## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Tuesday, September 3, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioner Meyer (President pro tem.) and Commissioner Murphy.

Absent—President Cram.

The minutes of the meetings held August 7 and 19, 1901, were approved.

The following communications were tabled for one month:

From John F. Maerz and the Jefferson Yacht Club—Protesting against the granting of the application of Jamieson & Bond for permission to construct a walkway at the foot of Academy avenue, Jamaica Bay, Rockaway Beach.

From the Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners—Requesting the consent of the Department to the construction of the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit extension.

The following reports on Secretary's Orders were referred to the Treasurer for collection:

No. 20511. Cost of relaying pavement taken up to permit repairs to gas-pipe leading to Pier, new 25, North river, \$77.24, for collection from the Consolidated Gas Company.

No. 21083. Cost of driving mooring piles on the south side of the Pier foot of Fiftieth street, North river, \$539.87, for collection from the Knickerbocker Steamboat Company.

No. 21084. Cost of driving mooring piles on the south side of the Pier foot of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, North river, \$173.92, for collection from the Knickerbocker Steamboat Company.

The following communications were also referred to the Treasurer:

From the Manhattan Railway Company—Requesting permission to construct exits for cable system at the foot of Second avenue and at the foot of Lincoln avenue, Harlem river.

From the Anderson-Murphy Company—Requesting permission to berth a scow in front of the bulkhead south of the Pier foot of Sixtieth street, East river, and to place a derrick on said bulkhead for the purpose of loading stone thereat.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Department of Water Supply, to lay a water-main on Twelfth avenue, between Fiftieth and Fifty-first streets, North river.

Anchor Line, to repair Pier, new 54, North river, from time to time, when required, during the ensuing six months.

New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, to repair Piers 25, 45, 46, 51 and 52, East river.

Holbrook, Cabot & Daly, to place temporarily a derrick on the inner end, northerly side of the Pier foot of Eighteenth street, East river, to be used in loading rip-rap stone thereat, the consent of the lessee having been obtained.

E. Ellery and Ellery O. Anderson, to construct a coal pocket between Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh streets, East river, in accordance with plans to be first approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

Boyce & Barnes Company, to construct a coal pocket on the Boulevard, between Main and Temple streets Astoria, Borough of Queens, in accordance with plans submitted as amended.

Theodore R. Chapman, to construct a bulkhead on the north side of Newtown creek, extending for a distance of about 125 feet westerly from the centre line of Gardner avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with plans to be first approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

Standard Oil Company of New York, to replace broken piles and fenders at the Piers foot of North Tenth, North Eleventh and North Twelfth streets, Brooklyn.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Municipal Assembly—Transmitting copy of resolution adopted July 2, 1901, requesting that the recreation piers and parks be kept open during the hot weather.

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—Transmitting copy of resolution adopted August 20, 1901, approving the amended plans for the improvement of the water-front between Forty-second and Forty-fourth streets, North river.

On motion, said resolution was ordered spread in full on the minutes as follows:

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby consent to and approve of the discontinuance of the Pier at the foot of West Forty-second street, the establishment of two ferry slips and the change in the length, width and location of the Piers at the foot of West Forty-third and West Forty-fourth streets in the Borough of Manhattan, as set forth in the resolution adopted by the Board of Docks at the meeting held July 19, 1901."

From Department of Taxes and Assessments, transmitting statement of assessed valuations of properties, between West Eighteenth and West Twentieth streets, North river, and between Rutgers slip and Jefferson street, and for a distance of 96 feet easterly of Jefferson street, East river.

From the District Attorney—Requesting information in relation to the construction of the crib-bulkhead around Riker's Island. Action of the Secretary in furnishing the desired plans and information approved.

From the Comptroller—Advising that his certificates have been indorsed upon Contracts Nos. 711 and 712 and that same are now valid contracts.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Approving forms of Contracts Nos. 715 and 716.

2d. Approving form of bond submitted by the Uvalde Asphalt Paving Company for the maintenance of the asphalt pavement between Twenty-first and Twenty-third streets, East river.

From Philip A. Smyth, auctioneer—Stating that the sale of old material held August 28, 1901, netted the sum of \$429.30.

From the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company—Stating that contract has been let for the removal of the old bridge foundations at the foot of Fourth avenue, Harlem river, the work to be completed on or before September 30, 1901.

From the American Ice Company, successors to H. D. Mould, deceased—Stating that they vacated the bulkhead at the foot of East One Hundred and Fourth street, East river, on August 31, 1901.

