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DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for the Week Ending February 6, 1902.

An application was received from Frederick Lohbauer for permission to rebuild the pier at the foot of New Dock road, Throgg's Neck, Pelham Bay, and an application was also received from Roscoe G. Carey for a lease of said dock. A request was also received from the Throgg's Neck Taxpayers' Association for the rebuilding of the pier, to be maintained by the city as a public pier. After a hearing the applications were laid over for consideration, and referred to the Deputy Commissioner.

Permits granted, work to be done under supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief: Consolidated Gas Company, to lay and repair gas pipes along the water front during ensuing six months, pavement to be taken up and relaid by this Department at cost of said company.

Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company, to construct subsidiary connection to the West Thirty-fourth street pier, the pavement to be taken up and relaid by this Department at cost of said company.

Bureau of Sewers, to build sewer outlet through the bulkhead wall foot of West Forty-eighth street.

Mutual Gas Light Company, to repair their wharves and coal shed between Eleventh and Twelfth streets, East River, in accordance with plans submitted as amended.

Hupfel Brewing Company, to run a salt water pipe through the bulkhead, foot of East Thirty-eighth street, the pipe to remain during the pleasure of the Commissioner, compensation to be paid to the Department for the privilege at the rate of \$300 per annum, quarterly in advance.

New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, to erect and maintain during the pleasure of the Commissioner two small sheds at the ferry racks, foot of Cabot street, East river.

Jamieson & Bond, to construct a pile bulkhead between Academy avenue and Bond street, Rockaway Beach, Jamaica Bay, in accordance with plans submitted as amended, to dredge in front of said proposed bulkhead, and to deposit the dredged material in rear thereof; the bulkhead to remain at the pleasure of the Commissioner.

A statement of the assessed valuation of the southerly half of the Peck Slip Pier West and the northerly half of the Peck Slip Pier East, East river, as furnished by the Department of Taxes and Assessments, was sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and said Board was requested to consent to the institution of proceedings for the condemnation of said property.

The form of renewal lease of the West Twenty-eighth Street Pier to John H. Starin, as prepared by the Corporation Counsel, was transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

The Corporation Counsel was requested to advise whether the appointment of Horgan & Slattery as consulting architects on the three proposed recreation piers can be canceled on account of delay in preparation, and whether the Department can refuse to pay for the incomplete plans already prepared.

The Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity was notified that the Department does not object to the landing of pipes on the East Twentieth Street Pier, but to the storage of the pipes thereon.

In response to an application of the Fire Department for the driving of additional clusters of piles at the Battery fireboat landing, said Department was requested to consider the desirability of moving the landing to a point about one hundred feet south of its present position.

The Importers' and Traders' National Bank was notified that the Deputy Commissioner is authorized to indorse all checks drawn to the order of the Department, and to sign checks drawn against the petty cash account.

On recommendation of the Engineer-in-Chief, the Commissioner of Public Works was requested to expedite the granting of permission to the New York Edison Company to open the streets where necessary for the purpose of installing an electric lighting system on the West Thirty-fourth Street Pier.

The Corporation Counsel was notified that the Commissioner is opposed to the passage of Senate Bill No. 395, providing for the acquisition by the city of lands under water surrounding Ward's Island, as any additional lands for the Manhattan State Hospital should be acquired by the State.

The New York Dock Company was notified that before its application for permission to erect a shed on its Pier No. 37, at the Atlantic Basin, Brooklyn, will be granted, an agreement must be filed, which shall be approved by the Corporation Counsel, that in case The City of New York shall at any time acquire either by purchase or condemnation, for the improvement of the water front, the said pier, that then and in that event no additional item of value beyond the actual cost of the shed shall be claimed by or allowed to the owners of the property for or on account of this permission, nor shall The City of New York be required to pay any additional value or compensation for or on account of the erection of said shed, except the actual value of the structure.

The claim against the American Transportation Company, \$1,069.85, for the cost of removing the sunken scow "Lester" from the slip on the south side of the West Fifty-fifth Street Pier was, on recommendation of the Chief Clerk, ordered sent to the Corporation Counsel for collection, the Department having been unable to collect the amount.

