Doctor S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: From March 3 to March 9, inclusive, forty-three operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital; eight at Gouverneur Hospital; four at Harlem Hospital, and three at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending Surgeons or their Assistants were present.

Dr. F. P. Wurtele, of the Third Medical Division, was infected with nasal diphtheria, and was transferred to the Minton Hospital.

Mr. M. J. Rickard, the Assistant Superintendent, requests permission to employ an additional Hospital Helper in the Bookkeeper's office, at a salary of \$50 a month. It is believed that, for the present at least, this service is needed, and it is recommended that authority be granted to employ such person.

The Police Department pays \$285 for horses. Their specifications are similar to those of this Department, but they purchase a larger number of horses. The Fire Department pays \$285 for horses for the engines, and \$325 for horses for the wagons of Chief officers. It does not seem apparent that more bids could be gained by re-advertising, as there seems to be a combination among the horse dealers in this City, and others will not bid to supply horses for the Department. New horses are urgently needed and authority is requested to have five horses sold at auction as soon as they can be replaced by new stock.

Authority is requested to purchase a vegetable peeling machine (with the necessary installation) for the main kitchen of Bellevue Hospital. The Belding & Franklin Machine Company offer to install the machine, with all connections complete, for \$330. Dr. Fitzgerald, of the Kings County Hospital, states that a barrel of potatoes can be peeled in one minute.

The tiling in the Assistant Superintendent's office and in the north and south halls of Bellevue Hospital is in very bad condition, and it is recommended that authority be given to accept the lowest of five bids on this work, the bid of the Eastern Marble Company, \$320, for the office, and \$150 for each hall.

Authority is requested to have the Duparquet, Huot & Moneuse Company connect the dish washing machine in the main kitchen of the new Fordham Hospital for the sum of \$130.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That the Assistant Superintendent be authorized to employ an additional Hospital Helper for the Bookkeeper's office, at \$50 per month.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That action on the bids for horses be deferred until next meeting.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That authority be given the General Medical Superintendent to purchase a vegetable peeling machine, at \$330.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That the estimates on the work of tiling the Assistant Superintendent's office and the north and south halls be referred to the President, with power.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That the estimate of the Duparquet, Huot & Moneuse Company on connecting the dish-washing machine at the new Fordham Hospital at \$130, be approved and accepted.

#### Reports of Committees.

Dr. Brannan reported that the plans for the new dormitory for male employees, which were referred to him at the last meeting, were satisfactory, but before steps can be taken to advertise for the work the approval of the Building Department will have to be obtained.

Dr. Brannan made a brief report upon the site taken by the City at Rockaway for hospital and convalescent institutions, this action having been originally requested by the Board of Trustees.

Dr. Brannan reported informally that an appropriation of \$850,000 for the buildings on the block north of Bellevue Hospital had been approved by the Board of Aldermen.

#### Communications.

A communication dated March 13, was received from Mr. R. F. Almirall, architect, inclosing four estimates from the John H. Parker Company, on the work of erecting an iron frame for awning, a wire mesh guard, painting iron work and erecting a canvas awning on the roof of the new Fordham Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That an advertisement be inserted in the City Record, calling for bids on the various items.

A communication dated March 11 was received from Dr. William M. Polk, Attending Gynaecologist on the Second Medical Division of Bellevue Hospital, applying for a leave of absence from March 12 to April 1.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That Dr. Polk's application be approved, Drs. Hamlen and Barrows being in charge of the service during his absence.

A communication dated March 9 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, enclosing a certified copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of

Estimate and Apportionment on March 8, authorizing an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$8,265.07, to provide means for the payment of expenses in connection with the acquisition of the land extending from First avenue to the East river, between Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets, required for the uses and purposes of Bellevue Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was placed on file. A communication dated March 9 was received from Mr. Frank Sutton suggesting the need of a pump for the boiler room of the new Fordham Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That this matter be referred to the architect, Mr. Raymond F. Almirall, for advice and recommendation.

A communication dated March 11 was received from the Sayles, Zahn Company, with assignment of contract for meats from A. M. Levy to the Sayles, Zahn Company.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That this assignment be approved and accepted by the Trustees.

