friedmann and a group of American promoters. It is hoped with the report just issued by the U. S. Public Health Service, after an investigation which has lasted more than a year, that the final chapter in this unscrupulous piece of commercialism has been written.

Whereas the claims made by Friedmann are based on cases which always seem to get well, or at least show phenomenal improvement after one or two injections, the cases observed by the physicians of the U. S. Public Health Service which reacted in this manner were conspicuously few. The Government report is, therefore, in line with other reports coming from scientific sources here and abroad and refutes the Friedmann's claims to the discovery of a specific cure for tuberculosis. The report also disproves that the inoculation of persons and animals with his organism is without harmful possibilities.

VENEREAL DISEASES, SECOND QUARTER, 1914.

In the following tables are given figures showing the Department's work in venereal diseases during the second quarter of 1914. It is interesting to note that approximately three-fifths of the cases of syphilis reported, are reported through the results obtained in the Serological Laboratory. The number of specimens sent to the laboratory for serological examination is steadily increasing, a fact which shows that this diagnostic aid is appreciated by physicians.

ONE MINUTE BIOGRAPHS.

No. 1. *The Father of Preventive Medicine.*
The early history of our hero is veiled in myth and mystery. Born of a persecuted race, adopted as a founding by a princely house, forced to flee the country for committing murder, the subject of this sketch exhibited marvelous insight and remarkable powers of administration and leadership. Although not a physician as we understand the term, and living long before the days of bacteriology, he yet was able to draft and enact a sanitary code whose guiding principles are still regarded as correct. In this code he originated an entirely new system of medicine, totally opposed to the prevailing plan. For the curative and therapeutic methods then universally followed, he substituted the more philosophic and wiser hygienic and preventive method. Moreover, in the regulations which he formulated, emphasis is laid on discharges from the body (blood, pus, mucus) as vehicles of disease, and on personal cleanliness and isolation as the chief means of preventing infection.
A hygienist whose influence has made itself felt throughout the world and the father of preventive medicine—we salute Moses, maker of sanitary laws.

ATROCIOUS NAMES.

State Architect Pilcher is to be felicitated upon his suggestion that all such titles as "Home for the Aged," "poor house," "alms house," etc., be dropped. Along with these offensive titles should go "Home for Consumptives." Nor should such sentimental designations as "Sunset" for a place in which elderly people are the guests of the State, be tolerated, since it suggests approaching demise. We have heard of a place in a neighboring State where children are cared for whose parents are serving prison terms. The title has slipped our mind, but it is clearly indicative of the cold facts—Home for Children of Convicts—or something like that.
It is odd that in this allegedly enlightened age such names should be employed. Good taste and every other consideration cry out against them.
One of the best suggestions of this sort that we have recently noted is that the Department of Public Charities be called the Department of Public Welfare.—*Medical Times*, November, 1914.



INVITATION TO CONTRACTORS.

Part of the Broadway-Fourth Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad.

The Public Service Commission for the First District (hereinafter called the "Commission"), acting for and on behalf of The City of New York (hereinafter called the "City"), invites proposals to reconstruct a portion of Section No. 9-C1 of Route No. 9, a part of the Broadway-Fourth Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad.

The portion of Section No. 9-C1 to be reconstructed lies under Flatbush Avenue Extension between Willoughby Street and DeKalb Avenue in the Borough of Brooklyn. The railroad at this point has six tracks and the reconstruction is to provide for the installation of additional crossovers between these tracks.

The Contractor will not be required to provide or lay tracks, ties or ballast, but will be required to do certain station finish work.

The work under the contract will include the care and support of buildings, vaults, sewers, pipes, railroads and other surface, subsurface and overhead structures, the maintenance of traffic and the restoration of pavements and other surfaces.

The method of construction, unless otherwise permitted by the Commission, will be by trench excavation under cover.

The City has entered into a contract for the installation of tracks in the Railroad and the work of installation will be in progress at the time that the work of reconstruction is in progress. It will also be necessary for the New York Municipal Railway Corporation, its contractors or employees, to do work in the Railroad in connection with the equipment of the Railroad at the time that the work of reconstruction is in progress. The Contractor must conduct his work so as not to impede or interfere with such other work, as provided in the contract.

The Railroad may also be opened and operated for passenger traffic before the completion of the work of reconstruction. In such event the Contractor must conduct his work so as to avoid interference with the operation of the Railroad and injury to passengers, as provided in the contract; and payment for all additional expense, loss, risk and damage due to such opening and operating for traffic will be made by increasing by the percentage stipulated in Item X in the Schedule contained in the Contractor's Proposal, the prices as stipulated in said Schedule for the work performed after the date of such opening and operating for passenger traffic, except as provided in the contract. Each bidder shall state in said Item X in the Schedule contained in the form of Contractor's Proposal the percentage required on such prices in payment for the additional expense, loss, risk and damage in the event of such opening and operating for traffic. For the purpose of comparing the bids only, and not for any other purpose, it will be assumed that the percentage so bid will be required to be paid on one-quarter (1/4) of the estimated amount of the work of reconstruction exclusive of Schedule Items 1, 2, 30, 76-H and 99-A and exclusive also of sixty per centum (60%) of the estimated amount for Schedule Items 19 and 20. If any bidder shall not desire any such increase in said prices on account of such opening and operating for traffic, he shall strike out said Item X in said Schedule contained in his Proposal.

Bidders must examine the form of contract and the specifications and contract drawings; must visit the location of the work and inform themselves of the conditions along the line of the work and make their own estimates of the facilities and difficulties attending the execution of the work.

A fuller description of the work and other requirements, provisions, details and specifications are given in the form of contract and in the contract drawings therein referred to. The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