A petition was received from L. W. Freeman and others, asking that a protest be filed against the application made by the Burlee Dry Dock Company for a grant of land under water at Port Richmond, Staten Island; and the Commissioners of the Land Office were notified that this Department is opposed to the granting of the application on the ground that a portion of the premises sought to be acquired is owned by the city.

The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company was notified, in reply to inquiry, that the cost of erecting the shed and fixtures on Broad Street Pier, No. 4, East river, was \$64,140.94, and that the annual rental for such shed and fixtures is \$3,367.40.

On recommendation of the Engineer-in-Chief, the Terry and Tench Construction Company and the O. J. Gude Company were notified to remove an abandoned canal boat now lying in the vicinity of Spuyten Duyvil Station, Harlem river, and that unless the work of removal is commenced within five days it will be done by this Department at their cost and expense.

The Engineer-in-Chief, in accordance with his recommendation, was directed to furnish the timber necessary for extending two sewers through the crib now being built between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, Harlem river, the Contractor under Contract No. 710 having agreed to carry the sewer barrel through said crib.

The Municipal Civil Service Commission was requested to submit a list of persons eligible for appointment as Fireman.

Russell Bleecker was appointed Secretary of the Department, February 3, 1902, with compensation at the rate of \$4,000 per annum.

The consent of the Commissioner was granted February 3, 1902, for the transfer of Samuel F. Spellman, Stenographer and Typewriter, to the Court of Special Sessions.

The title of Daniel F. Shanahan was changed from Laborer to Machinist's Helper, with compensation at the rate of 30 cents per hour while employed, commencing February 8, 1902.

The resignations of Francis McMorrow, Pile Driver Engineerman, of Joseph M. Farrell, Tinsmith, of Adam DeVenny, Marine Sounder, and of Benjamin S. Fox, Laborer, were accepted.

The names of Daniel McLaughlin, Ship Carpenter, and of Michael J. Kelly and Michael Monahan, Laborers, deceased, were taken from the list of employees.

The Engineer-in-Chief, at request of Department of Public Charities, was directed to replace clusters of piles at the north side of the East Twenty-sixth Street Pier and at the Morgue structure.

The following communications were filed:

From the Comptroller, transmitting complaint from James Daly alleging that the construction of the cribwork north of One Hundred and Thirty-first street, Harlem river, is not being done in accordance with the specifications contained in Contract No. 710. Copy of Engineer-in-Chief's report sent to the Comptroller that the work is being done properly and in accordance with the plans and specifications.

From the Corporation Counsel:

1st. Advising that no permits can be issued by the Commissioner of Docks to occupy wharf property at other than the regular wharfrage rates, unless such permits shall have been first approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

2d. Stating that the action brought by the city to recover the south half of the East Eighth Street Pier will be tried as soon as possible.

3d. Transmitting form of contract advertisement to be used in the "City Record," and general forms of contracts for supplies, alterations and repairs, and services of architects and engineers.

4th. Transmitting approved form of lease of Wall Street Pier, No. 12, East River. War Department notified that lease is ready for execution.

5th. Suggesting that the matter of the acquisition of Market Slip Pier West, East river, be again brought to the attention of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Corporation Counsel notified that the consent of said Board has been obtained.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission, stating that Francis J. Ryan and Berthold Sommer passed examination for promotion to sixth grade clerk.

From the Commissioners of Accounts, stating that John W. Booth and assistants have been detailed to make examination of the books, records and accounts of this Department.

From Ralph J. Treat, requesting use of 375 feet of south sides of Canal Street Pier South and West Fifty-fifth Street Pier, North river. Notified that premises are already leased.

The following communications were laid over for consideration:

From the Department of Health, requesting permission to erect a waiting room and disinfecting chamber on the platform at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, East river.

From the Board of Armory Commissioners, requesting improvement of water front between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, South Brooklyn.

From the Consolidated Gas Company of New York, requesting reduction in rental charged for privilege of maintaining pipe through the bulkhead wall at the foot of West Forty-fourth street, North river.

From William S. B. Heacock, requesting permission to occupy premises at the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, North River, for maintaining bathing houses.