The minutes of the Harlem Hospital Medical Board for the meeting of February 26, the Gouverneur Hospital Medical Board for the meeting of March 1, and the Fordham Hospital Medical Board for the meeting of March 2, were received and referred to Dr. Brannan for report at the next meeting.

A communication dated March 2 was received from Dr. G. R. Lockwood, Attending Physician on the First Division of Bellevue Hospital, in regard to the consumption of liquor on that division of the hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That this matter be referred to the General Medical Superintendent for further report at the next meeting.

A communication dated March 7 was received from Dr. J. R. Hayden, Attending Surgeon (genito-urinary) on the First Division of Bellevue Hospital, informing the Trustees that Drs. McCarthy and Bandler had, through a misunderstanding, presented their resignations.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was Resolved, That these resignations be withdrawn and that Dr. Joseph F. McCarthy and Dr. Clarence G. Bandler be and they hereby are appointed to the positions respectively of Assistant Genito-Urinary Surgeon and Surgeon to Out-Patients and Adjunct Assistant Attending Genito-Urinary Surgeon, First Division, Bellevue Hospital, for the remainder of the year 1907, having been recommended for these positions by Dr. Hayden, the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital and the Conference Committee of the First Division.

A communication dated March 14 was received from the Municipal Civil Service Commission asking for further information in regard to the position of Attending Physician to Tuberculosis Clinics in the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That this communication be placed on file and that a letter be sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment asking that this grade be established in the non-competitive class at a salary of fifty dollars a month.

A communication dated March 4 was received from the Department of Finance, asking that notice be sent to that department at the time the buildings at the present Fordham Hospital are ready to be turned over to the City.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was placed on file.

#### Unfinished Business.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That copies of the proposed rule governing the attendance of physicians and surgeons be prepared for each member of the Board and that the matter be made a special order at the next meeting.

By invitation of the Board Mr. Parish (of Messrs. Parish & Schroeder, architects for the new Training School) was present and spoke of extras needed in the construction of the new Nurses' Training School building. Mr. Parish explained the matters previously written of by his firm and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the matter of the supports for the roof be referred to the Engineer of the Finance Department for his advice. It was further

Resolved, That the Secretary address a communication to Mr. C. F. Lacombe, Chief Engineer of Light and Power (Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity), asking him to take up again with the architects the matter of the light in the bedrooms of the new Training School building. The architects were requested to provide a place for the installation of the new pump needed, and in the meantime the matter of purchase was deferred. Mr. Parish spoke also of the failure of Messrs. Candee, Smith and Howland to move from the premises despite letters received by them from the Board of Trustees, and it was, on motion, duly seconded,

Resolved, That the matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel, with the request that he take steps to oust them from the premises.

#### New Business.

## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York, Held at the Commission's Offices, No. 299 Broadway, on Wednesday March 20, 1907, at 10 a. m.

Present—President William F. Baker and Commissioners R. Ross Appleton and Alfred J. Talley.

The President, Mr. William F. Baker, presided.

A public hearing was had on the application of the Commissioner of Correction for an amendment of the classification of non-competitive positions by including therein the following: "Prison Van Driver." Mr. John P. Drever, General Book-keeper and Auditor, Department of Correction, representing the Commissioner, appeared in behalf of the amendment, which was opposed by Mr. Albert de Roode, Assistant Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association. The hearing then closed.

After the Commission had gone into regular session, the minutes of the meeting held March 13 were approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification of non-competitive positions under the heading "Positions in the Department of Public Charities, the Department of Correction, the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, the New York and Brooklyn Truant Schools, and the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School," as fixed by the rules, be and the same hereby is amended by including therein the following: "Prison Van Driver."