On motion, the permit granted to H. D. Mould to maintain an ice platform thereat was revoked as of August 31, 1901.

From C. H. Mallory & Co.—Requesting that this Department erect a shed on Pier, new 16, East river, to be leased to them at a rental of five per cent. per annum on the cost thereof. Application denied.

From the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company—Requesting on behalf of the Old Colony Steamboat Company a lease of the land under water adjoining Pier 31, East river, with the privilege of erecting platforms and sheds thereat. Application denied, the erection of such structures offshore of the bulkhead being illegal.

From E. A. Cruikshank & Co., agents—Requesting that permission be granted to maintain a private float on the southerly side of the Pier foot of East Twenty-ninth street. Application denied.

From the Bouker Contracting Company—In relation to the need of additional wharfage facilities at Fordham on the Harlem river. Secretary directed to state that all the public wharf property in that vicinity had been improved.

From George S. Macdonald—Requesting a reduction in the compensation charged him for the privilege of landing the steamer "S. E. Spring" at the foot of Main street, City Island.

On motion, the action of the Board in fixing the rental for said privilege was amended by fixing the rate at \$15 per month, payable monthly in advance to the Dock Master.

From the Central Vermont Railway Company—Requesting an extension of time to September 15, 1901, in which to vacate Pier, old 36, East river, and adjoining wharf property. Application granted.

From Herbert & Co.—Requesting that this Department place two mooring posts on the south side of the Pier foot of Twentieth street, East river. Secretary directed to state that such mooring posts must be placed by them as lessees.

From R. H. Hood Company—Requesting extension of time on Contract No. 697.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of building a freight shed on the Pier foot of West Fifty-ninth street, North river, under Contract No. 697, R. H. Hood Company, contractors, be and hereby is extended to and including September 10, 1901, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract be filed in this Department.

From the Treasurer—

1st. In relation to the applications of Barber & Co. for leases of the proposed new piers to be constructed between Forty-second and Forty-fourth streets, North river, and reporting that said applicants have already arranged for the desired accommodations in the Borough of Brooklyn.

2d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company for the privilege of landing the steamer "Chester W. Chapin" at the Pier foot of East Twenty-first street be fixed at the rate of \$15 per day, payable weekly to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the application of the Hammond Typewriter Company for permission to erect a bath-house between Sixty-ninth and Seventieth streets, East river, and to place scow thereat for the removal of cellar dirt, be denied. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Stating that the Department of Sewers have promised to force the completion of the sewer at the foot of East Twenty-third street, as rapidly as possible.

From the Dock Superintendent—Reports for the seven weeks ending August 31, 1901.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Reports for the two weeks ending August 24, 1901.

2d. Reporting the completion of Contract No. 703, August 22, 1901, and the commencement of Contract No. 714, August 19, 1901.

3d. Recommending that dredging be ordered in the slips and in front of the bulkheads between the Piers foot of West Fifty-second and West Fifty-sixth streets, North river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order the necessary dredging thereat, the work to be done under Treasurer's Orders, in accordance with the resolution adopted July 19, 1901.

4th. Recommending that the Pennsylvania Railroad Company be directed to construct a proper fender system in front of the bulkhead between Piers, new 27 and 28, North river. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending that the lessees be directed to make necessary repairs to the water-pipe leading to the Pier foot of West Twenty-second street. Recommendation adopted, all pavement to be taken up and relaid by the force of the Department at the cost and expense of the lessees.

6th. Recommending that the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company be directed to repair the bulkhead platform between Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth streets, North river. Recommendation adopted.

7th. Recommending that the Allan State Line be directed to repair the shed on the Pier foot of West Twenty-first street, where damaged by the steamer "Sardinian." Recommendation adopted.

8th. Recommending that John A. McCarthy, occupant, be directed to make necessary repairs to Pier 69, East river. Recommendation adopted.

9th. Reporting damage to the Pier foot of Fiftieth street, North river, by the tugboat "Victoria," owned by the Cornell Steamboat Company, and recommending that repairs be made by the force of the Department at the cost and expense of said company. Recommendation adopted.

10th. Recommending that the awning-shed now located at the foot of Fifty-second street, North river, be removed to the new-made land between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets, East river, to be used for recreation purposes. Recommendation adopted.

11th. Recommending that repairs be made by the force of the Department to Pier, old 58, North river, to the Pier foot of East Twenty-ninth street, to the Pier foot of East Ninety-sixth street, and to the backing-log on the bulkhead foot of One Hundred and Ninth street, Harlem river, Borough of Manhattan; and to the pavement in front of the Dock Master's office at the foot of North Second street, to the Pier foot of Noble street, and to the pavement on the bulkhead at Wallabout canal, east of Washington avenue and near the Dock Master's office at Wallabout Basin, Borough of Brooklyn. Recommendation adopted.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order 20737, stating that no repairs were necessary to the bulkheads foot of East Forty-third and East Forty-fourth streets.

