DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR WEEK ENDING SATURDAY, JULY 4, 1914.

THE STATE INSTITUTE FOR MALIGNANT DISEASES WILL AID IN THE DIAGNOSIS OF CANCER.

As announced in our issue of June 13, the Department of Health was recently requested by the American Society for the Control of Cancer to consider the provision of laboratory facilities for the microscopical diagnosis of cancer. The Department took the matter under advisement, but subsequently decided to take no action in view of the fact that the State Institute for the Study of Malignant Disease, under the direction of Dr. Harvey R. Gaylord, at Buffalo, N. Y., is already equipped for this work, and is prepared to co-operate with physicians throughout the State.

In a communication addressed to the Commissioner of Health on June 29, 1914, Dr. Gaylord writes as follows:

"There is no special obligation laid upon this Institute by any enactment to undertake the diagnosis of all cancer cases in the state, but we are perfectly willing and desirous of so doing and would be glad to diagnose all cases from the City of New York sent here."

"It is probably true that the practitioners of the state do not generally understand that the Institute is prepared to diagnose material, and doubtless none of the physicians in New York City are aware of the opportunity."

PHYSICIANS' DUTIES UNDER THE "BOYLAN LAW."

In reply to repeated inquiries, the Department wishes to state that prescriptions for chloral, opium or any of its salts, alkaloids or derivatives or any compound or preparation of any of them, may be written on ordinary prescription blanks. The prescription, however, must be dated and must bear the name, address, office hours and telephone number of the prescribing physician, and the name, age and address of the person for whom the drug is prescribed.

Physicians should also keep a record of all instances in which they personally administer any of the above mentioned drugs.

THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, THE MEDICAL PROFESSION AND THE PUBLIC.

From time to time, alleged official indiscretions by medical inspectors or Department nurses, have prompted complaints to the Department by private physicians. Accordingly the following note has been issued to Department employees. This makes the policy of the Department entirely clear, and should result in a better understanding between Department employees, private medical practitioners and the public:

"It is not the purpose or function of the Health Department to supplant private practitioners in the treatment of individuals. It is clearly in the interest of the City and of sound social policy that treatment should be conducted by private practitioners at the expense of the patient whenever the circumstances warrant. The City, through its Department of Health, is ready to step in and do what is needful for those who are suffering from infectious diseases and who are unable to help themselves. Department employees should constantly aim to work in harmony with the family physician, and should do nothing that will weaken his authority, or detract from his influence.

"A. Department representatives must always ascertain whether a private physician is in attendance and whether he wishes to permit or to delegate to the Department the carrying out of the following procedures:

- "1. Administering anti-rabic treatment.
- "2. Immunization in cases of diphtheria or typhoid fever, or administering other sera; or offering free vaccination.
- "3. Taking cultures either from patients or those exposed.
- "4. The investigation of cases in private rooms in hospitals (cases of typhoid fever more especially).

"B. The family physician must be conferred with:

- "1. When being assisted in diagnosis in cases where doubt exists, or where the diagnosis is in dispute, or when nurses terminate scarlet fever cases.
- "2. In ordering removal of patients to Minturn or Department hospitals.
- "3. Where the physician supervises fumigation in a private house.

"C. He should be consulted in the following cases:

- "1. The investigation of all complaints. The first question to be asked in these cases should be whether there is an attending physician in the case; if so, he should be consulted in the matter.
- "2. To secure proper isolation of contagious disease patients, particularly before resorting to enforced removal to a hospital.
- "3. Before putting into effect a court order to dispossess a contagious disease patient.

"The name and address of the physician in attendance should always be obtained by those taking case histories."

THE MEDICAL CONTROL OF DAY NURSERIES WITH RELATION TO THE PREVENTION AND SPREAD OF VAGINITIS AND OTHER INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

In March of this year, at the request of the Department of Health, the Committee on Public Health, Hospitals and Budget of the New York Academy of Medicine, discussed the problem of vaginitis in children as related to public schools, hospitals, day nurseries and other institutions. Following this conference a committee was appointed to submit recommendations. Among the recommendations submitted by the committee were the following:

1. That those in charge of Day Nurseries should be informed of the great danger of infection and taught what precautions are necessary.
2. That systematic examination of babies in Day Nurseries be undertaken by the Health Department to determine the frequency of infection and the measures necessary to diminish it.