The Committee on Transfers recommended that the following transfers be approved:

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to summon Michael Bennedetto, of No. 401 East One Hundredth street, and Thomas F. White, of No. 551 Broome street, to appear before the Commission on Wednesday morning, March 27, 1907, at 10 o'clock, to show cause why their names should not be stricken from the eligible list of Patrolman under the provisions of Rule VII., paragraph 14.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated March 8, recommending that in the examination for Monitor, Civil Service Commission, one paper be given candidates, on which would be required 70 per cent., and that such paper include questions in arithmetic. The recommendation was adopted, but the Secretary was directed not to fix a date for the examination until notified to do so by the Commission.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated March 18, with reference to the protest of James F. Martin, of No. 1257 Park avenue, against the arithmetic in the recent examination for Inspector of Masonry Construction. The Chief Examiner stated that that paper was drawn up after careful consideration and presented no problems that might not at any time confront an Inspector of Masonry, and that an Inspector of Masonry Construction should be something more than a mason. The papers were ordered filed.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner, dated March 13, with reference to a letter of the Fire Commissioner, dated March 11, transmitting a communication addressed to him by Chief Croker of that Department, recommending that Lieutenant Hock be given credit in his examination for promotion to Foreman for a meritorious act performed during the year 1903. It appeared from the report, first, that as the eligible list for Foreman was established on February 27, 1906, and was more than a year old, and as the rules provide that all corrections shall be made during the first year of a list's existence, the Commission was without power to make the requested correction; and secondly, that, in order to be rated in a given examination, an award must be made prior to the date of that examination, which was not done in the Hock case. The Secretary was directed to inform the Fire Commissioner that the request of Chief Croker could not be granted, but that, under the new rules, the candidate would be given credit for the award mentioned in his next examination for promotion.

A report was presented from the Chief Pay Roll Clerk, dated March 15, submitting, for the consideration of the Commission, fifteen supplementary payrolls for the salary of Frank Ciancimino, Interpreter in the City Magistrate's Court, Brooklyn, whose name had not appeared on the payroll of that Court since December 1, 1905. The report stated that, upon inquiry, word had been received at the office of the Commission on June 7, 1906, to the effect that the said employee had been suspended from duty pending a trial on charges that had been referred against him; and that no word was again received until March 5, 1907, when the President of the Board of City Magistrates, Second Division, had notified the Commission of Mr. Ciancimino's reassignment to duty, and asked approval of the payrolls covering his salary for services rendered from December 1, 1905, to February 28, 1907. 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The action of the Secretary was approved.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission, dated March 14, returning, in accordance with the request of the Commission, its resolution of January 30, 1907, including in the exempt class the position of Superintendent of Asphalt Repair Plant, Brooklyn. The communication was ordered filed.

A communication was presented from the President of the State Civil Service Commission, dated March 19, inclosing copies of bills Nos. 767 (Int. 651) and 769 (Int. 653), introduced in the Legislature, amending the Civil Service Law in accordance with the recommendations of the conference of Civil Service Commissioners held in Albany on October 11 and 12, 1906; and requesting the opinion of the Municipal Commission regarding the same. After due consideration of the matter, it appearing that the Commission was in favor of the proposed changes in the law, the President was requested to communicate with President Milliken and so inform him.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Acting Corporation Counsel, dated March 16, 1907:

"Hon. WILLIAM F. BAKER, President, Municipal Civil Service Commission:

"Sir—I am in receipt of your communication, dated March 7, 1907, with which you transmit payroll of Joseph C. Graveur, Probation Officer in the Court of Special Sessions, together with certain explanations attached thereto by Charles W. Culklin, Clerk of the Court, and request me to inform you whether your Commission can legally attach its certificate to the same in view of the fact that the position of Probation Officer is in the competitive class and there being an eligible list in existence for same upon which Mr. Graveur's name does not appear.

"These facts are before me. On September 9, 1901, Mr. Graveur was appointed Probation Officer of the Court of Special Sessions, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 372 of the Laws of 1901; that he has held the place continuously since that time; that there was inserted in the Annual Tax Budget for 1906, a provision for the payment of an annual salary of \$1,500 to him, and that pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Charter, the Board of Aldermen, on the recommendation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, fixed his salary at \$1,500 per annum. These facts are obtained from the communications of Clerk Culklin attached to the payroll.

"Section 11a of the Code of Criminal Procedure, as amended by chapter 372 of the Laws of 1901, authorizes the Court of Special Sessions to appoint a person to perform the duties of Probation Officer, to hold such office during the pleasure of the Court.

"It would seem from the statements before me and from a reading of the statute that Mr. Graveur has obtained one appointment only, namely, that of September 9, 1901, and that he has continued to hold his position ever since during the pleasure of the Court.

"I assume that at the time of his appointment as Probation Officer, no eligible list was in existence; that he therefore obtained a valid appointment without submitting to competitive examination, and that the provision of the statute to the effect that he should hold office during the pleasure of the Court, continues his tenure of office and imposes a duty upon the Civil Service Commissioners to certify to the validity of his appointment under the law, and a duty upon the Comptroller to pay his salary.

"I return herewith the payroll with communications attached.

Powers, Temporary Clerk, who was appointed in that office on December 20, 1906, for the reason that the work on which he was engaged was uncompleted, and stating that it was expected that the said work would last for an additional six weeks or two months. The request was granted.

The reassignment to duty of Henry B. Quinlan, Inspector of Sewer Construction in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity (Brooklyn), was approved, it appearing that his absence from duty since December 24, 1906, was due to illness. (Certificate.)

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Licenses, dated March 15, requesting authority to employ Mr. James R. Ryan as Special Investigator for a period not to exceed six weeks, at a total compensation of \$150.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 6, Mr. James R. Ryan be and he hereby is exempted from examination, to be employed in the office of the Commissioner of Licenses as a Special Investigator, it appearing that the services are expert and of an occasional and exceptional character; provided that his compensation shall not exceed \$150.

A communication was presented from the Acting President of the Borough of Richmond, dated March 11, requesting that the name of Paul Gordon be restored to the list of Topographical Draughtsman, and stating that, owing to an incomplete address, the notice sent the candidate did not reach him in time to report within the four days prescribed by the rules. The request was granted.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated March 15, stating that in the operation of the new asphalt repair plant in that borough it would be necessary to have a force of laborers and other employees under titles not appearing in the present classification, and requesting, therefore, that the classification be amended by including therein titles appropriate for that work. The matter was referred to the Labor Clerk for a recommendation as to what additional titles would be required.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, nominating Mr. David F. Moore, Superintendent of the bureau of Buildings, as a member of the Departmental Examining Board in place of Mr. Frank J. Ulrich, Superintendent of the Bureau of Highways. The appointment was approved.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated March 19, stating that owing to the new system of appointing persons from the eligible list of Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving to perform the work heretofore done by the so-called "Corporation Inspectors," he would require about one hundred and twenty of such employees in the near future; and asking, in view of the fact that the existing eligible list of Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving would not be adequate for the needs of his department, that the Commission conduct an open competitive examination for that position at the earliest possible date. On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to proceed with an open competitive examination for Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving at an early date.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated March 19, asking the Commission to rescind its action of January 22, 1907, in canceling the promotion of Henry E. Hanlon from the position of Messenger in the Bureau of Highways to that of Fourth Grade Clerk (\$1,350 per annum), in view of the amendment to clause 2 of Civil Service Rule XV., adopted February 27, 1907, permitting promotions from the ungraded to the graded service in the discretion of the Commission.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the action of the Commission taken January 22, 1907, canceling the promotion of Henry E. Hanlon from Messenger to Clerk (fourth grade) in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, be and the same hereby is rescinded, in view of the amendment to Rule XV., Clause 2, adopted February 27, 1907, permitting promotions from the ungraded to the graded service in the discretion of this Commission where the nature of the duties of the candidates is such as to fit them for the position to which they seek promotion.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Bridges, dated March 13, requesting approval of the appointment of Mr. C. Mazean as Assistant Engineer in that department, under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 5, to supervise the designing and construction of the new Manhattan Terminal of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge, and stating that, owing to the combination of railroad work, complicated structural design, and the necessity for the maintenance of traffic during the operations, a man of special experience and training was required. It appearing from the communication that Mr. Mazean possessed the necessary qualifications for the work in view, the requirement of competition was waived in his case, and the appointment was approved under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 5.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Bridges, dated March 19, stating that he would require the services of an expert Inspector of Steel in connection with the erection of an elevated structure connecting the Williamsburg Bridge with the Brooklyn Elevated Railroad, for a period of six months, and requesting authority to employ Mr. Charles F. Stowell, of No. 51 State street, Albany, N. Y., in that capacity, with compensation not to exceed \$800. The matter was referred back to the Commissioner of Bridges with a request for a statement of the qualifications possessed by Mr. Stowell for the work in view.