13th. Report on Secretary's Order 21085, stating that it was unnecessary to cut a gangway on the north side of Pier, new 33, East river, the Portchester Transportation Company having made arrangements for a berth at another pier.

At a special meeting of the Board of Docks held Monday, September 16, 1901, at 2.45 P. M.

On motion, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, At the hands of an assassin, our beloved President was cruelly put to an untimely death,

Resolved, That this Board joins with the people of these United States and with the rest of the world in mourning the great loss sustained by our country, and tenders to his widow, his relatives and friends our deepest and most heartfelt sympathy in their bereavement; and in the strongest terms condemn the dastardly act and wrong that has been inflicted not alone on the life and person of William McKinley, but on the honor of our country; and be it further

Resolved, That as a mark of respect to the memory of our deceased President, the offices of the Department of Docks and Ferries be closed on Thursday, the 19th instant; that the music on the recreation piers be discontinued on the night of that day, and that Pier "A" be appropriately draped in mourning for a period of thirty days.

The following reports on Secretary's Orders were referred to the Treasurer for collection:

#### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, October 11, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—Commissioner Meyer (President pro tem.) and Commissioner Murphy.

Absent—President Cram.

The minutes of the meeting held October 4, 1901, were approved.

The protests of the Jefferson Yacht Club, John F. Maerz and the Jamaica Bay Yacht Club against the granting of the application of Jamieson & Bond for permission to construct a pier or walk-way at the foot of Academy avenue, Rockaway Beach, Borough of Queens, were taken from the table. Henry Hoyt appeared on behalf of the protestants and stated that there were already sufficient pier accommodations to accommodate the commercial necessities in that section, and that the additional pier was not to be used for commercial purposes. A representative of the firm of Jamieson & Bond was also present and contended that the pier was desired for commercial use.

On motion, the application of Jamieson & Bond was denied.

The communication from the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, transmitting copy of letter from the Kinnear Manufacturing Company in relation to the use of rolling shutters on the West Fifty-ninth Street Pier, No. 99, was referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to whether the use of the rolling shutters is an infringement of the patent rights of said company, and what action, if any, this Board should take in the matter.

The following communications were referred to the Treasurer:

From M. McGirr's Sons Company—Requesting permission to use a portion of the dump on the south side of the West Nineteenth Street Pier for the loading of manure thereat.

From the Moquin-Offerman-Heissenbuttel Coal Company—Requesting permission to use the bulkhead on the southerly side of Ninety-fifth street, North river, when completed, instead of the premises now occupied by them on the north side of said street.

From John McDermott & Son—Requesting a lease of the bulkhead between Pike Slip Pier, East, No. 32, and Rutgers Slip Pier, West, No. 33, East river, with the privilege of maintaining a steam hoist thereat.

From the New York Telephone Company—Requesting privilege of maintaining, under lease for a term of years, a cable-house, 7 by 17 feet, on the outer end of the Rutgers Slip Pier, West, No. 33, East river, and of running subsidiary pipes under the pier to carry submarine cables to said house.

Scott to maintain the ice bridge, scales and tally-house on the bulkhead between the Broome street and Delancey street piers, on the East river, said Scott having paid to the Department the rental due under the old permit; the renewal privilege to be subject to the same terms and conditions as the original permit, namely, that the structure shall remain only during the pleasure of the Board, and that compensation be paid therefor at the rate of \$1,200 per annum, payable monthly in advance to the Treasurer.

The Secretary reported that the pay-roll for the week ending October 4, 1901, amounting to \$18,234.35, and the special pay-roll for the salary of James C. Daly as Foreman Dock Builder, from October 1, 1900, to August 31, 1901, amounting to \$2,291.67, had been approved, audited and transmitted to the Department of Finance for payment.

The Board then went into executive session.

From Abraham Marks—Tendering his resignation as Marine Sounder. Resignation accepted.

The minutes of the meeting held October 25, 1901, were read, and adopted by the following vote:

Burke, contractor, for a payment to him of \$12,240.20 on account of his contract for the erection of the First Battery armory, in the Borough of Manhattan; this application was accompanied by a certificate from the architects that the materials and work were in accordance with the specifications, and also from the Assistant Clerk of the works, who similarly certified, and offered the following:
