

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held September 10th, 1884.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meetings held September 3d and 8th, instant, were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and,
On motion, laid on the table to await action, as stated, to wit:

From the Equitable Gas-light Co.—Requesting permission to sink a crib at the foot of Fortieth street, East river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

From Brael C. Jones, Superintendent House of Refuge, Randall's Island—For permission to extend ferry landing at Randall's Island. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting the suspension of Watchmen John J. Murphy, Jr., and Francis M. Madden, for being found asleep while on post on the night of September 4th, instant, and also reporting the suspension of Edward P. AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of the Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 78 Tribune Building, Wednesday, September 10, 1884, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Commissioners present—The Comptroller, Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners James C. Spencer and Wilham Dowd.

Also, Chief-Engineer Church, Consulting Engineer Davis, and Executive Engineer Fteley; and Chief-Engineer Newton and Consulting Engineer Adams, of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the stated meeting of September 3d, were read and approved.

The Secretary presented a letter from Commissioner Baldwin, which was read, and ordered to be entered upon these minutes, as follows:

BADEN, August 22, 1884.

J. W. McCulloh, Esq., Secretary Aqueduct Commissioners, New York:

DEAR SIR-I am this morning in receipt of your cable, stating that Commissioners propose to elevate grade line of Aqueduct ten feet, to which I replied that I concurred, and beg now to confirm.

The Secretary reported that in obedience to the directions of the Commissioners, he had applied to the Secretary of the Municipal Service Examining Board for information as to the time and manner of sending forward for examination the applicants named in the list submitted by the Chief Engineer, September 3d, for appointment in the engineer corps of this Commission, and submitted the reply of the Secretary, dated September 5th, 1884. The matter was laid over awaiting further information from that Board.

information from that Board.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Public Works, dated September 4, 1884, in reply to the request of the Commissioners (of August 22), for further plans for the new Aqueduct; which communication was read, and on motion of Commissioner Spencer was referred to the Chief Engineer for consideration; and with instructions to confer with the Consulting Engineer in relation to the matters therein referred to, and make report thereon as soon as practicable.

The Commissioner of Public Works stated that he was not yet prepared to return the modified forms of specifications and contracts transmitted to him on the 4th inst., for the reason that the modifications and changes in the forms submitted by him were of such extent and so material as to require most careful consideration; but that he expected to be prepared to return the forms to the Commissioners by their next regular meeting day, the 17th inst., with his criticisms, and recommendations thereon.

A communication was received from the Comptroller, dated September 5th, 1884, in relation to certain lands of the City between Ninety-third and One Hundred and Thirteenth streets, formerly occupied by the masonry aqueduct; and for the purchase of which lands persons are now applying to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and asking that the Aqueduct Commissioners would determine whether said lands will be required for the new aqueduct. The communication was read, and on motion of Commissioner Dowd, was laid on the table to await the further information necessary to enable the Aqueduct Commissioners to act in the matter.

The Chief Engineer submitted a request from Engineer of Construction H. S. Craven, for authority to visit Washington, accompanied by Assistant Engineer Alfred Craven, to obtain information desired by the Engineers of this Commission, and for the establishment of a standard measure to be used in the measurements of the new Aqueduct; and on motion of the Comptroller, the authority asked for was granted.

The Secretary submitted claims for damages done by the rock-boring machines upon lands occupied by Antoine Singar, and by Emil Weber, which claims have been fully investigated and reported upon by the Engineers; and asked instructions from the Commissioners as to the disposition of said claims, and others of a similar nature which may be hereafter received.

On motion of Commissioner Spencer, the said claims of Singar and Weber were referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit, and the Chief Engineer and Secretary were directed to have all simil ar claims which may be presented fully investigated, and to make detailed report thereof to the Committee of Finance and Audit for consideration, and report to the Commissioners.

On motion of Commissioner Dowd, the Secretary was directed to confer with the Counsel to the Corporation with regard to certain proposed changes in the size of the new Aqueduct, where it will be under pressure, and to report to the Commissioners at their next meeting.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSION.

NEW YORK, September 16, 1884.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held at the office of the President, his Honor the Mayor, this date, all the members being present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The Secretary reported that he had received favorable replies from property-owners who had been requested to extend the time of refusal to purchase.

Letters were presented from the Secretary of the Sinking Fund Commission, informing this Board of the action of the said Sinking Fund Commission with reference to the communications and recommendations of the Armory Board on the following dates: June 6, June 26, July 28, August 25, September 4, 1884. Received and filed.

A requisition was received from Colonel James Cavanagh, commanding Sixty-ninth Regiment, asking for repairs to armory at Tompkins Market, which was referred to the Commissioner of Public Works.

Riker, commanding Twelfth Regiment, for an armory for said regiment, to be located at Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets and Ninth avenue, be referred to the Sinking Fund Commission, with the approval of this Board, and the recommendations that the plot of ground referred to be purchased, and that the sum of \$208,000 be designated as the sum to be paid for the same; also, that immediate steps be taken to obtain plans and specifications for the erection thereon of a suitable armory building for said Twelfth Regiment.

The owner of the above-named property, Mr. Edward Schell, being present, immediately gave, in writing, an extension of refusal to purchase until the first of October, which was received.