A communication was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated March 19, requesting the Commission to hold an open competitive examination for Assistant Engineer (Designer), it being necessary to fill a number of vacancies in that position in its office as a compensation of \$1,800 per annum; and requesting also that the requirement of residence in the State of New York, and the requirement of Rule VIII., regarding vouchers, be waived so far as they applied to that examination.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to proceed with an open competitive examination for Assistant Engineer (Designer) at an early date.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the requirement of residence in the State of New York be and the same hereby is waived so far as it applies to the coming examination for Assistant Engineer (Designer).

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the provision of Rule VIII., clause 2, to the effect that if the previous occupation or employment of an applicant has been wholly or in part outside The City of New York, not more than two of his vouchers may be persons resident or engaged in business elsewhere, be and the same hereby is waived so far as it applies to the coming examination for Assistant Engineer (Designer).

A communication was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated March 19, requesting authority to make seven or eight provisional appointments to the position of Assistant Engineer (Designer), under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 3.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to summon the persons nominated by the Board of Water Supply for a non-competitive examination to qualify them for provisional appointment as Assistant Engineers (Designers), in that Department, with salary at the rate of \$150 a month, in accordance with the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 3.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York, acting in accordance with clause 6 of Rule XII., hereby exempts from competitive examination John P. Mitchel, Esq., attorney and counsellor-at-law, of No. 76 William street, New York City; Marvyn Scudder, of No. 52 Wall street; John R. MacNeille, of No. 52 Wall street; John J. Boag, of No. 30 Broad street, and Allen W. Dow, of No. 120 East Twenty-third street, to be employed by the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York in the investigation of the Department of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, as directed by the Mayor of The City of New York.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York, acting in pursuance of the authority conferred on it by clause 6 of Rule XII., of the Municipal Civil Service Rules, hereby exempts from competitive examination Edward Maxson, Esq., attorney and counsellor-at-law, of No. 25 Broad street, New York City, to be employed by the Corporation Counsel in the preparation and investigation of City vs. American Sugar Refining Company, and City vs. New York Edison Company.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York, acting in pursuance of the authority conferred on it by clause 6, of Rule XII., of the Municipal Civil Service Rules, hereby exempts from examination Mr. James A. Lyon, of No. 150 Nassau street, to be employed by the Corporation Counsel as Stenographer, and assigned to the Commissioners of Appraisal in condemnation proceedings, authorized by chapter 724 of the Laws of 1905; said employment to be from time to time, in the discretion of the Chairman of said condemnation proceedings.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 6, Allen S. Jones, of No. 857 Herkimer street, Brooklyn, Marine Engineer, be and he hereby is exempted from examination, to be employed in the Metropolitan Sewerage Commission until May 1, 1907, at a compensation not to exceed \$3.25 a day while employed.

The reassignment to duty of Miss Mabel E. Macomber, Playground Attendant in the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, was approved, it appearing from the certificate furnished that her absence from November 8, 1906, was due to illness.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Public Charities, dated March 18, transmitting a supplementary payroll for salary of Miss Luella P. Burns, No. 896 Third avenue, Manhattan, requesting that the Commission approve his transfer from the position of Cleaner in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan to that of Inspector of Lamps and Gas in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, on the ground that he formerly held the latter position. The Secretary was instructed to inform the candidate that it would be necessary for the request for his transfer to be made by the head of the department to which transfer was sought.

The Commission then adjourned to meet Wednesday, March 27, 1907, at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

Appeal No. 9 of 1907, Alteration 3235 of 1906, premises No. 149 Broadway, Manhattan, Ernest Flagg, architect and appellant.