This matter has since received the careful consideration of the Department of Health, and the following rules for Day Nurseries have been prepared for adoption by the Board of Health at its next regular meeting:

Rules for Day Nurseries.

Each Day Nursery in The City of New York shall have attached thereto a regular physician of its selection, duly licensed under the laws of the State, and in good professional standing, and immediately upon the appointment of said physician, the Day Nursery shall notify the Director of the Bureau of Child Hygiene of the name and address of said physician.

The duties of such medical officer shall consist in

1. The systematic examination of every regularly attending child at least every alternate week.

2. He shall examine all new applicants for admission and issue a certificate to the effect that they are free from contagious or infectious diseases before the said child can be admitted to contact with the other children.

3. All female children applying for admission shall have a vaginal smear made by the physician who will forward the same to the Department of Health for examination and the certificate of admission for these children shall not be issued unless the result of the examination of such smear shall be negative.

4. Female children who have been denied admission because of gonorrheal vaginitis shall have later smears taken by either the medical officer of the day nursery or (upon his request) by an inspector of the Department of Health.

5. He shall make sanitary inspection of the institution and methods in use regarding caring for the child and its clothing, the character and the method of preservation of food and the nursery's compliance with the rules and regulations for the conduct of day nurseries, as compiled by the Department of Health.

The matron in charge of a day nursery must have

1. An original certificate of health, signed by the nursery physician, on file in the nursery office, for each child that is a regular attendant.

2. She must also have a record of the fact that each child regularly attending has been examined by the nursery physician at least every alternate week.

3. No child shall be admitted until after it has been examined by the nursery physician and a certificate issued to the effect that no contagious or infectious disease exists.

4. If any suspicious rash or illness appears during the absence of the nursery physician, the child must be placed in the isolation room and the nursery physician and the Department of Health immediately notified by telephone.

5. Daily inquiry must be made by the matron, of each mother or other person bringing the child, as to whether or not any sickness exists in the child's home, and if any suspicion is aroused as to the possibility of such home sickness being of a contagious or infectious nature, the child shall be excluded and the Department of Health notified, and such exclusion shall continue until a certificate of the Department of Health is furnished to the effect that premises referred to are free from contagious disease.

6. No certificate of health for a female child shall be considered complete unless attached thereto is a certificate of the Department of Health to the effect that the examination of the vaginal smear is negative.

7. Any female child who has been shown by examination of a vaginal smear to be affected with gonorrheal vaginitis shall not be readmitted to a nursery unless accompanied by a certificate of the Department of Health to the effect that two smears taken on successive days have shown negative results.

Note—The Department of Health will assume on request the duty of instructing the day nursery physicians in the technique of making smears for the detection of gonococci. Application for such assistance and instruction should be made to the Diagnosis Laboratory of the Department of Health, No. 149 Centre Street, Manhattan.

THE PROTECTION OF FOOD FROM CONTAMINATION.

Section 46 of the Sanitary Code reads as follows:

No food, except fruits and vegetables that are peeled, pared or cooked before consumption, shall be kept, sold or offered for sale or be displayed or transported unless protected from dust, dirt, flies or other contamination. The term "food" as herein used shall include every article of food and every beverage used by man, and all confectionery.

The following interpretations of this Section have been formulated by the Board of Health and dealers have been so notified:

Stands and Pushcarts and Open Containers. The strictest interpretation of the provisions of Section 46 of the Sanitary Code will be applied to stands and pushcarts and open containers at all times, and no covering other than of a fixed and permanent character will be recognized as conforming to the requirements of said section.

Candy. Within the meaning of this section, all candy stored, sold or offered for sale or displayed or transported must be covered with a covering such as glass, wood, metal, paste-board, paper or other suitable material so as to adequately protect it from flies, dust, dirt or other contamination.