"No. 1. By adding the new stories the building will be made to exceed twelve stories and 150 feet in height. The entire building must be made to conform to section 105 of the Code, relating to the fireproofing of buildings of that height."

First—Section 105 of the Code, I respectfully submit, with regard to the fireproofing of interior woodwork and external window frames and sash, does not apply to the present building, which, eleven stories and 156 feet in height, was passed in 1897 as fireproof, in accordance with the requirements of the Building Law then in force, the interior woodwork and external window frames and sash being made of first-class hard wood, oak and cherry, the flooring of oak and hard pine on steel beams and tile arches.

Second—That part of section 105 of the Code, above referred to, I respectfully submit, applies only to the three additional stories that I propose to erect upon the present building, and these additional stories I will construct in conformity with all the requirements of section 105 of the Code.

Third—It would be a great hardship; in fact, it would be practically impossible to remove and replace the interior woodwork and external window sash and frames in the present building, as its offices are fully occupied by tenants, such as bankers, trust companies, etc., holding long leases.

An approval of the application to make the floors in the three new stories of cement or other approved fireproof composition, the inside window frames, doors and all interior trim in the three new stories of metal, all outside window sash and frames in the three new stories of metal, but to leave the floors, interior trim and external window frames and sashes in the present building as they are now.

To make the interior floors, woodwork, trim and external window frames and sashes for the three new stories fireproof is a fair compliance with the spirit of the Code, which is not retroactive, which further, according to section 2, is to be construed literally to secure the beneficial interests and purposes thereof, and which does not therefore contemplate, I respectfully submit, extensive, costly and impracticable tearing out of work previously accepted and passed as fully satisfactory in a fireproof office building over 150 feet in height. To enforce such a requirement would place practically insurmountable obstructions in the path of a desirable improvement, tending to enhance the value of the taxable property of the City. These views were taken, your appellant is credibly informed, by the Bureau of Buildings in the case of the old Times Building and the Tribune Building, and I therefore respectfully petition you to act favorably upon this, a parallel case.

Section 5-C-3: This part of Section 5-C consists of a loop beginning in the Borough of The Bronx at a point in Park avenue between One Hundred and Fifty-first and One Hundred and Fifty-second streets, and runs thence northwesterly and westerly under private property and connects with the spur Section 5-C-2 above described near the point where the centre line of said spur would intersect One Hundred and Fifty-first street if produced.

Section 5-D-1: This part of Section 5-D, as described in the routes and general plan, begins at the southerly end of Section 5-O, above described, in Lexington avenue, between Forty-second and Forty-third streets, and runs thence southerly under Lexington avenue to a point about half way between Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh streets, at which point the tracks will diverge into two branches. Section 5-D-1: Begins at the southerly end of Section 5-D-2, and runs thence southerly under Broadway, Vesey street, Church street, Trinity place and Greenwich street to a suitable terminus under Battery Park.

The general plan of construction calls for a railroad placed in subways or tunnels. The road is intended to be operated by electricity or some other power not requiring combustion within the tunnels, and the motors are intended to be capable of moving trains at a speed of not less than forty miles per hour for long distances, exclusive of stops.

For all of Sections 5-O-1, 5-O-2, 5-O-3 and 5-A there will be four tracks. For Section 5-B there will be two tracks. For Section 5-C-1 and Section 5-C-2, there will be two tracks. If the contract covers two or more parts of the road, the deposit shall be the aggregate of the deposits required in respect of each of the several parts contracted for.

(2) By giving a bond in a penalty equal to the amount of the deposit as above required. At the option of the contractor, cash or approved securities may be deposited instead of giving a bond.

If securities are deposited for any purpose under this contract they must be of the character of securities in which savings banks may invest their funds and must be approved by the Board. Bonds must be in one of the forms annexed to the form of contract.

In addition, and as further security to the City, 10 per cent. of each amount certified from time to time to be due to the contractor will be retained until the railroad is completed.

SEVENTH AND EIGHTH AVENUE AND JEROME AVENUE SUBWAY ROUTES.

If the contract covers two or more parts of the road, the deposit shall be the aggregate of the deposits required in respect of each of the several parts contracted for.

### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

#### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