Bakery Products. All breadstuffs, cakes, pies or confectionery kept, held, offered or displayed for sale, must at all times be protected from the contamination of flies,

dust and unwarranted human handling by being enclosed or covered with some suitable covering. When displayed for sale, glass cases should be used, the back of which may be enclosed in close-mesh wire screening.

Groceries. All foodstuffs not protected by a fly and dust-proof wrapper must be protected by covering or cases of glass, metal, wood or close-mesh wire screening, so as to protect the same from flies or other contamination.

Butcher Shops and Markets. All meats, poultry, game, fish and similar products when displayed for sale, must be protected so as to preserve them from unwarranted human handling, contamination of flies and dust, by being kept within closed refrigerating display cases, or properly covered by close-mesh wire screening. Smoked meats, sausages, hams and other products of a similar character which are covered by a permanent protected cover, need not be kept as above indicated.

Restaurants and Public Eating Places. At restaurants and public eating places, all food must be protected from contamination by flies, dust and unwarranted handling by being enclosed in glass or metal cases, or cases covered with close-mesh wire screening. Where pies, sections of pies, sandwiches, cakes or similar products are securely wrapped in individual paper coverings they will be deemed as satisfactorily protected within the provision of Section 46 of the Sanitary Code.

An interesting addition to the permanent public health exhibit on the fifth floor of the Department of Health building, 149 Centre Street, shows just how food can be protected against dirt and flies. All dealers in foods and all others who are interested in clean foods should visit this interesting exhibit and learn how to comply with the above regulations.

SMOKE CASE SUCCESSFULLY PROSECUTED.

The Court of Special Sessions, County of the Bronx, has just rendered a very important decision involving a violation of Section 181 of the Sanitary Code, commonly known as the "smoke ordinance."

The Department of Health instituted a criminal action against the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company charging a violation of Section 181 of the Sanitary Code in that the said corporation allowed dense smoke to be discharged from the locomotives operated in the Borough of the Bronx. The action came on for trial on June 26th, 1914, at which time the court found the defendant guilty and deferred sentence until July 2nd, 1914, the defendant being fined the maximum penalty of \$500.

This is the first conviction obtained against a railroad company since the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court rendered the adverse decision in the New York Central case and many of such railroad companies operating steam engines in the City of New York have believed that they were immune from prosecution under the provisions of Section 181 of the Sanitary Code. In convicting the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, the Court of Special Sessions has determined that the evidence submitted by the department met all the conditions imposed by the Appellate Division. This evidence consisted of testimony given by a Sanitary inspector, corroborated by that of a Sanitary Police Officer and photographs taken of the offending nuisance. In addition to this, a number of citizens appeared as witnesses.

The corporation defended on the ground that it was operating its railroad by virtue of a franchise which authorized it to use, in the City of New York, locomotive engines propelled by steam and this implied a grant to the defendant of incidental powers and authority to operate the franchise granted so far as it was necessary to generate steam in its locomotive engines and that the enforcement of the ordinance was an unreasonable interference with and made it impossible for the defendant to use such locomotive engines as steam cannot be generated without heat which necessarily implies the use of fire and that the methods used by defendant caused as little smoke as was possible to attain the desired result.

In deciding as it did, the Court of Special Sessions has held that the defendant was making an unreasonable use of its premises, a view which sustains the contention of the Health Department in every respect. The Department is now in a position to take drastic action in like cases throughout the City of New York.

2. If it be determined that the above limitation applies to transfers, can this Commission legally permit a transfer from one department to another department in the face of an appropriate preferred list if such transfer creates no vacancy to which reinstatement might be made?

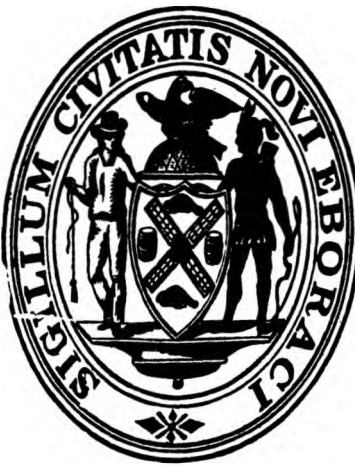

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time, after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.
